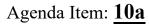

- Mae supports the Asian American Garden, the Food Gardena and Children's Sensory Garden at Locke Paddon Park. This is a place to reset and reflect and feel at peace. It will bring people together. This will be a legendary project.
- Young Soo Oh supports the Asian American Garden and believes the councilmembers are doing a great job for Marina.
- Young approves the Asian American Garden. This will provide a learning experience for the Asian American children, to teach them about heritage.
- Elphi strongly rejects the idea that the new projects in Lock Paddon Park be removed and fully supports all the projects being recommended by staff.
- Angie Landrum volunteers at the community garden and would like to encourage the city to adopt all the project being presented by staff as city projects.
- Grace Silva-Santella spoke about the study conducted by residents titled Lock Padden Wetland Community Park. Urged the council to work with the Parks District and spend city resources to update
- a maintenance agreement, define boundaries of the Holiday Inn mitigation area. Additional funding is needed to maintain the wetlands and landscape.
- Laura Hoover spoke in favor of the Community Projects on Lot 43 next to the public library and requested that the City of Marina take on these projects as city-sponsored projects.

- Fred Nelson expressed his support for the recommended project from staff. Commented on the homeless population.
- Scott supports the recommendation from staff. Volunteers at the community gardens. The whole area is a great place for communities of all types. Suggested doing a land swap to make things happen.
- Nancy Amadeo noted Locke Paddon Park used to be a quiet place where you could enjoy the birds. Expressed concerns about the property's current state due to disagreements between the city and the parks district about maintenance. Suggested placing the Asian American Garden at Vince DiMaggio Park's lower field.
- Arun Jani spoke about CSUMB students required to participate in the Learning Service program which allows them to interact in the community while working at the Locke Paddon Park Oak Woodland area. Spoke about working with the Elkhorn Slough Foundation, and with removing invasive eucalyptus from conservation land.
- Jeff Markham thanked the members of Citizens for Sustainable Marina and the members of the Asian Communities of Marina for continuing to advocate for the projects at Lock Patton Park. The Park District has heard your desire to create an Asian-themed garden at Locke Paddon Park, and our board expressed our support. Spoke of the history of the park and the work that needs to be done. We look forward to working with the community and city to do so.

RECOMMENDATION: it is recommended that the City Council consider:

- 1. Adopting Resolution No. 2025-, authorizing the City Manager or City Manager's Designee to submit a Pro-housing Designation Program Application to the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD); and
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to execute all documents deemed necessary or appropriate to participate in the Pro-housing Designation Program

BACKGROUND

In an effort to address the housing crisis in the State of California, as part of the 2019-2022 Budget Act, the legislature enacted AB 101 and established the Pro-housing Designation Program. The Pro-housing Designation Program identifies local policies that jurisdictions should consider adopting to address housing needs and affordability and identifies State programs and grants for which Pro-housing designated jurisdictions should receive preference or additional points.

Jurisdictions awarded a Pro-housing Designation will receive a competitive advantage for critical affordable housing and infrastructure grant programs, including, the Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program, Transformative Climate Communities, Infill Incentive Grant Program, and Pro-housing Incentive Program. To be eligible to apply for the designation, the Housing Element must be certified by HCD, and a resolution must be adopted by the City Council directing staff to apply for the designation. The Marina Sixth Cycle Housing Element was certified on April 11, 2024.

On March 5, 2024, the City Council adopted Resolution 2024-21 directing staff to file for the Prohousing Designation. After the submission of the applicant, HCD identified that the adopted resolution did not have all the enabling legislation required by the Pro-housing Designation. Additionally, HCD staff directed the city to bolster certain responses to ensure the city met all threshold requirements to receive the designation.

FISCAL IMPACT

Local governments with Pro-housing Designation are eligible to apply for new Pro-housing Incentive Program grant funding, a \$26 million state investment from the Building Homes and Jobs Trust Fund: Pro-housing Incentive Pilot (PIP). Pro-housing designated local governments can also receive priority processing or funding points when applying for several funding programs including:

- Affordable Housing & Sustainable Communities (AHSC)
- Infill Infrastructure Grant (IIG)
- Transformative Climate Communities (TCC)
- Solutions for Congested Corridors
- Local Partnership Program
- Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP)

WHEREAS, the City of Marina ("Applicant") desires to submit an Application for a Pro housing Designation ("Application").

THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. Applicant is hereby authorized and directed to submit an Application to the Department.
- 2. Applicant acknowledges and confirms that it is currently in compliance with applicable state housing law.
- 3. Applicant acknowledges and confirms that it will continue to comply with applicable housing laws and to refrain from enacting laws, developing policies, or taking other local governmental actions that may or do inhibit or constrain housing production. Examples of such local laws, policies, and actions include moratoriums on development; local voter approval requirements related to housing production; downzoning; and unduly restrictive or onerous zoning regulations, development standards, or permit procedures. Applicant further acknowledges and confirms that the Pro housing Policies in its Application comply with its duty to Affirmatively Further Fair Housing pursuant to Government Code sections 8899.50 and 65583. Applicant further acknowledges and confirms that its general plan is in alignment with an adopted sustainable community's strategy pursuant to Public Resources Code section 21155-21155.4. Applicant further acknowledges and confirms that its policies for the treatment of homeless encampments on public property comply with and will continue to comply with the Constitution and that it has enacted best practices in its jurisdiction that are consistent with the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness' "7 Principles for Addressing Encampments" (June 17, 2022, update).
- 4. If the Application is approved, Applicant is hereby authorized and directed to enter into, execute, and deliver all documents required or deemed necessary or appropriate to participate in the Program, and all amendments thereto (the "Program Documents").
- 5. Applicant acknowledges and agrees that it shall be subject to the Application; the terms and conditions specified in the Program Documents; the Program Regulations; and any and all other applicable law.

6. The City Manager is authorized to execute and deliver the Application and the Program Documents on behalf of the Applicant for participation in the Program.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is requested that the City Council:

- 1. Consider adopting Resolution No. 2025-, fixing and levying a special tax for principal and interest payments and administrative costs on the 2015 General Obligation Refunding Library Bonds for fiscal year 2025-2026; and
- 2. Consider adopting Resolution No. 2025-, certifying compliance with State Law (Proposition 218) with respect to special taxes for the 2015 General Obligation Refunding Library Bonds Levy for Fiscal Year 2025-2026.

BACKGROUND:

On June 8, 2005, the City issued \$8,000,000 of General Obligation Bonds Election of 2002, Series 2005 to fund construction of a new library facility. On May 12, 2015, the City issued \$7,640,000 general obligation bonds to refund the 2005 General Obligation Library Construction Bond Issue which was approved by the voters. The refunding provided savings to the City taxpayers due to the low interest rate environment. The true interest cost of the refunding is estimated to be 3.17%. The term of the bonds was not extended by the refunding. Final maturity is August 1, 2035, with twenty-one more payments. The current bonds outstanding are \$5,480,000.

California Revenue and Taxation Code Section 2270 authorizes the City to levy taxes to pay principal and interest on voter-approved bonded indebtedness. No other general obligation bonds are outstanding. For 2025-26, only the 2015 general obligation bonded debt tax levy is required.

Except for the Constitutionally-limited 1% ad valorem tax, the Monterey County Auditor-Controller will not place special taxes on the rolls unless the City Council certifies by resolution that the City is in compliance with Proposition 218, the 1996 'Right to Vote on Taxes Act' with respect to each such tax. The Certification Resolution must contain hold harmless and indemnification provisions for administrative expenses of the County associated with collection of the City's special taxes placed on the rolls. This certification, along with a copy of the resolution setting the special taxes and certain other documentation, must also be submitted to the County no later than August 1, 2025. The city requested and received an extension to August 7, 2025.

Estimated Assessed Values produce a tax rate of \$14.527 per \$100,000 assessed value for the 2015 refunding bond issue, which is less than the \$16.044 levy for FY 24-25 as a result of growth in assessed values.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Revenue collected will be credited to the 2015 GO Library Refunding Bonds Debt Service Fund 312.

WHEREAS, Section 2270 of the Revenue and taxation Code authorizes the City to levy taxes to pay principal, interest and administrative costs on voter-approved bonded indebtedness of the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Marina as follows:

- 1. The City has determined the 2025-2026 general obligation bonded indebtedness cost and cash requirement to be \$592,079 for the 2015 General Obligation Refunding Bonds.
- 2. CITY COUNCIL CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2025, APPROVING THE APPLICATION FOR FUNDING UNDER THE LAND AND WATER CONSERVATION FUND (LWCF) PROGRAM FOR THE BASEBALL FIELD EXPANSION AT PRESTON PARK

REQUEST:

It is requested that the City Council consider:

- 1. Adopting Resolution No. 2025-, authorizing the application for funding under the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) program for the Baseball Field Expansion at Preston Park; and
- 2. Appointing Michaelle Mowery, Administrative Assistant II Public Works Department, as the City's authorized agent to conduct negotiations, submit documentation, and execute agreements necessary to complete the project.

BACKGROUND

The Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) is a federal program created by Congress under Public Law 88-578. It provides matching grants to states and local governments to help buy land and develop outdoor recreation areas and facilities. In California, the program is managed by the Department of Parks and Recreation.

The City of Marina is planning to improve recreational amenities at Preston Park by upgrading the existing baseball fields and expanding the park to include two additional fields which will be designed to also be used for youth soccer and baseball. The project is meant to better serve local youth sports and community activities. Potential expansions include field surfacing, fencing, dugouts, bleachers, lighting, accessibility upgrades, and additional parking.

To apply for LWCF funding, the City needs to pass a resolution that approves the application and confirms that matching funds are available. The grant will cover up to 50% of the project costs, and the upgraded field must remain dedicated to public outdoor recreation use going forward.

ANALYSIS

The field expansion will enhance the City's recreational infrastructure by improving and expanding a widely used public sports facility. These improvements align with the City's goals to promote outdoor recreation, community health, and youth development. Approval of this resolution allows the City to formally apply for LWCF funding and demonstrates the City's commitment to maintaining high-quality public amenities.

If awarded, LWCF grant funds may reimburse 50% of the total project cost, up to a maximum of Four Million Dollars. The remaining costs will be covered by local matching funds from eligible sources.

FISCAL IMPACT

The current estimate for the Preston Park Field Expansion Project is \$8,641,858. City Council has already allocated \$8,050,000 (Project #QLP2113 – Preston Park Upgrades), and has committed an additional \$2,500,000 toward Preston Park Upgrades in the out years. This additional \$2,500,000 will come from Parks Impact Fees or the General Fund or a combination of the two. If awarded the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) Program Grant, the City will be eligible to receive 50% of the total project cost, up to a maximum of Four Million Dollars in grant funding.

The Secretary shall approve a conversion only if the Secretary finds it to be in accordance with the then-existing comprehensive statewide outdoor recreation plan and only on such conditions as the Secretary considers necessary to ensure the substitution of other recreation properties of at least equal fair market value and of reasonably equivalent usefulness and location."
- 4. Certifies that said agency has matching funds from eligible source(s) and can finance 100 percent of the project, which up to half may be reimbursed; and
- 5. Agrees to comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and guidelines.
- 6. Appoints Michaelle Mowery (Administrative Assistant II Public Works Department) as agent of the applicant to conduct all negotiations and execute and submit all documents, including, but not limited to, applications, contracts, amendments, payment requests, and compliance with all applicable current state and federal laws which may be necessary for the completion of the aforementioned project.

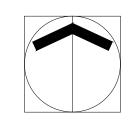


FIELD LAYOUT - CONCEPT 2

RECOMMENDATION TO CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2025-, APPROVING PURCHASE OF A PREFABRICATED RESTROOM FACILITY FROM PUBLIC RESTROOM COMPANY OF WINDEN, NV, AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER OR HIS DESIGNEE TO EXECUTE PURCHASE AGREEMENTS ON BEHALF OF THE CITY SUBJECT TO FINAL REVIEW AND APPROVAL BY THE CITY ATTORNEY, AND AUTHORIZING THE FINANCE DIRECTOR TO MAKE NECESSARY ACCOUNTING AND BUDGETARY ENTRIES.

REQUEST:

It is requested that the City Council:

- 1. Consider adopting Resolution No. 2025- approving the purchase of one Prefabricated Restroom Facility from Public Restroom Company of Winden, NV, for \$298,453.00;
- 2. Authorize the City Manager or his designee to execute purchase agreements on behalf of the City subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney; and
- 3. Authorize the Finance Director to make necessary accounting and budgetary entries.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Marina has long prioritized the improvement of public parks. To that end, the City Council has previously approved Capital Improvement Project QLP 2112, allocating \$1,435,000 for the purchase and installation of playground equipment, playground surfacing, and the construction of new restroom facilities at Windy Hill Park.

Installation of the new playground and playground surface was completed in June 2025 and has become a very popular amenity and is actively used by Marina residents.

Staff reviewed multiple restroom vendors and selected Public Restroom Company of Winden, Nevada, due to their extensive model options, reputation in the municipal sector, and quality of products. The procurement process is conducted via the Sourcewell cooperative purchasing program, which ensures a competitive, compliant, and efficient procurement that meets or exceeds local bidding requirements.

ANALYSIS:

The selected restroom model includes essential features such as exterior lighting, exterior drinking fountains with a water bottle filler, two ADA-compliant restrooms, and a separate mechanical room to facilitate routine maintenance.

In April, the Council approved a professional services agreement with Yamabe & Horn Engineering, Inc. of Fresno, CA, to provide engineering and land surveying services critical for designing the infrastructure needed for the restroom installation. Yamabe & Horn has completed the necessary surveying and initial design steps. After the restroom is ordered, it will be built over the following months, with an expected delivery approximately 10 months from the order date. Upon receipt, final engineering design, infrastructure bidding, and installation will be completed, and the restroom will be operational and open to the public by summer 2026.

The bidding requirement for this purchase is satisfied through a Sourcewell cooperative purchasing program. Cooperative purchasing is defined by the American Bar Association Model Procurement Code for State and Local Governments as "Procurement conducted by, or on behalf of, one or more Public Procurement Units." Sourcewell's analysts facilitate the procurement process by developing Requests for Proposals (RFPs) and Invitations for Bids (IFBs) for national, competitive solicitations that meet or exceed local requirements. Their rigorous process is continually refined to best serve the needs of participating agencies and ensures access to exceptional products from nationally recognized suppliers. The contract number for this purchase is 081721-PRM.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Funding for the restroom purchase is included in the existing budget approved for Windy Hill Park upgrades (Project #QLP2112). The project costs, including procurement, engineering, infrastructure, and installation, are within the allocated budget, and there is no anticipated additional fiscal impact beyond the existing approved funding.

1. Restroom Building delivered to site @ \$ 262,810

Public Restroom Company (PRC) herein bids to *furnish* (building only per plans and specifications, delivered to site with all costs except installation including applicable taxes excluding retention. (Retention is not allowed as this is materials or a product fully assembled before shipment to the site and therefore not subject to retention.)

- 2. Installation: Turnkey Installation of the Building above @ \$ 35,643 with retention allowed. Public Restroom Company also includes in this two-part quotation our turnkey installation package for this building. Our national factory authorized installation team will:
 - a. Arrive onsite to confirm and verify the Owner/General Contractor provided scope of work in preparation for installation including access to the site.
 - b. Verify the building pad size, building corners, finished slab elevation, utility depth and location, meter size and distance from building, and compaction compliance.
 - c. Excavate the utility trenches for placement of our prefabricated underground piping tree for the buildings plumbing and electrical, set the kit in place, provide the water test for inspection before backfilling, and then place the site adjacent coarse sand you provide to us alongside the building pad and screed it level for final building placement. We will need onsite water availability for wetting the sand bed before building placement to consolidate the pad.
 - d. Set the building on the site pad.
 - Connect the utility piping stub ups to the building piping stub down building points of connection for water, sewer, and electrical conduit to the building internal electrical panel.

3. Owner/General Contractor Final Tie In of Utilities and other site work:

- a. The Owner/Contractor is responsible for making all <u>final plumbing connections</u> at the 6' POC locations.
- b. The Owner/Contractor is responsible for pulling wire and completing all final tie-ins to the electrical panel from the 6' POC location.
- c. The Owner/Contractor is responsible for preparing the pad/foundation. PRC will trench through provided pad/foundation to run utilities to 6' POC locations.

OWNER/GENERAL CONTRACTOR SCOPE OF WORK WITH/WITHOUT FOOTINGS:

Scope of Work Background:

Owner/General Contractor shall survey the site, establish survey for the building pad and prefabricated building slab elevation and front corners, excavate for building footings (if required), locate footing sleeves for electrical, waste, and water, pour the footings (if required), furnish sand base adjacent to subgrade pad, and provide location for utility POC's nominally 6' outside the foundation.

Preparation of Building Pad:

Owner/General Contractor is responsible for providing the building subgrade pad or when required footings to frost depth per Public Restroom Company design specifications. PRC will provide detailed drawings for the subgrade building pad, utilities POC's, and if required the footings, attached to this scope of work.

Subgrade Pad/Foundation Requirements:

- 1. Owner/General Contractor shall survey the building site and provide a finished slab elevation for the prefabricated building. The building pad size we require is larger than the final actual building footprint. Provide building front corner stakes with 10' offsets.
- 2. Excavate the existing site to the depth of the required footings to local code if required.
- 3. Furnish coarse concrete sand adjacent to subgrade pad so PRC can cut the utility trenches, install underground utilities, and screed sand.
- 4. If determined that under slab vapor barrier and or insulation is required, Owner/General Contractor shall provide materials and installation.

Owner/General Contractor verification of site access to allow Building Delivery:

- 1. You certify to PRC that suitable delivery access to the proposed building site is available. Suitable access is defined as 14' minimum width, 16' minimum height, and sufficient turning radius for a crane and 70' tractor-trailer.
- 2. Our cost is based upon the crane we provide being able to get within 35' from the building center and for the delivery truck to be no more than 35' from the crane center picking point.
- If the path to the building site traverses curbs, underground utilities, landscaping, sidewalks, or other obstacles that could be damaged, it is the Owner/General Contractor 's responsibility for repair and all costs, if damage occurs.
- 4. If trench plating is required, it shall be the cost responsibility of the Owner/General Contractor.
- 5. If unseen obstacles are present when site installation begins, it is the Owner/General Contractor responsibility to properly mark them and verbally notify PRC before installation.
- 6. If weather becomes an issue for safety or site installation delays due to weather, Owner/General Contractor or PRC with General Contractor's confirmation may call-off set. If building set is stopped, relocation of the building modules to an onsite or offsite location may incur additional costs to Owner/General Contractor.



Installation Notice and Site Availability:

PRC will provide sufficient notice of delivery of the prefabricated building. The Owner/General Contractor shall make the site available during the delivery period. During the delivery period, on an improved site, Owner should stop site watering several days before delivery to minimize the impact on the soils for the heavy equipment needed for installation.

Caution: If site is not ready for our field crew to perform their installation and if no notice of delay in readiness from Owner/General Contractor is received, PRC will provide a change order for remobilization on a daily basis until the site is ready for us. Ready means that the site pad is completed, the corner required survey stakes are in place, the slab elevation stakes are in place, the location of the front of the building is confirmed on site, and access to the site is available from an improved roadway. Owner/General Contractor shall sign the change order before we will continue delivery.

Public Restroom Company will "turn-key" set the buildings including the hook up of utilities inside the building (only) when they are available. PRC will use its own factory trained staff for the installation.

Utility Connections:

- PRC to complete all internal building plumbing connections and connections from the electrical panel to building's fixtures. The Owner/ Contractor is responsible for making the <u>final plumbing</u> connections at the 6' POC locations.
- 2. The Owner/Contractor is responsible for pulling the wire and completing the final tie-in to the electrical panel from the 6' POC location.
- 3. The Owner/Contractor is responsible for commissioning the building once final utility connections are made. This includes flushing & testing all water service lines before final startup.

Special Conditions, Permits, and Inspection Fees:

Follow any published specifications governing local building procedures for applicable building permit fees, health department fees, all inspection fees, site concrete testing fees, and compaction tests, if required by Owner. PRC is responsible for all required State inspections and final State insignia certification of the building, if applicable.

Jurisdiction for Off-site Work:

Jurisdiction, for permitting and inspection of this building shall be either the State agency who manages prefabricated building compliance in the state or the local CBO (when the State does not provide certification.) If the responsibility for building inspection is the local CBO, we will provide a certified plan set, calculations, and a third-party engineer inspection report for any and all closed work the local official cannot see.



PUBLIC RESTROOM COMPANY SCOPE OF WORK:

Our In Plant/Off-Site Construction Scheduling System:

PRC has several off-site manufacturing centers in the United States, strategically located, with the proper equipment and trained staff to fabricate our custom buildings to our high-quality fit and finish standards. PRC manages quality control in our off-site production facility to comply with the approved drawings and provides an inspection certification and photos as required. When proprietary materials, which we have designed and fabricated, are part of the project, PRC supplies the manufacturing centers with these proprietary PRC components. We then schedule the in-plant construction process to coordinate with your delivery date through our Operations Division field staff. We guaranty on time at cost delivery weather permitting.

Special Payment and Progress Billing Terms:

Invoicing begins on the 30th of the month following an order and/or the acceptance of the proposal/contract. The first progress billing invoice will be issued for the commencement of design and engineering of architectural plans. This will be 10% of the contracted amount. Once construction begins invoicing will commence monthly based on plant percentage of completion, supported by photographs.

In the event of project stoppage, additional fees may be assessed for re-mobilization, storage, crane costs, etc. *Our discounted project costs are based upon timely payments. Delays in payment could change delivery schedules and project costs.*

Delivery and Installation:

Site Inspection:

PRC staff, upon site arrival, will verify the required dimensions of the building pad and the corner locations/elevation. We will also verify the delivery path from an accessible road or street and install the underground utilities to the point of connection nominally 6' from the exterior of the building.

Installation:

PRC will install the building turn-key, except for any exclusion (listed under "Exclusions," herein.)

Installation of Utilities under the Prefabricated Building:

We fabricate off-site an underground utilities (water, and DWV piping and fittings) preassembled plumbing and electrical tree. Our site staff will set the underground tree into code depth excavated trenches and our staff will install the coarse concrete sand to bed the piping per our submitted drawing.

We provide all the buildings under-slab piping including the driven electrical ground rod. The Owner/General Contractor brings utility services to within 6' of the pad and are responsible for final connections at that point.



Connection of Utilities Post Building Placement:

After placement of the building on the pad by PRC, our field staff will tie in the water and sewer connection "inside" the building only and terminate at a point of connection (POC) outside the building clearly marked for each utility service. The Owner/General Contractor is responsible for final utility point of service connections at the nominal 6' from building locations.

Electrical:

PRC provides the electrical conduit to the POC 6' from the building. The Owner/General Contractor pulls the wire and ties it off on the electrical panel.

Plumbing:

PRC provides the POC up to 6' from the building footprint and the Owner/General Contractor connects the water to our stub out location.

Sewer:

Some sites depending on the local jurisdiction will require an outside house trap which Owner/General Contractor shall install if needed. PRC will provide you with a sewer point of connection including a clean out to which Owner/General Contractor will terminate the site sewer service.

Testing of Water, Sewer, and Electrical in Plant and Final Site Utility Connection:

Before the building leaves the manufacturing center, PRC certifies a pressure water piping test, DWV, and the electrical connections for compliance with code. While the building is fully tested for leaks at the plant before shipment, road vibration may loosen some plumbing slip fittings and require tightening once the building services (water) is completed. Owner/General Contractor is responsible for minor fitting tightening to handle small slip fitting leaks caused by transportation.

Time of Completion:

PRC estimates a 240 calendar day schedule to complete our scope of work from receipt of written notice to proceed together with signed approved architectural submittals; including final construction documents and structural calculations from all authorities required to approve them.

Exclusions/Exceptions:

1. Access issues for delivery of the building by a clear unobstructed path of travel from an improved roadway to the final installation pad or foundation may cause site delays and extra cost at each site. This exclusion covers sites whose access is limited by trees, inaccessible roadways, overhead power lines at location where crane will lift building, grade changes disallowing our delivery trailers with only 4" of clearance to grade, berms, or uneven site grades, or when the path of travel is over improvements such as sidewalks, all of which are not within the scope of work by PRC. On some sites without on-site storage availability for buildings that cannot be set, relocation to a proximal crane yard and later relocated to the site for installation, will incur additional fees at rates that vary depending on local rates. PRC will provide written costs for this additional work by change order.



- 2. If weather on site causes site delivery issues, the delivery may have to be diverted to an off-site location and the additional costs will be a change order to the bid. Our staff works with the Owner/General Contractor in advance to make sure sound decisions for delivery are made to avoid this issue. But sometimes Owner/General Contractor take risks for weather, but this risk is clearly at the Owner/General Contractor risk, not PRC.
- 3. Sidewalks outside the building footprint.
- 4. Trench plates or matting needed for protection of site soils, sidewalks, hardscaping, or site utilities shall be the responsibility of the Owner/General Contractor. Any site soils damage or other site improvements if damaged during installation shall be the responsibility of the Owner/General Contractor.
- Not responsible for removing any soil, sand, or other debris as a result of trenching or installation.
- 6. Survey, location of building corners, finish floor elevation, excavation, and construction of subgrade building pad and footings (if required) per PRC plans.
- 7. Soil conditions not suitable for bearing a minimum of 1500 PSF with compaction to 90% maximum dry density shall require Owner/General Contractor correction before building placement. If no soils testing report is available before bid, Owner/General Contractor must verify site supporting soils at a minimum of 1500 PSF because that is the least we can place our structures on or Owner/General Contractor or engineer of record must design a foundation system to meet the imposed loads of site placement.
- 8. Improper water pressure, an undersized meter, or improper water volume flow to the building may necessitate a change order for installation of a building internal diaphragm tank to provide the minimum flow rate and static pressure of up to 60 PSI and a minimum of 40 PSI to properly flush the fixtures. Building water service chlorination, post installation, shall be by Owner/General Contractor.
- 9. Our bid included crane costs are based on a maximum 35' radius from the center pin of the crane (10' back from the rear of the crane) to the building center point of the furthest building module roof. If additional distance requires a larger crane, additional costs will be assessed by change order to the Owner/General Contractor.
- 10. Bonds, building permits, a site survey, special inspection fees, minor trash removal (nominally one pickup truck of shipping materials), final utility connections to the on-site water, sewer and electrical are by the Owner/General Contractor. Since the building is fully inspected and tested in plant, minor plumbing leaks (if water is not available when building site work installation is completed) is by the Owner/General Contractor.
- Site Traffic Control, if applicable, shall be by Owner/ General Contractor, not PRC.
- 12. Any equipment installation, site work or special inspections other than described within this proposal, shall be by Owner/General Contractor.
- 13. Backflow certification if applicable by Owner/ General Contractor.
- 14. Any Fire Suppression Systems by others, not by PRC.



Insurance and Prevailing Wage Certification:

PRC shall comply with the required insurance requirements, wage reports, and safety requirements for the project, including OSHA regulations.

Special Insurance to protect the Building before acceptance:

As PRC requires payment for each month of off-site construction, and since the building is not on owner property where their insurance will cover the building, we maintain a special policy that insures the property even when paid for off-site until the building is finally accepted by the owner. This special policy protects the Owner's custom ordered materials to be used in the fabrication of the building during this period. PRC provides this Stock Throughput Policy to cover the building materials from supplier to manufacturer, while it is being built off-site, while in transit to the job site, during and after it is installed on-site until final acceptance. This special policy has a \$1,000,000 coverage limit. This exceeds the cost of any single building we have offered for sale herein.

Errors and Omissions Insurance:

Our firm employs licensed architects, engineers, and drafting staff to provide design of our buildings. Since these buildings are required to meet accessibility standards and building codes on site, and since we are the designer, we carry Errors and Omissions Insurance (E & O) to protect our clients from any errors. The policy covers a limit of up to \$2,000,000 per occurrence and is more clearly explained in the insurance certificates we provide after receipt of a purchase order.

WARRANTY:

All work performed by PUBLIC RESTROOM COMPANY (called "Company") shall be warranted to the Owner to be of good quality, free of faults and defects in material, workmanship, and title for 5 years from last date of installation if building is installed by Company or 1 year if building is installed by Owner or Owner's agent without on-site supervision by Company. Company warranty on building shell including exterior walls, concrete 8" slab/foundation, and roof system is warranted for 20 years structurally. The Company will repair or replace at their sole option any defects in work upon proper notice to the below stated address below.

Owner/General Contractor selected parts and materials that are not PRC approved will not be covered under PRC's 5 year component warranty. These selections will be covered only by any available manufacturer warranty.

Our Company extended warranties shall be Company only and shall have no effect on any required Performance, Payment, or Warranty Bonds where Surety shall assume no liability to the Company, the Owner, or any third parties should the Company fail for any reason to deliver acceptable maintenance warranties beyond the one year period. The warranty extension is solely between the owner and PRC and not the general contractor, bonding company, or architect/engineer of record.

This warranty applies only if all work performed by Company has been fully paid for, including change orders if applicable. Company has no responsibility for any neglect, abuse, or improper handling of building product.



The warranties expressed herein are exclusive, and are in lieu of all other warranties expressed or implied, including those of merchantability and fitness.

There are no warranties which extend beyond those described on the face of this Warranty. The foregoing shall constitute the full liability of the Company and be the sole remedy to the Owner.

Term of Offer to Sell and Owner/General Contractor Acceptance:

This offer is valid for acceptance within 90 days or when a part of a public bid for the applicable duration imposed within the Owner's bid documents. Acceptance is by approving our post bid preliminary notice to begin drawings subject to final Owner/General Contractor approval of our submittals and receipt of a contract or a purchase order/contract.

Special Notice of Possible Project Cost Increases as a Result of Late Payments:

In the event of delayed or late payment, PRC shall have the right to remedies including late charges, overall project total cost increases, and other damages as allowed by applicable law. The contract price quoted herein is a discounted price based upon our receipt of progress payments as invoiced on the agreed billing schedule of PRC. In the event of non-payment, PRC will provide a 5 day written notice to cure and if payment is still not received, the discounted price for the payment due may increase, to an undetermined amount, to cover work stoppage, remobilization, cancellation of materials and subsequent restocking charges, resale of the contracted building to another party, storage fees, additional crane fees, travel and per diem costs for field crews, and any other cost applicable to the project, as allowed by law. Interest if applicable to non-payment will be assessed at the maximum amount allowed by law or 18% whichever is greater.

Termination:

Upon Termination for any reason, Owner/General Contractor shall be liable for the cost of all work performed up to the date of termination. Additionally, Owner/General Contractor shall pay for off-site demolition and disposal of the partially or fully fabricated building as well as any non-returnable materials which were custom-ordered to complete fabrication in PRC's factory location. Any returned materials are subject to return and restocking fees at the Owner/General Contractor expense.

Venue for Contract Jurisdiction:

Public Restroom Company requires all contracts accepted by our firm to hold that the venue for legal jurisdiction for this contract offer and acceptance shall be Douglas County, Nevada. In the event of your default, PRC shall be entitled to the full amount due including reasonable attorney fees, costs, storage, expenses of physical recovery, and statutory interest, as allowed by law.

CITY COUNCIL TO CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2025, APPROVING THE PURCHASE OF FIFTEEN (15) ADDITIONAL FLOCK LICENSE PLATE RECOGNITION CAMERAS AS PART OF THE MARINA POLICE DEPARTMENT'S EXPANSION OF THE CITY'S REAL-TIME CRIME CENTER (RTCC) NETWORK; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT PURCHASING THE EQUIPMENT, SUBJECT TO FINAL REVIEW AND APPROVAL BY THE CITY ATTORNEY; AND AUTHORIZING THE FINANCE DIRECTOR TO MAKE NECESSARY ACCOUNTING AND BUDGETARY ENTRIES.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2025- :

- 1. Approving the purchase and associated documentation for the acquisition of fifteen (15) additional Flock Falcon License Plate Recognition (LPR) cameras for the Marina Police Department, as an expansion of the existing contract with Flock Group, Inc.;
- 2. Authorizing the City Manager to execute an agreement to purchase the equipment, subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney; and
- 3. Authorize the Finance Director to make necessary accounting and budgetary entries.

BACKGROUND:

In 2023 the City Council approved the original purchase of 21 Flock Falcon LPR cameras to support the City's development of a Real-Time Crime Center (RTCC), aimed at enhancing public safety, expanding investigative capability, and promoting proactive law enforcement. These cameras have been strategically placed throughout the City.

The initial success of these cameras in aiding criminal investigations, deterring crime, and supporting regional law enforcement operations prompted the City Council to allocate funding in the FY 2025–2026 adopted budget for an additional 15 Flock cameras.

ANALYSIS:

The proposed expansion involves 15 new LPR camera units that will be fully integrated into the City's current Flock camera network. These additional placements are based on data-driven analysis identifying specific geographic gaps in visibility. All newly proposed sites have been vetted for public safety impact, jurisdictional clarity, and optimal coverage of key traffic corridors.

The procurement will occur under the terms of the **previously executed CA - Marina PD - Law Enforcement Agreement** dated November 29, 2023, and associated Expansion Agreement. The new order form explicitly confirms that:

"Customer understands that the previously executed agreement with Flock Safety shall govern this purchase order, and that any further purchase orders mutually accepted by the parties shall be subject to the terms and conditions previously agreed upon, which confirms that there are no differing terms of agreement other than those already accepted."

This ensures continuity of service, consistency in system architecture, and transparency in pricing and deployment.

Each camera includes:

- Solar-powered wireless deployment with cellular connectivity
- High-resolution imaging and vehicle LPR functionality
- Secure, CJIS-compliant 30-day data retention
- Real-time alerts on BOLO or hot list plates
- Full integration with Marina PD's investigative systems and RTCC platform

FISCAL IMPACT:

The total cost for the 15-camera expansion is \$45,000. The breakdown of the costs, including the one-time software upgrade is as follows:

The annual costs for the flock cameras have been incorporated into the Fiscal Year 2025-26 and Fiscal Year 2026-27 Budget. The impact to the current budget associated with the agreement is the additional \$3,500 for the software upgrades. It is anticipated that funding to support this additional amount will be available in the approved Police Department operating budget.

This order is subject to the terms and conditions outlined in the executed *CA - Marina PD - Law Enforcement Agreement* dated November 29, 2023. All terms regarding billing, service, usage, and renewal remain in effect.

CONCLUSION:

This request represents a strategic continuation of the City's public safety technology investment. With no changes to previously agreed contractual terms, this deployment will address existing surveillance gaps, integrate seamlessly into Marina's RTCC system, and offer enhanced visibility for law enforcement operations.

This request is submitted for City Council consideration and possible action.

WHEREAS, the City Council allocated additional funding in the adopted FY 2025–2026 budget to expand this program by fifteen (15) additional LPR cameras based on demonstrated investigative value, proactive deterrence, and identified geographic coverage gaps; and

WHEREAS, the additional fifteen (15) LPR cameras will be procured under the terms and conditions of the previously executed "CA - Marina PD - Law Enforcement Agreement" dated November 29, 2023, which remains in full force and effect; and

CITY COUNCIL CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2025-, APPROVING THE EXPANDED LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF MARNIA AND MONTEREY PENINSULA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the City Council consider:

1. Adopt Resolution No. 2025-, authorizing the City Manager to finalize and enter into an Expanded Learning Opportunities Agreement between the City of Marina (City) and Monterey Peninsula Unified School District (MPUSD), subject to approval by the City Attorney. ("EXHIBIT A")

BACKGROUND:

Derived from Assembly Bill (AB) 130, California Education Code (EC) Section 46120 established the program plan and funding for the Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P)

The Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P) provides funding for afterschool and summer school enrichment programs for transitional kindergarten through twelfth grade.

"Expanded learning" means before school, after school, summer, or intersession learning programs that focus on developing the academic, social, emotional, and physical needs and interests of pupils through hands-on, engaging learning experiences. It is the intent of the Legislature that expanded learning programs are pupil-centered, results driven, include community partners, and complement, but do not replicate, learning activities in the regular school day and school year.

MPUSD does not have adequate facilities or staffing to meet the requirements of the Expanded Learning Opportunity for all enrolled students.

ANALYSIS:

In August 2024, MPUSD approached City staff to determine the viability of the Recreation & Cultural Services Department administering the ELO-P by utilizing existing City facilities, infrastructure, and staff associated with the After School Program at the Rocky Han Community Center. After several meetings to discuss the requirements, details, and logistics of the program, both parties agreed that the City has the capacity to administer the ELO-P program as an Independent Contractor.

The intent of the proposed agreement is to ensure the safety of children; alignment with the ELO-P fiscal allocation requirements set forth by the State of California; support of the school day curriculum; successful operation following established policies and procedures; strong financial operations, communication, and coordination between MPUSD and the City.

In January 2025, MPUSD approached City staff to implement the ELO-P program at the Marina Teen Center for sixth through twelfth grades due to the success of the program at the Marina Youth Center. The agreement was approved by City Council in February 2025 and implemented March 1, 2025

Program components include literacy and enrichment activities, physical activity, and an afternoon snack in a safe environment that promotes emotional wellness and relationship building. These are areas of strength within the Recreation & Cultural Services Department that will enhance the positive impacts for youth participating in the program.

It is also intended to ensure continued successful student performance through a collaborative relationship among Olson, Marina Vista, JC Crumpton elementary schools, Los Arboles Middle School and the City.

FISCAL IMPACT:

MPUSD agrees to pay the City \$100 per student per month for the administration of the ELO-P. The City's afterschool program is already meeting all of the requirements of the agreement, including staff to student ratios, therefore there are no additional expenses to administer the ELO-P agreement.

CONCLUSION:

This request is submitted for City Council consideration and possible action.

This Independent Contractor Services Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into effective August 6_, 2025 (the "Effective Date"), by and between the Monterey Peninsula School District ("District") and City of Marina- Youth Center ("Contractor"). District and Contractor may
each be referred to as "Party" or together as the "Parties."
1. Contractor Services. Contractor agrees to provide the following services to District (collectively, the "Services"):
(SEE ATTACHED PROPOSAL/SCOPE OF WORK at Attachment A)
(SEE ATTACHED MPUSD Policies and Procedures at Exhibit A)

- 2. **Contractor Qualifications.** Contractor represents and warrants to District that Contractor and all of Contractor's employees, agents or volunteers (the "Contractor Parties") have in effect and shall maintain in full force throughout the Term of this Agreement all licenses, credentials, permits and any other qualifications required by law to perform the Services and to fully and faithfully satisfy all of the terms set forth in this Agreement. Contractor and any Contractor Parties performing Services shall be competent to perform those Services.
- 3. **Term.** This Agreement shall begin on __August 6, 2025_, and shall terminate upon completion of the Services, but no later than __June 6, 2026_ ("Term"), except as otherwise stated in Paragraph 4 below. The dates of service include regular school calendar days (180 days) and exclude holidays and school breaks. There shall be no extension of the Term of this Agreement without the express written consent of the Parties. Written notice by the District Superintendent or designee shall be sufficient to stop further performance of the Services by Contractor or the Contractor Parties. In the event of early termination, Contractor shall be paid for satisfactory Services provided to the date of termination. Upon payment by District, District shall be under no further obligation to Contractor, monetarily or otherwise, and District may proceed with the Services in any manner District deems proper.
- 4. **Termination.** Either Party may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving thirty (30) days advance written notice to the other Party, however the Parties may agree in writing to a shorter notice period. Notwithstanding the foregoing, District may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving written notice to Contractor if: (1) Contractor materially breaches any of the

terms of this Agreement; (2) any act or omission by Contractor or the Contractor Parties exposes District to potential liability or may cause an increase in District's insurance premiums; (3) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt; (4) Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors; (5) a receiver is appointed because of Contractor's insolvency; or (6) or Contractor Parties fail to comply with or make material representations as to the fingerprinting, criminal background check, and/or tuberculosis certification sections of this Agreement. Such termination shall be effective immediately upon Contractor's receipt of said notice.

- 5. **Payment.** District agrees to pay Contractor at the rate of \$[100] per student per month ("Rate") for Services satisfactorily performed. The Rate shall not be increased by Contractor over the course of this Agreement. Total fees (the "Fee") paid by District to Contractor shall not exceed __\$80,000__. Any work performed by Contractor in excess of the Fee shall not be compensated. District agrees to pay Contractor, up to the maximum amount provided herein, within sixty (60) days of receipt of a detailed invoice from Contractor, which shall include any additional supporting documentation reasonably requested by District.
- 5.1 **Incidental Expenses**. In addition to the above Fee, District shall reimburse Contractor for incidental expenses ("Incidental Expenses") as follows:
 - a. Lodging: Actual cost of single occupancy. Not to exceed \$N/A per night. (Receipt required).
 - b. Meals: Reimbursement limited to current rate for District employees.
 - c. Travel: Contractor shall not be reimbursed for travel costs within Monterey County. Other travel costs to be reimbursed at the current allowable IRS rate.

Contractor's total reimbursement for Incidental Expenses shall not exceed \$ N/A .

7. **Indemnity.** Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless District and its agents, representatives, officers, consultants, employees, Board of Education, and members of the Board of Education (collectively, the "District Parties"), from and against any and all claims, demands, liabilities, damages, losses, suits and actions, and expenses (including, but not limited to attorney fees and costs including fees of consultants) of any kind, nature and description (collectively, the "Claims") directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from any act, error, omission, negligence, or willful misconduct of Contractor, the Contractor Parties or their respective agents, subcontractors, employees, material or equipment suppliers, invitees, or licensees in the performance of or failure to perform Contractor's obligations under this Agreement, including, but not limited to Contractor's or the Contractor Parties' use of the site, Contractor's or the Contractor Parties' performance of the Services, Contractor's or the Contractor Parties' breach of any of the representations or warranties contained in this Agreement, or for injury to or death of persons or damage to property or delay or damage to the District Or the District Parties. Such obligation shall not be construed to negate, abridge, or

reduce other rights or obligations of indemnity, which would otherwise exist as to a Party, person, or entity described in this Paragraph. The indemnification provided for in this Section 7 includes, without limitation to the foregoing, claims that may be made against District by any taxing authority asserting that an employer-employee relationship exists by reason of this Agreement, and any claims made against District alleging civil rights violations by Contractor or Contractor Parties under the California Fair Employment and Housing Act ("FEHA").

- 8. **Equipment and Materials**. Contractor at its sole cost and expense shall provide and furnish all tools, labor, materials, equipment, transportation services, and any other items (collectively, "Equipment") which are required or necessary to perform the Services in a manner which is consistent with generally accepted standards of the profession for similar services. Notwithstanding the foregoing, District shall not be responsible for any damages to persons or property as a result of the use, misuse or failure of any Equipment used by Contractor of the Contractor Parties, even if such Equipment is furnished, rented or loaned to Contractor or the Contractor Parties by District. Furthermore, any Equipment or workmanship that does not conform to the regulations of this Agreement may be rejected by District and in such case must be promptly remedied or replaced by Contractor at no additional cost to District and subject to District's reasonable satisfaction.
- 9. Insurance. Without in any way limiting Contractor's liability or indemnification obligations set forth in Paragraph 7 above, Contractor shall secure and maintain throughout the Term of this Agreement the following insurance: (i) comprehensive general liability insurance with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 (One Million Dollars) each occurrence and \$2,000,000 (Two Million Dollars) in the aggregate; (ii) commercial automobile liability insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000 each per accident; (iii) worker's compensation insurance as required by Labor Code section 3200, et seq., if applicable; and (iv) employer's liability insurance with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 per accident, disease, and annual aggregate; and neither Contractor nor any of the Contractor Parties shall commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverages have been delivered to and approved by District. The liability insurance provided as a requirement of this Agreement must not contain any exclusions and/or limitations of coverage for mental, physical, emotional and/or sexual abuse, including molestation. All insurance policies shall include an endorsement stating that District and District Parties are named additional insureds. All of the policies shall be amended to provide that the insurance shall not be suspended, voided, canceled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice has been given to District. If any of the required insurance is not reinstated, District may, at its sole option, terminate this Agreement. All of the policies shall also include an endorsement stating that it is primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District and shall waive all rights of subrogation against District and/or the District Parties. A copy of the declarations page of Contractor's insurance policies shall be attached to this Agreement as proof of insurance.
- 10. **Independent Contractor Status.** Contractor, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor is engaged in an independently established trade, occupation, or business to provide the Services required by this Agreement and is hereby retained to provide specialized services for District that are outside the usual course of District's

business. Contractor is free from the control and direction of District in connection with the manner in which it provides the Services to District Contractor understands and agrees that s/he and the Contractor Parties shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partners, or joint ventures of District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided to District employees and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled.

- 11. **Taxes.** All payments made by District to Contractor pursuant to this Agreement shall be reported to the applicable federal and state taxing authorities as required. District will not withhold any money from compensation payable to Contractor, including FICA (social security), state or federal unemployment insurance contributions, or state or federal income tax or disability insurance. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor and the Contractor Parties and otherwise in connection with this Agreement.
- 12. **Fingerprinting/Criminal Background Investigation Certification.** Contractor and Contractor Parties shall at all times comply with the fingerprinting and criminal background investigation requirements of the California Education Code ("Education Code") section 45125.1. Before performing any Services, Contractor shall execute and return the District's Fingerprinting Notice and Acknowledgement form and the required Certification, attached to this Agreement as **Attachment B**.

Contractor further agrees and acknowledges that if at any time during the Term of this Agreement Contractor learns or becomes aware of additional information which differs in any way from the information learned or provided pursuant to Section 45125.1, or Contractor or Contractor Parties add personnel who will provide Services under this Agreement, Contractor shall immediately notify District and prohibit any new personnel from interacting with District students until the fingerprinting and background check requirements have been satisfied and District determines whether any interaction is permissible.

- 13. **Tuberculosis Certification.** Contractor and the Contractor Parties shall at all times comply with the tuberculosis ("TB") certification requirements of Education Code section 49406. Accordingly, by checking the applicable boxes below, Contractor hereby represents and warrants to District the following:
 - A. Contractor and Contractor Parties will have **only have limited or no contact** (as determined by District) with District students at all times during the Term of this Agreement.
 - B. X Contractor and Contractor Parties will have **more than limited contact** (as determined by District) with District students during the Term of this Agreement and, at no cost to District, have received a TB test or risk assessment in full compliance with the requirements of Education Code section 49406:

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Contractor shall maintain on file the certificates showing that Contractor and Contractor Parties was examined and found free from active TB. These forms shall be regularly maintained and updated by Contractor and shall be available to District upon request or audit.

Contractor further agrees and acknowledges that all new personnel hired by Contractor and Contractor Parties after the Effective Date who will provide Services under this Agreement are subject to the TB certification requirements of Education Code section 49406 and shall be prohibited from having any contact with District students until those TB certification requirements have been satisfied and District determines whether any such contact is permissible.

- 14. **COVID-19 and Other Contagious Diseases**. During the Services, the Contractor and the Contractor Parties shall comply with all applicable legal, contractual, and local government requirements related to the to prevention of the transmission of COVID-19 and other contagious diseases, including "social distancing," masks, and hygiene as may be ordered by the State or local authorities.
- 15. Confidential Information. All District information disclosed to Contractor during the course of performance of the Services under this Agreement shall be treated as confidential and shall not be disclosed to any other persons or parties except as authorized by District or required by law. Contractor shall maintain the confidentiality of and protect from unauthorized disclosure, any and all individual student information received from the District, including but not limited to student names and other identifying information. Contractor shall not use such student information for any purpose other than carrying out the obligations under this Agreement. Upon termination of this Agreement, Contractor shall turn over to District all educational records related to the Services provided to any District student pursuant to this Agreement.
- 16. **Reports**. Contractor shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to the Services rendered and the costs incurred under this Agreement, including records with respect to any payments to employees and subcontractors. All such records shall be prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting procedures. Upon request, Contractor shall make such records available to District for the purpose of auditing and copying such records for a period of five years from the date of final payment under this Agreement.
- 17. **Ownership of Documents**. All plans, studies, drawings, calculations, reports, specifications, estimates, and other documents or any other works of authorship fixed in any tangible medium of expression, including but not limited to physical drawings, data magnetically or otherwise recorded on computer disks, or other writings prepared or caused to be prepared by the Contractor under this Agreement ("Documents") shall be and shall remain the property of the District for all purposes, not only as they relate or may relate to the Services but as they relate or may relate to any other project. Contractor will provide the District with a complete set of Documents, and will retain, on the District's behalf, the originals or reproducible copies of all

Documents, however stored, in the Contractor's files for a period of no less than fifteen (15) years. Contractor shall promptly make available to District any original documents it has retained under this Agreement upon request by the District.

- 18. **Assignment/Successors and Assigns.** Contractor shall not assign or transfer by operation of law or otherwise any or all of its rights, burdens, duties or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of District. Subject to the foregoing, this Agreement shall be binding on the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the respective Parties.
- 19. **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision of this Agreement.
- 20. **Amendments.** The terms of this Agreement shall not be waived, altered, modified, supplemented or amended in any manner whatsoever except by written agreement signed by both Parties.
- 21. **Governing Law.** This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California, excluding its choice of law rules. Any action or proceeding seeking any relief under or with respect to this Agreement shall be brought solely in the Superior Court of the State of California for the County of Monterey, subject to transfer of venue under applicable State law, provided that nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of immunity to suit by the District.
- 22. **Written Notice.** Written notice shall be deemed to have been duly served if delivered by personal service, regular mail, overnight mail with proof of delivery, facsimile with proof of transmission, or email provided receipt is acknowledged at the address, fax number, or email address located next to the Party signatures below, or if delivered at or sent by registered or certified mail to the last business address known to the person who sends the notice.
- 23. Compliance with Law. Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted into this Agreement shall be deemed to be inserted herein and this Agreement shall be read and enforced as though it were included therein. Contractor shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances, including but not limited to fingerprinting under Education Code section 45125.1, confidentiality of records, Education Code section 49406 and others. Contractor agrees that it shall comply with all legal requirements for the performance of duties under this Agreement and that failure to do so shall constitute material breach.
- 24. **Non-Discrimination.** There shall be no unlawful discrimination in the contracting of persons under this Agreement because of race, color, national origin, age, ancestry, religion, sex, or sexual orientation of such persons. Contractor and Contractor Parties shall comply with all state and federal laws regarding non-discrimination.
- 25. Attorney Fees. If any legal action is taken to enforce the terms of this Agreement, the

prevailing Party shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorneys' fees and other reasonable costs and expenses incurred in connection with that legal action.

- 26. **Liability of District.** Notwithstanding anything stated herein to the contrary, District shall not be liable for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including but not limited to lost profits in connection with this Agreement.
- 27. **Time.** Time is of the essence to this Agreement.
- 28. **Waiver.** No delay or omission by District in exercising any right under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver of that or any other right and no single or partial exercise of any right shall preclude the District from any or further exercise of any right or remedy.
- 29. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement is intended by the Parties as the final expression of their agreement with respect to such terms as are included herein and as the complete and exclusive statement of its terms and may not be contradicted by evidence of any prior agreement or of a contemporaneous oral agreement, nor explained or supplemented by evidence of consistent additional terms
- 30. **Ambiguity.** The Parties to this Agreement, and each of them, hereby represent that the language contained herein is to be construed as jointly proposed and jointly accepted, and in the event of any subsequent determination of ambiguity, all Parties shall be treated as equally responsible for such ambiguity.
- 31. **Execution of Other Documents.** The Parties to this Agreement shall cooperate fully in the execution of any and all other documents and in the completion of any additional actions that may be necessary or appropriate to give full force and effect to the terms and intent of this Agreement.
- 32. **Execution in Counterparts.** This Agreement may be executed in counterparts such that the signatures may appear on separate signature pages. A copy, facsimile, or an original, with all signatures appended together, shall be deemed a fully executed Agreement.
- 33. **Warranty of Authority**. The persons who have signed this Agreement warrant that they are legally authorized to do so on behalf of the respective Parties, and by their signatures to bind the respective Parties to this Agreement.

Attachment EXHIBIT A

This Exhibit sets forth the policies, protocols, and procedures under which the Monterey Peninsula School District and Program Partners will interact. It outlines shared objectives, roles, and responsibilities to foster a safe, effective, and compliant after school program. The scope of this Exhibit includes, but is not limited to:

- Ensuring ELO program compliance with CDE and Federal Grants mandates
- Enhancing educational opportunities through community collaboration
- Ensuring the protection of student and staff welfare
- Aligning community activities with district values and regulatory requirements
- **1. Attendance Policy** All participants in programs facilitated by an ELO program partner must comply with MPUSD's ELO attendance protocol.
 - **1.1.** Upon arrival after school, students are required to check into the ELO program (time and date stamp) using the District's attendance software system.
 - **1.2.** Upon departure from the ELO program, students are checked out via the digital attendance system by an authorized adult (e.g., a parent, guardian, or designated ELO program representative)
 - **1.2.1.** An authorized adult must provide a valid signature (or an approved digital equivalent) upon check out each day.
 - **1.3.** Timely records of attendance, including absences and early releases from the ELO program, will be maintained.
 - 1.3.1. Parent Pick-Up Policy: A regularly updated list of authorized pick-up persons will be maintained at the school campus, and all pick-ups must follow the check-out process. When releasing a student, staff must verify the identity of the parent or authorized guardian using pre-established procedures. A secure, designated pick-up area should be utilized, and any alternative pick-up arrangements or delays must be pre-approved by the site lead. In emergencies or unforeseen circumstances, specific protocols—such as emergency contact procedures and temporary supervised holding areas— need to be established to ensure children's safety.
 - **1.3.2. Early Release procedure**: The ELO program runs each day school is in session from school dismissal until 6:00pm. Any student checked out before 5:30 is considered "Early Release" and requires the guardian to indicate the reason for the Early Release with one of the following approved Early Release Codes (ERC):
 - 1. **Other On-Campus Activity** (Athletics, Clubs, Tutoring, etc.)
 - 2. Family Needs/Emergency

- 3. **Appointment** (Medical, Dental, Counseling, etc.)
- 4. Child Injury/Accident
- 5. Student Walking (Daylight Savings)/Transportation Issues
- 6. **Off-Campus Activity** (Girl Scouts, Tutoring, Athletics, etc.)
- **1.3.3.** The ER Code must be provided at the time of student pick up by the authorized adult
- **1.3.4.** Students who are regularly picked up early (more than 2 times a week or 8 times a month) must complete an <u>Early Release form</u> with a parent/ guardian signature to be kept on file at the school site.
- 2. Records Keeping The School District requires meticulous maintenance of all attendance, incident, and related records generated by our community partner programs. These records, including but not limited to sign-in/out logs and incident reports, behavior reports, etc. must be stored securely in compliance with district data protection policies and federal FERPA regulations. Access to these records is restricted to authorized personnel only. Regular audits will be conducted by the Program Director or Manager to verify that records are complete, accurate, and secure. Community Partners are responsible for training their personnel on proper record-keeping procedures and ensuring that all documentation meets the established standards.

3. Auditing and Reporting:

- **3.1.** The School District reserves the right to audit program activities and records related to the engagement with Community Partners.
- **3.2.** Any discrepancies or issues discovered during audits shall be promptly addressed and corrected. Reoccurring discrepancies and records incorrectly kept may result in delay of payments and processing invoices, and potentially termination of contract services.

4. Nutritional Services

- **4.1.** Nutritional snacks and meals are provided as part of the School district ELO program and follow California State nutritional guidelines.
 - **4.1.1.** Snack and meals (when applicable) must be offered daily to each student
 - 4.1.2. When applicable, snack orders must be sent to the ELO district office at least two weeks before they are needed to ensure the order can be filled. Snack orders must be reviewed and approved by ELO administrative staff.
 - **4.1.3.** Accurate records of snacks and meals distributed must be kept each day and recorded as part of the attendance record.

ATTACHMENT B

Fingerprinting Notice and Acknowledgment (Non-Construction Contracts)

FINGERPRINTING NOTICE AND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT FOR CONTRACTS OTHER THAN CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS

(Education Code Section 45125.1)

Other than business entities performing construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or repair who have complied with Education Code section 45125.2, business entities entering into contracts with the District must comply with Education Code sections 45125.1. Such entities are responsible for ensuring full compliance with the law and should therefore review all applicable statutes and regulations. The following information is provided simply to assist such entities with compliance with the law:

- 1. You (as a business entity) shall ensure that each of your employees who interacts with pupils outside of the immediate supervision and control of the pupil's parent or guardian or a school employee has a valid criminal records summary as described in Education Code section 44237. (Education Code §45125.1(a).) You shall do the same for any other employees as directed by the District. (Education Code §45125.1(c).) - 3. Prior to performing any work or services under your contract with the District, and prior to being present on District property or being within the vicinity of District pupils, you shall certify in writing to the District under the penalty of perjury that neither the employer nor any of its employees who are required to submit fingerprints, and who may interact with pupils, have been convicted of a felony as defined in Education Code section 45122.1, and that you are in full compliance with Education Code section 45125.1. (Education Code §45125.1(f).) For this certification, you shall use the form in *Attachment B-2* to this Notice.
- 4. If you are providing the above services in an emergency or exceptional situation, you are not required to comply with Education Code section 45125.1, above. An "emergency or exceptional" situation is one in which pupil health or safety is endangered or when repairs are needed to make a facility safe and habitable. The District shall determine whether an emergency or exceptional situation exists.

(Education Code §45125.1(b).)

5. If you are an individual operating as a sole proprietor of a business entity, you are considered an employee of that entity for purposes of Education Code section 45125.1, and the District shall prepare and submit your fingerprints to the Department of Justice as described in Education Code section 45125.1(a). ATTACHMENT B-1

Violent and Serious Felonies

- (8) Any felony in which the defendant inflicts great bodily injury on any person other than an accomplice which has been charged and proved as provided for in Section 12022.7, 12022.8, or 12022.9 on or after July 1, 1977, or as specified prior to July 1, 1977, in Sections 213, 264, and 461, or any felony in which the defendant uses a firearm which use has been charged and proved as provided in subdivision (a) of Section 12022.3, or Section 12022.5 or 12022.55.
- (9) Any robbery.
- (10) Arson, in violation of subdivision (a) or (b) of Section 451.
- (11) Sexual penetration as defined in subdivision (a) or (j) of Section 289.
- (12) Attempted murder.
- (13) A violation of Section 18745, 18750, or 18755.
- (14) Kidnapping.
- (15) Assault with the intent to commit a specified felony, in violation of Section 220.
- (16) Continuous sexual abuse of a child, in violation of Section 288.5.
- (17) Carjacking, as defined in subdivision (a) of Section 215.
- (18) Rape, spousal rape, or sexual penetration, in concert, in violation of Section 264.1.
- (19) Extortion, as defined in Section 518, which would constitute a felony violation of Section 186.22 of the Penal Code.
- (20) Threats to victims or witnesses, as defined in Section 136.1, which would constitute a felony violation of Section 186.22 of the Penal Code.
- (21) Any burglary of the first degree, as defined in subdivision (a) of Section 460, wherein it is charged and proved that another person, other than an accomplice, was present in the residence during the commission of the burglary.
- (22) Any violation of Section 12022.53.
- (23) A violation of subdivision (b) or (c) of Section 11418.

A serious felony is any felony listed in subdivision (c) Section 1192.7 of the Penal Code. Those felonies are presently defined as:

(1) Murder or voluntary manslaughter; (2) Mayhem; (3) Rape; (4) Sodomy by force, violence, duress, menace, threat of great bodily injury, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury on the victim or another person; (5) Oral copulation by force, violence, duress, menace, threat of great bodily injury, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury on the victim or another person; (6) Lewd or lascivious act on a child under the age of 14 years; (7) Any felony punishable by death or imprisonment in the state prison for life; (8) Any felony in which the defendant personally inflicts great bodily injury on any person, other than an accomplice, or any felony in which the defendant personally uses a firearm; (9) Attempted murder; (10) Assault with intent to commit rape, or robbery; (11) Assault with a deadly weapon or instrument on a peace officer; (12) Assault by a life prisoner on a non-inmate; (13) Assault with a deadly weapon by an inmate; (14) Arson; (15) Exploding a destructive device or any explosive with intent to injure; (16) Exploding a destructive device or any explosive causing bodily injury, great bodily injury, or mayhem; (17) Exploding a destructive device or any explosive with intent to murder; (18) Any burglary of the first degree; (19) Robbery or bank robbery; (20) Kidnapping; (21) Holding of a hostage by a person confined in a state prison; (22) Attempt to commit a felony punishable by death or imprisonment in the state prison for life; (23) Any felony in which the defendant personally used a dangerous or deadly weapon; (24) Selling, furnishing, administering, giving, or offering to sell, furnish, administer, or give to a minor any heroin, cocaine, phencyclidine (PCP), or any methamphetamine-related drug, as described in paragraph (2) of subdivision (d) of Section 11055 of the Health and Safety Code, or any of the precursors of methamphetamines, as described in subparagraph (A) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (f) of Section 11055 or subdivision (a) of Section 11100 of the Health and Safety Code; (25) Any violation of subdivision (a) of Section 289 where the act is accomplished against the victim's will by force, violence, duress, menace, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury on the victim or another person; (26) Grand theft involving a firearm; (27)carjacking; (28) any felony offense, which would also constitute a felony violation of Section 186.22; (29) assault with the intent to commit mayhem, rape, sodomy, or oral copulation, in violation of Section 220; (30) throwing acid or flammable substances, in violation of Section 244; (31) assault with a deadly weapon, firearm, machine gun, assault weapon, or semiautomatic firearm or assault on a peace officer or firefighter, in violation of Section 245; (32) assault with a deadly weapon against a public transit employee, custodial officer, or school employee, in violation of Sections 245.2, 245.3, or 245.5; (33) discharge of a firearm at an inhabited dwelling, vehicle, or aircraft, in violation of Section 246; (34) commission of rape or sexual penetration in concert with another person, in violation of Section 264.1; (35) continuous sexual abuse of a child, in violation of Section 288.5; (36) shooting from a vehicle, in violation of subdivision (c) or (d) of Section 26100; (37) intimidation of victims or witnesses, in violation of Section 136.1; (38) criminal threats, in violation of Section 422; (39) any attempt to commit a crime listed in this subdivision other than an assault; (40) any violation of Section 12022.53; (41) a violation of subdivision (b) or (c) of Section 11418; and (42) any conspiracy to commit an offense described in this subdivision.

1. Contractor Services. Contractor agrees to provide the following services to Dis (collectively, the "Services"):	trict

- 2. **Contractor Qualifications.** Contractor represents and warrants to District that Contractor and all of Contractor's employees, agents or volunteers (the "Contractor Parties") have in effect and shall maintain in full force throughout the Term of this Agreement all licenses, credentials, permits and any other qualifications required by law to perform the Services and to fully and faithfully satisfy all of the terms set forth in this Agreement. Contractor and any Contractor Parties performing Services shall be competent to perform those Services.
- 3. **Term.** This Agreement shall begin on __August 6, 2025_, and shall terminate upon completion of the Services, but no later than __June 6, 2026_ ("Term"), except as otherwise stated in Paragraph 4 below. The dates of service include regular school calendar days (180 days) and exclude holidays and school breaks. There shall be no extension of the Term of this Agreement without the express written consent of the Parties. Written notice by the District Superintendent or designee shall be sufficient to stop further performance of the Services by Contractor or the Contractor Parties. In the event of early termination, Contractor shall be paid for satisfactory Services provided to the date of termination. Upon payment by District, District shall be under no further obligation to Contractor, monetarily or otherwise, and District may proceed with the Services in any manner District deems proper.
- 4. **Termination.** Either Party may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving thirty (30) days advance written notice to the other Party, however the Parties may agree in writing to a shorter notice period. Notwithstanding the foregoing, District may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving written notice to Contractor if: (1) Contractor materially breaches any of the

terms of this Agreement; (2) any act or omission by Contractor or the Contractor Parties exposes District to potential liability or may cause an increase in District's insurance premiums; (3) Contractor is adjudged a bankrupt; (4) Contractor makes a general assignment for the benefit of creditors; (5) a receiver is appointed because of Contractor's insolvency; or (6) or Contractor Parties fail to comply with or make material representations as to the fingerprinting, criminal background check, and/or tuberculosis certification sections of this Agreement. Such termination shall be effective immediately upon Contractor's receipt of said notice.

- 5. **Payment.** District agrees to pay Contractor at the rate of \$[100] per student per month ("Rate") for Services satisfactorily performed. The Rate shall not be increased by Contractor over the course of this Agreement. Total fees (the "Fee") paid by District to Contractor shall not exceed___**\$80,000**__. Any work performed by Contractor in excess of the Fee shall not be compensated. District agrees to pay Contractor, up to the maximum amount provided herein, within sixty (60) days of receipt of a detailed invoice from Contractor, which shall include any additional supporting documentation reasonably requested by District.
- 5.1 **Incidental Expenses**. In addition to the above Fee, District shall reimburse Contractor for incidental expenses ("Incidental Expenses") as follows:
 - a. Lodging: Actual cost of single occupancy. Not to exceed \$N/A per night. (Receipt required).
 - b. Meals: Reimbursement limited to current rate for District employees.
 - c. Travel: Contractor shall not be reimbursed for travel costs within Monterey County. Other travel costs to be reimbursed at the current allowable IRS rate.

Contractor's total reimbursement for Incidental Expenses shall not exceed \$ N/A .

7. **Indemnity.** Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless District and its agents, representatives, officers, consultants, employees, Board of Education, and members of the Board of Education (collectively, the "District Parties"), from and against any and all claims, demands, liabilities, damages, losses, suits and actions, and expenses (including, but not limited to attorney fees and costs including fees of consultants) of any kind, nature and description (collectively, the "Claims") directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with, or resulting from any act, error, omission, negligence, or willful misconduct of Contractor, the Contractor Parties or their respective agents, subcontractors, employees, material or equipment suppliers, invitees, or licensees in the performance of or failure to perform Contractor's obligations under this Agreement, including, but not limited to Contractor's or the Contractor Parties' use of the site, Contractor's or the Contractor Parties' performance of the Services, Contractor's or the Contractor Parties' breach of any of the representations or warranties contained in this Agreement, or for injury to or death of persons or damage to property or delay or damage to the District Parties. Such obligation shall not be construed to negate, abridge, or

reduce other rights or obligations of indemnity, which would otherwise exist as to a Party, person, or entity described in this Paragraph. The indemnification provided for in this Section 7 includes, without limitation to the foregoing, claims that may be made against District by any taxing authority asserting that an employer-employee relationship exists by reason of this Agreement, and any claims made against District alleging civil rights violations by Contractor or Contractor Parties under the California Fair Employment and Housing Act ("FEHA").

- 8. **Equipment and Materials**. Contractor at its sole cost and expense shall provide and furnish all tools, labor, materials, equipment, transportation services, and any other items (collectively, "Equipment") which are required or necessary to perform the Services in a manner which is consistent with generally accepted standards of the profession for similar services. Notwithstanding the foregoing, District shall not be responsible for any damages to persons or property as a result of the use, misuse or failure of any Equipment used by Contractor of the Contractor Parties, even if such Equipment is furnished, rented or loaned to Contractor or the Contractor Parties by District. Furthermore, any Equipment or workmanship that does not conform to the regulations of this Agreement may be rejected by District and in such case must be promptly remedied or replaced by Contractor at no additional cost to District and subject to District's reasonable satisfaction.
- 9. Insurance. Without in any way limiting Contractor's liability or indemnification obligations set forth in Paragraph 7 above, Contractor shall secure and maintain throughout the Term of this Agreement the following insurance: (i) comprehensive general liability insurance with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 (One Million Dollars) each occurrence and \$2,000,000 (Two Million Dollars) in the aggregate; (ii) commercial automobile liability insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000 each per accident; (iii) worker's compensation insurance as required by Labor Code section 3200, et seq., if applicable; and (iv) employer's liability insurance with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 per accident, disease, and annual aggregate; and neither Contractor nor any of the Contractor Parties shall commence performing any portion of the Services until all required insurance has been obtained and certificates indicating the required coverages have been delivered to and approved by District. The liability insurance provided as a requirement of this Agreement must not contain any exclusions and/or limitations of coverage for mental, physical, emotional and/or sexual abuse, including molestation. All insurance policies shall include an endorsement stating that District and District Parties are named additional insureds. All of the policies shall be amended to provide that the insurance shall not be suspended, voided, canceled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice has been given to District. If any of the required insurance is not reinstated, District may, at its sole option, terminate this Agreement. All of the policies shall also include an endorsement stating that it is primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District and shall waive all rights of subrogation against District and/or the District Parties. A copy of the declarations page of Contractor's insurance policies shall be attached to this Agreement as proof of insurance.
- 10. **Independent Contractor Status.** Contractor, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. Contractor is engaged in an independently established trade, occupation, or business to provide the Services required by this Agreement and is hereby retained to provide specialized services for District that are outside the usual course of District's

business. Contractor is free from the control and direction of District in connection with the manner in which it provides the Services to District Contractor understands and agrees that s/he and the Contractor Parties shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partners, or joint ventures of District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided to District employees and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled.

- 11. **Taxes.** All payments made by District to Contractor pursuant to this Agreement shall be reported to the applicable federal and state taxing authorities as required. District will not withhold any money from compensation payable to Contractor, including FICA (social security), state or federal unemployment insurance contributions, or state or federal income tax or disability insurance. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes with respect to Contractor and the Contractor Parties and otherwise in connection with this Agreement.
- 12. **Fingerprinting/Criminal Background Investigation Certification.** Contractor and Contractor Parties shall at all times comply with the fingerprinting and criminal background investigation requirements of the California Education Code ("Education Code") section 45125.1. Before performing any Services, Contractor shall execute and return the District's Fingerprinting Notice and Acknowledgement form and the required Certification, attached to this Agreement as **Attachment B**.

Contractor further agrees and acknowledges that if at any time during the Term of this Agreement Contractor learns or becomes aware of additional information which differs in any way from the information learned or provided pursuant to Section 45125.1, or Contractor or Contractor Parties add personnel who will provide Services under this Agreement, Contractor shall immediately notify District and prohibit any new personnel from interacting with District students until the fingerprinting and background check requirements have been satisfied and District determines whether any interaction is permissible.

- 13. **Tuberculosis Certification.** Contractor and the Contractor Parties shall at all times comply with the tuberculosis ("TB") certification requirements of Education Code section 49406. Accordingly, by checking the applicable boxes below, Contractor hereby represents and warrants to District the following:
 - A. Contractor and Contractor Parties will have **only have limited or no contact** (as determined by District) with District students at all times during the Term of this Agreement.
 - B. X Contractor and Contractor Parties will have **more than limited contact** (as determined by District) with District students during the Term of this Agreement and, at no cost to District, have received a TB test or risk assessment in full compliance with the requirements of Education Code section 49406:

Contractor shall maintain on file the certificates showing that Contractor and Contractor Parties was examined and found free from active TB. These forms shall be regularly maintained and updated by Contractor and shall be available to District upon request or audit.

Contractor further agrees and acknowledges that all new personnel hired by Contractor and Contractor Parties after the Effective Date who will provide Services under this Agreement are subject to the TB certification requirements of Education Code section 49406 and shall be prohibited from having any contact with District students until those TB certification requirements have been satisfied and District determines whether any such contact is permissible.

- 14. **COVID-19 and Other Contagious Diseases**. During the Services, the Contractor and the Contractor Parties shall comply with all applicable legal, contractual, and local government requirements related to the to prevention of the transmission of COVID-19 and other contagious diseases, including "social distancing," masks, and hygiene as may be ordered by the State or local authorities.
- 15. Confidential Information. All District information disclosed to Contractor during the course of performance of the Services under this Agreement shall be treated as confidential and shall not be disclosed to any other persons or parties except as authorized by District or required by law. Contractor shall maintain the confidentiality of and protect from unauthorized disclosure, any and all individual student information received from the District, including but not limited to student names and other identifying information. Contractor shall not use such student information for any purpose other than carrying out the obligations under this Agreement. Upon termination of this Agreement, Contractor shall turn over to District all educational records related to the Services provided to any District student pursuant to this Agreement.
- 16. **Reports**. Contractor shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to the Services rendered and the costs incurred under this Agreement, including records with respect to any payments to employees and subcontractors. All such records shall be prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting procedures. Upon request, Contractor shall make such records available to District for the purpose of auditing and copying such records for a period of five years from the date of final payment under this Agreement.
- 17. **Ownership of Documents**. All plans, studies, drawings, calculations, reports, specifications, estimates, and other documents or any other works of authorship fixed in any tangible medium of expression, including but not limited to physical drawings, data magnetically or otherwise recorded on computer disks, or other writings prepared or caused to be prepared by the Contractor under this Agreement ("Documents") shall be and shall remain the property of the District for all purposes, not only as they relate or may relate to the Services but as they relate or may relate to any other project. Contractor will provide the District with a complete set of Documents, and will retain, on the District's behalf, the originals or reproducible copies of all

Documents, however stored, in the Contractor's files for a period of no less than fifteen (15) years. Contractor shall promptly make available to District any original documents it has retained under this Agreement upon request by the District.

- 18. **Assignment/Successors and Assigns.** Contractor shall not assign or transfer by operation of law or otherwise any or all of its rights, burdens, duties or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of District. Subject to the foregoing, this Agreement shall be binding on the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the respective Parties.
- 19. **Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision of this Agreement.
- 20. **Amendments.** The terms of this Agreement shall not be waived, altered, modified, supplemented or amended in any manner whatsoever except by written agreement signed by both Parties.
- 21. **Governing Law.** This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California, excluding its choice of law rules. Any action or proceeding seeking any relief under or with respect to this Agreement shall be brought solely in the Superior Court of the State of California for the County of Monterey, subject to transfer of venue under applicable State law, provided that nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of immunity to suit by the District.
- 22. **Written Notice.** Written notice shall be deemed to have been duly served if delivered by personal service, regular mail, overnight mail with proof of delivery, facsimile with proof of transmission, or email provided receipt is acknowledged at the address, fax number, or email address located next to the Party signatures below, or if delivered at or sent by registered or certified mail to the last business address known to the person who sends the notice.
- 23. Compliance with Law. Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted into this Agreement shall be deemed to be inserted herein and this Agreement shall be read and enforced as though it were included therein. Contractor shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances, including but not limited to fingerprinting under Education Code section 45125.1, confidentiality of records, Education Code section 49406 and others. Contractor agrees that it shall comply with all legal requirements for the performance of duties under this Agreement and that failure to do so shall constitute material breach.
- 24. **Non-Discrimination.** There shall be no unlawful discrimination in the contracting of persons under this Agreement because of race, color, national origin, age, ancestry, religion, sex, or sexual orientation of such persons. Contractor and Contractor Parties shall comply with all state and federal laws regarding non-discrimination.
- 25. Attorney Fees. If any legal action is taken to enforce the terms of this Agreement, the

prevailing Party shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorneys' fees and other reasonable costs and expenses incurred in connection with that legal action.

- 26. **Liability of District.** Notwithstanding anything stated herein to the contrary, District shall not be liable for any special, consequential, indirect or incidental damages, including but not limited to lost profits in connection with this Agreement.
- 27. **Time.** Time is of the essence to this Agreement.
- 28. **Waiver.** No delay or omission by District in exercising any right under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver of that or any other right and no single or partial exercise of any right shall preclude the District from any or further exercise of any right or remedy.
- 29. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement is intended by the Parties as the final expression of their agreement with respect to such terms as are included herein and as the complete and exclusive statement of its terms and may not be contradicted by evidence of any prior agreement or of a contemporaneous oral agreement, nor explained or supplemented by evidence of consistent additional terms.
- 30. **Ambiguity.** The Parties to this Agreement, and each of them, hereby represent that the language contained herein is to be construed as jointly proposed and jointly accepted, and in the event of any subsequent determination of ambiguity, all Parties shall be treated as equally responsible for such ambiguity.
- 31. **Execution of Other Documents.** The Parties to this Agreement shall cooperate fully in the execution of any and all other documents and in the completion of any additional actions that may be necessary or appropriate to give full force and effect to the terms and intent of this Agreement.

- 33. **Warranty of Authority**. The persons who have signed this Agreement warrant that they are legally authorized to do so on behalf of the respective Parties, and by their signatures to bind the respective Parties to this Agreement.

Attachment EXHIBIT A

This Exhibit sets forth the policies, protocols, and procedures under which the Monterey Peninsula School District and Program Partners will interact. It outlines shared objectives, roles, and responsibilities to foster a safe, effective, and compliant after school program. The scope of this Exhibit includes, but is not limited to:

- Ensuring ELO program compliance with CDE and Federal Grants mandates
- Enhancing educational opportunities through community collaboration
- Ensuring the protection of student and staff welfare
- Aligning community activities with district values and regulatory requirements
- **1. Attendance Policy** All participants in programs facilitated by an ELO program partner must comply with MPUSD's ELO attendance protocol.
 - **1.1.** Upon arrival after school, students are required to check into the ELO program (time and date stamp) using the District's attendance software system.
 - **1.2.** Upon departure from the ELO program, students are checked out via the digital attendance system by an authorized adult (e.g., a parent, guardian, or designated ELO program representative)
 - **1.2.1.** An authorized adult must provide a valid signature (or an approved digital equivalent) upon check out each day.
 - **1.3.** Timely records of attendance, including absences and early releases from the ELO program, will be maintained.
 - 1.3.1. Parent Pick-Up Policy: A regularly updated list of authorized pick-up persons will be maintained at the school campus, and all pick-ups must follow the check-out process. When releasing a student, staff must verify the identity of the parent or authorized guardian using pre-established procedures. A secure, designated pick-up area should be utilized, and any alternative pick-up arrangements or delays must be pre-approved by the site lead. In emergencies or unforeseen circumstances, specific protocols—such as emergency contact procedures and temporary supervised holding areas— need to be established to ensure children's safety.
 - **1.3.2. Early Release procedure**: The ELO program runs each day school is in session from school dismissal until 6:00pm. Any student checked out before 5:30 is considered "Early Release" and requires the guardian to indicate the reason for the Early Release with one of the following approved Early Release Codes (ERC):
 - 1. **Other On-Campus Activity** (Athletics, Clubs, Tutoring, etc.)
 - 2. Family Needs/Emergency

- 3. **Appointment** (Medical, Dental, Counseling, etc.)
- 4. Child Injury/Accident
- 5. Student Walking (Daylight Savings)/Transportation Issues
- 6. **Off-Campus Activity** (Girl Scouts, Tutoring, Athletics, etc.)
- **1.3.3.** The ER Code must be provided at the time of student pick up by the authorized adult
- **1.3.4.** Students who are regularly picked up early (more than 2 times a week or 8 times a month) must complete an <u>Early Release form</u> with a parent/ guardian signature to be kept on file at the school site.
- 2. Records Keeping The School District requires meticulous maintenance of all attendance, incident, and related records generated by our community partner programs. These records, including but not limited to sign-in/out logs and incident reports, behavior reports, etc. must be stored securely in compliance with district data protection policies and federal FERPA regulations. Access to these records is restricted to authorized personnel only. Regular audits will be conducted by the Program Director or Manager to verify that records are complete, accurate, and secure. Community Partners are responsible for training their personnel on proper record-keeping procedures and ensuring that all documentation meets the established standards.

3. Auditing and Reporting:

- **3.1.** The School District reserves the right to audit program activities and records related to the engagement with Community Partners.
- **3.2.** Any discrepancies or issues discovered during audits shall be promptly addressed and corrected. Reoccurring discrepancies and records incorrectly kept may result in delay of payments and processing invoices, and potentially termination of contract services.

4. Nutritional Services

- **4.1.** Nutritional snacks and meals are provided as part of the School district ELO program and follow California State nutritional guidelines.
 - **4.1.1.** Snack and meals (when applicable) must be offered daily to each student
 - 4.1.2. When applicable, snack orders must be sent to the ELO district office at least two weeks before they are needed to ensure the order can be filled. Snack orders must be reviewed and approved by ELO administrative staff.
 - **4.1.3.** Accurate records of snacks and meals distributed must be kept each day and recorded as part of the attendance record.

ATTACHMENT B

Fingerprinting Notice and Acknowledgment (Non-Construction Contracts)

FINGERPRINTING NOTICE AND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT FOR CONTRACTS OTHER THAN CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS

(Education Code Section 45125.1)

Other than business entities performing construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or repair who have complied with Education Code section 45125.2, business entities entering into contracts with the District must comply with Education Code sections 45125.1. Prior to performing any work or services under your contract with the District, and prior to being present on District property or being within the vicinity of District pupils, you shall certify in writing to the District under the penalty of perjury that neither the employer nor any of its employees who are required to submit fingerprints, and who may interact with pupils, have been convicted of a felony as defined in Education Code section 45122.1, and that you are in full compliance with Education Code section 45125.1. (Education Code §45125.1(f).) For this certification, you shall use the form in *Attachment B-2* to this Notice.
- 4. If you are providing the above services in an emergency or exceptional situation, you are not required to comply with Education Code section 45125.1, above. An "emergency or exceptional" situation is one in which pupil health or safety is endangered or when repairs are needed to make a facility safe and habitable. The District shall determine whether an emergency or exceptional situation exists.

(Education Code §45125.1(b).)

5. If you are an individual operating as a sole proprietor of a business entity, you are considered an employee of that entity for purposes of Education Code section 45125.1, and the District shall prepare and submit your fingerprints to the Department of Justice as described in Education Code section 45125.1(a). (Education Code §45125.1(h).)

ATTACHMENT B-1

Violent and Serious Felonies

Under Education Code sections 45122.1 and 45125.1, no employee of a contractor or subcontractor who has been convicted of or has criminal proceedings pending for a violent or serious felony may come into contact with any student. A violent felony is any felony listed in subdivision (c) of Section 667.5 of the Penal Code. Those felonies are presently defined as:

- (8) Any felony in which the defendant inflicts great bodily injury on any person other than an accomplice which has been charged and proved as provided for in Section 12022.7, 12022.8, or 12022.9 on or after July 1, 1977, or as specified prior to July 1, 1977, in Sections 213, 264, and 461, or any felony in which the defendant uses a firearm which use has been charged and proved as provided in subdivision (a) of Section 12022.3, or Section 12022.5 or 12022.55.
- (9) Any robbery.
- (10) Arson, in violation of subdivision (a) or (b) of Section 451.
- (11) Sexual penetration as defined in subdivision (a) or (j) of Section 289.
- (12) Attempted murder.
- (13) A violation of Section 18745, 18750, or 18755.
- (14) Kidnapping.
- (15) Assault with the intent to commit a specified felony, in violation of Section 220.
- (16) Continuous sexual abuse of a child, in violation of Section 288.5.
- (17) Carjacking, as defined in subdivision (a) of Section 215.
- (18) Rape, spousal rape, or sexual penetration, in concert, in violation of Section 264.1.
- (19) Extortion, as defined in Section 518, which would constitute a felony violation of Section 186.22 of the Penal Code.
- (20) Threats to victims or witnesses, as defined in Section 136.1, which would constitute a felony violation of Section 186.22 of the Penal Code.
- (21) Any burglary of the first degree, as defined in subdivision (a) of Section 460, wherein it is charged and proved that another person, other than an accomplice, was present in the residence during the commission of the burglary.
- (22) Any violation of Section 12022.53.
- (23) A violation of subdivision (b) or (c) of Section 11418.

A serious felony is any felony listed in subdivision (c) Section 1192.7 of the Penal Code. Those felonies are presently defined as:

(1) Murder or voluntary manslaughter; (2) Mayhem; (3) Rape; (4) Sodomy by force, violence, duress, menace, threat of great bodily injury, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury on the victim or another person; (5) Oral copulation by force, violence, duress, menace, threat of great bodily injury, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury on the victim or another person; (6) Lewd or lascivious act on a child under the age of 14 years; (7) Any felony punishable by death or imprisonment in the state prison for life; (8) Any felony in which the defendant personally inflicts great bodily injury on any person, other than an accomplice, or any felony in which the defendant personally uses a firearm; (9) Attempted murder; (10) Assault with intent to commit rape, or robbery; (11) Assault with a deadly weapon or instrument on a peace officer; (12) Assault by a life prisoner on a non-inmate; (13) Assault with a deadly weapon by an inmate; (14) Arson; (15) Exploding a destructive device or any explosive with intent to injure; (16) Exploding a destructive device or any explosive causing bodily injury, great bodily injury, or mayhem; (17) Exploding a destructive device or any explosive with intent to murder; (18) Any burglary of the first degree; (19) Robbery or bank robbery; (20) Kidnapping; (21) Holding of a hostage by a person confined in a state prison; (22) Attempt to commit a felony punishable by death or imprisonment in the state prison for life; (23) Any felony in which the defendant personally used a dangerous or deadly weapon; (24) Selling, furnishing, administering, giving, or offering to sell, furnish, administer, or give to a minor any heroin, cocaine, phencyclidine (PCP), or any methamphetamine-related drug, as described in paragraph (2) of subdivision (d) of Section 11055 of the Health and Safety Code, or any of the precursors of methamphetamines, as described in subparagraph (A) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (f) of Section 11055 or subdivision (a) of Section 11100 of the Health and Safety Code; (25) Any violation of subdivision (a) of Section 289 where the act is accomplished against the victim's will by force, violence, duress, menace, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury on the victim or another person; (26) Grand theft involving a firearm; (27)carjacking; (28) any felony offense, which would also constitute a felony violation of Section 186.22; (29) assault with the intent to commit mayhem, rape, sodomy, or oral copulation, in violation of Section 220; (30) throwing acid or flammable substances, in violation of Section 244; (31) assault with a deadly weapon, firearm, machine gun, assault weapon, or semiautomatic firearm or assault on a peace officer or firefighter, in violation of Section 245; (32) assault with a deadly weapon against a public transit employee, custodial officer, or school employee, in violation of Sections 245.2, 245.3, or 245.5; (33) discharge of a firearm at an inhabited dwelling, vehicle, or aircraft, in violation of Section 246; (34) commission of rape or sexual penetration in concert with another person, in violation of Section 264.1; (35) continuous sexual abuse of a child, in violation of Section 288.5; (36) shooting from a vehicle, in violation of subdivision (c) or (d) of Section 26100; (37) intimidation of victims or witnesses, in violation of Section 136.1; (38) criminal threats, in violation of Section 422; (39) any attempt to commit a crime listed in this subdivision other than an assault; (40) any violation of Section 12022.53; (41) a violation of subdivision (b) or (c) of Section 11418; and (42) any conspiracy to commit an offense described in this subdivision.

THE CITY COUNCIL SHALL CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2025-, AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH DENISE DUFFY AND ASSOCIATES FOR BIOLOGICAL CONSULTING SERVICS AND A REIMBURSEMENT AGREEMENT WITH RAMCO ENTERPRISES AND FIND THESE ACTION ARE EXEMPT FROM CEQA PER SECTION 15061(B)(3) OF THE CEQA GUIDELINES.

RECOMMENDATION: it is recommended that the City Council consider:

- 1. Adopting Resolution No. 2025-, authorizing the City Manager to execute a contract with Denise Duffy and Associates to provide biological consulting services in an amount not to exceed \$203,000 subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney.
- 2. Authorizing the City Manager to enter into a reimbursement agreement with Ramco Enterprises for \$203,000
- 3. Authorizing Finance Director to make appropriate accounting and budgetary entries.
- 4. Find these actions are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) per Section 15061(b)(3) of the CEQA Guidelines.

BACKGROUND

In 2014 or thereabouts, RAMCO Enterprises LP (RAMCO) began leasing property for agricultural purposes directly abutting the City owned parcel at Assessor Parcel Number (APN 031-111-013). Upon acceptance of the property, RAMCO identified sand piles and other dumping abutting and on City owned property. The unauthorized dumping impacted approximately ½ acre and included placement of soil, weeds, and clippings removed from agricultural fields along a portion of an elevated terrace above Salinas River and on City property. The unauthorized dumping impacted native vegetation and included foreign soil, trash, and organic debris.

This problem was brought to the City's attention during site visits being done as part of the city-wide Habitat Resource Management Plan being conducted by Denise Duffy & Associates. After meeting with RAMCO, they agreed to fund the cleanup and restoration of the site. Since Denise Duffy & Associates is already working on the Habitat Resources Management Plan, staff are proposing that a separate contract be entered into with Denise Duffy & Associates to provide for the cleanup and restoration of the site with a separate Habitat Restoration Plan. All the work performed by Denise Duffy and Associates on behalf of the City will be paid for 100% by Ramco Enterprises via a Reimbursement Agreement with the City.

The Habitat Restoration Plan will include implementation of debris removal and disposal; site restoration; and completion of a five-year maintenance and monitoring period at the project site. In addition to the Habitat Restoration Plan, Denise Duffy and Associates will also be providing Section 1652 Habitat Restoration and Enhancement Act permitting services with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW).

CITY OF MARINA AGREEMENT FOR ENVIRONMENTAL CONSULTING SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into on **July 16, 2025**, by and between the City of Marina, a California charter city, hereinafter referred to as the "City," and Denise Duffy & Associates, Inc., a California Corporation hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor." City and Contractor are sometimes individually referred to as "party" and collectively as "parties" in this Agreement.

Recitals

A. City desires to retain Contractor to:

Prepare application materials and apply for a California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) Section 1652 Habitat Restoration and Enhancement Act (HREA) permit on behalf of the City of Marina (City). Additionally, Contractor will provide implementation of debris removal and disposal; implementation of restoration; and completion of the five-year maintenance and monitoring period at the RAMCO Facility at the Salinas River Unauthorized Dumping Site, hereinafter referred to as the "Project."

- B. Contractor represents and warrants that it has the qualifications, experience and personnel necessary to properly perform the services as set forth herein.
- C. City desires to retain Contractor to provide such services.

Terms and Conditions

For of good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged and in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, City and Contractor agree to the following terms and conditions:

1. Scope of Work.

- (a) Contractor is hereby hired and retained by the City to work in a cooperative manner with the City to fully and adequately perform those services set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto ("Scope of Work") and by this reference made a part hereof. With prior written notice to Contractor, City may elect to delete certain tasks of the Scope of Work at its sole discretion.
- (b) Contractor shall perform all such work with skill and diligence and pursuant to generally accepted standards of practice in effect at the time of performance. Contractor shall provide corrective services without charge to the City for work which fails to meet these standards and which is reported to Contractor in writing within sixty days of discovery. Should Contractor fail or refuse to perform promptly its obligations under this Agreement, the City may render or undertake the performance thereof and the Contractor shall be liable for any expenses thereby incurred.

- (c) If services under this Agreement are to be performed by a design professional, as that term is defined in California Civil Code §2782.8(b)(2), design professional certifies that all design professional services shall be provided by a person or persons duly licensed by the State of California to provide the type of services described in Section 1(a). By delivery of completed work, design professional certifies that the work conforms to the requirements of this Agreement and all applicable federal, state and local laws, and the professional standard of care in California.
- (d) Contractor is responsible for making an independent evaluation and judgment of all relevant conditions affecting performance of the work, including without limitation site conditions, existing facilities, seismic, geologic, soils, hydrologic, geographic, climatic conditions, applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations and all other contingencies or considerations.
- (e) City shall cooperate with Contractor and will furnish all information data, records and reports existing and available to City to enable Contractor to carry out work outlined in Exhibit "A." Contractor shall be entitled to reasonably rely on information, data, records and reports furnished by the City, however, the City makes no warranty as to the accuracy or completeness of any such information, data, records or reports available to it and provided to Contractor which were furnished to the City by a third party. Contractor shall have a duty to bring to the City's attention any deficiency or error it may discover in any information provided to the Contractor by the City or a third party.

2. Term of Agreement & Commencement of Work.

- (a) Unless otherwise provided, the term of this Agreement shall begin on the date of its full execution and shall expire on **July 31, 2031** unless extended by amendment or terminated earlier as provided herein. The date of full execution is defined as the date when all of the following events have occurred:
- (i) This Agreement has been approved by the City's Council or by the board, officer or employee authorized to give such approval; and
- (ii) The office of the City Attorney has indicated in writing its approval of this Agreement as to form; and
- (iii) This Agreement has been signed on behalf of Contractor by the person or persons authorized to bind the Contractor hereto; and.
- (iv) This Agreement has been signed on behalf of the City by the person designated to so sign by the City's Council or by the officer or employee authorized to enter into this Contract and is attested to by the Marina City Clerk.
- (b) Contractor shall commence work on the Project on or by **July 16, 2025.** This Agreement may be extended upon written agreement of both parties. Contractor may be required to prepare a written schedule for the work to be performed, which schedule shall be approved by the City and made a part of Exhibit A, and to perform the work in accordance with the approved schedule.

3. <u>Compensation</u>.

- (a) City liability for compensation to Contractor under this Agreement shall only be to the extent of the present appropriation to fund this Agreement. For services to be provided under this Agreement City shall compensate Contractor in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Two Thousand, Nine Hundred Sixty-Seven Dollars (\$202,967.00) in accordance with the provisions of this Section and the Fee Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by this reference.
- (b) Invoice(s) in a format and on a schedule acceptable to the City shall be submitted to and be reviewed and verified by the Project Administrator (see Section 5(a)) and forwarded to the City's Finance Department for payment. City shall notify Contractor of exceptions or disputed items and their dollar value within fifteen days of receipt. Payment of the undisputed amount of the invoice will typically be made approximately thirty days after the invoice is submitted to the Finance Department.
- (c) Contractor will maintain clearly identifiable, complete and accurate records with respect to all costs incurred under this Agreement on an industry recognized accounting basis. Contractor shall make available to the representative of City all such books and records related to this Agreement, and the right to examine, copy and audit the same during regular business hours upon 24-hour's notice for a period of four years from the date of final payment under this Agreement.
- (d) Contractor shall not receive any compensation for Extra Work without the prior written authorization of City. As used herein, "Extra Work" means any work that is determined by the City to be necessary for the proper completion of the Project but which is not included within the Scope of Work and which the parties did not reasonably anticipate would be necessary at the execution of this Agreement. Compensation for any authorized Extra Work shall be paid in accordance with Exhibit B.
- (e) Expenses not otherwise addressed in the Scope of Services or the Fee Schedule incurred by Contractor in performing services under this Agreement shall be reviewed and approved in advance by the Project Administrator (Section 5(a)), be charged at cost and reimbursed to Contractor.
- (f) There shall be no charge for transportation within Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito Counties required for the performance of the services under this Agreement; travel to other locations must be approved in writing and in advance by the City, mileage will be charged at the then current standard rate for business travel as set by the U.S. Internal Revenue Service for such approved travel.

4. Termination or Suspension.

- (a) This Agreement may be terminated in whole or in part in writing by either party in the event of a substantial failure by the other party to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement through no fault of the terminating party, provided that no termination may be effected unless the other party is given (1) not less than ten days written notice of intent to terminate, and (2) provided an opportunity for consultation with the terminating party prior to termination.
- (b) If termination for default is effected by the City, an equitable adjustment in the price provided for in this Agreement shall be made, but (1) no amount shall be allowed for anticipated profit on unperformed services or other work, and (2) any payment due

the Contractor at the time of termination may be adjusted to cover any additional costs to the City because of the Contractor's default. If after the termination for failure of Contractor to fulfill its contractual obligations, it is determined that the Contractor had not failed to fulfill contractual obligations, the termination shall be deemed to have been for the convenience of the City.

- (c) The City may terminate or suspend this Agreement at any time for its convenience upon not less than thirty days prior written notice to Contractor. Not later than the effective date of such termination or suspension, Contractor shall discontinue all affected work and deliver all work product and other documents, whether completed or in progress, to the City.
- (d) If termination for default is effected by the Contractor or if termination for convenience is effected by the City, the equitable adjustment shall include a reasonable profit for services or other work performed. The equitable adjustment for termination shall provide for payment to the Contractor for services rendered and expenses incurred prior to the termination, in addition to termination settlement costs reasonably incurred by Contractor relating to written commitments that were executed prior to the termination.

5. Project Administrator, Project Manager & Key Personnel.

- (a) City designates as its Project Administrator **Guido F. Persicone**, **AICP** who shall have the authority to act for the City under this Agreement. The Project Administrator or his/her authorized representative shall represent the City in all matters pertaining to the work to be performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- (b) Contractor designates **John Wandke** as its Project Manager who shall coordinate all phases of the Project. The Project manager shall be available to City at all reasonable times during the Agreement term.
- (c) Contractor warrants that it will continuously furnish the necessary personnel to complete the Project on a timely basis as contemplated by this Agreement. Contractor, at the sole discretion of City, shall remove from the Project any of its personnel assigned to the performance of services upon written request of City. Contractor has represented to City that certain key personnel will perform and coordinate the work under this Agreement. Should one or more of such personnel become unavailable, Contractor may substitute other personnel of at least equal competence upon written approval of the City. In the event that City and Contractor cannot agree as to the substitution of key personnel, City shall be entitled to terminate this Agreement for cause. The key personnel for performance of this Agreement are as follows: **John Wandke.**

6. Delegation of Work.

(a) If Contractor utilizes any subcontractors, consultants, persons, employees or firms having applicable expertise to assist Contractor in performing the services under this Agreement, Contractor shall obtain City's prior written approval to such employment. Contractor's contract with any subcontractor shall contain a provision making the subcontract subject to all provisions of this Agreement. Contractor will be fully responsible and liable for payment for, administration, completion, presentation, and

quality of all work performed. If such persons are utilized, they shall be charged at cost. City reserves its right to employ other contractors in connection with this Project.

- (b) If the work hereunder is performed by a design professional, design professional shall be directly involved with performing the work or shall work through his, her or its employees. The design professional's responsibilities under this Agreement shall not be delegated. The design professional shall be responsible to the City for acts, errors or omissions of his, her or its subcontractors. Negligence of subcontractors or agents retained by the design professional is conclusively deemed to be the negligence of the design professional if not adequately corrected by the design professional. Use of the term subcontractor in any other provision of this Agreement shall not be construed to imply authorization for a design professional to use subcontractors for performance of any professional service under this Agreement.
- (c) The City is an intended beneficiary of any work performed by a subcontractor for purposes of establishing a duty of care between the subcontractor and the City.
- **7. Skill of Employees**. Contractor shall ensure that any employees or agents providing services under this Agreement possess the requisite skill, training and experience to properly perform such services.
- 8. <u>Confidential and Proprietary Information</u>. In the course of performing services under this Agreement Contractor may obtain, receive, and review confidential or proprietary documents, information or materials that are and shall remain the exclusive property of the City. Should Contractor undertake the work on behalf of other agencies, entities, firms or persons relating to the matters described in the Scope of Work, it is expressly agreed by Contractor that any such confidential or proprietary information or materials shall not be provided or disclosed in any manner to any of Contractor's other clients, or to any other third party, without the City's prior express written consent.
- Ownership of Data. Unless otherwise provided for herein, all documents, material, data, drawings, plans, specifications, computer data files, basis for design calculations, engineering notes, and reports originated and prepared by Contractor, or any subcontractor of any tier, under this Agreement shall be and remain the property of the City for its use in any manner it deems appropriate. Contractor agrees that all copyrights which arise from creation of the work pursuant to this Agreement shall be vested in the City and waives and relinquishes all claims to copyright or intellectual property rights in favor of the City. Contractor shall provide two (2) sets of reproducible of the above-cited items, except for the computer data files which shall consist of one (1) set. Contractor shall use all reasonable efforts to ensure that any electronic files provided to the City will be compatible with the City's computer hardware and software. Contractor makes no representation as to long-term compatibility, usability or readability of the format resulting from the use of software application packages, operating systems or computer hardware differing from those in use by the City at the commencement of this Agreement. Contractor shall be permitted to maintain copies of all such data for its files. City acknowledges that its use of the work product is limited to the purposes contemplated by the Scope of Work and, should City use these products or data in connection with additions to the work required under this Agreement or for new work without consultation with and without additional compensation to Contractor, Contractor makes no representation as to the suitability of the work product for use in or application to circumstances not contemplated by the Scope of Work and shall have no liability or

responsibility whatsoever in connection with such use which shall be at the City's sole risk. Any and all liability arising out of changes made by the City to Contractor's deliverables is waived against Contractor unless City has given Contractor prior written notice of the changes and has received Contractor's written consent to such changes.

10. Conflict of Interest.

- (a) Contractor covenants that neither it, nor any officer or principal of its firm has or shall acquire any interest, directly or indirectly, which would conflict in any manner with the interests of the City or which would in any way hinder Contractor's performance of services under this Agreement. Contractor further covenants that in the performance of this Agreement, no person having any such interest shall be employed by it as an officer, employee, agent or subcontractor without the express written consent of the City Manager. Contractor agrees to at all times avoid conflicts of interest or the appearance of any conflicts of interest with the interests of the City in the performance of this Agreement. Contractor shall represent the interest of the City in any discussion or negotiation.
- (b) City understands and acknowledges that Contractor may be, as of the date of commencement of services under this Agreement, independently involved in the performance of non-related services for other governmental agencies and private parties. Contractor is unaware of any stated position of the City relative to such projects. Any future position of the City on such projects may result in a conflict of interest for purposes of this section.
- **11. Disclosure**. Contractor may be subject to the appropriate disclosure requirements of the California Fair Political Practices Act, as determined by the City Manager.

12. Non-Discrimination.

- (a) During the performance of this Agreement the Contractor and its subcontractors shall comply with the applicable laws of the United States of America, the State of California and the City prohibiting discrimination and harassment. In performing this Agreement, Contractor shall not discriminate, harass, or allow harassment, against any employee or applicant for employment because of gender, gender expression, gender identity, genetic characteristics, sex, race, color, ancestry, religious creed, national origin, physical disability (including HIV and AIDS), medical condition (including cancer), mental disability, age, marital status, denial of family and medical care leave and denial of pregnancy disability leave, sexual orientation, military/veteran status and any other characteristics protected by state or federal law. Contractor shall give written notice of its obligations under this clause to labor organizations with which it has a collective bargaining or other agreement.
- (b) Contractor shall include the provisions of this Section 12(a) in all subcontracts related to this Agreement.

13. Indemnification.

- (a) Other than in the performance of design professional services by a design professional, which shall be solely as addressed by subsection (b) below, and to the full extent permitted by law, Contractor shall indemnify, immediately defend (with independent counsel reasonably acceptable to the City) and hold harmless the City, its Council, boards, commissions, employees, officials and agents (collectively "Indemnified Parties" or in the singular "Indemnified Party") from and against any claims, losses, damages, penalties, fines and judgments, associated investigation and administrative expenses, and defense costs including but not limited to reasonable attorney's fees, court costs, expert witness fees and costs of alternate dispute resolution (collectively "Liabilities"), where same arise out of the performance of this Agreement by Contractor, its officers, employees, agents and sub-contractors. The duty to defend is a separate and distinct obligation from the Contractor's duty to indemnify and Contractor shall be obligated to defend in all legal, equitable, administrative or special proceedings upon tender to the Contractor of any claim in any form or at any stage of an action or proceeding, whether or not liability is established and the obligation extends through final judgment including exhaustion of any appeals.. The Contractor's obligation to indemnify applies unless it is finally determined that the liability was caused by the sole active negligence or sole willful misconduct of an indemnified party. If it is finally determined that liability is caused by the comparative active negligence or willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party, the Contractor's indemnification obligation shall be reduced in proportion to the established comparative liability of the indemnified party.
- (b) To the fullest extent permitted by law (including without limitation California Civil Code Sections 2782.8), when the services to be provided under this Agreement are design professional services to be performed by a design professional, as that term is defined by said section 2782.8(c)(2) ("Design Professional") Design Professional shall indemnify, protect and hold harmless any Indemnified Party for all Liabilities regardless of nature or type that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of Design Professional, or such acts or omissions of an officer, employee, agent or subcontractor of the Design Professional. Design Professional shall not have an immediate duty to defend an Indemnified Party, however, Design Professional's obligation to indemnify (including reimbursing the cost to defend) and hold the Indemnified Parties harmless applies unless it is finally determined that the liability was caused by the sole active negligence or sole willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party. If it is finally determined that liability was caused by the comparative active negligence or willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party the Design Professional's indemnification obligation shall be reduced in direct proportion to the indemnified party's proportionate percentage of fault. Within 30 days following Design Professional's receipt of a properly presented written invoice Design Professional shall satisfy its indemnification obligations and reimburse the Indemnified Party for the cost of reasonable attorney's fees and defense costs incurred by the Indemnified Party to the same extent of Design Professional's indemnity obligation herein. In no event shall the cost to defend charged to the Design Professional exceed the Design Professional's proportionate percentage of fault.
- (c) The provisions of this Section are not limited by the provisions of sections relating to insurance including provisions of any worker's compensation act or similar act. Contractor expressly waives its statutory immunity under such statues or laws as to City, its employees and officials. An allegation or determination of comparative active negligence or willful misconduct by an Indemnified Party unrelated to design professional services does not relieve Contractor from its separate and distinct obligation

to defend City. Contractor agrees to obtain executed indemnity agreements with provisions identical to those set forth here in this section from each and every subcontractor, sub tier contractor or any other person or entity involved by, for, with or on behalf of Contractor in the performance or subject matter of this Agreement. In the event Contractor fails to obtain such indemnity obligations from others as required here, Contractor agrees to be fully responsible according to the terms of this section. Failure of City to monitor compliance with these requirements imposes no additional obligations on City and will in no way act as a waiver of any rights hereunder.

- (d) If any action or proceeding is brought against any Indemnified Party by reason of any of the matters against which the Contractor has agreed to provide an immediate defense to any Indemnified Party, as provided above, Contractor, upon notice from the City, shall defend the Indemnified Party at Contractor's expense by independent counsel reasonably acceptable to the City. Unless otherwise provided above, an Indemnified Party need not have first paid for any of the matters to which it is entitled to indemnification in order to be so defended. Contractor may submit a claim to the City for reasonable defense costs (including attorney's and expert fees) incurred in providing a defense of any Indemnified Party to the extent such defense costs arise under principals of comparative fault from the Indemnified Party's active negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct.
- (e) This obligation to indemnify and defend, as set forth herein, is binding on the successors, assigns, or heirs of Contractor and shall survive the termination of this Agreement or this Section.

14. Insurance.

- (a) As a condition precedent to the effectiveness of this Agreement and without limiting Contractor's indemnification of the City, Contractor agrees to obtain and maintain in full force and effect at its own expense the insurance policies set forth in Exhibit "C" "Insurance" attached hereto and made a part hereof. Contractor shall furnish the City with original certificates of insurance, executed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf, along with copies of all required endorsements. All certificates and endorsements must be received and approved by the City before any work commences. All insurance policies shall be subject to approval by the City Attorney and Risk Manager as to form and content. Specifically, such insurance shall: (1) be endorsed to protect City as an additional insured for commercial general and business auto liability; (2) provide City prior notice of cancellation; and (3) be primary with respect to City's insurance program. Contractor's insurance is not expected to respond to claims that may arise from the acts or omissions of the City.
- (b) City reserves the right at any time during the term of this Agreement to change the amounts and types of insurance required herein by giving Contractor ninety days advance written notice of such change. If such change should result in substantial additional cost of the Contractor, City agrees to negotiate additional compensation proportional to the increased benefit to City.
- (c) All required insurance must be submitted and approved the City Attorney and Risk Manager prior to the inception of any operations by Contractor.

- (d) The required coverage and limits are subject to availability on the open market at reasonable cost as determined by the City. Non availability or non affordability must be documented by a letter from Contractor's insurance broker or agency indicating a good faith effort to place the required insurance and showing as a minimum the names of the insurance carriers and the declinations or quotations received from each. Within the foregoing constraints, Contractor's failure to procure or maintain required insurance during the entire term of this Agreement shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement under which City may immediately suspend or terminate this Agreement or, at its discretion, procure or renew such insurance to protect City's interests and pay any and all premium in connection therewith and recover all monies so paid from Contractor.
- (e) By signing this Agreement, Contractor hereby certifies that it is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 *et seq.*, of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provision of that Code, and that it will comply with such provisions at all such times as they may apply during the performance of the work pursuant to this Contract. Unless otherwise agreed, a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City is required.
- **15.** <u>Independent Contractor</u>. The parties agree that Contractor, its officers, employees and agents, if any, shall be independent contractors with regard to the providing of services under this Agreement, and that Contractor's employees or agents shall not be considered to be employees or agents of the City for any purpose and will not be entitled to any of the benefits City provides for its employees. City shall make no deductions for payroll taxes or Social Security from amounts due Contractor for work or services provided under this Agreement.

This Agreement shall not constitute, and it is not intended to constitute, either party as an employer, employee, agent, partner or legal representative of the other party for any purpose, or give either party any right to supervise or direct the functions of the other party. Except as specifically provided herein, neither party shall have authority to act for or obligate the other party in any way or to extend any representation on behalf of the other party. Each party agrees to perform under this Agreement solely as an independent contractor and neither party shall have any right, power, or authority, nor shall they represent themselves as having any authority to assume, create, or incur any expense, liability or obligation, express or implied, on behalf of the other party for any purpose. Each party agrees not to permit its employees or agents to do anything that might be construed or interpreted as acts of the other party.

- **Claims for Labor and Materials**. Contractor shall promptly pay when due all amounts payable for labor and materials furnished in the performance of this Agreement, so as to prevent any lien or other claim under any provision of law from arising against any City property (including reports, documents, and other tangible matter produced by the Contractor hereunder), against the Contractor's rights to payments hereunder, or against the City, and shall pay all amounts due under the Unemployment Insurance Act with respect to such labor.
- **17. Discounts**. Contractor agrees to offer the City any discount terms that are offered to its best customers for the goods and services to be provided herein, and apply such discounts to payment made under this Agreement which meet the discount terms.

- **18.** <u>Cooperation; Further Acts.</u> The Parties shall fully cooperate with one another, and shall take any additional acts or sign any additional documents as may be necessary, appropriate or convenient to attain the purposes of this Agreement.
- **Dispute Resolution**. If any dispute arises between the parties as to proper interpretation or application of this Agreement, the parties shall first meet and confer in a good faith attempt to resolve the matter between themselves. If the dispute is not resolved by meeting and conferring, the matter shall be submitted for formal mediation to a mediator selected mutually by the parties. The expenses of such mediation shall be shared equally between the parties. If the dispute is not or cannot be resolved by mediation, the parties may mutually agree (but only as to those issues of the matter not resolved by mediation) to submit their dispute to arbitration. Before commencement of the arbitration, the parties may elect to have the arbitration proceed on an informal basis; however, if the parties are unable so to agree, then the arbitration shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of the American Arbitration Association. The decision of the arbitrator shall be binding, unless within thirty days after issuance of the arbitrator's written decision, any party files an action in court. Venue and jurisdiction for any such action between the parties shall lie in the Superior Court for the County of Monterey.

20. Compliance with Laws.

- (a) Each party's performance hereunder shall comply with all applicable laws of the United States of America, the State of California and the City including but not limited to laws regarding health and safety, labor and employment, wage and hours and licensing laws which affect employees. This Agreement shall be governed by, enforced and interpreted under the laws of the State of California. Contractor must be in good standing and registered with the California Department of Industrial Relations in accordance with California labor Code section 1725.5 and shall comply with new, amended or revised laws, regulations or procedures that apply to the performance of this Agreement.
- (b) If the Project is a "public work," or prevailing wages are otherwise required, Contractor shall comply with all provision of California Labor Code section 1720 *et seq.*, as applicable, and laws dealing with prevailing wages, apprentices and hours of work.
- (c) Contractor represents that it has obtained and presently holds all permits and licenses necessary for performance hereunder, including a Business License required by the City's Business License Ordinance (Title 5 of the Marina Municipal Code) for which a business license tax is prescribed and assessed at the rate of two-tenths percent of gross receipts, in accordance with the provisions therein. For the term covered by this Agreement, the Contractor shall maintain or obtain as necessary, such permits and licenses and shall not allow them to lapse, be revoked or suspended.
- **21.** Assignment or Transfer. This Agreement or any interest herein may not be assigned, hypothecated or transferred, either directly or by operation of law, without the prior written consent of the City. Any attempt to do so shall be null and void, and any assignees, hypothecates or transferees shall acquire no right or interest by reason of such attempted assignment, hypothecation or transfer.

22. <u>Notices</u>. All notices required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be personally delivered, sent by facsimile ("fax") or certified mail, postage prepaid with return receipt requested, addressed as follows:

The parties my agree in writing to receive notice by email. Notice shall be deemed effective on the date personally delivered or transmitted by facsimile or, if mailed, three days after deposit in the custody of the U.S. Postal Service. A copy of any notice sent as provided herein shall also be delivered to the Project Administrator and Project Manager.

- **23.** <u>Amendments, Changes or Modifications</u>. This Agreement is not subject to amendment, change or modification except by a writing signed by the authorized representatives of City and Contractor.
- **24.** Force Majeure. Notwithstanding any other provisions hereof, neither Contractor nor City shall be held responsible or liable for failure to meet their respective obligations under this Agreement if such failure shall be due to causes beyond Contractor's or the City's control except that an economic downturn of any type shall not be a justifiable cause for the failure to meet their respective obligations under this Agreement. Such causes include but are not limited to: strike, fire, flood, civil disorder, act of God or of the public enemy, act of the federal government, or any unit of state of local government in either sovereign or contractual capacity, epidemic, quarantine restriction, or delay in transportation to the extent that they are not caused by the party's willful or negligent acts or omissions, and to the extent that they are beyond the party's reasonable control.
- **25.** Attorney's Fees. In the event of any controversy, claim or dispute relating to this Agreement, or the breach thereof, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the losing party reasonable expenses, attorney's fees and costs.
- **26.** Successors and Assigns. All of the terms, conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall apply to and bind the respective heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the parties. Nothing in this paragraph is intended to affect the limitation on assignment
- **Authority to Enter Agreement**. Contractor has all requisite power and authority to conduct its business and to execute, deliver and perform the Agreement. Each party warrants that the individuals who have signed this Agreement have the legal power, right and authority to make this Agreement and bind each respective party.

- **28. Waiver**. A waiver of a default of any term of this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver of any succeeding default or as a waiver of the provision itself. A party's performance after the other party's default shall not be construed as a waiver of that default.
- **29.** Severability. Should any portion of this Agreement be determined to be void or unenforceable, such shall be severed from the whole and the Agreement will continue as modified.
- **30.** Construction, References, Captions. Since the parties or their agents have participated fully in the preparation of this Agreement, the language of this Agreement shall be construed simply, according to its fair meaning, and not strictly for or against any party. Any term referencing time, days or period for performance shall be deemed calendar days and not work days. The captions of the various sections are for convenience and ease of reference only, and do not define, limit, augment or describe the scope, content or intent of this Agreement.
- 31. Advice of Counsel. The parties agree that they are aware that they have the right to be advised by counsel with respect to the negotiations, terms and conditions of this Agreement, and that the decision of whether or not to seek the advice of counsel with respect to this Agreement is a decision which is the sole responsibility of each of the parties hereto. This Agreement shall not be construed in favor or against either party by reason of the extent to which each party participated in the drafting of this Agreement.
- **32.** <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall constitute an original.
- **33. Time.** Time is of the essence in this contract.
- **34.** Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties with respect to the matters as set forth in this Agreement, and no other agreement, statement or promise made by or to any party or by or to any employee, officer or agent of any party, which is not contained in this Agreement shall be binding or valid.

Denise Duffy & Associates, Inc. (DD&A) is pleased to submit our proposal to prepare application materials and apply for a California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) Section 1652 Habitat Restoration and Enhancement Act (HREA) permit on behalf of the City of Marina (City). The HREA permit is necessary to allow restoration of the unauthorized RAMCO dumping site located on City property near the Salinas River and within a portion of the riparian corridor. The HREA permitting process is a streamlined permitting pathway that CDFW has developed for voluntary projects that are intended to improve fish and wildlife habitat and meet other specific requirements. Once the project is approved under the HREA, no other permits from CDFW are required. This proposal provides a scope and cost estimate to prepare the application package, apply for the HREA permit and coordinate with CDFW during the process. It is assumed that no other permits from CDFW or other agencies will be required. We are grateful for the opportunity and look forward to continuing our work together on this important project.

SCOPE OF WORK

The following scope of work includes preparation and submittal of necessary application materials and coordination with California Department of Fish & Wildlife (CDFW) during the 1652 Habitat Restoration and Enhancement Act (HREA) permitting process.

Task 1 – CDFW HREA Permitting

This task includes initial correspondence with CDFW, preparation of the HREA application package to include necessary forms and required documents (i.e., the existing Ramco Restoration Plan; description of project implementation methods and equipment; material quantities; impact areas; and list of measures to protect fish, wildlife, and plant resources), and coordination with CDFW throughout the process.

DD&A will prepare the permit applications in signature-ready format. Upon client signature, DD&A will submit the applications and coordinate with CDFW to determine if the applications are complete, provide additional information, review project measures to avoid or minimize impacts, and identify additional conditions recommended for permit approval. The client will be responsible for agreeing to and finalizing the permit conditions, executing the permits, and paying permit application fees.

Assumptions: This scope is based on our professional experience with the timeline and effort required for acquiring the CDFW HREA permit identified above. However, if the regulatory agencies provide requests for additional information or comments beyond what can reasonably be expected, an add on to the scope may be required. This scope also assumes that preparation of CEQA documentation, including a Notice of Exemption (NOE), will not be required, and other site-specific technical reports including but not limited to a biological report or wetland delineation will not be required. This scope of work assumes acquisition of other regulatory permits will not be required.

BUDGET

The project will be billed on a time-and-materials basis by task with a not-to-exceed amount detailed in the attached budget.

ASSUMPTIONS

The budget is based on completing only the tasks identified above and does not include services including but not limited to land surveying, grading plans, or other engineering services; preparation of design drawings or irrigation plans; payment of permit fees; CEQA documentation; implementation of restoration; or the task-specific assumptions noted above. DD&A is available to perform these services, but an add-on to the contract would be necessary.

OPINION OF PROBABLE COST

Revised July 15, 2025

Denise Duffy and Associates (DD&A) has prepared this opinion of probable cost for implementation of debris removal and disposal; implementation of restoration; and completion of the five-year maintenance and monitoring period at the RAMCO Facility at the Salinas River Unauthorized Dumping Site (Project). This opinion of probable cost is based on the Habitat Restoration Plan (Plan) for the Project prepared by DD&A (April 2024) and is intended to provide costs to aid in high-level planning. This opinion of probable cost is not a formal proposal and estimates of costs for restoration implementation are subject to change based on potential future revisions to the Plan, permitting requirements, escalation of costs, or other factors unknown at this time.

The scope of work remains unchanged, but estimated costs have been adjusted to assume that RAMCO will fund and provide complete services, under DD&A's guidance and oversight, for the following items:

- All materials and labor associated with Task 2, Debris Removal, Hauling, Disposal and Soil Preparation.
- Irrigation contingency as described under Task 4.
- All materials and labor associated with installation of 3,500 square feet of biodegradable erosion control fabric and 700 linear feet of biodegradable straw wattles as described under Task 5.
- Water supply (tank, water truck) for up to five years to support plant establishment as described under Task 6.

Estimated costs associated with these items are excluded from this document and are to be provided by RAMCO if requested by the City of Marina.

SCOPE OF WORK

Task 1. Removal and Initial Restoration Management and Monitoring

Task 1 covers management and monitoring work performed by the Project Biologist during initial removal of foreign materials at the unauthorized dumping site and initial implementation of restoration. Anticipated activities include marking the limits of work with stakes and flagging, subcontractor coordination; providing guidance and oversight to RAMCO during the implementation of their responsible tasks; coordination with the City of Marina; miscellaneous meetings and correspondence; inspections and monitoring during activities including removal and loading of debris using heavy equipment; installation of erosion control materials; initial planting and seeding; and irrigation.

Task 2. Debris Removal, Hauling, Disposal, Soil Preparation (Performed by RAMCO)

This task includes materials, equipment, and labor associated with excavation of foreign materials (assumes 1,000 tons) at the dumping site using heavy equipment; loading excavated debris into haul trucks and transporting to the municipal landfill in Marina; disposal fees for mixed problem waste; scarification of compacted soils and smoothing of native soil in preparation for seeding and planting over an approximately 0.5-acre area.

<u>Initial Installation of the Restoration Tasks 3 - 5. Initial Installation</u>

Initial installation of the restoration assumes collection of propagules and propagation of native plant container stock; collection/acquisition of native seed materials for seeding; a contingency for temporary irrigation; installation of erosion control materials; initial hydroseeding; and initial plant installation at the approximately 0.5-acre restoration site.

- <u>Task 3 Contract Grow and Native Seed Acquisition</u> Collection of propagules and implementation of a contract grow at a native plant nursery to include up to 560 plants (1-gal size or smaller). Acquisition of native seed needed to perform initial seeding of 0.5-acre.
- <u>Task 4 Irrigation Contingency</u> Allowance for installation and removal of temporary irrigation for establishment of plantings, if needed.
- <u>Task 5 Temporary Erosion Control, Planting and Seeding</u> Mobilization, staging and layout; installation of up to 3,500 square feet of biodegradable erosion control fabric; installation of up to 700 linear feet of biodegradable straw wattles; hydroseeding 0.5-acre with a bonded fiber matrix (BFM); planting to include up to 560 plants; and installation of wire browse protection cages on tree plantings.

Task 6. Maintenance for 5 Years

Five-year maintenance includes maintenance and management activities necessary to establish the restoration installation and guide the site towards meeting applicable success criteria. This work includes operation and maintenance of temporary irrigation (if used), periodic maintenance inspections, and maintenance of plantings. Maintenance of plantings may include repairing water retention basins, repairing browse protection cages, resetting plants disrupted by wildlife, hand weeding around plants, cutting weeds with string trimmers, or other related tasks (up to 6 visits per year).

Task 7. Monitoring and Reporting for 5 Years

Annual monitoring and preparation of annual reports will occur for a period of five years. Monitoring will include both qualitative and quantitative methods as detailed in the Plan as well as data analysis. Annual reports will be prepared and submitted once each year for a period of five years and will include the content specified by the Plan.

COST ESTIMATE

The attached opinion of probable cost uses values based on DD&A's prior experience with habitat restoration and a site visit with a general engineering contractor and assumes 2025 dollars for implementation of the initial tasks. An escalation rate of 5%/year is applied to each subsequent year of the five-year maintenance and monitoring period. Costs are subject to change based on potential future revisions to the Plan, permitting requirements, escalation of costs, or other factors unknown at this time. This opinion of probable cost is for high-level planning and is not a formal proposal.

Estimated costs have been adjusted to account for the tasks to be implemented by RAMCO, as described above.

EXHIBIT C - INSURANCE

Contractor shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by Contractor, its agents, representatives, or employees.

MINIMUM SCOPE AND LIMIT OF INSURANCE

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 1. Commercial General Liability (CGL): Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (ISO CG 25 03 or 25 04) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
- 2. **Automobile Liability:** Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 0001 covering, Code 1 (any auto), or if Contractor has no owned autos, Code 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned), with limit no less than **\$1,000,000** per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 3. **Workers' Compensation** insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease. (Not required if Contractor provides written verification it has no employees)
- Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions): Insurance appropriates to Contractor's profession, with limit no less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence or claim, \$2,000,000 aggregate.

If Contractor maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the City requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or the higher limits maintained by Contractor. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the City.

Other Insurance Provisions

The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

Additional Insured Status

City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of Contractor including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to Contractor's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or if not available, through the addition of both CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38; and CG 20 37 if a later edition is used).

Primary Coverage

For any claims related to this contract, Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary and non-contributory and at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects the City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the City, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it. This requirement shall also apply to any Excess or Umbrella liability policies.

Umbrella or Excess Policy

Contractor may use Umbrella or Excess Policies to provide the liability limits as required in this agreement. This form of insurance will be acceptable provided that all of the Primary and Umbrella or Excess Policies shall provide all of the insurance coverages herein required, including, but not limited to, primary and non-contributory, additional insured, Self-Insured Retentions (SIRs), indemnity, and defense requirements. The Umbrella or Excess policies shall be provided on a true "following form" or broader coverage basis, with coverage at least as broad as provided on the underlying Commercial General Liability insurance. No insurance policies maintained by the Additional Insureds, whether primary or excess, and which also apply to a loss covered hereunder, shall be called upon to contribute to a loss until Contractor's primary and excess liability policies are exhausted.

Notice of Cancellation

Each insurance policy required above shall provide that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the City.

Waiver of Subrogation

Contractor hereby grants to City a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Contractor may acquire against the City by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Contractor agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the City has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.

Self-Insured Retentions

Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City. The City may require Contractor to purchase coverage with a lower retention or provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. The policy language shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured or City. The CGL and any policies, including Excess liability policies, may not be subject to a self-insured retention (SIR) or deductible that exceeds \$25,000 unless approved in writing by City. Any and all deductibles and SIRs shall be the sole responsibility of Contractor or subcontractor who procured such insurance and shall not apply to the Indemnified Additional Insured Parties. City may deduct from any amounts otherwise due Contractor to fund the SIR/deductible. Policies shall NOT contain any self-insured retention (SIR) provision that limits the satisfaction of the SIR to the City. The policy must also provide that Defense costs, including the Allocated Loss Adjustment Expenses, will satisfy the SIR or deductible. City reserves the right to obtain a copy of any policies and endorsements for verification.

Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers authorized to conduct business in the state with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the City.

Claims Made Policies

If any of the required policies provide claims-made coverage:

- 1. The Retroactive Date must be shown, and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
- 2. Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.
- 3. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, Contractor must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of work.

Verification of Coverage

Contractor shall furnish the City with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause and a copy of the Declarations and Endorsements Pages of the CGL and any Excess policies listing all policy endorsements. All certificates and endorsements and copies of the Declarations & Endorsements pages are to be received and approved by the City before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive Contractor's obligation to provide them. The City reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time. City reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.

Subcontractors

Contractor shall require and verify that all subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein, and Contractor shall ensure that City is an additional insured on insurance required from subcontractors.

Duration of Coverage

CGL & Excess liability policies for any construction related work, including, but not limited to, maintenance, service, or repair work, shall continue coverage for a minimum of five (5) years for Completed Operations liability coverage. Such Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.

Special Risks or Circumstances

City reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.

CITY COUNCIL CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2025-, AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE A CONTRACT WITH SCI CONSULTING NOT TO EXCEED \$60,000 TO PROVIDE CANNABIS PROGRAM APPLICATION REVIEW, TAX AUDITS, COMPLIANCE INSPECTIONS, BACKGROUND CHECKS, AND SUBJECT MATTER EXPERTISE AND TECHNICAL SUPPORT

REQUEST:

It is requested that City Council consider:

- 1. Adopting Resolution No. 2025-, authorizing the City Manager to execute a contract with SCI Consulting not to exceed \$60,000 to provide cannabis program application review, tax audits, compliance inspections, background checks, and subject matter expertise and technical support, subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney.
- 2. Authorizing Finance Director to make appropriate accounting and budgetary entries.

BACKGROUND:

On November 6, 2018, the citizens of the City of Marina passed an Ordinance allowing Cannabis Business Activity and Establishing Taxes and Fees for Such Businesses within the City of Marina. The 2018 Ordinance only pertains to those Cannabis Businesses permitted prior to 2021. On November 3, 2020, the citizens of the City of Marina passed a revised Ordinance that repealed the 2018 voter approved Commercial Cannabis Activities Ordinance, and replaced it with Chapter 5.80 Commercial Cannabis Business Regulations and Chapter 17.47 Commercial Cannabis Uses.

The Commercial Cannabis Activities Ordinance allows for no more than three Medical Cannabis dispensaries and three Adult Cannabis dispensaries in the City of Marina at any one time. Currently, there are 3 permitted Commercial Cannabis Medical and Adult Use Dispensaries and the City is not accepting new Dispensary Permit Applications.

ANALYSIS:

SCI Consulting has a team of knowledgeable professionals who have direct experience in the implementation of Cannabis Regulatory Programs including developing applications, application rating systems, reviewing applications for compliance with rules and regulations, performing facility inspections conducting compliance and financial audits, and developing application fees to ensure that the City recovers the costs of reviewing materials and conducting hearings before the Planning Commission and City Council. The scope of services includes:

- Cannabis business application review
- Pre-license site visits
- Cannabis tax audits
- Regulatory compliance inspections
- Supplemental background checks
- Subject matter expertise and technical support

SCI Consulting's proposal is based on time, materials and travel expenses associated with the execution of these type services. The contract is for a not to exceed amount of \$60,000. The City is only billed for services rendered listed in the Cost section of the proposal contained in proposal included in "EXHIBIT A".

FISCAL IMPACT:

On an annual basis the City collects approximately \$271,000-\$420,000 in cannabis taxes from the three approved cannabis shops in Marina. Therefore the \$60,000 SCI will not have a negative fiscal impact upon the City. Additionally, except for the City authorized SCI technical expertise services outlined in Objective six (6) of the proposal, there will be no additional cost to the General Fund. The \$60,000 cost of SCI services, except Objective 6, will be recovered 100% from the applications and licenses charged to those businesses involved in the cannabis application and license process.

CONCLUSION:

Adopting Resolution No. 2025-, will authorize the City Manager to execute a contract with SCI Consulting not to exceed \$60,000 to provide cannabis program application review, tax audits, compliance inspections, background checks, and subject matter expertise and technical support, subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney.

CITY OF MARINA AGREEMENT FOR CANNABIS MANAGEMENT SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into on August 7, 2025, by and between the City of Marina, a California charter city, hereinafter referred to as the "City," and SCI Consulting Group a California Corporation, hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor." City and Contractor are sometimes individually referred to as "party" and collectively as "parties" in this Agreement.

Recitals

City desires to retain Contractor to:

- A. Provide cannabis management services as described in Exhibit A, hereinafter referred to as the "Project."
- B. Contractor represents and warrants that it has the qualifications, experience and personnel necessary to properly perform the services as set forth herein.
- C. City desires to retain Contractor to provide such services.

Terms and Conditions

For of good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged and in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, City and Contractor agree to the following terms and conditions:

1. Scope of Work.

- (a) Contractor is hereby hired and retained by the City to work in a cooperative manner with the City to fully and adequately perform those services set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto ("Scope of Work") and by this reference made a part hereof. With prior written notice to Contractor, City may elect to delete certain tasks of the Scope of Work at its sole discretion.
- (b) Contractor shall perform all such work with skill and diligence and pursuant to generally accepted standards of practice in effect at the time of performance. Contractor shall provide corrective services without charge to the City for work which fails to meet these standards and which is reported to Contractor in writing within sixty days of discovery. Should Contractor fail or refuse to perform promptly its obligations under this Agreement, the City may render or undertake the performance thereof and the Contractor shall be liable for any expenses thereby incurred.
- (c) If services under this Agreement are to be performed by a design professional, as that term is defined in California Civil Code §2782.8(b)(2), design professional certifies that all design professional services shall be provided by a person or persons duly licensed by the State of California to provide the type of services described in Section 1(a). By delivery of completed work, design professional certifies

that the work conforms to the requirements of this Agreement and all applicable federal, state and local laws, and the professional standard of care in California.

- (d) Contractor is responsible for making an independent evaluation and judgment of all relevant conditions affecting performance of the work, including without limitation site conditions, existing facilities, seismic, geologic, soils, hydrologic, geographic, climatic conditions, applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations and all other contingencies or considerations.
- (e) City shall cooperate with Contractor and will furnish all information data, records and reports existing and available to City to enable Contractor to carry out work outlined in Exhibit "A." Contractor shall be entitled to reasonably rely on information, data, records and reports furnished by the City, however, the City makes no warranty as to the accuracy or completeness of any such information, data, records or reports available to it and provided to Contractor which were furnished to the City by a third party. Contractor shall have a duty to bring to the City's attention any deficiency or error it may discover in any information provided to the Contractor by the City or a third party.

2. Term of Agreement & Commencement of Work.

- (a) Unless otherwise provided, the term of this Agreement shall begin on August 7, 2025 and shall expire on <u>December 31,2027</u>, unless extended by amendment or terminated earlier as provided herein. The date of full execution is defined as the date when all of the following events have occurred:
- (i) This Agreement has been approved by the City's Council or by the board, officer or employee authorized to give such approval; and
- (ii) The office of the City Attorney has indicated in writing its approval of this Agreement as to form; and
- (iii) This Agreement has been signed on behalf of Contractor by the person or persons authorized to bind the Contractor hereto; and.
- (iv) This Agreement has been signed on behalf of the City by the person designated to so sign by the City's Council or by the officer or employee authorized to enter into this Contract and is attested to by the Marina City Clerk.
- (b) Contractor shall commence work on the Project on or by August 7, 2025 . This Agreement may be extended upon written agreement of both parties. Contractor may be required to prepare a written schedule for the work to be performed, which schedule shall be approved by the City and made a part of Exhibit A, and to perform the work in accordance with the approved schedule.

3. Compensation.

(a) City liability for compensation to Contractor under this Agreement shall only be to the extent of the present appropriation to fund this Agreement. For services to be provided under this Agreement City shall compensate Contractor in an amount not to exceed sixty thousand Dollars (\$60,000) in accordance with the provisions of this Section

- (b) Invoice(s) in a format and on a schedule acceptable to the City shall be submitted to and be reviewed and verified by the Project Administrator (see Section 5(a)) and forwarded to the City's Finance Department for payment. City shall notify Contractor of exceptions or disputed items and their dollar value within fifteen days of receipt. Payment of the undisputed amount of the invoice will typically be made approximately thirty days after the invoice is submitted to the Finance Department.
- (c) Contractor will maintain clearly identifiable, complete and accurate records with respect to all costs incurred under this Agreement on an industry recognized accounting basis. Contractor shall make available to the representative of City all such books and records related to this Agreement, and the right to examine, copy and audit the same during regular business hours upon 24-hour's notice for a period of four years from the date of final payment under this Agreement.
- (d) Contractor shall not receive any compensation for Extra Work without the prior written authorization of City. As used herein, "Extra Work" means any work that is determined by the City to be necessary for the proper completion of the Project but which is not included within the Scope of Work and which the parties did not reasonably anticipate would be necessary at the execution of this Agreement. Compensation for any authorized Extra Work shall be paid in accordance with Exhibit B.
- (e) Expenses not otherwise addressed in the Scope of Services or the Fee Schedule incurred by Contractor in performing services under this Agreement shall be reviewed and approved in advance by the Project Administrator (Section 5(a)), be charged at cost and reimbursed to Contractor.
- (f) There shall be no charge for transportation within Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito Counties required for the performance of the services under this Agreement; travel to other locations must be approved in writing and in advance by the City, mileage will be charged at the then current standard rate for business travel as set by the U.S. Internal Revenue Service for such approved travel.

4. <u>Termination or Suspension</u>.

- (a) This Agreement may be terminated in whole or in part in writing by either party in the event of a substantial failure by the other party to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement through no fault of the terminating party, provided that no termination may be effected unless the other party is given (1) not less than ten days written notice of intent to terminate, and (2) provided an opportunity for consultation with the terminating party prior to termination.
- (b) If termination for default is effected by the City, an equitable adjustment in the price provided for in this Agreement shall be made, but (1) no amount shall be allowed for anticipated profit on unperformed services or other work, and (2) any payment due the Contractor at the time of termination may be adjusted to cover any additional costs to the City because of the Contractor's default. If after the termination for failure of Contractor to fulfill its contractual obligations, it is determined that the Contractor had not failed to fulfill contractual obligations, the termination shall be deemed to have been for the convenience of the City.

- (c) The City may terminate or suspend this Agreement at any time for its convenience upon not less than thirty days prior written notice to Contractor. Not later than the effective date of such termination or suspension, Contractor shall discontinue all affected work and deliver all work product and other documents, whether completed or in progress, to the City.
- (d) If termination for default is effected by the Contractor or if termination for convenience is effected by the City, the equitable adjustment shall include a reasonable profit for services or other work performed. The equitable adjustment for termination shall provide for payment to the Contractor for services rendered and expenses incurred prior to the termination, in addition to termination settlement costs reasonably incurred by Contractor relating to written commitments that were executed prior to the termination.

5. <u>Project Administrator, Project Manager & Key Personnel.</u>

- (a) City designates as its <u>Project Administrator Guido F. Persicone</u>, who shall have the authority to act for the City under this Agreement. The Project Administrator or his/her authorized representative shall represent the City in all matters pertaining to the work to be performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- (b) Contractor designates <u>John Bliss as its Project Manager</u> who shall coordinate all phases of the Project. The Project manager shall be available to City at all reasonable times during the Agreement term.
- (c) Contractor warrants that it will continuously furnish the necessary personnel to complete the Project on a timely basis as contemplated by this Agreement. Contractor, at the sole discretion of City, shall remove from the Project any of its personnel assigned to the performance of services upon written request of City. Contractor has represented to City that certain key personnel will perform and coordinate the work under this Agreement. Should one or more of such personnel become unavailable, Contractor may substitute other personnel of at least equal competence upon written approval of the City. In the event that City and Contractor cannot agree as to the substitution of key personnel, City shall be entitled to terminate this Agreement for cause. The key personnel for performance of this Agreement are as described in Exhibit B.

6. <u>Delegation of Work</u>.

- (a) If Contractor utilizes any subcontractors, consultants, persons, employees or firms having applicable expertise to assist Contractor in performing the services under this Agreement, Contractor shall obtain City's prior written approval to such employment. Contractor's contract with any subcontractor shall contain a provision making the subcontract subject to all provisions of this Agreement. Contractor will be fully responsible and liable for payment for, administration, completion, presentation, and quality of all work performed. If such persons are utilized, they shall be charged at cost. City reserves its right to employ other contractors in connection with this Project.
- (b) If the work hereunder is performed by a design professional, design professional shall be directly involved with performing the work or shall work through his, her or its employees. The design professional's responsibilities under this Agreement

shall not be delegated. The design professional shall be responsible to the City for acts, errors or omissions of his, her or its subcontractors. Negligence of subcontractors or agents retained by the design professional is conclusively deemed to be the negligence of the design professional if not adequately corrected by the design professional. Use of the term subcontractor in any other provision of this Agreement shall not be construed to imply authorization for a design professional to use subcontractors for performance of any professional service under this Agreement.

- (c) The City is an intended beneficiary of any work performed by a subcontractor for purposes of establishing a duty of care between the subcontractor and the City.
- **7. Skill of Employees**. Contractor shall ensure that any employees or agents providing services under this Agreement possess the requisite skill, training and experience to properly perform such services.
- 8. <u>Confidential and Proprietary Information</u>. In the course of performing services under this Agreement Contractor may obtain, receive, and review confidential or proprietary documents, information or materials that are and shall remain the exclusive property of the City. Should Contractor undertake the work on behalf of other agencies, entities, firms or persons relating to the matters described in the Scope of Work, it is expressly agreed by Contractor that any such confidential or proprietary information or materials shall not be provided or disclosed in any manner to any of Contractor's other clients, or to any other third party, without the City's prior express written consent.
- 9. Ownership of Data. Unless otherwise provided for herein, all documents, material, data, drawings, plans, specifications, computer data files, basis for design calculations, engineering notes, and reports originated and prepared by Contractor, or any subcontractor of any tier, under this Agreement shall be and remain the property of the City for its use in any manner it deems appropriate. Contractor agrees that all copyrights which arise from creation of the work pursuant to this Agreement shall be vested in the City and waives and relinquishes all claims to copyright or intellectual property rights in favor of the City. Contractor shall provide two (2) sets of reproducible of the above-cited items, except for the computer data files which shall consist of one (1) set. Contractor shall use all reasonable efforts to ensure that any electronic files provided to the City will be compatible with the City's computer hardware and software. Contractor makes no representation as to long-term compatibility, usability or readability of the format resulting from the use of software application packages, operating systems or computer hardware differing from those in use by the City at the commencement of this Agreement. Contractor shall be permitted to maintain copies of all such data for its files. City acknowledges that its use of the work product is limited to the purposes contemplated by the Scope of Work and, should City use these products or data in connection with additions to the work required under this Agreement or for new work without consultation with and without additional compensation to Contractor, Contractor makes no representation as to the suitability of the work product for use in or application to circumstances not contemplated by the Scope of Work and shall have no liability or responsibility whatsoever in connection with such use which shall be at the City's sole risk. Any and all liability arising out of changes made by the City to Contractor's deliverables is waived against Contractor unless City has given Contractor prior written notice of the changes and has received Contractor's written consent to such changes.

10. Conflict of Interest.

- (a) Contractor covenants that neither it, nor any officer or principal of its firm has or shall acquire any interest, directly or indirectly, which would conflict in any manner with the interests of the City or which would in any way hinder Contractor's performance of services under this Agreement. Contractor further covenants that in the performance of this Agreement, no person having any such interest shall be employed by it as an officer, employee, agent or subcontractor without the express written consent of the City Manager. Contractor agrees to at all times avoid conflicts of interest or the appearance of any conflicts of interest with the interests of the City in the performance of this Agreement. Contractor shall represent the interest of the City in any discussion or negotiation with cannabis or tobacco business licensees, and as such, may not accept compensation, commission or payment of any type from any such party or such party's agent. [
- (b) City understands and acknowledges that Contractor may be, as of the date of commencement of services under this Agreement, independently involved in the performance of non-related services for other governmental agencies and private parties. Contractor is unaware of any stated position of the City relative to such projects. Any future position of the City on such projects may result in a conflict of interest for purposes of this section.
- **11. Disclosure**. Contractor may be subject to the appropriate disclosure requirements of the California Fair Political Practices Act, as determined by the City Manager.

12. Non-Discrimination.

- (a) During the performance of this Agreement the Contractor and its subcontractors shall comply with the applicable laws of the United States of America, the State of California and the City prohibiting discrimination and harassment. In performing this Agreement, Contractor shall not discriminate, harass, or allow harassment, against any employee or applicant for employment because of gender, gender expression, gender identity, genetic characteristics, sex, race, color, ancestry, religious creed, national origin, physical disability (including HIV and AIDS), medical condition (including cancer), mental disability, age, marital status, denial of family and medical care leave and denial of pregnancy disability leave, sexual orientation, military/veteran status and any other characteristics protected by state or federal law. Contractor shall give written notice of its obligations under this clause to labor organizations with which it has a collective bargaining or other agreement.
- (b) Contractor shall include the provisions of this Section 12(a) in all subcontracts related to this Agreement.

13. Indemnification.

(a) Other than in the performance of design professional services by a design professional, which shall be solely as addressed by subsection (b) below, and to the full extent permitted by law, Contractor shall indemnify, immediately defend (with independent counsel reasonably acceptable to the City) and hold harmless the City, its Council, boards, commissions, employees, officials and agents (collectively "Indemnified Parties" or in the

singular "Indemnified Party") from and against any claims, losses, damages, penalties. fines and judgments, associated investigation and administrative expenses, and defense costs including but not limited to reasonable attorney's fees, court costs, expert witness fees and costs of alternate dispute resolution (collectively "Liabilities"), to the extent such Liabilities arise out of Contractor's negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct in performing the Work under this Agreement. The duty to defend is a separate and distinct obligation from the Contractor's duty to indemnify and Contractor shall be obligated to defend in all legal, equitable, administrative or special proceedings upon tender to the Contractor of any claim in any form or at any stage of an action or proceeding, whether or not liability is established and the obligation extends through final judgment including exhaustion of any appeals. The Contractor's obligation to indemnify applies unless it is finally determined that the liability was caused by the sole active negligence or sole willful misconduct of an indemnified party. If it is finally determined that liability is caused by the comparative active negligence or willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party, the Contractor's indemnification obligation shall be reduced in proportion to the established comparative liability of the indemnified party. Contractor shall have no duty to indemnify or hold harmless the Indemnified Parties from or against any Liability arising out of or in connection with the sole negligence, or willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party. Furthermore, Contractor shall not be responsible for any Liability arising out of an Indemnified Party's discretionary actions related to the Work or actions taken that are contrary to Contractor's advice.

- (b) To the fullest extent permitted by law (including without limitation California Civil Code Sections 2782.8), when the services to be provided under this Agreement are design professional services to be performed by a design professional, as that term is defined by said section 2782.8(c)(2) ("Design Professional") Design Professional shall indemnify, protect and hold harmless any Indemnified Party for all Liabilities regardless of nature or type that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of Design Professional, or such acts or omissions of an officer, employee, agent or subcontractor of the Design Professional. Design Professional shall not have an immediate duty to defend an Indemnified Party, however, Design Professional's obligation to indemnify (including reimbursing the cost to defend) and hold the Indemnified Parties harmless applies unless it is finally determined that the liability was caused by the sole active negligence or sole willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party. If it is finally determined that liability was caused by the comparative active negligence or willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party the Design Professional's indemnification obligation shall be reduced in direct proportion to the indemnified party's proportionate percentage of fault. Within 30 days following Design Professional's receipt of a properly presented written invoice Design Professional shall satisfy its indemnification obligations and reimburse the Indemnified Party for the cost of reasonable attorney's fees and defense costs incurred by the Indemnified Party to the same extent of Design Professional's indemnity obligation herein. In no event shall the cost to defend charged to the Design Professional exceed the Design Professional's proportionate percentage of fault.
- (c) The provisions of this Section are not limited by the provisions of sections relating to insurance including provisions of any worker's compensation act or similar act. Contractor expressly waives its statutory immunity under such statues or laws as to City, its employees and officials. An allegation or determination of comparative active negligence or willful misconduct by an Indemnified Party unrelated to design professional services does not relieve Contractor from its separate and distinct obligation to defend City. Contractor agrees to obtain executed indemnity agreements with provisions identical

to those set forth here in this section from each and every subcontractor, sub tier contractor or any other person or entity involved by, for, with or on behalf of Contractor in the performance or subject matter of this Agreement. In the event Contractor fails to obtain such indemnity obligations from others as required here, Contractor agrees to be fully responsible according to the terms of this section. Failure of City to monitor compliance with these requirements imposes no additional obligations on City and will in no way act as a waiver of any rights hereunder.

- (d) If any action or proceeding is brought against any Indemnified Party by reason of any of the matters against which the Contractor has agreed to provide an immediate defense to any Indemnified Party, as provided above, Contractor, upon notice from the City, shall defend the Indemnified Party at Contractor's expense by independent counsel reasonably acceptable to the City. Unless otherwise provided above, an Indemnified Party need not have first paid for any of the matters to which it is entitled to indemnification in order to be so defended. Contractor may submit a claim to the City for reasonable defense costs (including attorney's and expert fees) incurred in providing a defense of any Indemnified Party to the extent such defense costs arise under principals of comparative fault from the Indemnified Party's active negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct.
- (e) This obligation to indemnify and defend, as set forth herein, is binding on the successors, assigns, or heirs of Contractor and shall survive the termination of this Agreement or this Section.

14. <u>Insurance</u>.

- (a) As a condition precedent to the effectiveness of this Agreement and without limiting Contractor's indemnification of the City, Contractor agrees to obtain and maintain in full force and effect at its own expense the insurance policies set forth in Exhibit "C" "Insurance" attached hereto and made a part hereof. Contractor shall furnish the City with original certificates of insurance, executed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf, along with copies of all required endorsements. All certificates and endorsements must be received and approved by the City before any work commences. All insurance policies shall be subject to approval by the City Attorney and Risk Manager as to form and content. Specifically, such insurance shall: (1) be endorsed to protect City as an additional insured for commercial general and business auto liability; (2) provide City prior notice of cancellation; and (3) be primary with respect to City's insurance program. Contractor's insurance is not expected to respond to claims that may arise from the acts or omissions of the City.
- (b) City reserves the right at any time during the term of this Agreement to change the amounts and types of insurance required herein by giving Contractor ninety days advance written notice of such change. If such change should result in substantial additional cost of the Contractor, City agrees to negotiate additional compensation proportional to the increased benefit to City.
- (c) All required insurance must be submitted and approved the City Attorney and Risk Manager prior to the inception of any operations by Contractor.
- (d) The required coverage and limits are subject to availability on the open market at reasonable cost as determined by the City. Non availability or non affordability

must be documented by a letter from Contractor's insurance broker or agency indicating a good faith effort to place the required insurance and showing as a minimum the names of the insurance carriers and the declinations or quotations received from each. Within the foregoing constraints, Contractor's failure to procure or maintain required insurance during the entire term of this Agreement shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement under which City may immediately suspend or terminate this Agreement or, at its discretion, procure or renew such insurance to protect City's interests and pay any and all premium in connection therewith and recover all monies so paid from Contractor.

- (e) By signing this Agreement, Contractor hereby certifies that it is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 *et seq.*, of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provision of that Code, and that it will comply with such provisions at all such times as they may apply during the performance of the work pursuant to this Contract. Unless otherwise agreed, a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City is required.
- **15.** <u>Independent Contractor</u>. The parties agree that Contractor, its officers, employees and agents, if any, shall be independent contractors with regard to the providing of services under this Agreement, and that Contractor's employees or agents shall not be considered to be employees or agents of the City for any purpose and will not be entitled to any of the benefits City provides for its employees. City shall make no deductions for payroll taxes or Social Security from amounts due Contractor for work or services provided under this Agreement.

This Agreement shall not constitute, and it is not intended to constitute, either party as an employer, employee, agent, partner or legal representative of the other party for any purpose, or give either party any right to supervise or direct the functions of the other party. Except as specifically provided herein, neither party shall have authority to act for or obligate the other party in any way or to extend any representation on behalf of the other party. Each party agrees to perform under this Agreement solely as an independent contractor and neither party shall have any right, power, or authority, nor shall they represent themselves as having any authority to assume, create, or incur any expense, liability or obligation, express or implied, on behalf of the other party for any purpose. Each party agrees not to permit its employees or agents to do anything that might be construed or interpreted as acts of the other party.

- **16.** Claims for Labor and Materials. Contractor shall promptly pay when due all amounts payable for labor and materials furnished in the performance of this Agreement, so as to prevent any lien or other claim under any provision of law from arising against any City property (including reports, documents, and other tangible matter produced by the Contractor hereunder), against the Contractor's rights to payments hereunder, or against the City, and shall pay all amounts due under the Unemployment Insurance Act with respect to such labor.
- **17. Discounts**. Contractor agrees to offer the City any discount terms that are offered to its best customers for the goods and services to be provided herein, and apply such discounts to payment made under this Agreement which meet the discount terms.

- **18.** <u>Cooperation; Further Acts.</u> The Parties shall fully cooperate with one another, and shall take any additional acts or sign any additional documents as may be necessary, appropriate or convenient to attain the purposes of this Agreement.
- **Dispute Resolution**. If any dispute arises between the parties as to proper interpretation or application of this Agreement, the parties shall first meet and confer in a good faith attempt to resolve the matter between themselves. If the dispute is not resolved by meeting and conferring, the matter shall be submitted for formal mediation to a mediator selected mutually by the parties. The expenses of such mediation shall be shared equally between the parties. If the dispute is not or cannot be resolved by mediation, the parties may mutually agree (but only as to those issues of the matter not resolved by mediation) to submit their dispute to arbitration. Before commencement of the arbitration, the parties may elect to have the arbitration proceed on an informal basis; however, if the parties are unable so to agree, then the arbitration shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of the American Arbitration Association. The decision of the arbitrator shall be binding, unless within thirty days after issuance of the arbitrator's written decision, any party files an action in court. Venue and jurisdiction for any such action between the parties shall lie in the Superior Court for the County of Monterey.

20. Compliance with Laws.

- (a) Each party's performance hereunder shall comply with all applicable laws of the United States of America, the State of California and the City including but not limited to laws regarding health and safety, labor and employment, wage and hours and licensing laws which affect employees. This Agreement shall be governed by, enforced and interpreted under the laws of the State of California. Contractor must be in good standing and registered with the California Department of Industrial Relations in accordance with California labor Code section 1725.5 and shall comply with new, amended or revised laws, regulations or procedures that apply to the performance of this Agreement.
- (b) If the Project is a "public work," or prevailing wages are otherwise required, Contractor shall comply with all provision of California Labor Code section 1720 *et seq.*, as applicable, and laws dealing with prevailing wages, apprentices and hours of work.
- (c) Contractor represents that it has obtained and presently holds all permits and licenses necessary for performance hereunder, including a Business License required by the City's Business License Ordinance (Title 5 of the Marina Municipal Code) for which a business license tax is prescribed and assessed at the rate of two-tenths percent of gross receipts, in accordance with the provisions therein. For the term covered by this Agreement, the Contractor shall maintain or obtain as necessary, such permits and licenses and shall not allow them to lapse, be revoked or suspended.
- **21.** <u>Assignment or Transfer</u>. This Agreement or any interest herein may not be assigned, hypothecated or transferred, either directly or by operation of law, without the prior written consent of the City. Any attempt to do so shall be null and void, and any assignees, hypothecates or transferees shall acquire no right or interest by reason of such attempted assignment, hypothecation or transfer.

22. Notices. All notices required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be personally delivered or certified mail, postage prepaid with return receipt requested, addressed as follows:

The parties my agree in writing to receive notice by email. Notice shall be deemed effective on the date personally delivered or transmitted by facsimile or, if mailed, three days after deposit in the custody of the U.S. Postal Service. A copy of any notice sent as provided herein shall also be delivered to the Project Administrator and Project Manager.

- **23.** <u>Amendments, Changes or Modifications</u>. This Agreement is not subject to amendment, change or modification except by a writing signed by the authorized representatives of City and Contractor.
- **24.** Force Majeure. Notwithstanding any other provisions hereof, neither Contractor nor City shall be held responsible or liable for failure to meet their respective obligations under this Agreement if such failure shall be due to causes beyond Contractor's or the City's control except that an economic downturn of any type shall not be a justifiable cause for the failure to meet their respective obligations under this Agreement. Such causes include but are not limited to: strike, fire, flood, civil disorder, act of God or of the public enemy, act of the federal government, or any unit of state of local government in either sovereign or contractual capacity, epidemic, quarantine restriction, or delay in transportation to the extent that they are not caused by the party's willful or negligent acts or omissions, and to the extent that they are beyond the party's reasonable control.
- **25.** Attorney's Fees. In the event of any controversy, claim or dispute relating to this Agreement, or the breach thereof, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the losing party reasonable expenses, attorney's fees and costs.
- **26.** Successors and Assigns. All of the terms, conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall apply to and bind the respective heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the parties. Nothing in this paragraph is intended to affect the limitation on assignment
- **27.** Authority to Enter Agreement. Contractor has all requisite power and authority to conduct its business and to execute, deliver and perform the Agreement. Each party warrants that the individuals who have signed this Agreement have the legal power, right and authority to make this Agreement and bind each respective party.
- **28.** <u>Waiver</u>. A waiver of a default of any term of this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver of any succeeding default or as a waiver of the provision itself. A

party's performance after the other party's default shall not be construed as a waiver of that default.

- **29.** Severability. Should any portion of this Agreement be determined to be void or unenforceable, such shall be severed from the whole and the Agreement will continue as modified.
- **30.** Construction, References, Captions. Since the parties or their agents have participated fully in the preparation of this Agreement, the language of this Agreement shall be construed simply, according to its fair meaning, and not strictly for or against any party. Any term referencing time, days or period for performance shall be deemed calendar days and not work days. The captions of the various sections are for convenience and ease of reference only, and do not define, limit, augment or describe the scope, content or intent of this Agreement.
- **31.** Advice of Counsel. The parties agree that they are aware that they have the right to be advised by counsel with respect to the negotiations, terms and conditions of this Agreement, and that the decision of whether or not to seek the advice of counsel with respect to this Agreement is a decision which is the sole responsibility of each of the parties hereto. This Agreement shall not be construed in favor or against either party by reason of the extent to which each party participated in the drafting of this Agreement.
- **32.** <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall constitute an original.
- **33.** Time. Time is of the essence in this contract.
- **34. Entire Agreement**. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties with respect to the matters as set forth in this Agreement, and no other agreement, statement or promise made by or to any party or by or to any employee, officer or agent of any party, which is not contained in this Agreement shall be binding or valid.

Objective 6: Retail Compliance Monitoring for Tobacco and Hemp-Derived Products

SCI Consulting Group will perform annual on-site inspections of all City-licensed tobacco retailers to assess compliance with local ordinances and California state law. These visits will also include enforcement of prohibitions on the sale of hemp-derived products containing any detectable THC or other intoxicating cannabinoids, ensuring businesses are not marketing unregulated or illegal substances under the guise of legal hemp.

EXHIBIT C - INSURANCE

Contractor shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by Contractor, its agents, representatives, or employees.

MINIMUM SCOPE AND LIMIT OF INSURANCE

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 1. Commercial General Liability (CGL): Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (ISO CG 25 03 or 25 04) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
- 2. **Automobile Liability:** Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 0001 covering, Code 1 (any auto), or if Contractor has no owned autos, Code 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned), with limit no less than **\$1,000,000** per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 3. **Workers' Compensation** insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease. (Not required if Contractor provides written verification it has no employees)
- Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions): Insurance appropriates to Contractor's profession, with limit no less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence or claim, \$2,000,000 aggregate.

If Contractor maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the City requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or the higher limits maintained by Contractor. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the City.

Other Insurance Provisions

The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

Additional Insured Status

City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of Contractor including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to Contractor's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or if not available, through the addition of both CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38; and CG 20 37 if a later edition is used).

Primary Coverage

For any claims related to this contract, Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary and non-contributory and at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects the City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the City, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it. This requirement shall also apply to any Excess or Umbrella liability policies.

Umbrella or Excess Policy

Contractor may use Umbrella or Excess Policies to provide the liability limits as required in this agreement. This form of insurance will be acceptable provided that all of the Primary and Umbrella or Excess Policies shall provide all of the insurance coverages herein required, including, but not limited to, primary and non-contributory, additional insured, Self-Insured Retentions (SIRs), indemnity, and defense requirements. The Umbrella or Excess policies shall be provided on a true "following form" or broader coverage basis, with coverage at least as broad as provided on the underlying Commercial General Liability insurance. No insurance policies maintained by the Additional Insureds, whether primary or excess, and which also apply to a loss covered hereunder, shall be called upon to contribute to a loss until Contractor's primary and excess liability policies are exhausted.

Notice of Cancellation

Each insurance policy required above shall provide that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the City.

Waiver of Subrogation

Contractor hereby grants to City a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Contractor may acquire against the City by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Contractor agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the City has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.

Self-Insured Retentions

Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City. The City may require Contractor to purchase coverage with a lower retention or provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. The policy language shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured or City. The CGL and any policies, including Excess liability policies, may not be subject to a self-insured retention (SIR) or deductible that exceeds \$25,000 unless approved in writing by City. Any and all deductibles and SIRs shall be the sole responsibility of Contractor or subcontractor who procured such insurance and shall not apply to the Indemnified Additional Insured Parties. City may deduct from any amounts otherwise due Contractor to fund the SIR/deductible. Policies shall NOT contain any self-insured retention (SIR) provision that limits the satisfaction of the SIR to the City. The policy must also provide that Defense costs, including the Allocated Loss Adjustment Expenses, will satisfy the SIR or deductible. City reserves the right to obtain a copy of any policies and endorsements for verification.

Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers authorized to conduct business in the state with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the City.

Claims Made Policies

If any of the required policies provide claims-made coverage:

- 1. The Retroactive Date must be shown, and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
- 2. Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.
- 3. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, Contractor must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of work.

Verification of Coverage

Contractor shall furnish the City with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause and a copy of the Declarations and Endorsements Pages of the CGL and any Excess policies listing all policy endorsements. All certificates and endorsements and copies of the Declarations & Endorsements pages are to be received and approved by the City before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive Contractor's obligation to provide them. The City reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time. City reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.

Subcontractors

Contractor shall require and verify that all subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein, and Contractor shall ensure that City is an additional insured on insurance required from subcontractors.

Duration of Coverage

CGL & Excess liability policies for any construction related work, including, but not limited to, maintenance, service, or repair work, shall continue coverage for a minimum of five (5) years for Completed Operations liability coverage. Such Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.

Special Risks or Circumstances

City reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.

CITY COUNCIL TO CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2025, AUTHORIZING AN AGREEMENT TO PRECISION CONCRETE CUTTING FOR CITYWIDE SIDEWALK ASSESSMENT AND TRIP HAZARD REPAIR SERVICES; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER OR DESIGNEE TO EXECUTE CONTRACT DOCUMENTS SUBJECT TO FINAL REVIEW AND APPROVAL BY THE CITY ATTORNEY; AND AUTHORIZING THE FINANCE DIRECTOR TO MAKE NECESSARY ACCOUNTING AND BUDGETARY ENTRIES.

REQUEST:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1. Consider adopting Resolution No. 2025-, authorizing an agreement with Precision Concrete Cutting (PCC) for sidewalk inspection and trip hazard removal services to begin in early September 2025, in an amount not to exceed \$200,000.
- 2. Authorize the City Manager or designee to execute the agreement on behalf of the City subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney.
- 3. Authorize the Finance Director to make necessary accounting and budgetary entries.

BACKGROUND:

In 2025, the City of Marina Public Works Department identified a need to formalize its sidewalk inspection and repair program due to ADA compliance concerns and trip hazard risks caused by uplifted or damaged sidewalk panels. These hazards are often the result of age, weather, subsurface movement, or tree root intrusion.

To address safety concerns, the City is initiating a comprehensive sidewalk assessment and trip hazard repair program using Precision Concrete Cutting (PCC). PCC utilizes a saw-cutting method that removes uplifted edges between ½" and 2", creating clean, ADA-compliant transitions. This method is significantly more cost-effective than traditional remove-and-replace (R&R) repair methods.

PCC will also collect field data through their GIS software platform, DataWorks, which enables the City to maintain a long-term sidewalk condition database for budgeting, planning, and ADA reporting. This project supports Marina's goals for safer, more accessible pedestrian infrastructure.

ANALYSIS:

To address sidewalk safety hazards and ADA compliance needs, Public Works staff recommend contracting with Precision Concrete Cutting (PCC), a sole-source provider of sidewalk shaving services. PCC utilizes a saw-cutting method that removes vertical offsets between ¼" and 2" while preserving the integrity of the concrete. This approach is cleaner, more efficient, and significantly more cost-effective than traditional remove-and-replace (R&R) methods.

PCC will also collect detailed field data using the DataWorks software platform, which allows the City to track sidewalk conditions, measure progress, and support long-term infrastructure planning. DataWorks integrates with the City's GIS system and will provide documentation to assist with ADA reporting, budgeting, and risk management.

The project is scheduled to begin in early September 2025 and is expected to be completed within one month, minimizing disruption to the public while improving pedestrian safety citywide.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The total not-to-exceed amount for this contract is \$200,000, which covers sidewalk inspection, trip hazard shaving, and geospatial data collection. The work will be funded through Capital Improvement Project HSR2605 - Citywide sidewalk shaving and sidewalk condition assessment. Additionally, the City will incur an annual licensing fee of \$1,920 for the DataWorks software platform, enabling ongoing access to the GIS-integrated database.

WHEREAS, the City of Marina recognizes the need to address sidewalk trip hazards to ensure safe, ADA-compliant pedestrian infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, sidewalk displacement caused by age, weather, root intrusion, and subsurface conditions poses a safety and liability concern to the public and the City; and

WHEREAS, Capital Improvement Project HSR2605 - Citywide sidewalk shaving and sidewalk condition assessment was approved to fund this effort; and

WHEREAS, Precision Concrete Cutting (PCC) is the sole authorized provider in Northern California of patented sidewalk trip hazard removal services using precision saw-cutting methods, and is uniquely qualified to complete the proposed work efficiently and safely; and

WHEREAS, PCC's methods reduce costs by eliminating the need for concrete panel replacement, while meeting ADA slope requirements and preserving the structural integrity of adjacent sidewalk panels; and

WHEREAS, PCC will also document all sidewalk conditions and repairs using DataWorks, a GIS-integrated software platform that supports ADA compliance, risk management, and long-term infrastructure planning; and

WHEREAS, PCC's services are scheduled to begin in early September 2025 and will be completed within one month; and

WHEREAS, the total not-to-exceed cost of this project is \$200,000, with an additional \$1,920 annual licensing cost for DataWorks software, and all costs are to be funded from existing appropriations in Project HSR2605; and

WHEREAS, Exhibits A through C provide supporting documentation including the scope of work, sole source justifications, and project materials;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Marina does hereby:

- 1. Authorize an agreement with Precision Concrete Cutting (PCC) for sidewalk inspection and trip hazard removal services to begin in early September 2025, in an amount not to exceed \$200,000;
- 2. Authorize the City Manager or designee to execute the agreement on behalf of the City subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney; and
- 3. Authorize the Finance Director to make necessary accounting and budgetary entries.

CITY OF MARINA MAINTENANCE SERVICES AGREEMENT

This MAINTENANCE SERVICES AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and effective August 7, 2025 by and between the City of Marina, a municipal corporation ("City"), And Precision Concrete Cutting Northern California ("CONTRACTOR").

City wishes to retain the services of an experienced and qualified CONTRACTOR to provide sidewalk assessment, repair, and data collection ("Services"). CONTRACTOR represents and warrants that it is qualified to perform those Services. In consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

1. TERM

Unless terminated in accordance with Section 8 below, the AGREEMENT will continue in full force and effect from the Effective Date through December 31, 2025. Upon mutual written AGREEMENT, the term of this AGREEMENT can be extended annually for an additional one (1) year period, or longer as the parties agree.

2. SCOPE OF SERVICES

CONTRACTOR will provide the Services listed in the Scope of Services attached hereto as Exhibit A. CONTRACTOR warrants that all work and services set forth in the Scope of Services will be performed in a competent, professional and satisfactory manner.

3. PERFORMANCE

- a. CONTRACTOR shall at all times faithfully, competently and to the best of its ability, experience, and talent, perform all tasks described herein. CONTRACTOR shall employ, at a minimum, generally accepted standards and practices utilized by persons engaged in providing similar services as are required of CONTRACTOR hereunder in meeting its obligations under this Agreement.
- b. CONTRACTOR shall obtain a valid City Business License and shall maintain said Business License for the term of this Agreement and any extensions.
- c. CONTRACTOR shall keep itself informed of State and Federal laws and regulations which in any manner affect those employed by CONTRACTOR or in any way affect the performance of its Services pursuant to this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall at all times observe and comply with all such laws and regulations. City, and its officers, employees, and agents shall not be liable at law or in equity occasioned by failure of CONTRACTOR to comply with this Section.
- d. CONTRACTOR must maintain a valid California Contractor's License throughout the term of this Contract.

- e. CONTRACTOR agrees that in the performance of this Agreement or any sub-agreement hereunder, neither CONTRACTOR nor any person acting on CONTRACTOR's behalf shall refuse to employ or refuse to continue in any employment any person or discriminate on the basis of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sexual preference, sex, gender identity, gender expression, military or veteran status or age. Harassment in the workplace is not permitted in any form. CONTRACTOR further agrees to comply with all laws with respect to employment when performing this Agreement.
- f. CONTRACTOR shall maintain prior to the beginning of and for the duration of this Agreement insurance coverage as specified in Exhibit D attached to and part of this Agreement.
- g. CONTRACTOR declares and warrants that no undue influence or pressure is used against or in concert with any officer, employee or agent of City in connection with the award, terms or implementation of this Agreement, including any method of coercion, confidential financial agreement or financial inducement. No officer, employee, or agent of City will receive compensation, directly or indirectly, from CONTRACTOR, or from any officer, employee or agent of CONTRACTOR, in connection with the award of this Agreement or any work to be conducted as a result of this Agreement. Violation of this Section shall be a material breach of this Agreement entitling City to any and all remedies at law or in equity.

4. CITY MANAGEMENT

The City Manager, or designee, shall represent City in all matters pertaining to the administration of this Agreement, review and approval of all products submitted by CONTRACTOR, but not including the authority to enlarge the Scope of Work or change the compensation due to CONTRACTOR. The City Manager shall be authorized to act on City's behalf and to execute all necessary documents which enlarge the Scope of Work or change CONTRACTOR's compensation, subject to Section 6 hereof.

5. PAYMENT

- a. For Services rendered pursuant to this AGREEMENT, CONTRACTOR shall be paid in accordance with the Payment Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit B, provided, however, that in no event will the total amount of money paid the CONTRACTOR, for the Services initially contemplated by this AGREEMENT, exceed the sum of \$200,000, unless otherwise first approved in writing by the City.
- b. The City Manager's contract authority is limited to \$24,999.99, which includes all costs. Contracts, including any contract amendments that exceed the total threshold, require City Council approval. Any contracts, including contract amendments that exceed the total threshold, which do not have City Council approval, shall be void.
- c. CONTRACTOR shall submit invoices monthly for actual Services performed. Invoices shall be submitted on or about the first business day of each month, or as soon thereafter

as practical, for Services provided in the previous month. Payment shall be made within thirty (30) days of receipt of each invoice as to all non-disputed fees. If City disputes any of CONTRACTOR's fees, it shall give written notice to CONTRACTOR within thirty (30) days of receipt of an invoice of any disputed fees set forth on the invoice.

6. LABOR CODE AND PREVAILING WAGE REQUIREMENTS:

- a. CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with the requirements of California Labor Code sections 1810 through 1815. Eight hours of labor constitutes a legal day's work per Labor Code section 1810. CONTRACTOR will forfeit the statutory penalty to City for each worker employed in the execution of this Agreement by CONTRACTOR or any subcontractor for each calendar day during which such worker is required or permitted to work more than eight hours in any one calendar day and 40 hours in any one calendar week in violation of the provisions of Labor Code sections 1810 through 1815.
- b. Copies of the determination of the Director of the Department of Industrial Relations of the prevailing rate of per diem wages for each craft, classification or type of worker needed to execute this Agreement are available for download from the State website:

http://www.dir.ca.gov/OPRL/dprewagedetermination.htm

- c. CONTRACTOR must post at the work site, or if there is no regular work site then at its principal office, for the duration of the Contract, a copy of the determination by the Director of the Department of Industrial Relations of the specified prevailing rate of per diem wages. (Labor Code § 1773.2.) When applicable, copies of the prevailing rate of per diem wages will be on file at City's Administrative Services Department and available to CONTRACTOR and any other interested party upon request.
- d. CONTRACTOR, and any subcontractor engaged by CONTRACTOR, may pay not less than the specified prevailing rate of per diem wages to all workers employed in the execution of the contract. (Labor Code § 1774.) CONTRACTOR is responsible for compliance with Labor Code section 1776 relative to the retention and inspection of payroll records.
- e. CONTRACTOR must comply with all provisions of Labor Code section 1775. Under Section 1775, CONTRACTOR will forfeit the statutory penalty to City for each worker employed in the execution of the Agreement by CONTRACTOR or any subcontractor for each calendar day, or portion thereof, in which the worker is paid less than the prevailing rates. CONTRACTOR may also be liable to pay the difference between the prevailing wage rates and the amount paid to each worker for each calendar day, or portion thereof, for which each worker was paid less than the prevailing wage rate.

Nothing in this Agreement prevents CONTRACTOR or any subcontractor from employing properly registered apprentices in the execution of the Contract. CONTRACTOR is responsible for compliance with Labor Code section 1777.5 for all apprenticeable occupations. This statute requires that contractors and subcontractors must

submit contract award information to the applicable joint apprenticeship committee, must employ apprentices in apprenticeable occupations in a ratio of not less than one hour of apprentice's work for every five hours of labor performed by a journeyman (unless an exception is granted under § 1777.5), must contribute to the fund or funds in each craft or trade or a like amount to the California Apprenticeship Council, and that contractors and subcontractors must not discriminate among otherwise qualified employees as apprentices solely on the ground of sex, race, religion, creed, national origin, ancestry or color. Only apprentices defined in Labor Code section 3077, who are in training under apprenticeship standards and who have written apprentice contracts, may be employed on public works in apprenticeable occupations

- f. CONTRACTOR has reviewed and agrees to comply with any applicable provisions for any public work subject to Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) Monitoring and Enforcement of prevailing wages, including the registration requirements of Labor Code Section 1771.1(a). City hereby notifies CONTRACTOR that CONTRACTOR is responsible for submitting certified payroll records directly to the State Compliance Monitoring Unit (CMU). For further information concerning compliance monitoring please visit the website location at: http://www.dir.ca.gov/dlse/cmu/cmu.html.
- g. CONTRACTOR must comply with Labor Code section 1771.1(a), which provides that CONTRACTOR may award any contracts and subcontracts for work that qualifies as a "public work" only to subcontractors which are at that time registered with the DIR and qualified to perform public work pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5. CONTRACTOR must obtain proof of such registration from all such subcontractors."
- h. If federal funds are used to pay for the Work, CONTRACTOR and any subcontractor agree to comply, as applicable, with the labor and reporting requirements of the Davis-Bacon Act (40 USC § 276a-7), the Copeland Act (40 USC § 276c and 18 USC §874), and the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 USC § 327 and following).

7. INSPECTION

City shall at all times have the right to inspect the work and materials. CONTRACTOR shall furnish all reasonable aid and assistance required by City for the proper examination of the work and all parts thereof. Such inspection shall not relieve CONTRACTOR from any obligation to perform said work strictly in accordance with the specifications or any modifications thereof and in compliance with the law.

8. SUSPENSION OR TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT WITHOUT CAUSE

a. City may at any time, for any reason, without cause, suspend or terminate this Agreement, or any portion hereof, by serving upon CONTRACTOR at least thirty (30) days prior written notice. Upon receipt of said notice, CONTRACTOR shall immediately cease all work under this Agreement, unless the notice provides otherwise. If City suspends or terminates a portion of this Agreement, such suspension or termination shall not make void or invalidate the remainder of this Agreement.

b. In the event this Agreement is terminated pursuant to this Section, City shall pay to CONTRACTOR the actual value of the Services performed up to the time of termination, provided that the Services performed are of value to the City. Upon termination of the Agreement pursuant to this Section, CONTRACTOR shall submit an invoice to City pursuant to Section 6.c.

9. DEFAULT OF CONTRACTOR/FORCE MAJEURE

- a. CONTRACTOR's failure to comply with the provisions of this Agreement shall constitute a default. In the event that CONTRACTOR is in default for cause under the terms of this Agreement, City shall have no obligation or duty to continue compensating CONTRACTOR for any Services performed after the date of default and can terminate this Agreement immediately by written notice to the CONTRACTOR. If such failure by the CONTRACTOR to make progress in the performance of Services hereunder arises out causes beyond the CONTRACTOR's control, and without fault or negligence of the CONTRACTOR, it shall not be considered a default.
- b. If the City Manager or designee determines CONTRACTOR is in default in the performance of any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement, they shall cause to be served upon CONTRACTOR a written notice of the default. The CONTRACTOR shall have ten (10) days after service upon it of said notice in which to cure the default by rendering a satisfactory performance. In the event CONTRACTOR fails to cure its default within such period of time or fails to present City with a written plan for the cure of the default, City shall have the right, notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, to terminate this Agreement without further notice and without prejudice to any other remedy to which it may be entitled at law, in equity or under this Agreement.

10. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

- a. CONTRACTOR shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to sales, costs, expenses, receipts, and other such information required by City that relate to the performance of Services under this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall maintain adequate records of Services provided in sufficient detail to permit an evaluation of Services. All such records shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and shall be clearly identified and readily accessible. CONTRACTOR shall provide free access to the representatives of City or its designees at reasonable times to such books and records; shall give City the right to examine and audit said books and records at CONTRACTOR's office; shall permit City to make copies and transcripts there from as necessary; and shall allow inspection of all work, data, documents, proceedings, and activities related to this Agreement. If there is a substantial billing deviation adverse to City, then the cost of an audit shall be borne by CONSULTANT. Such records, together with supporting documents, shall be maintained at City Hall for a minimum period of five (5) years after receipt of final payment.
- b. Upon completion of, or in the event of termination or suspension of this Agreement, all original documents, designs, drawings, maps, models, computer files, surveys, notes, and

other documents prepared in the course of providing the Services to be performed pursuant to this Agreement shall become the sole property of City and may be used, reused, or otherwise disposed of by City without the permission of CONTRACTOR. With respect to computer files, CONTRACTOR shall make available to City, at City's office and upon reasonable written request by City, the necessary computer software and hardware for purposes of accessing, compiling, transferring, and printing computer files.

11. RECORD AUDIT

In accordance with Government Code, Section 8546.7, for expenditures of greater than \$10,000, records of both City and CONTRACTOR shall be subject to examination and audit by the Auditor General for a period of three (3) years after final payment.

12. INDEMNIFICATION

CONTRACTOR shall indemnify, defend with legal counsel approved by City, and hold harmless City, its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers (collectively, City) from and against all liability, loss, damage, expense, cost (including without limitation reasonable legal counsel fees, expert fees and all other costs and fees of litigation) of every nature arising out of or in connection with CONTRACTOR's negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct in the performance of work hereunder or its failure to comply with any of its obligations contained in this Agreement, except such loss or damage which is caused by the sole or active negligence or willful misconduct of the City. Should conflict of interest principles preclude a single legal counsel from representing both City and CONTRACTOR, or should City otherwise find CONTRACTOR's legal counsel unacceptable, then CONTRACTOR shall reimburse the City its costs of defense, including without limitation reasonable legal counsel fees, expert fees and all other costs and fees of litigation. The CONTRACTOR shall promptly pay any final judgment rendered against the City (and its officers, employees, agents and volunteers) with respect to claims determined by a trier of fact to have been the result of the CONTRACTOR's negligent, reckless or wrongful performance. It is expressly understood and agreed that the foregoing provisions are intended to be as broad and inclusive as is permitted by the law of the State of California and will survive termination of this Agreement.

CONTRACTOR obligations under this section apply regardless of whether such claim, charge, damage, demand, action, proceeding, loss, stop notice, cost, expense, judgment, civil fine or penalty, or liability was caused in part or contributed to by City. However, without affecting the rights of City under any provision of this agreement, CONTRACTOR shall not be required to indemnify and hold harmless City for liability attributable to the active negligence of City, provided such active negligence is determined by agreement between the parties or by the findings of a court of competent jurisdiction. In instances where City is shown to have been actively negligent and where City's active negligence accounts for only a percentage of the liability involved, the obligation of CONTRACTOR will be for that entire portion or percentage of liability not attributable to the active negligence of City.

No City officer, employee or agent shall be personally liable to CONTRACTOR, in the event of any default or breach by City or for any amount that may become due to CONTRACTOR.

13. INSURANCE

Without limiting CONTRACTOR's indemnification of City, and prior to commencement of work, CONTRACTOR shall obtain, provide, and maintain at its own expense during the term of this AGREEMENT, policies of insurance of the type and amounts described in <u>Exhibit C</u> and in a form that is satisfactory to City.

14. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

- a. CONTRACTOR is and shall at all times remain as to City a wholly independent contractor. The personnel performing the services under this Agreement on behalf of CONTRACTOR shall at all times be under CONTRACTOR's exclusive direction and control. Neither City nor any of its officers, employees, or agents shall have control over the conduct of CONTRACTOR or any of CONTRACTOR's officers, employees, or agents, except as set forth in this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall not at any time or in any manner represent that it or any of its officers, employees, or agents are in any manner officers, employees, or agents of the City. CONTRACTOR shall not incur or have the power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability whatever against City, or bind City in any manner.
- b. No employee benefits shall be available to CONTRACTOR in connection with the performance of this Agreement. Except for the fees paid to CONTRACTOR as provided in the Agreement, City shall not pay salaries, wages, or other compensation to CONTRACTOR for performing services hereunder for City. City shall not be liable for compensation or indemnification to CONTRACTOR for injury or sickness arising out of performing services hereunder.
- c. Any and all employees or sub-contractors of CONTRACTOR under this Agreement, while engaged in the performance of any work or services required by CONTRACTOR under this Agreement, shall be considered employees or sub-contractors of CONTRACTOR only and not of City. Any and all claims that may arise under the Workers' Compensation Act on behalf of said employees or sub-contractors, while so engaged and all claims made by a third party as a consequence of any negligent act or omission on the part of the CONTRACTOR's employees or sub-contractors, while so engaged in any of the work or services provided for or rendered herein shall not be City's obligation.

15. SUBCONTRACTORS

Before CONTRACTOR retains or hires a subcontractor to provide any work, labor, or services relative to this AGREEMENT, CONTRACTOR must:

a. Present the name and identifying information of the subcontractor that will provide any work, labor, or services to City.

- b. Present to the City the form of subcontract that will be used with the subcontractor for City's approval, which approval will not be unreasonably withheld. Such subcontract AGREEMENT must include an indemnity agreement that is generally in accord with the indemnity obligations contained in Section 11 of this Agreement and must specifically name the City as an indemnified party; and
- c. Secure from the subcontractor evidence of insurance coverage that meets with this Agreement including naming the City as an additional insured as required by this Agreement, unless such requirement is waived in writing by the City.

16. NO BENEFIT TO ARISE TO CITY OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

No City officer, employee of City, or their designees or agents, and no public officer who exercises authority over or responsibilities with respect to the Services provided under the Agreement during their tenure or for one year thereafter, shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in any agreement or sub-agreement, or the proceeds thereof, for work to be performed in connection with the Services performed under this Agreement.

17. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

CONTRACTOR shall at all times avoid conflicts of interest, or the appearance of conflicts of interest, in the performance of this Agreement, and shall comply with the City's conflict of interest code.

If City determines CONTRACTOR comes within the definition of Contractor under the Political Reform Act (Government Code §87100 et seq.), CONTRACTOR shall complete and file and shall require any other person performing Services under this Agreement to complete and file a "Statement of Economic Interest" with City disclosing CONTRACTOR's and/or such other person's financial interests.

18. NO WAIVER OF BREACH/TIME

The waiver by City of any breach of any term or promise contained in this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term or provision or any subsequent breach of the same or any other term or promise contained in this Agreement. Time is of the essence in carrying out the duties hereunder.

19. CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION/RELEASE OF INFORMATION

a. All information gained by CONTRACTOR in performance of this Agreement shall be considered confidential and shall not be released by CONTRACTOR without City's prior written authorization. CONTRACTOR, its officers, employees, agents, or subcontractors, shall not without written authorization from the City Manager or unless requested by the City Attorney, voluntarily provide declarations, letters of support, testimony at depositions, response to interrogatories, or other information concerning the work performed under this Agreement or relating to any project or property located within the City. Response to a subpoena or court order shall not be considered "voluntary" provided CONTRACTOR gives City notice of such court order or subpoena.

b. CONTRACTOR shall promptly notify City should CONTRACTOR, its officers, employees, agents, or sub-contractors be served with any summons, complaint, subpoena, notice of deposition, request for documents, interrogatories, request for admissions, or other discovery request, court order, or subpoena from any person or party regarding this Agreement and the Services performed thereunder or with respect to any project or property located within the City. City retains the right, but has no obligation, to represent CONTRACTOR and/or be present at any deposition, hearing, or similar proceeding. CONTRACTOR agrees to cooperate fully with City and to provide the opportunity to review any response to discovery requests provided by CONTRACTOR. However, City's right to review any such response does not imply or mean the right by City to control, direct, or rewrite said response.

20. NOTICES

Any notices which either party may desire to give to the other party under this Agreement must be in writing and may be given either by (i) personal service, (ii) delivery by a reputable document delivery service, such as but not limited to, Federal Express, which provides a receipt showing date and time of delivery, or (iii) mailing in the United States Mail, certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, addressed to the address of the party as set forth below or at any other address as that party may later designate by notice:

Notice is effective on the date of personal service, or 5 days following deposit in a United States mailbox, or date of postmark. The parties may agree to notice by email.

21. THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES

Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to create, and the parties do not intend to create, any rights in third parties.

22. ASSIGNMENT

CONTRACTOR shall not assign the performance of this Agreement, nor any part thereof, nor any monies due hereunder, without prior written consent of City. Subject to the foregoing, all terms of the Agreement will be binding upon, enforceable by and inure to the benefit of the parties and their successors and assigns.

23. GOVERNING LAW

City and CONTRACTOR understand and agree that the laws of the State of California shall govern the rights, obligations, duties, and liabilities of the parties to this Agreement and also

govern the interpretation of this Agreement. Any litigation concerning this Agreement shall take place in Monterey County, or the federal district court with jurisdiction over the City. CONTRACTOR agrees not to commence or prosecute any dispute arising out of or in connection with this Agreement other than in the aforementioned courts and irrevocably consents to the exclusive personal jurisdiction and venue of the aforementioned courts. Maintenance Services Agreement 07.19.2022

24. DISPUTE RESOLUTION; ATTORNEY'S FEES

CONTRACTOR shall continue to perform under this Agreement during any dispute. CONTRACTOR and City hereby agree to make good faith efforts to resolve disputes as quickly as possible. In the event any dispute arising from or related to this Agreement results in litigation or arbitration, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover all reasonable costs incurred, including court costs, attorney fees, expenses for expert witnesses (whether or not called to testify), expenses for accountants or appraisers (whether or not called to testify), and other related expenses. Recovery of these expenses shall be as additional costs awarded to the prevailing party, and shall not require initiation of a separate legal proceeding.

25. AUTHORITY TO EXECUTE THIS AGREEMENT

The person or persons executing this Agreement on behalf of CONTRACTOR warrants and represents that they have the authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of the CONTRACTOR and the authority to bind CONTRACTOR to the performance of its obligations hereunder.

26. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement contains the entire understanding between the parties relating to their obligations described in this Agreement. All prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings, representations, and statements, oral or written, are merged into this Agreement and shall be of no further force or effect. Each party is entering into this Agreement based solely upon the representations set forth herein and upon each party's own independent investigation of any and all facts such party deems material.

27. AMENDMENT

- a. Any modification or amendment to this Agreement must be in writing.

PROPOSAL FOR "NOT TO EXCEED" AGREEMENT BETWEEN: THE CITY of MARINA AND PRECISION CONCRETE CUTTING (PCC) <u>Overview</u>

Uneven sidewalks caused by ground settling and tree roots cause a potential hazard to pedestrians. Displaced sidewalks cause problems for both public and private entities in the form of trip and fall liability exposure.

It is proposed that the City of Marina and PCC enter into an agreement whereby PCC will inspect sidewalks as identified by City staff. The price for these services shall not exceed the proposed dollar amount and quantity defined in the "Proposal Detail" section below.

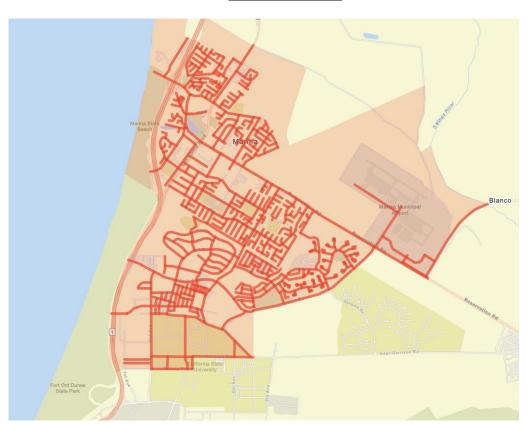
Data Collection and Sidewalk Assessment Proposal Detail

Contract amount: total charge for services rendered shall not exceed \$200,000

Scope of Work

- · PCC Technicians will walk every sidewalk within the city of Marina
- Identify and repair off-set sidewalks .25-2"
- Identify any sidewalk lifted over 2" or cracked/spalling with be identified for remove and replacement
- PCC will capture field data including before/after site photos, measurements, repair quantities, street address and geolocation
- Dataworks Software will be used to build a GIS database to track all sidewalk repairs made by PCC and for budgeting, project planning and tracking all remove and replacement locations.

Project Area Map:



Sidewalk Shaving Repair Billing Units: Services are billed in "Inch Feet". An inch foot is calculated by measuring the average height of the sidewalk off-set and multiplying this average by the length of the cut. Example: A sidewalk off-set on a 4-foot wide sidewalk that consists of a 0.5" rise on one side, and tapers down to a zero rise on the other is calculated as follows:

 x 4ft = 1 inch-foot

Unit Price for sidewalk shaving: \$55 per inch-foot

Shaving Off-set Sidewalk Repair Specifications

- A. Contractor shall repair all sidewalk trip hazards from 1/2" and up to 2" differential, as long as the integrity of the sidewalk is not compromised, within the areas identified in a Work Order.
- B. Contractor shall remove hazards completely, from one end of the raised sidewalk joint to the other if applicable, leaving a zero point of differential between slabs.
- C. Contractor shall not use any type of "fill" material that deteriorates or breaks apart over time.
- D. Contractor shall not cause any damage to landscaping, retaining walls, curbs, sprinkler heads, utility covers or other objects adjacent to sidewalks. If the contractor and/or contractor's equipment does cause damage to above, the City must be notified immediately and damages must be repaired at the Contractor's expense within 24 hours of the time the damage occurred.
- E. Contractor must completely and immediately clean up all debris after each hazard is repaired. All costs incurred for disposal of waste material shall be included in unit cost.
- F. Contractor shall repair each sidewalk trip hazard without damage or visible markings to adjacent slab(s) or curb(s).
- G. No water-cooling is allowed unless all slurry and contaminates are contained. Under no circumstances shall any slurry or contaminates enter storm drains or cause excessive environmental impact. Contractor shall use a dust abatement system, and demonstrate such a system to the satisfaction of the City.
- H. Contractor shall guarantee specified repair slope (1:10 based upon requirements outlined by the Americans with Disabilities Act) is achieved. If defined slope is not achieved, contractor shall repair to specification at no additional charge within 24 hours of discovery.
- I. Contractor shall guarantee that the removed trip hazard will have a uniform appearance and texture. The finished surface shall have a coefficient of friction of at least 0.6 and show via previous testing that the technique used yields the specified coefficient of friction.
- J. The hardware must be flush to the ground and capable of working at any angle and perform trip hazard removal in hard-to-reach areas, around obstacles, on narrow walkways, next to fences and retaining walls or buildings.
- K. Grinding or pulverization of the concrete is NOT acceptable or allowed, causing microcracks or weakening the concrete panel. Contractor's sidewalk defect repairs shall not leave ridges or grooves that could hold water and prevent drainage of rain water or irrigation.
 - L. Dust collection device with be used in conjunction with High powered vacuums that use HEPA filters and collect 90% of the dust.

CITY COUNCIL TO CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2025, AUTHORIZING A PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT TO WALLACE GROUP OF SAN LUIS OBISPO, CA FOR CIVIL ENGINEERING AND LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE SERVICES FOR DESIGN OF PHASE 2 OF THE CITY PARK AT THE DUNES; AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER OR DESIGNEE TO EXECUTE CONTRACT DOCUMENTS SUBJECT TO FINAL REVIEW AND APPROVAL BY THE CITY ATTORNEY; AND AUTHORIZING THE FINANCE DIRECTOR TO MAKE NECESSARY ACCOUNTING AND BUGETARY ENTRIES.

REQUEST:

It is requested that the City Council consider adopting Resolution No. 2025- :

- 1. Authorizing a professional services agreement with Wallace Group of San Luis Obispo, CA for civil engineering and landscape architecture services in an amount not to exceed \$250,407.00 for the design of Phase 2 of the City Park at the Dunes.
- 2. Authorize the City Manager or designee to execute the agreement on behalf of the City subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney.
- 3. Authorize the Finance Director to make necessary accounting and budgetary entries.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Marina has prioritized enhancing its public park offerings to improve community recreation and quality of life. The City Park at the Dunes is a key component of this initiative, planned as a 13.5-acre public space featuring amenities such as restrooms, walking paths, tennis and pickleball courts, beach volleyball, a multi-sport court, a fitness court, and an inclusive playground designed to accommodate children of all abilities.

A Capital Improvement Project (CIP) (QLP 2017) was previously approved by the City Council, allocating \$22,600,000 for all phases of construction related to the City Park at the Dunes.

The City initially engaged Wallace Group on May 6, 2025, to provide engineering and land surveying services for Phase 1. Given their successful performance and expertise, staff recommends continuing our partnership with Wallace Group for the upcoming Phase 2 design work which will include an outdoor amphitheater, second restroom facility for the park, and additional parking.

ANALYSIS:

Wallace Group has demonstrated a high level of competence and professionalism in delivering Phase 1 services, including land surveying, grading, and preliminary design efforts. Their familiarity with the project scope, site conditions, and community needs makes them the most qualified firm to execute the detailed design and engineering work required for Phase 2.

Engaging Wallace Group for Phase 2 will ensure continuity, efficiency, and quality in project delivery. Their proven track record supports the City's goal of developing a comprehensive recreational space that meets the community's needs and adheres to all regulatory and safety standards.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The total fiscal impact for the staff report is estimated at \$250,407. This amount will be financed through funds already allocated in the Capital Improvement Project QLP 2017. This ensures no additional financial burden on the city budget, allowing the project to progress as intended.

CITY OF MARINA AGREEMENT FOR CIVIL ENGINEERING AND LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into on August 6, 2025, by and between the City of Marina, a California charter city, hereinafter referred to as the "City," and *Wallace Group*, a *California corporation*, hereinafter referred to as the "Consultant." City and Consultant are sometimes individually referred to as "party" and collectively as "parties" in this Agreement.

Recitals

A. City desires to retain Consultant to:

<u>Provide civil engineering and landscape architecture services for Phase 2 of the City Park at the Dunes Project, hereinafter referred to as the "Project."</u>

- B. Consultant represents that it has the qualifications, experience and personnel necessary to properly perform the services as set forth herein.
- C. City desires to retain Consultant to provide such services.

Terms and Conditions

For of good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged and in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, City and Consultant agree to the following terms and conditions:

1. Scope of Work.

- (a) Consultant is hereby hired and retained by the City to work in a cooperative manner with the City to fully and adequately perform those services set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto ("Scope of Work") and by this reference made a part hereof. With prior written notice to Consultant, City may elect to delete certain tasks of the Scope of Work at its sole discretion.
- (b) Consultant shall perform all such work with skill and diligence and pursuant to generally accepted standards of practice in effect at the time of performance. Consultant shall provide corrective services without charge to the City for work which fails to meet these standards and which is reported to Consultant in writing within sixty days of discovery. Should Consultant fail or refuse to perform promptly its obligations under this Agreement, the City may render or undertake the performance thereof and the Consultant shall be liable for any expenses thereby incurred.

- (c) If services under this Agreement are to be performed by a design professional, as that term is defined in California Civil Code §2782.8(b)(2), design professional certifies that all design professional services shall be provided by a person or persons duly licensed by the State of California to provide the type of services described in Section 1(a). By delivery of completed work, design professional certifies that the work conforms to the requirements of this Agreement and all applicable federal, state and local laws, and the professional standard of care in California.
- (d) Consultant is responsible for making an independent evaluation and judgment of all relevant conditions affecting performance of the work, including without limitation site conditions, existing facilities, seismic, geologic, soils, hydrologic, geographic, climatic conditions, applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations and all other contingencies or considerations.
- (e) City shall cooperate with Consultant and will furnish all information data, records and reports existing and available to City to enable Consultant to carry out work outlined in Exhibit "A." Consultant shall be entitled to reasonably rely on information, data, records and reports furnished by the City, however, the City makes no warranty as to the accuracy or completeness of any such information, data, records or reports available to it and provided to Consultant which were furnished to the City by a third party. Consultant shall have a duty to bring to the City's attention any deficiency or error it may discover in any information provided to the Consultant by the City or a third party.

2. Term of Agreement & Commencement of Work.

- (a) Unless otherwise provided, the term of this Agreement shall begin on August 6, 2025 and shall expire on June 30, 2027, unless extended by amendment or terminated earlier as provided herein. The date of full execution is defined as the date when all of the following events have occurred:
- (i) This Agreement has been approved by the City's Council or by the board, officer or employee authorized to give such approval; and
- (ii) The office of the City Attorney has indicated in writing its approval of this Agreement as to form; and
- (iii) This Agreement has been signed on behalf of Consultant by the person or persons authorized to bind the Consultant hereto; and.
- (iv) This Agreement has been signed on behalf of the City by the person designated to so sign by the City's Council or by the officer or employee authorized to enter into this Contract and is attested to by the Marina City Clerk.
- (b) Consultant shall commence work on the Project on or by August 7, 2025. This Agreement may be extended upon written agreement of both parties. Consultant may be required to prepare a written schedule for the work to be performed, which schedule shall be approved by the City and made a part of Exhibit A, and to perform the work in accordance with the approved schedule.

3. Compensation.

- (a) City liability for compensation to Consultant under this Agreement shall only be to the extent of the present appropriation to fund this Agreement. For services to be provided under this Agreement City shall compensate Consultant in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Four Hundred and Seven Dollars (\$250,407.00) in accordance with the provisions of this Section and the Fee Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by this reference.
- (b) Invoice(s) in a format and on a schedule acceptable to the City shall be submitted to and be reviewed and verified by the Project Administrator (see Section 5(a)) and forwarded to the City's Finance Department for payment. City shall notify Consultant of exceptions or disputed items and their dollar value within fifteen days of receipt. Payment of the undisputed amount of the invoice will typically be made approximately thirty days after the invoice is submitted to the Finance Department.
- (c) Consultant will maintain clearly identifiable, complete and accurate records with respect to all costs incurred under this Agreement on an industry recognized accounting basis. Consultant shall make available to the representative of City all such books and records related to this Agreement, and the right to examine, copy and audit the same during regular business hours upon 72-hour's notice for a period of four years from the date of final payment under this Agreement.
- (d) Consultant shall not receive any compensation for Extra Work without the prior written authorization of City. As used herein, "Extra Work" means any work that is determined by the City to be necessary for the proper completion of the Project but which is not included within the Scope of Work and which the parties did not reasonably anticipate would be necessary at the execution of this Agreement.
- (e) Expenses not otherwise addressed in the Scope of Services or the Fee Schedule incurred by Consultant in performing services under this Agreement shall be reviewed and approved in advance by the Project Administrator (Section 5(a)), be charged at cost and reimbursed to Consultant.
- (f) There shall be no charge for transportation within Monterey, Santa Cruz and San Benito Counties required for the performance of the services under this Agreement; travel to other locations must be approved in writing and in advance by the City, mileage will be charged at the then current standard rate for business travel as set by the U.S. Internal Revenue Service for such approved travel.

4. Termination or Suspension.

- (a) This Agreement may be terminated in whole or in part in writing by either party in the event of a substantial failure by the other party to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement through no fault of the terminating party, provided that no termination may be effected unless the other party is given (1) not less than ten days written notice of intent to terminate, and (2) provided an opportunity for consultation with the terminating party prior to termination.
- (b) If termination for default is effected by the City, an equitable adjustment in the price provided for in this Agreement shall be made, but (1) no amount shall be allowed for anticipated profit on unperformed services or other work, and (2) any payment due the Consultant at the time of termination may be adjusted to cover any additional costs

to the City because of the Consultant's default. If after the termination for failure of Consultant to fulfill its contractual obligations, it is determined that the Consultant had not failed to fulfill contractual obligations, the termination shall be deemed to have been for the convenience of the City.

- (c) The City may terminate or suspend this Agreement at any time for its convenience upon not less than thirty days prior written notice to Consultant. Not later than the effective date of such termination or suspension, Consultant shall discontinue all affected work and deliver all work product and other documents, whether completed or in progress, to the City.
- (d) If termination for default is effected by the Consultant or if termination for convenience is effected by the City, the equitable adjustment shall include a reasonable profit for services or other work performed. The equitable adjustment for termination shall provide for payment to the Consultant for services rendered and expenses incurred prior to the termination, in addition to termination settlement costs reasonably incurred by Consultant relating to written commitments that were executed prior to the termination.

5. Project Administrator, Project Manager & Key Personnel.

- (a) City designates as its Project Administrator, Ismael Hernandez, who shall have the authority to act for the City under this Agreement. The Project Administrator or his/her authorized representative shall represent the City in all matters pertaining to the work to be performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- (b) Consultant designates, Kari Wagner, as its Project Manager who shall coordinate all phases of the Project. The Project manager shall be available to City at all reasonable times during the Agreement term.
- (c) Consultant warrants that it will continuously furnish the necessary personnel to complete the Project on a timely basis as contemplated by this Agreement. Consultant, at the sole discretion of City, shall remove from the Project any of its personnel assigned to the performance of services upon written request of City. Consultant has represented to City that certain key personnel will perform and coordinate the work under this Agreement. Should one or more of such personnel become unavailable, Consultant may substitute other personnel of at least equal competence upon written approval of the City. In the event that City and Consultant cannot agree as to the substitution of key personnel, City shall be entitled to terminate this Agreement for cause.

6. Delegation of Work.

(a) If Consultant utilizes any subconsultants, consultants, persons, employees or firms having applicable expertise to assist Consultant in performing the services under this Agreement, Consultant shall obtain City's prior written approval to such employment. Consultant's contract with any subconsultant shall contain a provision making the subcontract subject to all provisions of this Agreement. Consultant will be fully responsible and liable for payment for, administration, completion, presentation, and quality of all work performed. If such persons are utilized, they shall be charged at cost. City reserves its right to employ other consultants in connection with this Project.

- (b) If the work hereunder is performed by a design professional, design professional shall be directly involved with performing the work or shall work through his, her or its employees. The design professional's responsibilities under this Agreement shall not be delegated. The design professional shall be responsible to the City for acts, errors or omissions of his, her or its subconsultants. Negligence of subconsultants or agents retained by the design professional is conclusively deemed to be the negligence of the design professional if not adequately corrected by the design professional. Use of the term subconsultant in any other provision of this Agreement shall not be construed to imply authorization for a design professional to use subconsultants for performance of any professional service under this Agreement.
- (c) The City is an intended beneficiary of any work performed by a subconsultant for purposes of establishing a duty of care between the subconsultant and the City.
- 7. <u>Skill of Employees</u>. Consultant shall ensure that any employees or agents providing services under this Agreement possess the requisite skill, training and experience to properly perform such services.
- 8. <u>Confidential and Proprietary Information</u>. In the course of performing services under this Agreement Consultant may obtain, receive, and review confidential or proprietary documents, information or materials that are and shall remain the exclusive property of the City. Should Consultant undertake the work on behalf of other agencies, entities, firms or persons relating to the matters described in the Scope of Work, it is expressly agreed by Consultant that any such confidential or proprietary information or materials shall not be provided or disclosed in any manner to any of Consultant's other clients, or to any other third party, without the City's prior express written consent.
- 9. Ownership of Data. Unless otherwise provided for herein, all documents, material, data, drawings, plans, specifications, computer data files, basis for design calculations, engineering notes, and reports originated and prepared by Consultant, or any subconsultant of any tier, under this Agreement shall be and remain the property of the City for its use in any manner it deems appropriate. Consultant agrees that all copyrights which arise from creation of the work pursuant to this Agreement shall be vested in the City and waives and relinquishes all claims to copyright or intellectual property rights in favor of the City. Consultant shall provide two (2) sets of reproducible of the above-cited items, except for the computer data files which shall consist of one (1) set. Consultant shall use all reasonable efforts to ensure that any electronic files provided to the City will be compatible with the City's computer hardware and software. Consultant makes no representation as to long-term compatibility, usability or readability of the format resulting from the use of software application packages, operating systems or computer hardware differing from those in use by the City at the commencement of this Agreement. Consultant shall be permitted to maintain copies of all such data for its files. City acknowledges that its use of the work product is limited to the purposes contemplated by the Scope of Work and, should City use these products or data in connection with additions to the work required under this Agreement or for new work without consultation with and without additional compensation to Consultant, Consultant makes no representation as to the suitability of the work product for use in or application to circumstances not contemplated by the Scope of Work and shall have no liability or responsibility whatsoever in connection with such use which shall be at the City's sole risk. Any and all liability arising out of changes made by the City to Consultant's

deliverables is waived against Consultant unless City has given Consultant prior written notice of the changes and has received Consultant's written consent to such changes.

10. Conflict of Interest.

- (a) Consultant covenants that neither it, nor any officer or principal of its firm has or shall acquire any interest, directly or indirectly, which would conflict in any manner with the interests of the City or which would in any way hinder Consultant's performance of services under this Agreement. Consultant further covenants that in the performance of this Agreement, no person having any such interest shall be employed by it as an officer, employee, agent or subconsultant without the express written consent of the City Manager. Consultant agrees to at all times avoid conflicts of interest or the appearance of any conflicts of interest with the interests of the City in the performance of this Agreement. Consultant shall represent the interest of the City in any discussion or negotiation.
- (b) City understands and acknowledges that Consultant may be, as of the date of commencement of services under this Agreement, independently involved in the performance of non-related services for other governmental agencies and private parties. Consultant is unaware of any stated position of the City relative to such projects. Any future position of the City on such projects may result in a conflict of interest for purposes of this section.
- **11. Disclosure**. Consultant may be subject to the appropriate disclosure requirements of the California Fair Political Practices Act, as determined by the City Manager.

12. Non-Discrimination.

- (a) During the performance of this Agreement the Consultant and its subconsultants shall comply with the applicable laws of the United States of America, the State of California and the City prohibiting discrimination and harassment. In performing this Agreement, Consultant shall not discriminate, harass, or allow harassment, against any employee or applicant for employment because of gender, gender expression, gender identity, genetic characteristics, sex, race, color, ancestry, religious creed, national origin, physical disability (including HIV and AIDS), medical condition (including cancer), mental disability, age, marital status, denial of family and medical care leave and denial of pregnancy disability leave, sexual orientation, military/veteran status and any other characteristics protected by state or federal law. Consultant shall give written notice of its obligations under this clause to labor organizations with which it has a collective bargaining or other agreement.
- (b) Consultant shall include the provisions of this Section 12(a) in all subcontracts related to this Agreement.

13. Indemnification.

(a) Other than in the performance of design professional services by a design professional, which shall be solely as addressed by subsection (b) below, and to the full extent permitted by law, Consultant shall indemnify, immediately defend (with

independent counsel reasonably acceptable to the City) and hold harmless the City, its Council, boards, commissions, employees, officials and agents (collectively "Indemnified Parties" or in the singular "Indemnified Party") from and against any claims, losses, damages, penalties, fines and judgments, associated investigation and administrative expenses, and defense costs including but not limited to reasonable attorney's fees, court costs, expert witness fees and costs of alternate dispute resolution (collectively "Liabilities"), where same arise out of the performance of this Agreement by Consultant, its officers, employees, agents and sub-consultants. The duty to defend is a separate and distinct obligation from the Consultant's duty to indemnify and Consultant shall be obligated to defend in all legal, equitable, administrative or special proceedings upon tender to the Consultant of any claim in any form or at any stage of an action or proceeding, whether or not liability is established and the obligation extends through final judgment including exhaustion of any appeals.. The Consultant's obligation to indemnify applies unless it is finally determined that the liability was caused by the sole active negligence or sole willful misconduct of an indemnified party. If it is finally determined that liability is caused by the comparative active negligence or willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party, the Consultant's indemnification obligation shall be reduced in proportion to the established comparative liability of the indemnified party.

- (b) To the fullest extent permitted by law (including without limitation California Civil Code Sections 2782.8), when the services to be provided under this Agreement are design professional services to be performed by a design professional, as that term is defined by said section 2782.8(c)(2) ("Design Professional") Design Professional shall indemnify, protect and hold harmless any Indemnified Party for all Liabilities regardless of nature or type that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of Design Professional, or such acts or omissions of an officer, employee, agent or subcontractor of the Design Professional, in the performance of professional services provided to the city. Design Professional shall not have an immediate duty to defend an Indemnified Party, however, Design Professional's obligation to indemnify (including reimbursing the cost to defend) and hold the Indemnified Parties harmless applies unless it is finally determined that the liability was caused by the sole active negligence or sole willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party. If it is finally determined that liability was caused by the comparative active negligence or willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party as adjudicated by a court of competent jurisdiction, the Design Professional's indemnification obligation shall be reduced in direct proportion to the indemnified party's proportionate percentage of fault. Within 30 days following Design Professional's receipt of a properly presented written invoice Design Professional shall satisfy its indemnification obligations and reimburse the Indemnified Party for the cost of reasonable attorney's fees and defense costs incurred by the Indemnified Party to the same extent of Design Professional's indemnity obligation herein. In no event shall the cost to defend charged to the Design Professional exceed the Design Professional's proportionate percentage of fault.
- (c) The provisions of this Section are not limited by the provisions of sections relating to insurance including provisions of any worker's compensation act or similar act. Consultant expressly waives its statutory immunity under such statues or laws as to City, its employees and officials. An allegation or determination of comparative active negligence or willful misconduct by an Indemnified Party unrelated to design professional services does not relieve Consultant from its separate and distinct obligation to defend City. Consultant agrees to obtain executed indemnity agreements with provisions identical to those set forth here in this section from each and every

subconsultant, sub tier consultant or any other person or entity involved by, for, with or on behalf of Consultant in the performance or subject matter of this Agreement. In the event Consultant fails to obtain such indemnity obligations from others as required here, Consultant agrees to be fully responsible according to the terms of this section. Failure of City to monitor compliance with these requirements imposes no additional obligations on City and will in no way act as a waiver of any rights hereunder.

- (d) If any action or proceeding is brought against any Indemnified Party by reason of any of the matters against which the Consultant has agreed to provide an immediate defense to any Indemnified Party, as provided above, Consultant, upon notice from the City, shall defend the Indemnified Party at Consultant's expense by independent counsel reasonably acceptable to the City. Unless otherwise provided above, an Indemnified Party need not have first paid for any of the matters to which it is entitled to indemnification in order to be so defended. Consultant may submit a claim to the City for reasonable defense costs (including attorney's and expert fees) incurred in providing a defense of any Indemnified Party to the extent such defense costs arise under principals of comparative fault from the Indemnified Party's active negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct.
- (e) This obligation to indemnify and defend, as set forth herein, is binding on the successors, assigns, or heirs of Consultant and shall survive the termination of this Agreement or this Section.

14. Insurance.

- (a) As a condition precedent to the effectiveness of this Agreement and without limiting Consultant's indemnification of the City, Consultant agrees to obtain and maintain in full force and effect at its own expense the insurance policies set forth in Exhibit "B" "Insurance" attached hereto and made a part hereof. Consultant shall furnish the City with original certificates of insurance, executed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf, along with copies of all required endorsements. All certificates and endorsements must be received and approved by the City before any work commences. All insurance policies shall be subject to approval by the City Attorney and Risk Manager as to form and content. Specifically, such insurance shall: (1) be endorsed to protect City as an additional insured for commercial general and business auto liability; (2) provide City prior notice of cancellation; and (3) be primary with respect to City's insurance program. Consultant's insurance is not expected to respond to claims that may arise from the acts or omissions of the City.
- (b) City reserves the right at any time during the term of this Agreement to change the amounts and types of insurance required herein by giving Consultant ninety days advance written notice of such change. If such change should result in substantial additional cost of the Consultant, City agrees to negotiate additional compensation proportional to the increased benefit to City.
- (c) All required insurance must be submitted and approved the City Attorney and Risk Manager prior to the inception of any operations by Consultant.
- (d) The required coverage and limits are subject to availability on the open market at reasonable cost as determined by the City. Non availability or non affordability must be documented by a letter from Consultant's insurance broker or agency indicating

a good faith effort to place the required insurance and showing as a minimum the names of the insurance carriers and the declinations or quotations received from each. Within the foregoing constraints, Consultant's failure to procure or maintain required insurance during the entire term of this Agreement shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement under which City may immediately suspend or terminate this Agreement or, at its discretion, procure or renew such insurance to protect City's interests and pay any and all premium in connection therewith and recover all monies so paid from Consultant.

- (e) By signing this Agreement, Consultant hereby certifies that it is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 *et seq.*, of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provision of that Code, and that it will comply with such provisions at all such times as they may apply during the performance of the work pursuant to this Contract. Unless otherwise agreed, a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City is required.
- **15.** <u>Independent Consultant</u>. The parties agree that Consultant, its officers, employees and agents, if any, shall be independent consultants with regard to the providing of services under this Agreement, and that Consultant's employees or agents shall not be considered to be employees or agents of the City for any purpose and will not be entitled to any of the benefits City provides for its employees. City shall make no deductions for payroll taxes or Social Security from amounts due Consultant for work or services provided under this Agreement.

This Agreement shall not constitute, and it is not intended to constitute, either party as an employer, employee, agent, partner or legal representative of the other party for any purpose, or give either party any right to supervise or direct the functions of the other party. Except as specifically provided herein, neither party shall have authority to act for or obligate the other party in any way or to extend any representation on behalf of the other party. Each party agrees to perform under this Agreement solely as an independent consultant and neither party shall have any right, power, or authority, nor shall they represent themselves as having any authority to assume, create, or incur any expense, liability or obligation, express or implied, on behalf of the other party for any purpose. Each party agrees not to permit its employees or agents to do anything that might be construed or interpreted as acts of the other party.

- **16.** Claims for Labor and Materials. Consultant shall promptly pay when due all amounts payable for labor and materials furnished in the performance of this Agreement, so as to prevent any lien or other claim under any provision of law from arising against any City property (including reports, documents, and other tangible matter produced by the Consultant hereunder), against the Consultant's rights to payments hereunder, or against the City, and shall pay all amounts due under the Unemployment Insurance Act with respect to such labor.
- **17. Discounts.** Consultant agrees to offer the City any discount terms that are offered to its best customers for the goods and services to be provided herein, and apply such discounts to payment made under this Agreement which meet the discount terms.
- **18.** Cooperation; Further Acts. The Parties shall fully cooperate with one another, and shall take any additional acts or sign any additional documents as may be necessary, appropriate or convenient to attain the purposes of this Agreement.

19. <u>Dispute Resolution</u>. If any dispute arises between the parties as to proper interpretation or application of this Agreement, the parties shall first meet and confer in a good faith attempt to resolve the matter between themselves. If the dispute is not resolved by meeting and conferring, the matter shall be submitted for formal mediation to a mediator selected mutually by the parties. The expenses of such mediation shall be shared equally between the parties. If the dispute is not or cannot be resolved by mediation, the parties may mutually agree (but only as to those issues of the matter not resolved by mediation) to submit their dispute to arbitration. Before commencement of the arbitration, the parties may elect to have the arbitration proceed on an informal basis; however, if the parties are unable so to agree, then the arbitration shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of the American Arbitration Association. The decision of the arbitrator shall be binding, unless within thirty days after issuance of the arbitrator's written decision, any party files an action in court. Venue and jurisdiction for any such action between the parties shall lie in the Superior Court for the County of Monterey.

20. Compliance with Laws.

- (a) Each party's performance hereunder shall comply with all applicable laws of the United States of America, the State of California and the City including but not limited to laws regarding health and safety, labor and employment, wage and hours and licensing laws which affect employees. This Agreement shall be governed by, enforced and interpreted under the laws of the State of California. Consultant must be in good standing and registered with the California Department of Industrial Relations in accordance with California labor Code section 1725.5 and shall comply with new, amended or revised laws, regulations or procedures that apply to the performance of this Agreement.
- (b) If the Project is a "public work," or prevailing wages are otherwise required, Consultant shall comply with all provision of California Labor Code section 1720 *et seq.*, as applicable, and laws dealing with prevailing wages, apprentices and hours of work.
- (c) Consultant represents that it has obtained and presently holds all permits and licenses necessary for performance hereunder, including a Business License required by the City's Business License Ordinance (Title 5 of the Marina Municipal Code) for which a business license tax is prescribed and assessed at the rate of two-tenths percent of gross receipts, in accordance with the provisions therein. For the term covered by this Agreement, the Consultant shall maintain or obtain as necessary, such permits and licenses and shall not allow them to lapse, be revoked or suspended.
- **21.** Assignment or Transfer. This Agreement or any interest herein may not be assigned, hypothecated or transferred, either directly or by operation of law, without the prior written consent of the City. Any attempt to do so shall be null and void, and any assignees, hypothecates or transferees shall acquire no right or interest by reason of such attempted assignment, hypothecation or transfer.
- **22. Notices**. All notices required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be personally delivered, sent by facsimile ("fax") or certified mail, postage prepaid with return receipt requested, addressed as follows:

The parties my agree in writing to receive notice by email. Notice shall be deemed effective on the date personally delivered or transmitted by facsimile or, if mailed, three days after deposit in the custody of the U.S. Postal Service. A copy of any notice sent as provided herein shall also be delivered to the Project Administrator and Project Manager.

- **23.** <u>Amendments, Changes or Modifications</u>. This Agreement is not subject to amendment, change or modification except by a writing signed by the authorized representatives of City and Consultant.
- **24.** Force Majeure. Notwithstanding any other provisions hereof, neither Consultant nor City shall be held responsible or liable for failure to meet their respective obligations under this Agreement if such failure shall be due to causes beyond Consultant's or the City's control except that an economic downturn of any type shall not be a justifiable cause for the failure to meet their respective obligations under this Agreement. Such causes include but are not limited to: strike, fire, flood, civil disorder, act of God or of the public enemy, act of the federal government, or any unit of state of local government in either sovereign or contractual capacity, epidemic, quarantine restriction, or delay in transportation to the extent that they are not caused by the party's willful or negligent acts or omissions, and to the extent that they are beyond the party's reasonable control.
- **25.** Attorney's Fees. In the event of any controversy, claim or dispute relating to this Agreement, or the breach thereof, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the losing party reasonable expenses, attorney's fees and costs.
- **Successors and Assigns.** All of the terms, conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall apply to and bind the respective heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the parties. Nothing in this paragraph is intended to affect the limitation on assignment
- **27.** Authority to Enter Agreement. Consultant has all requisite power and authority to conduct its business and to execute, deliver and perform the Agreement. Each party warrants that the individuals who have signed this Agreement have the legal power, right and authority to make this Agreement and bind each respective party.
- **28. Waiver**. A waiver of a default of any term of this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver of any succeeding default or as a waiver of the provision itself. A party's performance after the other party's default shall not be construed as a waiver of that default.

- **29.** Severability. Should any portion of this Agreement be determined to be void or unenforceable, such shall be severed from the whole and the Agreement will continue as modified.
- **30.** Construction, References, Captions. Since the parties or their agents have participated fully in the preparation of this Agreement, the language of this Agreement shall be construed simply, according to its fair meaning, and not strictly for or against any party. Any term referencing time, days or period for performance shall be deemed calendar days and not work days. The captions of the various sections are for convenience and ease of reference only, and do not define, limit, augment or describe the scope, content or intent of this Agreement.
- **31.** Advice of Counsel. The parties agree that they are aware that they have the right to be advised by counsel with respect to the negotiations, terms and conditions of this Agreement, and that the decision of whether or not to seek the advice of counsel with respect to this Agreement is a decision which is the sole responsibility of each of the parties hereto. This Agreement shall not be construed in favor or against either party by reason of the extent to which each party participated in the drafting of this Agreement.
- **32.** <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall constitute an original.
- **33.** Time. Time is of the essence in this contract.
- **34.** Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties with respect to the matters as set forth in this Agreement, and no other agreement, statement or promise made by or to any party or by or to any employee, officer or agent of any party, which is not contained in this Agreement shall be binding or valid.

EXHIBIT B - INSURANCE

Consultant shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by Consultant, its agents, representatives, or employees.

MINIMUM SCOPE AND LIMIT OF INSURANCE

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 1. Commercial General Liability (CGL): Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (ISO CG 25 03 or 25 04) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
- 2. **Automobile Liability:** Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 0001 covering, Code 1 (any auto), or if Consultant has no owned autos, Code 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned), with limit no less than **\$1,000,000** per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 3. **Workers' Compensation** insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease. (Not required if Consultant provides written verification it has no employees)
- 4. **Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions):** Insurance appropriates to Consultant's profession, with limit no less than **\$2,000,000** per occurrence or claim, \$2,000,000 aggregate.

If Consultant maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the City requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or the higher limits maintained by Consultant. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the City.

Other Insurance Provisions

The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

Additional Insured Status

City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of Consultant including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to Consultant's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or if not available, through the addition of both CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38; and CG 20 37 if a later edition is used).

Primary Coverage

For any claims related to this contract, Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary and non-contributory and at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects the City, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the City, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it. This requirement shall also apply to any Excess or Umbrella liability policies.

Umbrella or Excess Policy

Consultant may use Umbrella or Excess Policies to provide the liability limits as required in this agreement. This form of insurance will be acceptable provided that all of the Primary and Umbrella or Excess Policies shall provide all of the insurance coverages herein required, including, but not limited to, primary and non-contributory, additional insured, Self-Insured Retentions (SIRs), indemnity, and defense requirements. The Umbrella or Excess policies shall be provided on a true "following form" or broader coverage basis, with coverage at least as broad as provided on the underlying Commercial General Liability insurance. No insurance policies maintained by the Additional Insureds, whether primary or excess, and which also apply to a loss covered hereunder, shall be called upon to contribute to a loss until Consultant's primary and excess liability policies are exhausted.

Notice of Cancellation

Each insurance policy required above shall provide that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the City.

Waiver of Subrogation

Consultant hereby grants to City a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Consultant may acquire against the City by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Consultant agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the City has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.

Self-Insured Retentions

Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City. The City may require Consultant to purchase coverage with a lower retention or provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. The policy language shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured or City. The CGL and any policies, including Excess liability policies, may not be subject to a self-insured retention (SIR) or deductible that exceeds \$25,000 unless approved in writing by City. Any and all deductibles and SIRs shall be the sole responsibility of Consultant or subconsultant who procured such insurance and shall not apply to the Indemnified Additional Insured Parties. City may deduct from any amounts otherwise due Consultant to fund the SIR/deductible. Policies shall NOT contain any self-insured retention (SIR) provision that limits the satisfaction of the SIR to the City. The policy must also provide that Defense costs, including the Allocated Loss Adjustment Expenses, will satisfy the SIR or deductible. City reserves the right to obtain a copy of any policies and endorsements for verification.

Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers authorized to conduct business in the state with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the City.

Claims Made Policies

If any of the required policies provide claims-made coverage:

- 1. The Retroactive Date must be shown, and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
- 2. Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.
- 3. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, Consultant must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of work.

Verification of Coverage

Consultant shall furnish the City with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause and a copy of the Declarations and Endorsements Pages of the CGL and any Excess policies listing all policy endorsements. All certificates and endorsements and copies of the Declarations & Endorsements pages are to be received and approved by the City before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive Consultant's obligation to provide them. The City reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time. City reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.

Subconsultants

Consultant shall require and verify that all subconsultants maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein, and Consultant shall ensure that City is an additional insured on insurance required from subconsultants.

Duration of Coverage

CGL & Excess liability policies for any construction related work, including, but not limited to, maintenance, service, or repair work, shall continue coverage for a minimum of five (5) years for Completed Operations liability coverage. Such Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.

Special Risks or Circumstances

City reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.

Wallace Group requests the Client's authorization to proceed with revisions to the contract agreement for the above referenced project as herein described. Approval below incorporates this document as a part of the original contract signed June 18, 2025. If approved, please return a signed copy of the Contract Amendment to Wallace Group.

Description and Purpose of the Revision(s)

Wallace Group appreciates the opportunity to provide you with our proposal for Civil Engineering and Landscape Architecture services for the above-referenced project. Wallace Group is currently under contract for Phase 1 of the Dunes Project. The City is now requesting Wallace Group provide a design alternative to include Phase 2, the amphitheater. A conceptual design of the amphitheater was prepared by Verde Design, Inc. The City has requested Wallace Group to complete the design. Wallace Group will utilize the AutoCAD files provided by Verde Design, Inc. Based on our discussion, the following Scope of Services has been prepared for your consideration:

I. PROJECT UNDERSTANDING

The phase 2 portion of Dunes Park is the southwest corner of the site, adjacent to 7th Street and Sand Dune Ave, where an amphitheater is anticipated. The City contracted with Verde Design, Inc. to prepare concept plans. The layout of the amphitheater is based on the conceptual layout from Verde but wasn't taken to the 60% level (see figure 1 on the following page). Based on some rough order of magnitude costs that we developed for the phase 2 area (predicated on the Verde design), we estimate that the overall costs would be around \$2.7M.

Similar to the efforts on phase 1, Wallace Group will attempt to reduce the construction costs for the amphitheater design; however, this effort requires reconceptualizing the layout and design, requiring additional time and effort. In order to get the design to the current level of design of the phase 1 park, the team will need to work on the design and provide a revised conceptual layout for the City's review (at a proposed 35% design level), along with a 60% design layout to confirm the design and costs for the phase 2 area. We have separated this as a standalone task so that if the City would like, we could work on this effort first, before the City decides to proceed to full bid-ready plans. At a minimum, we would advise that the City advance the design to a 60% design level, as it would provide a better understanding of the tie-ins to the phase 1 park area and allow for rough grading and hydroseeding that is set near the proposed elevation. If the City decides to proceed with the design and add this to the bid set for phase 1, we will then work on the 95% design and a final design in order to get both projects out within the same bid set. This is indicated in the task 3 efforts of this CA proposal.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- Wallace Group assumes that there will be conceptual refinement changes needed in order to tie the amphitheater to the refined site plan.
- A Prefabricated Restroom Manufacturer will be selected, and that building structural design will be included in the restroom manufacturer's design.
- Electrical lighting and service will be done in an effort to be flexible and provide electrical tie-ins for audio equipment; however, no advanced AV equipment, lighting controls, or amplification will be provided.

II. SCOPE OF SERVICES

Note that the task numbers for this CA correlate to the prime contract. The new task included (task 2) is in place of the previous survey task number. However, Wallace Group will create a new task for this work under the prime contract so that it is billed separately.

Task 1: Project Management, QA/QC, Coordination and Meetings

Subtask 1.1 - Project Management and Administration

We approach project management and quality control as an integral and continuous thread from kick-off through implementation. This task includes project management for internal team coordination needs and coordination with the City of Marina. This task includes project setup, coordination, budget/schedule monitoring, and invoicing. This task is budgeted based on a design and bid phase schedule of 12 months.

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Subtask 1.2 - Meetings

Wallace Group will attend two (2) focused meetings regarding the conceptual design of the amphitheater to go over the design with the City at the schematic design and 65% (design development) submittals.

We have scheduled meetings for the phase 1 work of the park; however, we assume that there will need to be additional time dedicated to the review of the phase 2 work during these meetings. Therefore, we are scoping in an additional thirty (30) minutes per meeting for this work. This includes two (2) web conference progress meetings with City staff and the Project Team to review the project progress and to discuss project status via phone or web conference for each submittal phase (95% and 100%).

Subtask 1.3 - Quality Assurance / Quality Control (QA/QC)

Our team will provide QA/QC will be provided following the 60%, 95% and 100% Construction Documents, including Plans, Specifications, and Engineer's Estimate (PS&E).

Task 1 Deliverables:

- Attend two (2) web conference meetings with City at 35% schematic design and 60% design development
- Additional time (30-minutes) for the web conference meetings with City at 95%, and 100% milestones to discuss the phase 2 work

Task 2: Preliminary Design

Subtask 2.1 - 35% Schematic Design:

The schematic design will deliver a final design for the review and input by the City. The plan sheets will be a total of four (4) sheets at 24" x 36", with no details. The schematic design package will include:

- Schematic Site Plan
- Schematic Utilities Plan
- Schematic Grading/Drainage Plan
- Schematic Amenities Layout Plan
- Schematic Landscape Planting Plan

The purpose of the schematic plans is to establish a better understanding of the potential cost estimate of the phase 2 work. Included in the schematic design package will be an itemized engineer's opinion of probable construction cost for defined components of the work with appropriate contingency for this level of estimate. Relevant unit bid information will be acquired from available public bid sources. Based on this information, an Engineer's Opinion of Probable Construction Cost will be generated and submitted to the City for budgeting purposes.

It's assumed that City approval will be needed in order to advance to the 60% design.

Subtask 2.2 - 60% Design Development:

Based on the City's acceptance of the schematic design, Wallace Group will provide the following improvement plans for 60% submittal. We anticipate approximately 15 sheets to be provided as a Bid Alternative to Phase 1 improvements. Improvement Plans are estimated to consist of (30"x42", PDF). Plans will be submitted to the City of Marina. The following sheets are assumed to be needed for the project:

- Site Plan (1-sheet)
- Horizontal Control Plan (1-sheets)
- Grading and Drainage Plan (1-sheet)
- Site Cross Sections (1-sheet)
- Utility Plan (1-sheet)



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- Site Amenities Plan and Details (2-sheets)
- Planting Plan and Details (1-sheet)
- Irrigation Plan and Details (1-sheet)
- Electrical Plans and Details (2-sheets)
- Structural Plans and Details (2-sheet)

Below is a description of each of the anticipated plans in more detail:

Site Plan:

The site plan set will show the location of surface improvements, such as asphalt, concrete, sidewalks, ramps, site amenities, etc. Vehicular and pedestrian access will be shown on the site plan. Wallace Group will show the ADA path of travel based on coordination with the City of Marina. Signage and striping will be included as a part of the Site Plan.

Horizontal Control Plan:

The horizontal control plan set will provide line and curve data for the curbs and site improvements. Site dimensions and reference to survey coordinates and/or monuments will be included.

Grading and Drainage Plan:

The grading and drainage plan set will utilize the topographic survey data to create a finish grade surface. Plans will show elevations and slopes of sidewalks, flatwork, and landscape areas. The proposed storm drainage system will be shown including inlets, storm drain pipes and applicable drainage features. Grades and indications for an accessible path of travel will be provided to the buildings and accessible amenities.

Site Cross Sections:

The site cross sections will be provided and will show proposed grading across the site and conformance to existing grades at the property lines. Retaining wall profiles will be provided where needed.

Utility Plan:

The utility plan set will provide the layout for the proposed sanitary sewer and water needed to serve the project. The Phase 1 park improvements will provide stubs for water and sewer lines for the future Phase 2 park improvement for connection if needed. No main line extensions within the right of way will be required. Design of other dry utilities including but limited to gas, telephone, cable, tv, internet, etc. are not anticipated.

Construction Details:

Construction details will include City of Marina standard details along with other agency specified details applicable to the project. Project specific details will be included as well.

Site Amenities Plan:

The site amenities plan set will include site amenities showing the location of surface improvements such as concrete jointing, concrete finishes, and site amenities (i.e. restroom, benches, picnic tables, trash receptacles, etc.).

Planting Plan:

The planting plan set will include planting layouts, notes, and details for all planting areas within the site per City of Marina standards.



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Irrigation Plan:

The irrigation plan set will include irrigation equipment types, layout, and water demand calculations as required for landscape water efficiency ordinances, City review, and per MCWD requirements. The system will be designed for connections to the phase 1 mainline water source and notes and equipment will be added to accommodate recycled water service. The irrigation plans assume that the recycled water point of connection is available for use with adequate pressure. MWELO calculations and forms will be provided.

2.3 Engineer's Estimate of Probable Construction Costs (60%)

Based on consolidated written comments from the City of Marina and MCWD on the 60% Engineer's Estimate, we will update the engineer's estimate of probable construction costs. This will include project quantities and estimated unit costs in PDF and Excel file format. Wallace Group will recommend additive alternatives if the estimated costs exceed the available funding.

2.4 Specifications (60%)

We will provide a specification outline for the work based on using CSI MasterSpec format to be incorporated as Technical Provisions with the City's standard front-end documents.

Task 2 Deliverables:

- One (1) final schematic design package (pdf)
- One (1) 60% design development package (pdf)

Task 3: Construction Documents

3.1 Construction Plans (95%)

Based on the City's acceptance of the 60% design, Wallace Group will provide the improvement plans for 95% submittal. The plans will follow the description of the sheets described in Task 2 above.

3.2 Engineer's Estimate of Probable Construction Costs (95%)

Based on consolidated written comments from the City of Marina and MCWD on the 60% Engineer's Estimate, we will update the engineer's estimate of probable construction costs. This will include project quantities and estimated unit costs in PDF and Excel file format. Wallace Group will recommend additive alternatives if the estimated costs exceed the available funding.

3.3 Specifications (95%)

Based on consolidated written comments from the City of Marina and MCWD on the 60% Specifications, we will update specifications for the work based on using CSI MasterSpec format to be incorporated as Technical Provisions with the City's standard front-end documents.

3.4 Stormwater Control Plan

A stormwater control plan (SWCP) will be prepared in accordance with the City of Marina requirements and the Regional Water Quality Control Board Post Construction Stormwater Requirements (PCRs) for phase one of the project. The phase two area will be added to the SWCP to complete a single SWCP for the entire project. The site will be divided into preliminary drainage management areas and stormwater control measures will be implemented to manage post-developed runoff. The project is located in Water Management Zone 4 and we anticipate the project will require PR-1 through PR-3. We anticipate the project will not require peak flow management (PR-4) performance requirements as it is not located in WMZ 1-3, 6 & 9.

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Flood control design (storms larger than PCR requirements) are not included in the stormwater design. The SWCP will be provided with the 95% Construction Documents.

3.5 Drainage Report

Wallace Group will prepare the drainage report prepared to include the storm drain infrastructure and drainage features in accordance with the City of Marina Public Works standards for phase one of the project. The phase two area will be added to the Drainage Report to complete a single Drainage Report for the entire project.

3.6 Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan

Wallace Group will prepare a Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) for the project for phase one of the project. The phase two area will be incorporated into the SWPPP to provide a complete SWPPP for the entire project. The Erosion Control Plans and the Drainage Design Report prepared in Tasks 3.1 and 3.5 will be the basis for the SWPPP Site Map, Stormwater Run-on and Run-off Calculations, and Risk Level Assessment.

3.7 Stormwater Operations and Maintenance Manual

Preparation of an Operations and Maintenance Manual addressing Storm Water facilities management, monitoring and inspections, landscape and irrigation maintenance, inspection requirements for common areas and site-specific information regarding the Homeowner's Association responsibilities will be prepared for phase one of the project. The phase two area will be incorporated into the Stormwater Operations and Maintenance Manual to provide a complete Stormwater Operations and Maintenance Manual for the entire project.

3.8 Electrical Design & PG&E Coordination

Otto Electrical will provide Electrical Design Plans, which shall include complete detailed design drawings and photometrics analysis and exhibit of initial phase site lighting for installation of parking lot lighting, lighting along pathways, electric power provisions to the new prefabricated restroom building At grade power and audio/visual boxes or receptacles at stage (excluding specification of any A/V equipment), spare conduits are routed for future A/V use, upsized light poles at back of amphitheatre with receptacles, and step lights at the amphitheatre. Electrical plans will be included in the construction document sets for schematic design (30%), design development (60%), 95% and Final design. Division 26 Specifications, Title 24 Compliance Forms, Probable Cost Estimate for electrical infrastructure and Bid and Construction support are included.

3.9 Structural Design

Murphy Structural Engineers will provide structural scope for various site retaining walls, foundation and anchorage design for light poles, foundation design review for the prefabricated band stand (structural design assumed to be provided by manufacturer), and foundation design and anchorage for pre-engineering/prefabricated manufactured restroom. The restroom building will be designed by a licensed engineer and reactions will be provided for design of the foundation and anchorage including reactions for individual load cases, conventional slab on grade with shallow foundations will be an acceptable foundation system in accordance with geotechnical investigations.

Murphy Structural Engineers will produce design drawings, calculations and related specifications for the structural design elements as required. Structural plans will be included in the construction document sets for the design development (60%), 95% and Final design and will include an Overall Site Plan, Shade Structure Foundation Plan, Restroom Foundation Plan, Structural Details and General Structural Notes.

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3.10 Construction Plans (100%)

After receiving consolidated written comments from the City of Marina and MCWD on the 95% Plans, Wallace Group will finalize the plan set for the submittal of the 100% Construction Document package. The plan set will include the same sheet count as described in the 95% submittal.



3.11 Engineer's Estimate of Probable Construction Costs (100%)

Based on consolidated written comments from the City of Marina on the 95% Engineer's Estimate, we will finalize the engineer's estimate of probable construction costs. This will include project quantities and estimated unit costs in PDF and Excel file format. Wallace Group will recommend additive alternatives if the estimated costs exceed the available funding.

3.12 Specifications (100%)

Based on consolidated written comments from the City of Marina on the 95% Specifications, we will finalize for the work based on using CSI MasterSpec format to be incorporated as Technical Provisions with the City's standard front-end documents.

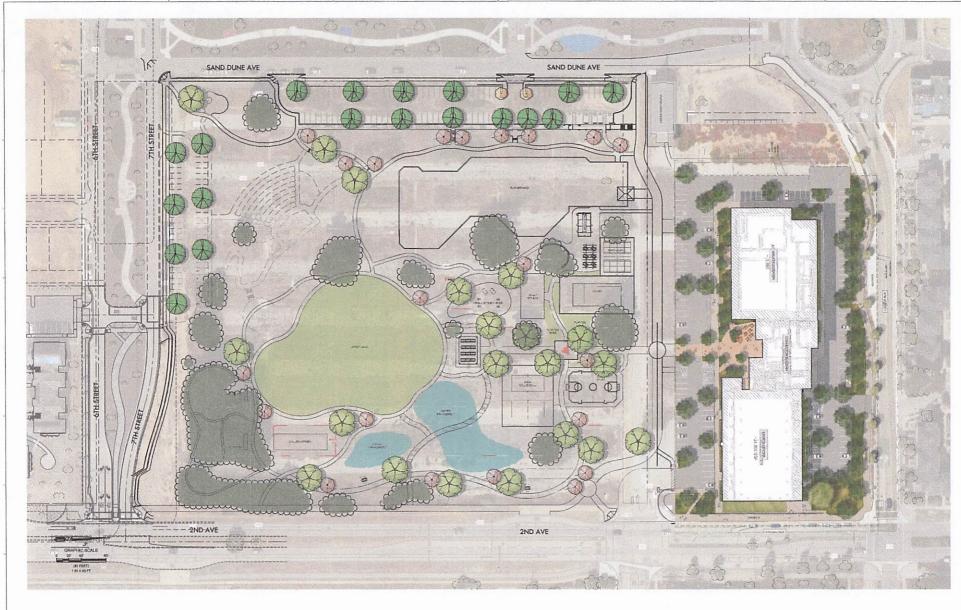

CITY COUNCIL TO CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2025, AUTHORIZING AN AGREEMENT WITH PHAIDON INTERNATIONAL FOR EXECUTIVE RECRUITMENT SERVICES TO HIRE A CITY ENGINEER; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER OR DESIGNEE TO EXECUTE CONTRACT DOCUMENTS SUBJECT TO FINAL REVIEW AND APPROVAL BY THE CITY ATTORNEY; AND AUTHORIZING THE FINANCE DIRECTOR TO MAKE NECESSARY ACCOUNTING AND BUDGETARY ENTRIES.

REQUEST:

It is recommended that the City Council Consider adopting Resolution No. 2025-_:

- 1. Authorizing an agreement with Phaidon International (U.S.) Inc. to conduct an executive recruitment for the position of City Engineer, in an amount not to exceed \$45,000.
- 2. Authorize the City Manager or designee to execute the agreement on behalf of the City, subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney.
- 3. Authorize the Finance Director to make necessary accounting and budgetary entries.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Marina is currently seeking to fill the critical position of City Engineer. To ensure a high-quality pool of qualified candidates and a timely, confidential, and optimal hiring process, the City has elected to contract with a professional executive recruitment firm.

Phaidon International (U.S.) Inc. is a global executive recruitment firm with experience sourcing qualified candidates for technical and infrastructure-focused positions in the public sector. The City desires to enter into a one-time agreement with Phaidon for the recruitment of a new City Engineer.

ANALYSIS:

Phaidon International will provide recruitment services including engagement, market mapping and initial contact, candidate screening, and support during candidate selection and offer processes. Their services are tailored to attract top-level engineering professionals with public infrastructure experience.

The attached agreement and proposal outline the scope of services and recruitment approach for a fixed recruitment fee of \$45,000 for the City Engineer search. This ensures predictable budgeting and a clear scope. If the selected candidate separates from the City within the first 90 days, a partial fee refund or replacement recruitment will be provided per Phaidon's rebate policy.

Engaging a specialized recruiter is most desired for challenging technical roles, ensuring the City accesses a competitive and diverse pool of applicants.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The total not-to-exceed cost for executive recruitment services is \$45,000. Funding is proposed to be allocated from the City's General Fund.

1. **Phaidon International (U.S.) Inc.**, whose registered office is 711 3rd Avenue, 3rd Floor, New York, NY 10017, hereinafter referred to as the "Company", and;

City of Marina, whose registered office is 211 Hillcrest Ave, Marina, CA 93933, hereinafter referred to as the "Client",

Collectively also known as the "Parties" and individually as a "Party".

Background. The Company is in the business of sourcing, introducing and supplying the services of qualified Candidates to fulfill its Clients' requirements. The Client is the organization that engages the Company to carry out any services. This Agreement is a one-for agreement; the terms of which shall apply to the placement of Bridge Lead for the effective duration of this agreement.

1. Definitions and Interpretation. For the purposes of this Agreement, unless the context otherwise explicitly requires, the following definitions shall apply:

"Affiliate(s)" means any person or entity controlling, controlled by or under common control of or with one of the Parties and, for the purposes of this definition, "Control" shall mean the direct or indirect ownership of more than fifty percent (50%) of the voting interest in such corporation or other entity or the power to direct or cause the direction of the management or polices of a corporation or business entity.

"Appointment" means the employment of a Candidate by the Client or any of its Affiliates.

"Candidate" means any person introduced to the Client either directly or indirectly under this Agreement.

"Confidential Information" means any and all information provided by the Company to the Client or which it otherwise gains access to during the course of its performance under this agreement.

"<u>Data Protection Laws</u>" means all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations relating to the protection of Personal Information and privacy including without limitation applicable data breach notifications laws.

"Billable Salary" means the Candidate's first year gross remuneration package relative to their employment by the Client; including, but not limited to, the Candidate's annual base salary, bonuses (including sign-on, retention, performance and discretionary), and allowances.

"Introduction" an Introduction shall be deemed to have occurred when:

- a) a Candidate's curriculum vitae (CV), resume or any other form of application is provided to the Client by the Company;
- b) a Candidate's contact information (e.g. phone number, email address) is provided to the Client by the Company;
- c) the Company provides arrangements or otherwise facilitates an interview, meeting, assessment or evaluation involving a Candidate; or
- d) the Client is provided with any other non-public information regarding a Candidate which informs the Client's interest in such Candidate for current or future employment.

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"Loss" means any demand, contribution, claim, action, proceeding, liability, loss, damage, costs, expenses, tax, social security contributions (to the extent permitted by law) and charges and any related penalties, fines or interest whatsoever whether founded in statute, contract, tort or otherwise made or brought against or incurred (including without limitation all losses, liabilities and costs incurred as a result of defending or settling such claims).

"<u>Personal Information</u>" means any information that identifies, relates to, describes, or is capable of being associated with, an individual, including but not limited to, his or her name, signature, Social Security Number, address, telephone number, employment history and or financial information. Personal Information does not include any information that is lawfully made available to the general public from federal, state, or local government records.

"<u>Unauthorized Person(s)</u>" means any and all persons who are not party to this Agreement and not have official permission and or legal rights to access the Personal Information.

2. Terms and Conditions

- a) Unless otherwise specified in writing by the Company and the Client in an attached addendum or appendix, these terms and conditions shall govern all services undertaken on behalf of the Client for the position of Bridge Lead only and shall not override any framework agreement agreed. No amendments shall be made without the prior written agreement of an authorized representative of the Company. For the avoidance of doubt, amendments to this Agreement made either verbally or through emails shall not be considered part of this Agreement.
- b) The engagement of the Company by the Client to carry out services, including the Introduction of a Candidate to the Client, shall be deemed acceptance of and agreement to these terms and conditions by the Client.

3. Fees

- a) Fees will be charged to the Client by the Company for the Introduction of Candidate(s) that the Client Appoints for the purposes of employment. For such Candidate, the Client shall pay \$45,000 for City Engineer search in Marina, California.
- b) The Client has an obligation to immediately inform the Company of the Billable Salary after an offer of employment has been made to the Candidate by the Client.
- c) Unless otherwise agreed to by the Company, all fees are calculated and payable in United States Dollars (USD) and subject to any applicable taxes at the time of the invoice.
- d) For a period of twelve (12) months following the date of Introduction, should the Client employ, retain, or otherwise engage in a relationship with the Candidate, the Client maintains liability for the full fee(s) agreed.
- e) If the Company becomes aware that the Personal Information of any Candidate who was introduced to the Client by the Company is passed on by the Client to any third party with whom said Candidate is subsequently employed, the Client shall become liable for the relevant fee.
- f) A minimum charge of \$21,000 will apply to any engagement of a Candidate Introduced by the Company.
- g) If the Client offers a Candidate whom subsequently accepts the role, whereas the role is subject to the Client successfully procuring the appropriate work permit or visa, then the Client will be liable to pay the agreed fee regardless of the outcome of the award of the visa / work permit process.
- h) The Company shall be entitled to invoice the Client for any pre-approved expenses incurred by the Company in the performance of its services under this Agreement.

4. Invoicing and Payment

- a) The Client agrees to issue payment to the Company for invoices within fifteen (15) days from the date of the invoice.
- b) All amounts due under this Agreement shall be paid in full without deduction. For the avoidance of doubt, credits, set-offs, instalments, and or counterclaims are not permitted. The Client shall not be entitled to any

- credit, set-off or counterclaim against the Company in order to justify withholding payment of any such amount in whole or in part.
- c) For the avoidance of doubt, any fees due under this Agreement are due exclusive and net of any withholding or other taxes that may apply in the Client's jurisdiction. If any such withholding or other taxes are due, they are the responsibility of the Client and may not be deducted from the Fee due to the Company.
- d) Unless otherwise agreed, in writing, by the Company and Client, all amounts due under this Agreement shall be paid by electronic transfer (ACH) to the Company's bank account.
- e) The Company shall apply an overdue charge equal to 1% of the original invoice amount for each seven (7) day period beyond the net payment period that the invoice remains unpaid. If the Company incurs any legal costs as a result of non or late payment of the invoice, the Client shall become liable for such reasonable costs.
- f) The Client agrees that when the recruitment service has been satisfactorily supplied and an amendment to the invoice is required due to the provision of subsequent information at the direct request of the Client, the date of due payment will continue to be calculated from the date of the original invoice.

5. Rebate

a) If the Candidate's employment with the Client is terminated ("separation") within their first ninety (90) days, the Company will provide a replacement Candidate. If no replacement is made, the Company will provide a refund for an amount of the fee in accordance with the following schedule:

Days of Employment Before Separation	Percent of Fee Refundable
0 to 30 days	75%
31 to 60 days	50%
61 to 90 days	25%

- b) The Client shall not be entitled to a refund or replacement Candidate if:
 - i.) Candidate's separation is the result of a reduction in force (lay-off);
 - ii.) Candidate's separation is not related to his or her ability, integrity or character;
 - iii.) Client fails to pay the invoice in full within the time period specified in section 4(a);
 - iv.) Client fails to notify the Company in writing within fourteen (14) days of Candidate's separation; or
 - v.) Client withdraws an offer after the Candidate has accepted the offer, unless such withdrawal is the result of a written condition of said offer.

6. General Liabilities

- a) The Client acknowledges and agrees that it is their responsibility to determine the suitability of the Candidate for the relevant position, including (without limitation) to conduct reference checks and confirm work authorization. The Company takes no responsibility for the suitability, employment or the performance of any Candidate introduced or referred to the Client and makes no warranties, either expressed or implied, in respect thereof.
- b) The Company shall not, under any circumstances, be liable to the Client, or any other party, for any direct, indirect or consequential Loss, expense or damage of any kind (including, without limitation, Loss of profit) arising out of or in connection with this Agreement. For the avoidance of doubt, nothing in this Agreement shall exclude or limit the liability of the Company for intentionally fraudulent misrepresentations made by it.

7. General

7.1. Severability. In the event any of these terms are determined unlawful or invalid to any extent, it shall be severed from the remainder of this Agreement, which shall continue to be valid.

7.2. Third Party Rights. The rights and obligations of the Parties hereto shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon their permitted successors and assigns. This Agreement is for the exclusive benefit of the Company and Client, and there shall be no third party beneficiary to any of the provisions of this Agreement.

7.3. Data Protection

- a) Each Party warrants that it will comply with any applicable Data Protection Laws by implementing and maintaining sufficient security policies and practices to protect against the accidental loss, unauthorized access, acquisition, use, destruction, modification and/or disclosure of Personal Information that it receives from the other Party.
- b) The Client acknowledges that it shall receive Personal Information relating to Candidates under this Agreement and as part of the Introduction services. Therefore, the Client agrees to:
 - i.) Use the Personal Information of a Candidate only to the extent necessary to evaluate their suitability for employment;
 - ii.) Ensure that access to the Personal Information of Candidates is limited strictly to employees that need to access such Personal Information for the purpose of evaluating Candidates and that such employee(s) will be informed of the confidential nature of such Personal Information and Client's obligations hereunder;
 - iii.) Ensure that Personal Information is treated as strictly confidential; iv.) Ensure that Personal Information is not accessible by Unauthorized Persons;
 - v.) Immediately inform the Company upon becoming aware of suspected or actual accidental loss, and/or unauthorized access, acquisition, use, destruction, modification, or disclosure of Personal Information and assist the Company in complying with applicable data breach notification requirements, and;
 - vi.) Dispose of Personal Information in a manner that renders the Personal Information unreadable, unusable, and undecipherable.
- c) The Client shall indemnify the Company against any Losses, liabilities, damages, costs and expenses incurred by the Company as a result of any breach of these clauses by the Client.

7.4. Anti-Bribery

- a) The Client acknowledges and agrees that the Company will not tolerate bribery in any form in connection with the conduct of its business.
- b) The Client shall comply with all applicable laws, statutes, regulations, codes and guidance relating to antibribery and anti-corruption ("Anti-Bribery Laws"). Therefore, the Client agrees to:
 - i.) Not engage in any activity, practice or conduct which would constitute an offense under Anti-Bribery Laws; ii.) Not commit, or fail to act, in a way that could result in the Company to be in breach of the Anti-
 - Bribery Laws; iii.) Promptly report to the Company any request or demand for any undue financial or other advantage of any kind received by the Client in connection with the performance of this Agreement.
- c) The Client shall promptly notify the Company if at any time during the term of this Agreement its circumstances, knowledge or awareness changes such that it would not be able to repeat the warranties set out in these clauses.
- d) Breach of any of the Anti-Bribery clauses shall be deemed a material breach of this Agreement.
- e) The Client shall indemnify the Company against any Losses, liabilities, damages, costs and expenses incurred by the Company as a result of Client's breach of these clauses.

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7.5. Confidential Information

- a) All and any information provided by (or available from) the Company is confidential and must be kept in the strictest confidence by the Client.
- b) Such information may not be provided to or disclosed to any third party without the prior written consent of the Company.
- c) The Company will keep in strictest confidence any and all information provided to it by the Client which is marked as confidential.
- d) The Client shall treat the Personal Information of Candidates as strictly confidential and use it in compliance with the Data Protection Laws. The Client shall destroy or delete (to the extent technically feasible) a Candidate's Personal Information from all of its computer systems as soon as reasonably practicable in the event that: 1) the Client decides that a Candidate is unsuitable for a role; or 2) twelve (12) months have passed since the Company sent the Candidate's Personal Information to the Client and the Client has not requested an Introduction.
- e) The Client will indemnify the Company for a breach by the Client of this clause. The provisions of this clause will survive termination of this Agreement.
- **8. Force Majeure.** Neither Party shall be responsible for the failure to perform any obligation under the Agreement due to causes beyond its control, including but not limited to, natural disasters, acts of God, terrorism or such other event of similar nature, on the condition that it uses reasonable efforts to attempt to perform that obligation all the same. Any date for performance of that obligation will be extended by the time of the delay. If the failure continues for more than 30 days and the obligation that is not being performed is material, the Party whose performance is not affected may end the Agreement immediately upon notice to the other.
- 9. Dispute Resolution. Prior to initiating any legal action arising out of or relating to this Agreement, the Parties shall first attempt in good faith to resolve any dispute through mediation. Either Party may demand mediation by delivering written notice to the other Party. Mediation shall take place within the City of Marina or another location agreed upon in writing by the Parties, and shall be conducted by a mediator mutually selected by the Parties. Each Party shall bear its own costs and expenses of mediation, and shall share the mediator's fees equally. Participation in mediation is a condition precedent to the filing of any lawsuit or other legal proceeding.
- **10. Governing Law and Jurisdiction.** This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with laws of the state of New York. The courts of the state of New York are to have exclusive jurisdiction to settle any dispute, whether contractual or non-contractual, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement.

11. Assignment and Entire Agreement

a) These terms, including any addendum, set out the entire agreement between the Parties relating to the subject matter hereof and no other terms or representation other than set out in these terms have been relied

- upon or agreed between the Parties. These terms may only be amended by the written agreement of an authorized representative of both Parties.
- b) The Client shall not be entitled to assign, transfer or subcontract its obligations under this Agreement without the express written consent of the Company. For the avoidance of doubt, email authorization shall not constitute written consent.

On July 16, 2024, three (3) sealed bids were received, opened, and were publicly in-person.

At the regular meeting of August 7, 2024, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2024-87, authorizing the awarding of the contract to VSS International, Inc., for \$342,000 plus allocating \$180,514 for construction inspection, administration, contingency and project closeout.

ANALYSIS:

A budget amount of \$522,514 was approved for the Project. The final construction cost with two contract change orders was \$369,712.49. Contract change orders included adjustments to the design including additional crack sealing and reconciling quantities. The project cost of inspection and administrative services was \$129,214. Therefore, the final project costs for construction were \$498,926.49.

The project was completed within the allotted contract working days with a one-year maintenance period after the completion of construction within the roadway.

The Project is now complete. It is appropriate to accept these public improvements and to file a Notice of Completion for the project with the Monterey County Recorder's Office ("**EXHIBIT** A"). Following Council approval, the City will receive a one-year warranty bond for the project from the Contractor and release contract retention 35 days after the recording of the Notice of Completion.

I. Welcome and Introductions

Chair James Kyriaco and Vice-Chair Tamala Takahashi provided opening remarks and welcomed committee members.

II. Public Comment

Chair Kyriaco opened the meeting for public comment. There was no public comment.

III. General Briefing

The Cal Cities advocacy team compiled a <u>General Briefing Document</u>, which includes the latest on legislative and budgetary matters impacting cities.

IV. Presentation: California State Parks Pass Program

Marivel Barajas, Deputy Director of Legislative Affairs at the California Department of Parks and Recreation, gave an overview of the state park system. California is home to 280 park units, and the department works to create opportunities for high-quality outdoor recreation.

Adrian Contreras, Assistant Deputy Director of Park Operations with the department, joined to discuss the Governor's Outdoor Access for All program, which includes the State Adventure Pass, State Library Pass, and Golden Bear Pass. The <u>state parks pass programs</u> provide thousands of kids and their families free access to participating state parks.

Richard Rendon, Chief of Grants and Local Services, discussed the Community Engagement division, which seeks to increase access to parks by providing local funding opportunities. Since 2000, the division has provided \$4.4 billion in grant

funding throughout the state. Richard also gave an overview of the Statewide Park Program and the Outdoor Equity Program.

V. Presentation: Community Disaster Preparedness

Guest speaker Reva Feldman, Retired City Manager for the City of Malibu, spoke to the lived experience of working as a City Manager during a disaster. Reva provided information about how to build an effective disaster preparedness plan, which includes a reverse 911 notification system, personal wildfire action plans, and community safety expos to help inform the community. Reva discussed additional issues that cities face during an emergency, including loss of power and lack of communication, evacuation challenges, and strained fire and law enforcement resources.

Cal Cities staff Jolena Voorhis provided a legislative update on wildfire-related bills. For more information about disaster preparedness, Cal Cities has compiled a comprehensive list of <u>federal</u>, <u>state</u>, <u>and local resources</u> as well as an <u>Emergency Check List for cities</u>.

VI. Budget and Legislative Update

Caroline Grinder, Legislative Advocate, League of California Cities, provided a legislative update and gave an overview of Cal Cities' recovery housing sponsored bill package. Wendy Bucknum, Mayor Pro Tem of the City of Mission Viejo and cochair of the <u>California Sober Living and Recovery Task Force</u>, provided a brief overview of the task force and how to get more involved. More information on Cal Cities-sponsored bills can be found <u>here</u>.

The committee also received an overview of the Governor's <u>revised 2025-26 budget proposal</u>. The proposal included a budget of \$321 billion, with a \$12 billion budget deficit. As proposed, the budget would tap into reserves and would have out-year deficits. The proposal did not include new funding for homelessness and proposes a new State Housing and Homelessness Agency.

VII. Adjourn

Chair Kyriaco thanked members for attending the meeting and thanked staff for a productive year.

REQUEST:

It is requested that the City Council and Boards:

1. Consider receiving Investment Reports for the City of Marina, City of Marina as Successor Agency to the Marina Redevelopment Agency, and Preston Park Sustainable Community Non-Profit Corporation (PPSC-NPC) and Abrams B Non-Profit Corporation for the quarter ended June 30, 2025.

BACKGROUND:

Cash Management

At the end of the third quarter, the City's aggregate cash and investments were \$177.2 million. This represents an increase of \$8.5 million when compared to the prior quarter. The variance is attributed to interest gained on matured investments, a \$6.0 million grant reimbursement for the Imjin Road Widening Project, and receiving \$0.74 million in sales tax from the State.

The City's fiduciary funds, which consist of the Successor Agency to the Marina Redevelopment Agency and the Fort Ord Reuse Authority (FORA) bond reserve account, were \$9.1 million and \$4.5 million, respectively. The \$2.0 million increase in the FORA bond reserve account was the result of receiving the property pledged tax revenue. The \$2.0 million increase in the Successor Agency LAIF investment account represents the receipt of Redevelopment Property Tax Trust Fund revenues that will be used to support approved obligations.

The combined Preston and Abrams cash and investment balances were \$18.6 million. The quarterly increase of approximately \$0.6 million reflects on-going revenues and timing differences associated with expenditure.

Consistent with the City's investment strategy of capital preservation, the City has continued to maintain significant cash with the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF), US Treasury Bills, US Agency Bonds. The City has also recently invested in Certificates of Deposit which are secured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC).

An overview of City investments is presented below, with detailed information included in the attached reports.

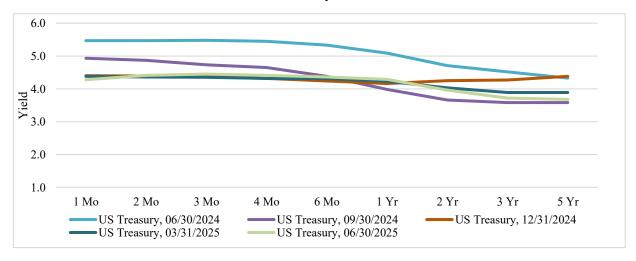

Interest Rate / Economy

The Federal Open Committee (FOMC) is the monetary policy making body of the Federal Reserve. Their goal is to achieve maximum employment, with a targeted 2% inflation rate. Interest rates have continued to range between 4.25% and 4.50% during the fourth quarter. Although there is continued uncertainty, the FOMC is still speculating that interest rates could fall in calendar year 2025 to between 3.75% - 4.00%.

The following chart shows the treasury yield curve and its shift from June 2024 to June 2025. The majority of the interest rates that were one year or less increased over the prior quarter, while rates associated with a longer-term investments decreased when compared to the prior quarter.

Chart 1 Treasury Yield Curve



Investment Performance

The quarterly LAIF interest rate was 4.27%, which represents a 0.6% decrease from the previous quarter. Changes in LAIF rates typically follow or are in close alignment with the federal funds lending rate. A history of how LAIF closely tracks with the upper federal funds limit is provided in Chart II. The City's investment portfolio includes US Treasuries, US Agency Bonds, Municipal Bonds, and FDIC Insured certificates of deposits. Most of these investments have maturity dates of less than two years. Their current combined market yield is close to 4.23%, which is just below the LAIF rate. While the return rates fluctuate with economic conditions, Chart I shows that the six-month and one-year treasury bill had a yield of 4.36% and 4.29%, respectively at June 30, 2025.

Chart II: LAIF Compared to Federal Funds Upper Limit Interest Rates

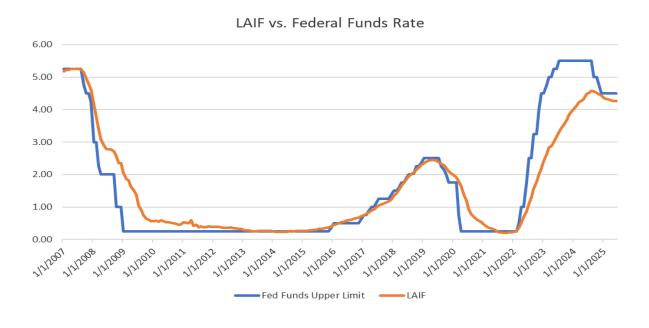

Portfolio Strategy

The prior fiscal year investment goal was to match or outperform LAIF. While this goal continues, staff also plans to evaluate cash flow needs to determine if it is prudent to purchase approved investments with terms of two to five years. This would allow the City to lock-in higher interest rates for a greater time horizon. This could be beneficial if there are continuing signs that interest rates will fall in calendar year 2025. In this current quarter, the City has approximately \$12.2 million in investments that will yield more than 4% interest over the next 3-5 years.

ANALYSIS:

The attached investment reports include the City of Marina's and the City of Marina as Successor Agency to the Marina Redevelopment Agency's and Preston & Abrams Non-Profit Corporation reports ("EXHIBIT A"). These include balances of City, Successor Agency and Preston Park / Abrams Park, and restricted FORA bond reserves that are held by financial institutions, as reported in their monthly statements.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no fiscal impact. This report is for informational purposes.

CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA RECEIVE THE HDL CITY OF MARINA SALES TAX UPDATE FOR THE PERIOD FROM JANUARY – MARCH 2025

REQUEST:

It is requested that the City Council and Boards:

1. Consider receiving the HdL City of Marina Sales Tax Update for the period from January – March 2025.

BACKGROUND:

In February 2025, the Finance Department introduced interim budget reporting to provide updates on the City's fiscal condition and assist with financial planning. The initial reports consisted of a Quarterly Budget Report and a City of Marina HdL Sales Tax Update. The Quarterly Budget Report provides information on the City's General Fund, Municipal Airport Fund, FORA Dissolution Fund, and the Public Facilities Impact Fee Fund. The HdL report includes information on local and state sales tax performance; the top twenty-five sales tax producers in the City, and sales tax activity by business type.

The City records revenues and expenditures that were applicable to Fiscal Year 2024-25 through the end of August. This includes tax revenues and vendor payments for June activities that were not received or billed until July or August. Typically, the City's Quarterly Budget Report is provided at the same time as the HdL Report; however, due to these year-end processes, this report will not be available until mid-September or early October.

ANALYSIS:

The City's most recent HdL Sales Tax Update is provided in Exhibit A. The reporting intervals on the HdL report differ from the City's records due to the City's use of accrual accounting; however, the information is a good indicator of the current local economic environment and sales tax performance.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no fiscal impact. This report is for informational purposes.

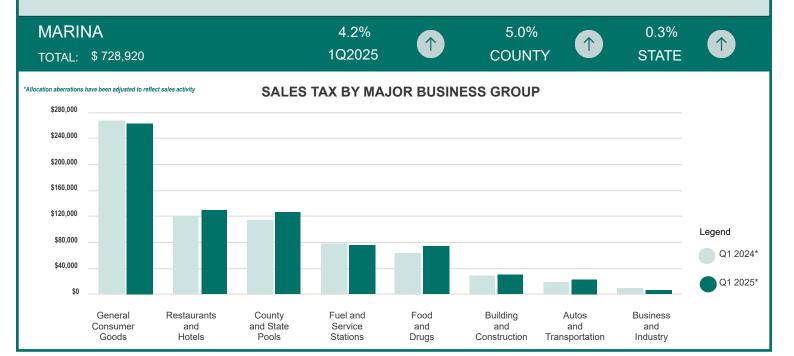

CITY OF MARINA HIGHLIGHTS

Marina's receipts from January through March were 1.7% above the first sales period in 2024. Excluding reporting aberrations, receipts for this period were up 4.2%.

The prior addition of several new businesses is reflected in the results as they continue to add value to the tax base. This was true for the fooddrug, general consumer goods, and restaurant groups. In addition, this period saw a minor surge in spending on transportation needs as consumers anticipate higher future prices from new tariffs.

the size of the use tax pool which came from new investments by commercial and industrial entities for the equipment and supplies they needed.

Measure N fared far better as all major business categories reported growth. except fuel-service stations. construction group saw the most growth as the importing of material for local projects ramped up with more concrete, lumber, and steel being acquired from outside sources.

Net of aberrations, taxable sales for all of Monterey County grew 5.0% over the comparable period while those of the The City also benefitted from growth in Central Coast region were up 3.3%.

STATEWIDE RESULTS

California's local one-cent sales and use tax receipts for January through March 2025 increased by 0.34% compared to the same quarter in 2024, after adjusting for accounting anomalies. While this modest growth may signal the end of an eight-quarter decline, it could be temporary, as the broader economy remains on the edge between recovery and further slowdown.

The first quarter is traditionally the lowest sales tax-generating period of the year, often influenced by seasonal weather and post-holiday consumer behavior.

Notably, the autos-transportation building-construction sectors-both of which had been dragging down statewide results over the past two years-showed the strongest rebounds this quarter. In the autos sector, used car sales and leasing activity led the recovery. Consumers are increasingly opting for more affordable vehicles and shorter-term commitments, moving away from high-end purchases. In construction, pent-up demand for repairs and improvements, especially in weatheraffected and wildfire-damaged areas like Southern California, drove strong sales for building material suppliers.

Other segments generating modest growth included business-industry and countywide use tax pools, largely due to continued strength in online sales. Sales of goods already in California before purchase are reported under business-industry fulfillment centers. Goods shipped from outside the state are reported under county pools, based on the destination of the out-of-state shipment. Online shopping remains a preferred option for value-conscious consumers, contributing significantly to tax receipts in these categories.

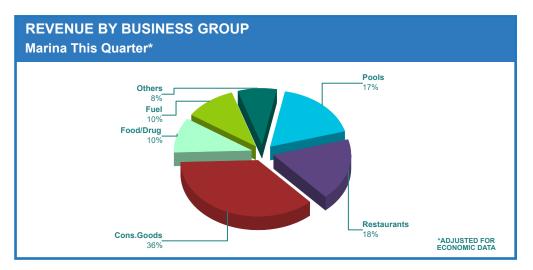
Calendar year 2024 saw a decline in fuel-

related tax receipts due to lower global crude oil prices—a trend that continued into 1Q 2025. Fuel-related returns dropped by 5%. This decline also affected general consumer goods, as large retailers that sell fuel typically report all sales under a single taxpayer ID. As a result, brick-and-mortar merchants such as post-holiday family apparel stores, winter sporting goods vendors and closures of variety stores contributed to weaker performance.

Although food-drugs is the smallest of the eight tax groupings, it was significant that cannabis returns continued a downturn trend that has been ongoing for over two years. Bankruptcies, customer shopping

alternatives and oversaturation of retail footprint diminished taxes coming from drug stores.

As 2025 begins, sales tax returns remain modest, reflecting broader economic volatility. Key factors influencing our outlook include: ongoing national tariff and trade negotiations and decisions on the federal funds rate - which directly affect consumer interest rates. Recent Middle East conflicts, which temporarily spiked crude oil prices and threatened local gas prices during the summer, will be a short-term concern. In summary, "uncertainty" remains the most accurate descriptor of California's current and future economic climate.

ORDINANCE NO. 2025-11

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE MARINA MUNICIPAL CODE (MMC), TITLE 17 BY ADDING SECTION 17.04.305 (GARDEN STRUCTURES), SECTION 17.42.060 (FENCES), AND CHAPTER 17.55 (STAFF APPROVALS AND PROCEDURES) AND AMENDING SECTIONS 17.42.020 (USE REGULATIONS), 17.42.055 (HEIGHT), AND 17.42.070 (YARDS) WITH CORRESPONDING UPDATES TO RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS (17.06, 17.08, 17.10, AND 17.12) IN THE MARINA MUNICIPAL CODE. THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS ARE EXEMPT FROM ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW PER SECTION 15061(B)(3) OF THE CEQA GUIDELINES.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The Community Development Dept. (CDD) of the City of Marina (City), through its regular use and implementation of the Marina Municipal Code (MMC), finds that targeted changes should be implemented to update and streamline the ordinance to better serve the community.
- 2. On April 10, 2025, the Planning Commission received an informational presentation on the proposed amendments to Marina Municipal Code Title 17 and gave their input.
 - 3. The proposed amendments include:
 - a. Modifying Title 17, Article 1 by adding Section 17.04.305 (Garden Structures) to Definitions;
 - b. Modifying Title 17, Article 2 by making changes to remove outdated language, update the residential districts with changes to height and permitted uses (17.06, 17.08, 17.10, and 17.12);
 - c. Modifying MMC Section 17.42.020 (Use Regulations) to allow beer and wine permits to be a staff level decision;
 - d. Modifying Title 17, Article 4 by changing Section 17.42.60 to be dedicated to Fences and renumbering Section 17.42.55 to be Height;
 - e. Modifying MMC Sections 17.42.060 (Fences), and 17.42.070 (Yards) to clarify the development standards and to allow changes to be reviewed administratively rather than with a variance; and
 - f. Modifying Title 17, Article 6 by adding Chapter 17.55 (Staff Approvals and Procedures) to provide a process for administrative review.
- 4. The proposed amendments to Chapter 17 of the MMC are consistent with Section 17.72 (Amendments).

5. Environmental. The proposed Ordinance amendments are not subject to environmental review pursuant to the State CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Article 5, Section 15061(b)(3) because the proposed procedural changes would not result in a direct or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment and the proposed ordinance is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have potential for causing significant effect on the environment. Therefore, the adoption of this ordinance is exempt from CEQA, and no further environmental review is necessary.

6. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect on thirty (30) days after its final passage and adoption.

7. Severability. If any portion of this Ordinance is found to be unconstitutional or invalid the City Council hereby declares that it would have enacted the remainder of this Ordinance regardless of the absence of any such invalid part.

8. Posting of Ordinance. Within fifteen (15) days after the passage of this Ordinance, the City Clerk shall cause it to be posted in the three (3) public places designated by resolution of the City Council.

Chapter 17.04 DEFINITIONS

Sections:

17.04.305 Garden Structures.

17.04.305 Garden Structures.

"Garden structures" includes arbors, trellises, pergolas, arches, and other similar open structures that are primarily designed to support the growth of plants or to provide shade and shelter in a garden or yard. Garden structures do not include accessory buildings, gazebos with a solid roof and floor, cisterns, hot tubs, fountains, walls, fences, hedges, and other similar features. The area of a garden structure area is calculated from the structure's largest horizontal dimensions.

Chapter 17.06 R-1 OR SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT

17.06.030 R-1—Conditional uses.

Uses permitted, subject to first securing a use permit in each case, or in the Coastal Zone, a coastal permit, in the R-1 districts shall be as follows:

A. Public and quasi-public uses and buildings, including churches, firehouses, hospitals, parks and playgrounds, community or recreational centers, schools (public and parochial), or schools accredited to the state school system and public utility buildings and uses exclusive of corporate, storage or repair yards.

B. Private stables, subject to Section 17.42.030.

- EB. Large residential care homes. Approval shall be pursuant to Section <u>17.58.040</u> (Use permit action by appropriate authority).
- DC. Condominium and/or planned development projects, subject to the provisions of Chapter 17.66.
- D. Day care centers as defined in Section 17.04.211 and licensed under Title 22, Division 12 of the California Code of Regulations, as may be amended.

17.06.040 Accessory buildings, structures and uses.

Accessory buildings not intended for living purposes and accessory structures and uses permitted in the R-1 districts shall be on the same building site with, and of a nature customarily incidental and subordinate to, the principal use, structure or building including, but not limited to:

- A. Portable recreation structures;
- B. Detached sheds, garages, workrooms, and other outbuildings in compliance with the limitations contained in Section 17.42.070;
- C. Non-portable recreation structures located in a yard area screened from public and private streets; and-
- D. Garden structures subject to Section 17.42.060 Paragraph H.

17.06.050 Building height.

- A. Maximum building height limit in the R-1 districts shall be thirty feet for main buildings and sixteen feet for accessory buildings not intended for living purposes, except that approval by the planning commission Community Development Director shall be obtained prior to the construction of any accessory building over twelve feet in height, or if any portion within five feet of any lot line is over ten feet in height. Any action taken by the planning commission Community Development Director may be appealed, in writing, to the planning commission within ten days of such action.
- B. The maximum building heights for accessory dwelling units shall be governed by the provisions of Section <u>17.42.040</u>.
- C. The maximum building heights for public and quasi-public uses and buildings, including churches, firehouses, hospitals, parks and playgrounds, community or recreational centers, schools (public and parochial), or schools accredited to the state school system and public utility buildings and uses exclusive of corporate, storage or repair yards is forty feet.

Chapter 17.08 R-2 OR DUPLEX RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT

17.08.040 Accessory buildings, structures and uses.

Accessory buildings not intended for living purposes and accessory structures and uses permitted in the R-2 districts shall be on the same building site with, and of a nature customarily incidental and subordinate to, the principal use, structure or building including, but not limited to:

- A. Portable recreation structures;
- B. Detached sheds, garages, workrooms, and other outbuildings, in compliance with the limitations contained in Section <u>17.42.070</u>;
- C. Non-portable recreation structures located in a yard area screened from public and private streets; and
- D. Garden structures subject to Section 17.42.060 Paragraph H.

17.08.050 Building height.

- A. Maximum building height limit in the R-2 districts shall be thirty feet for main buildings and sixteen feet for accessory buildings not intended for living purposes, except that approval by the Community Development Director planning commission shall be obtained prior to the construction of any accessory building over twelve feet in height, or if any portion within five feet of any lot line is over ten feet in height. Any action taken by the Community Development Director planning commission may be appealed, in writing, to the planning commission within ten days of such action. Any action taken by the planning commission Community Development Director may be appealed, in writing, to the planning commission within ten days of such action.
- B. The maximum building heights for accessory dwelling units shall be governed by the provisions of Section <u>17.42.040</u>.

Chapter 17.10 R-3 OR LIMITED MULTIPLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT

17.10.040 Accessory buildings, structures and uses.

Accessory buildings not intended for living purposes and accessory structures and uses permitted in the R-3 districts shall be on the same building site with, and of a nature customarily incidental and subordinate to, the principal use, structure or building including, but not limited to:

- A. Portable recreation structures;
- B. Detached sheds, garages, workrooms, and other outbuildings, in compliance with the limitations contained in Section 17.42.070;
- C. Non-portable recreation structures located in a yard area screened from public and private streets; and
- D. Garden structures subject to Section 17.42.060 Paragraph H.

17.10.050 Building height.

A. Maximum building height limit in the R-3 districts shall be thirty-five (35) feet and three stories for main buildings. The height limit for accessory buildings not intended for living purposes shall be sixteen feet, except that approval by the Community Development Director shall be obtained prior to the construction of any accessory building over twelve feet in height. Any action taken by the Community Development Director may be appealed, in writing, to the planning commission within ten days of such action.

<u>B.</u> The maximum building heights for accessory dwelling units shall be governed by the provisions of Section <u>17.42.040</u>.

Chapter 17.12 R-4 OR MULTIPLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT

17.12.050 Accessory buildings, structures and uses.

Accessory buildings not intended for living purposes and accessory structures and uses permitted in the R-4 districts shall be on the same building site with, and of a nature customarily incidental and subordinate to, the principal use, structure or building including, but not limited to:

- A. Portable recreation structures;
- B. Detached sheds, garages, workrooms, and other outbuildings, in compliance with the limitations contained in Section 17.42.070;
- C. Non-portable recreation structures located in a yard area screened from public and private streets; and
- D. Garden structures subject to Section 17.42.060 Paragraph H.

17.12.060 Building height.

A. The maximum building height limit in the R-4 district shall be forty-two feet and three-four stories- for main buildings. The height limit for accessory buildings not intended for living purposes shall be sixteen feet, except that approval by the Community Development Director shall be obtained prior to the construction of any accessory building over twelve feet in height. Any action taken by the Community Development Director may be appealed, in writing, to the planning commission within ten days of such action.

B. The maximum building heights for accessory dwelling units shall be governed by the provisions of Section <u>17.42.040</u>.

Chapter 17.42GENERAL ZONING REGULATIONS

17.42.020 Use regulations.

- A. No dancehall, roadhouse, nightclub, commercial club, establishment or business where alcoholic beverages are served or sold for off-sale consumption, commercial place of amusement or recreation, including but not limited to an amusement center or arcade, or place where entertainers are provided whether as social companions or otherwise, shall be established in any zoning district in the city unless a use permit is first secured in each case. <u>Incidental beer and wine, when served with food or sold with groceries, shall require an Administrative Use Permit pursuant to Chapter 17.55.</u>
- B. A finding of public convenience or necessity is required for an establishment or business where alcoholic beverages are served or sold for on- and/or off-sale consumption, except when incidental and in combination with food or groceries and within an area of undue concentration as determined by Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC). Such finding shall require that selling of alcohol for on- and/or off-sale consumption at the subject establishment of business:
 - 1. Will not constitute a public nuisance;
 - 2. Will not occur within five hundred feet of a park or school or place of public assembly;
 - 3. Will not contribute to law enforcement problems associated with an undue concentration of on- and/or off-sale licenses in the vicinity of the subject business or establishment.

17.42.060055 Height.

- A. Chimneys, vents, cupolas, spires, and other architectural or mechanical appurtenances may be erected to a greater height than the limit established for the district in which the building is located, except in the Coastal Zone where the height of such structures shall be subject to a coastal permit.
- B. Towers, poles, water tanks, and similar structures may be erected to a greater height than the limit established for the district in which they are to be located, subject to securing a use permit and, in the Coastal Zone, a coastal permit in each case.

17.42.060 Fences.

<u>CA</u>. In any required front yard or in any required exterior side yard or any side yard abutting a street, separate fences and retaining walls shall not exceed three and one-half feet in height and fences combined with retaining walls shall not exceed a combined height of four and one-half

feet with the retaining wall not exceeding one foottwo feet in height, all subject to modifications in subsections G-C and HD of this section. Maximum height limitations may be exceeded to six feet in height for fences, retaining walls and for combination of fences and retaining walls as determined necessary for public safety, privacy, or security subject to the approval of the Community Development Director or by the planning commission on appeal. The review authority may require alternative materials, segmented retaining walls, landscaping or other measures to mitigate the visual impacts of proposed fences and/or retaining walls or any combination thereof.

D. NOTE: Retaining walls exceeding thirty inches in height are required to meet all Uniform Building Code (UBC) requirements. All persons planning to install a retaining wall should check with the Marina Building Division prior to installing a retaining wall. Retaining walls that exceed thirty inches in height above grade are required to install a thirty-six-inch (three foot) tall guardrail on top of the retaining wall for safety reasons. The Marina Building Department shall determine when a guardrail is required. This note is provided for informational purposes only. It is not a quote from the UBC.

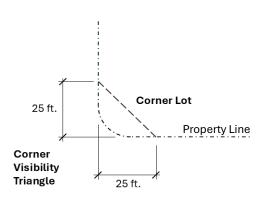
EB. In any required rear yard or in any required interior side yard or any required side yard not abutting a street, separate fences and separate retaining walls shall not exceed six feet in height, and fences combined with retaining walls shall not exceed a combined height of nine feet with the retaining wall not exceeding three four feet in height. Maximum height limitations may be exceeded to eight feet total height for fences and retaining walls and up to 12 feet in total height for combination of fences and retaining walls as determined necessary for public safety, privacy, or security subject to the approval of the Community Development Director or by the planning commission on appeal. The review authority may require alternative materials, segmented retaining walls, landscaping or other measures to mitigate the visual impacts of proposed fences and/or retaining walls or any combination thereof. Other factors in allowing a height exception include (1) to provide satisfactory visual or sound isolation of sensitive land uses from commercial activities such as contractors yards, loading docks and similar commercial activities or (2) to provide reasonable security for areas approved for outdoor storage of equipment or material associated with approved contractor's yards to restrict unauthorized access to facilities that might be dangerous or hazardous or (3) to minimize grading and/or tree removal impacts.

FC. All heights referenced in subsections C-A and D-B of this section shall be measured from the finished ground elevation at the base of a separate fence and from the finished ground elevation at the base of the lower side of a separate retaining wall or a combined retaining wall and fence. A fence or a wall shall be considered a separate fence or a separate wall when the face of the fence and the face of the retaining wall are separated by a minimum three-foot horizontal distance or are located on separate building sites.

DG. The heights of fence columns may extend a maximum of six inches above the maximum height otherwise allowed by the height limitations described aboveherein. The height of arbors integrated into the design of a fence and incorporating a pedestrian opening in the fence may exceed the height limitations described aboveherein, provided the height of such an arbor does not exceed a height of twelve feet above the height of the finished ground elevation at the pedestrian opening.

E. As provided in Section 10.70.010 of the Marina Municipal Code Chapter 10.70 (Visibility at Intersections), corner parcels shall be developed in a manner that ensures unrestricted visibility across the corners of the intersecting streets, alleys, and private driveways.

1. The corner vision triangle area is a triangular-shaped area on a corner parcel formed by measuring the prescribed distance from the intersection of the front and street side property lines, an intersecting alley, or an intersecting driveway and connecting the lines diagonally across the property making a 90-degree triangle. See figure below.



2. The dimensions of a corner vision triangle are 25 feet from the intersection of two public or private street rights-of-way.

3. It is illegal to erect, place, plant, or allow to grow within the corner vision triangle area.

- a. Fences, walls, signs, accessory structures, mounds of earth, advertising matter, storage area, merchandise display area or other visual obstructions over 30 inches in height;
- b. Hedges, shrubbery, and vegetation over or with a growth characteristic over 30 inches in height; and
- c. <u>Tree canopies maintained at a height less than seven feet above ground level, as measured from adjacent street curb elevation.</u>

- H. Maximum height limitations as otherwise required above may be exceeded determined necessary by the planning commission on appeal (1) to provide satisfactory visual or sound isolation of sensitive land uses from commercial activities such as contractors yards, loading docks and similar commercial activities or (2) to provide reasonable security for areas approved for outdoor storage of equipment or material associated with approved contractor's yards to restrict unauthorized access to facilities that might be dangerous or hazardous.
- GI. Master fence plans for subdivisions of five units/lots or more shall be reviewed as part of the entitlement process. Master fence plans for minor subdivisions may, at the discretion of the applicant, be reviewed as part of the entitlement process. Master fence plans may deviate from the fence regulations stated herein if the Development Director or planning commission makes findings that the proposed fences provide public safety, privacy or security and are aesthetically pleasing from the street side view (findings are listed in order of importance). The Development Director or planning commission may require landscaping or other measures to mitigate the visual impacts of proposed fences and/or retaining walls or any combination thereof.

H. Garden structures are allowed, subject to the following standards:

- 1. A garden structure shall not encroach onto a public right-of-way.
- 2. <u>If a garden structure has an area of 36 square feet or less, it may have a solid roof. If a garden structure has an area greater than 36 square feet, its roof shall be at least half open to the elements, with no solid roof portion greater in area than 36 square feet.</u>
- 3. A garden structure 100 square feet or less in area may encroach into a required side yard or rear yard setback, but if greater than six feet in height, shall be located at least three feet from the property line, with the following exceptions:
 - a. If the property line faces a street or alley, one garden structure, over a gate or walkway, shall be allowed on the outward-facing property line. Such structures shall be no more than 24 square feet in area and shall be nine feet or less in height.
 - b. In each side yard setback, a single garden structure over a gate or walkway is allowed to encroach up to the property line. Such structures shall be nine feet or less in height, and shall not have a depth greater than two feet.
- 4. <u>In required front yard setbacks</u>, one garden structure is allowed over a gate or walkway. Such structures shall be no more than 24 square feet in area with a height of nine feet or less and may be located either in the setback or on the front property line.
- 5. <u>Vertical trellises that serve the same function as a fence shall be treated as a fence under MMC 17.42.060.</u>

6. Garden structures exceeding these standards may be allowed with an administrative design review pursuant to Section 17.55.030. Garden structures outside of required setbacks do not require a planning permit.

I. Prohibited Materials

- 1. Fences in any district may not contain strands of barbed or razor wire, sharp or jagged glass, sharp or jagged metal components (e.g., razor-spikes), or similar materials. The only exception shall be for properties that contain a public safety hazard such as a power plant, facilities with hazardous materials or as determined by the Community Development Director, which must receive an Administrative Use Permit.
- 2. Prohibited fence materials on an existing fence may not be expanded or repaired. Further, all prohibited fence materials must be removed within one year of the feature becoming non-conforming.
- J. Temporary fencing to secure and/or screen a property may be authorized by the Community Development Director or their designee on vacant lots, lots with an active building permit or a blighted property as defined in MMC Chapter 8.70 (Public Nuisance).
- K. Gated communities shall not be allowed as part of a development application.

K. In the R-1 district, on a corner lot created prior to January 7, 1997, fences, retaining walls or combined retaining walls/fences are subject to the pre-January 7, 1997, fence regulations listed below:

- 1. Fences. Maximum height of six feet measured from the lowest ground elevation at wall, fence or screen planting or one foot above the lowest ground elevation with a three-foot horizontal distance from said wall, fence or screen planting, whichever measurement point results in the greater height;
- 2. Combined Retaining Wall/Fence. Maximum height of eight feet measured from the lowest ground elevation at wall, fence or screen planting or one foot above the lowest ground elevation within a three-foot horizontal distance from said wall, fence or screen planting, whichever measurement point results in the greater height;
- 3. No required side yard fence setbacks.

17.42.070 Yards.

A. In any case, where an official plan line has been established as a part of the street and highway master plan, the required yards on the street side shall be measured from such official plan lines and in no case shall the provisions of this title be construed as permitting any structures to extend beyond such building line.

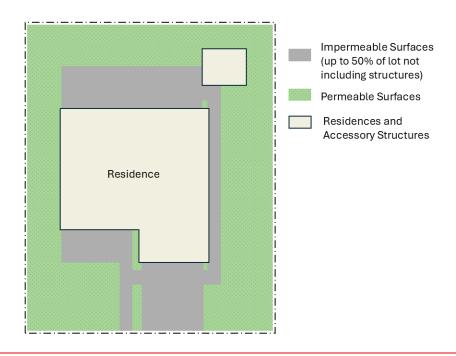
- B. Cornices, eaves, canopies, and similar architectural features may extend into any required yard not exceeding two and one-half feet.
- C. Uncovered porches, or stairways, fire escapes or landing places may extend into any required front or rear yard not exceeding six feet, and into any required side yard not exceeding three feet. Covered porches on interior lots may extend into the required front yard not exceeding six feet and sixty square feet. Covered porches on corner lots may extend into any combination of the required front yard and the required exterior side yard not exceeding six feet and a total area of one hundred twenty square feet.
- D. In any R or K district, where fifty percent or more of the building sites on any one block or portion thereof in the same district have been improved with buildings, the required front yard shall be of a depth equal to the average of the front yards of the improved building sites, to a maximum of that specified for the district in which such building site is located.
- E. In case a dwelling is to be located so that the front or rear thereof faces any side lot line, such dwelling shall not be less than ten feet from such lot line.
- F. In case a building site is less than sixty feet in width, side yards equal to ten percent of the lot width but not less than five feet shall be required, except in C or M districts.
- G. In the case of a corner lot adjacent to a key lot, the required side yard on the street side for any building within twenty-five feet of the side line of the key lot shall be equal to the front yard required on the key lot, and if more than twenty-five feet from such side line, the required side yard shall be fifty percent of the front yard required on the key lot.
- H. In case an accessory building is attached to the main building it shall be made structurally a part thereof and shall comply in all respects with the requirements of this title applicable to the main building.
- I. Except as otherwise provided in subsection \underline{J} of this section, detached accessory buildings not for living purposes shall not be located:
 - 1. Within six five feet from the main building;
 - 2. Within fifty feet from the front property line; Within the front one-half of the lot; 3. Within six feet from the sidelines of the front one-half of the lot;
 - 4. Within six feet of the sidelines of the front one-half of any adjacent lot;
 - 3. Within 10 feet of a street side-yard setback;
 - 54. Within one four feetfoot of any lot line of the rear one-half of the lot;

- 65. So as to encroach on any easement or right-of-way of record;
- $\frac{76}{10}$. Within six feet of an alley from which the building has access.
- J. The location of accessory buildings not for living purposes may only exceed Notwithstanding the limitations of subsection I of this section subject to an administrative use permit. The Community Development Director or the planning commission on appeal may require landscaping or other measures to mitigate the visual impacts of accessory buildings. detached accessory buildings with a projected roof area of less than one hundred twenty square feet as defined in the Marina building code, a height not exceeding eight feet, and on a building site used exclusively for single-family dwelling purposes in any residential district may be constructed or placed on the site as long as it is:
- 1. Located at least three feet from the main building or perimeter fence; and
- 2. Located within that portion of the site which is separated from the public way by the main building or by a minimum five foot-high fence.
- K. In case of a lot abutting upon two or more streets, the main building and accessory buildings shall not be erected so as to encroach upon the front yard or the exterior side yard required on any of the streets.
- L. Notwithstanding any requirements in this section, in cases where the elevation of the front half of the lot at a point fifty feet from the centerline of the traveled roadway is seven feet above or below the grade of the centerline, a private garage attached or detached may be built to within five feet of the front line of the lot.
- M. Nothing contained in the general provisions shall be deemed to reduce special yard requirements as set forth in the regulations for any R or K districts.
- N. Structures, except utility poles and utility equipment appurtenant thereto, shall not be located so as to encroach on any utility or road easement or right-of-way.
- O. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsections \underline{B} , \underline{C} and \underline{H} of this section, porches, decks and patios exceeding a height of eighteen inches and attached to the main building, and patio covers attached to the main building, may extend into the required rear yard and together with other buildings on the lot may occupy an area greater than the maximum site coverage allowed in the district in which it is located, except as follows:
 - 1. The structures shall not extend more than ten feet into the required rear yard and shall not occupy an area of the required rear yard exceeding two hundred square feet.

- 2. The finished floor surface shall not exceed five feet in height and the patio cover is a single story structure not exceeding sixteen feet in height.
- 3. If the structure is enclosed by walls, the walls may have any configuration, provided the open area of the longer wall and one additional wall is equal to at least sixty-five percent of the area of each respective wall below a minimum of six feet eight inches measured from the floor.
- 4. Wall openings may be enclosed with insect screening, plastic or glass. The plastic or glass shall be readily removable, translucent or transparent and not exceed a thickness provided by the current edition of the Uniform Building Code.
- 5. Patio covers shall be used only for recreational and outdoor living purposes and not as carports, garages, storage rooms, commercial or business space or habitable space as defined by the current edition of the Uniform Building Code.
- P. Stormwater Runoff Limitations. Impermeable surfacing may not exceed the stormwater runoff design for the parcel or lot and must not cause runoff to affect adjacent property.

 Properties located in residential districts shall not cover the front, side or rear yards not including buildings and accessory structures with impermeable surfaces such as concrete, asphalt or hardscape more than 50% of the yard including the driveway and all pathways, unless approved by the Community Development Director. To exceed this standard, applicants must include calculations by a registered civil engineer demonstrating consistency with onsite stormwater retention subject to review by the City Engineer.

17.55.010 Purpose.

This section establishes procedures and findings for the issuance of, and effective time periods for, staff-approved permits. No public hearings are held unless a request for a hearing is submitted or the Community Development Director refers it to the hearing authority. The intent of this section is to ensure that planning permits are in compliance with the general plan, local coastal program, objective design review, specific plans and these regulations, and are issued quickly yet allow for public input.

17.55.020 Types of Staff Approvals and Related Review Authorities.

Table 17.55.020.1 below, entitles "Types of Review and Roles of Review Authorities," identifies the city official or body responsible for reviewing and making decisions on community development permit applications, legislative amendments, and other actions required by these regulations.

- 1. "Decision" means that the review authority makes the decision on the matter; "appeal" means that the review authority may consider and decide upon appeals to the decision of an earlier decision-making body, in compliance with MMC Chapter 17.70 (Appeals).

17.55.030 Applicability.

The Community Development Director or designee is the decision-making authority for the following community development permits:

- 1. Administrative Design Review Permits.
 - a. Administrative Design Review Permits as described in Table 17.56.030.
 - b. <u>In all residential zoning districts</u>, administrative design review permits may be granted for the following:
 - i. <u>Detached accessory structures not intended for living that are 12 feet to 16 feet in height in the R-1 District;</u>
 - ii. Structures, fences, retaining walls, or other visual obstructions in excess of height limits under MMC Section 17.42.060.F;
 - iii. Covering the yard outside of buildings and accessory structures with more than 50% with asphalt, concrete, or hardscape; and
 - iv. Garden structures exceeding the standards required by MMC 17.42.060 Paragraph J.
- 2. Design Review Changes. Once a Planning Commission design review permit or an administrative design review permit, outside the coastal zone, has been approved, but before the associated building permit becomes final, changes up to ten percent that modify the exterior design, height or setback of the project shall be processed as an administrative design change; provided, that cumulative design changes to a prior design review permit or administrative design review permit shall not appreciably alter the originally approved design.
- 3. <u>Administrative subdivisions. The following subdivision map changes shall be reviewed at the staff level, in accordance with Title 16, Subdivisions:</u>
 - a. <u>Lot mergers</u>, in accordance with this section and the procedures in MMC Chapter 16.12.
 - b. Reversion to acreage, in accordance with this section and the procedures in MMC Chapter 16.14.
 - c. Parcel maps, in accordance with this section and the procedures in MMC Chapter 16.18.
 - d. Lot line adjustments, in accordance with this section and the procedures in MMC Chapter 16.20.
 - e. <u>Certificates of compliance, in accordance with this section and the procedures in MMC Chapter 16.22.</u>
- 4. <u>Administrative Sign Permit. An administrative sign permit may be granted for compliant signs as described in Section 17.46.050.</u>

- 5. <u>Administrative Use Permits. Administrative use permits and administrative use permit</u> amendments may be granted for the following:
 - a. Beer and wine when served with food or sold with groceries.
 - b. Detached or semi-detached accessory rooms within the R-1 district;
 - c. <u>Detached accessory structures not intended for living that exceed the limitations in Section 17.42.070 as allowed in Paragraph J;</u>
 - d. Temporary use permits;
 - e. <u>Barbed or razor wire affixed to the top of a fence for properties with public safety hazards;</u>
 - f. Wireless eligible facilities requests (for modification of previously permitted wireless telecommunications facilities); and
 - g. <u>Uses similar in nature as listed above as determined by the Community Development Director.</u>
- 6. <u>Minor Variances. Administrative variances and administrative variance amendments may be granted for the following:</u>
 - a. Reductions in required yards or setbacks that are ten percent or less of the required distance;
 - b. <u>Increases in maximum front yard setbacks</u>;
 - c. <u>Increases in allowable building site coverage of ten percent or less for additions to an existing structure;</u>
 - d. The occupancy of any part of a required side or front yard by a parking pad;
 - e. Fences or retaining walls over 8 feet in height up to 12 feet in height; and
 - f. Fences and retaining walls in combination over 12 feet up to 16 feet in height.

17.55.040 Review Process.

<u>Upon submittal of one of the community development permit applications listed in this section, the department shall process it in accordance with the following:</u>

- 1. Staff reviews the proposed project for compliance with the general plan, certified local coastal program, these regulations, and other applicable conditions and regulations.
- 2. The Community Development Director issues a notice of administrative decision, pursuant to the procedures in 17.55.080, or determines that the permit application presents issues of sufficient public concern to warrant a public hearing and refers the application directly to the appropriate hearing authority. The hearing authority decision may be appealed in accordance with Chapter 17.70 (Appeals).
- 3. If no written request for a hearing is received by the department within 10 days of the issuance of the notice of administrative decision, then the action of the director is final.

17.55.050 Review Criteria.

For design review projects, the review criteria in MMC 17.56 and in Marina's Objective Design Standards shall apply.

17.55.060 Findings Required for Approval.

Permit applications under this section shall be approved or approved with conditions, only if the review authority first makes all the following applicable findings:

- 1. Findings for All Staff Approvals
 - a. The proposed development conforms to the applicable provisions of the general plan, the local coastal program, any applicable specific plan, and these regulations;
 - b. The proposed development is located on a legally created lot;
 - c. The subject property is otherwise in compliance with all applicable laws, regulations, and rules pertaining to uses, subdivision, setbacks, and any other applicable provisions of this municipal code, and all applicable zoning violation enforcement and processing fees have been paid; and
 - d. The proposed development is in compliance with all citywide permits, including, but not limited to, the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit.
- 2. Additional Findings for Administrative Use Permits and Variances.
 - a. The findings in MMC 17.58.040 shall apply to administrative use permits;
 - b. Additional Finding for Administrative Use Permits for Fences, Deer Fences, and Garden Structures. The proposed fencing, and/or garden structure, will be in keeping with the neighborhood and will not obstruct views, air or light from the adjoining public street(s) without there being unique or exceptional circumstances of the property to warrant it; and
 - c. The findings in MMC 17.60.030 shall apply to administrative variances.
- 3. Administrative Use Permit (AUP) Findings for Wireless Eligible Facilities Requests.
 - a. The proposed wireless telecommunications facility qualifies as a wireless eligible facilities request, satisfying each element specified in 47 CFR

 Sections 1.6001 through 1.6100, as may be amended.
 - b. The proposed wireless telecommunications facility complies with applicable safety codes and guidelines, and FCC regulations governing radiofrequency emissions.

17.55.070 Effective Date of Decision.

The decision shall become effective only when:

- 1. The 10-day request for hearing period has expired, or the appeal period following a hearing authority decision has expired or, if appealed in accordance with Chapter 17.70; and
- 2. All necessary prior approvals have been obtained.

17.55.080 Notice of administrative decision procedure.

Notice of an administrative decision to approve a community development permit shall be given as follows:

- (a) <u>Contents of Notice</u>. The contents of a notice of administrative decision shall be as <u>follows:</u>
 - a. <u>Hearing Information</u>. A brief description of the city's general procedure concerning the conduct of hearings and decisions; and the phone number and street address of the department, where an interested person could call or visit to obtain additional information;
 - b. Project Information. The date of filing of the application and the name of the applicant; the city's file number assigned to the application; a general explanation of the matter to be considered; and a general description, in text and/or by diagram, of the location of the property that is the subject of the hearing;
 - c. Coastal Zone Information. If the proposed development is within the coastal zone, the notice shall also include a statement that the development is within the coastal zone.
- (b) Method of Notice Distribution. A notice of administrative decision shall be given as follows:
 - (1) Mailed notice for administrative permits as referenced herein shall be provided to:
 - (A) Owners of all property that are abutting the exterior boundaries of the subject lot. The names and addresses used for such notice shall be those appearing on the equalized county assessment roll, as updated from time to time; and
 - (B) Any person who has filed a written request for notice with the department and has paid the required fee for the notice.
 - (2) Posting. The department shall conspicuously post notice on the subject lot in a location that can be viewed from the nearest street. If the subject lot is a through lot, a notice shall be conspicuously posted adjacent to each street frontage in a location that can be viewed from the street.
 - (3) Timeline. The notice shall be mailed and posted at least 10 days before an action by the Community Development Director or their designee to approve a community development permit.
 - (4) Duration of Posting. The notice shall be continuously posted from the date required by subsection (b)(3) of this section until the effective date of the Community Development Director or their designee's decision to approve, or approve with conditions, the community development permit.
 - (5) Provide Comment. Members of the public may provide comments during the 10 days prior to the approval by the Community Development Director or their designee.

<u>CITY COUNCIL CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2025-,</u> <u>AMENDING THE MASTER FEE SCHEDULE</u>

REOUEST:

It is requested that the City Council consider:

1. Adopting Resolution No. 2025-, amending the City's Master Fee Schedule to reflect adjustments by the Consumer Price Index (CPI) to reflect inflation, new fees, and certain other charges.

The City provides a variety of services to the community. Some of the services provide a global benefit to the overall community, while other services provide direct benefits to individuals or specific groups. An overview is provided below:

Global Community Benefit	Global and Individual /Group Benefit	Individual or Group Benefit
Police	Recreation and cultural services	Building permits

The City has the ability to recover "user" fees that provide benefits to individuals or groups; however, the fees cannot exceed the reasonable cost of providing the service. In Fiscal Year 2023-24, the City conducted a comprehensive "user" fee study. The goal of the study was to identify the full cost of providing these services, which includes the calculation of overhead. This would assist the City in determining the appropriate cost-recovery levels, and minimize the use of tax dollars to subsidize certain services. The recommended fees were adopted on July 2, 2024, and became effective on September 1, 2024 (EXHIBIT A).

ANALYSIS:

Comprehensive fee studies are initiated to revisit the complete analytical fee structure, service level estimates and assumptions; and to account for any major shifts or changes within an organization. Typically, comprehensive studies are not prepared every year. The City's Municipal Code, Section 3.240 (B), indicates that the City Manager, Finance Director, and each City Department Head, shall review annually the fees and services charges and provide an adjusted fee or charge schedule to the City Council for its consideration so as the recovery costs reasonably borne for the service. While the City's goal is to conduct fee studies every five years, a process has not been established to update the fees between studies. Adjusting the fee schedule annually will assist the City in recovering costs associated with inflation or employee cost of living adjustments. It will also provide a mechanism to gradually increase fees over time, rather than incorporating a potential significant adjustment in the fifth year.

Staff discussed interim methods for adjusting fees with the City's fee study consultant. The most common method for adjusting fees between studies is to reference a published industry standard, such as the Consumer Price Index (CPI). An alternate method could be to reference known employee cost of living increases, since a significant portion of the fees relate to staff time. To align future fee

effective dates with the annual budget process, staff is recommending referencing the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for San Francisco-Oakland-Hayward, California for the 12-month period from February to February. This would provide staff with the opportunity to bring the proposed fees to Council in April, with the fees becoming effective after 60 days or at the beginning of each fiscal year. This proposed method of using the CPI index and the referenced time period are also used for Preston Park and Abrams Park to calculate rent increases, which are brought forward as part of the budget process.

The proposed fees, along with a comparison to the existing fees are included in **EXHIBIT B**. Most proposed fees include a 2.7% increase, which reflects the San Francisco-Oakland-Hayward change in the CPI for the period from February 2024 to February 2025. This percentage is also fairly consistent with the placeholder for salary and benefit increases that were incorporated into the Fiscal Year 2025-26 Budget. Any new fees or fee increases that are not consistent with the CPI increase are highlighted for reference. While most fees have been adjusted by the CPI, some fees such as recreation programs and facility rental rates can be based on market rates. The Recreation and Cultural Services Director reviewed the local market for similar programs and is only recommending adjustments to membership fees which are listed in bold, in the relevant highlighted section. Other fees, which are based on building valuation, the actual cost of service, or have costs mandated by the State or other legislation are maintained at their current level.

This item was continued at the July 1, 2025, Council Meeting. The notice for this public hearing was originally published in the Monterey Herald on June 20, 2025, and June 26, 2025. The proposed fees, current fees, and the most recent comprehensive fee study were posted on the City website 10 days prior to the July 1, 2025 Council Meeting. Additional proposed updates to the fee schedule were posted to the City website on July 18, 2025. The proposed revisions include the addition of a new Shopping Cart Containment Plan Review fee, as well as an administrative adjustment to add the CPI increase to select fees.

FISCAL IMPACT:

This increase will assist in recovering costs for services that provide direct benefits to individuals and groups. The Fiscal Year 2025-26 Adopted Budget includes estimated increases for select fee categories. Due to potential variations in the use of services, it is anticipated that the impact to the budgeted amount will be minimal.

CONCLUSION:

This request is submitted for City Council consideration and possible action.

Therefore, determining the cost of services ensures that fees recover only costs reasonably borne, as established by Section 8(c) of Proposition 4, now Article XIIIB of the California Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the Council has determined that the use of the CPI index to adjust certain fees represents the reasonable costs borne by the City for providing the identified services; and

WHEREAS, on August 6, 2025, the City Council held a public hearing, for which notice was provided in accordance with Government Code Section 6062a, and took oral or written testimony from members of the public and information from staff regarding the new, increased, or confirmed service charges and fees; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to adopt an amended Master Fee Schedule for Fiscal Year 2025-26.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Marina does hereby:

1. Approve the City of Marina Fee Schedule for City services (Exhibit B), attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference, and direct that all new or increased fees and service charges shall take effect as of October 6, 2025, and existing fees and service charges shall remain in full force and effect until that time and are hereby restated.

ORDINANCE NO. 2025-11

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA AMENDING SECTION 10.60.010 "SPEED LIMITS ESTABLISHED" OF CHAPTER 10.60 "SPEED LIMITS" OF TITLE 10 "VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC," OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE TO ADOPT *PRIMA FACIE* SPEED LIMITS PURSUANT TO AN ENGINEERING AND TRAFFIC SURVEY AND THE CALIFORNIA VEHICLE CODE

WHEREAS, California Vehicle Code Sections 22357 and 22358 provide that local entities may declare *prima facie* speed limits of more than 25 miles per hour on City streets on the basis of an engineering and traffic survey; and

WHEREAS, THE California Vehicles Code Section 627 defines an engineering and traffic survey to include consideration of all of the following:

- 1) Prevailing speeds as determined by traffic engineering measurements;
- 2) Accident records;
- 3) Highway, traffic and roadside conditions not readily apparent to the driver; and

WHEREAS, the City of Marina has completed an engineering and traffic survey pursuant to California Vehicle Code Sections 22357 and 22358.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. The City of Marina is authorized to use radar enforcement of speed limits on local streets pursuant to the *prima facie* speed limits specified in the California Vehicle Code and on other streets if the speed limits established by the City are consistent with the results of an engineering and traffic survey conducted according to the standards set forth in the California Vehicle Code.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. The City Council of the City of Marina finds and declares that an Engineering and Traffic Survey has been completed in full compliance with the requirements of the California Vehicle Code.

SECTION 3 Based on the findings and recommendations of the Engineering and Traffic Survey, all Subsections of Section 10.60.010 entitled "Speed Limits Established" of Title 10, Chapter 10.60, of the Marina Municipal Code are amended, repealing in their entirety and replacing Subsections A through G and adding Subsections H through Y; to read in their entirety as follows:

- "A. Reservation Road, as follows:
 - 1. Thirty-five miles per hour from Dunes Drive to Beach Road;
 - 2. Thirty miles per hour from Beach Road to Del Monte Blvd;
 - 3. Thirty-five miles per hour from Del Monte Blvd to Crescent Ave;
 - 4. Forty miles per hour from Crescent Ave to Salinas Ave;
 - 5. Fifty miles per hour from Salinas Avenue to Imjin Parkway;
 - 6. Fifty-five miles per hour from Imjin Parkway to Blanco Road.

B. Del Monte Boulevard, as follows:

- 1. Thirty-Five miles per hour from six hundred feet south of Reindollar Avenue to Reservation Road;
- 2. Thirty miles per hour from Reservation Road to Beach Road;
- 3. Forty miles per hour from Beach Road to Marina Greens Drive.

C. Cardoza Avenue, as follows:

1. Thirty miles per hour from Reservation Road to the end thereof, which is approximately six hundred feet north of Lakewood Drive.

D. Carmel Avenue, as follows:

- 1. Twenty-five miles per hour from Del Monte Boulevard to approximately 300 feet west of Everett Drive;
- 2. The prima facie speed limit on Carmel Avenue from approximately 300 feet west of Everett Drive to Bostick Avenue shall be fifteen miles per hour when children are present;
- 3. Twenty-five miles per hour from Bostick Avenue to Salinas Avenue.

E. California Avenue, as follows:

- 1. Thirty miles per hour from Reservation Road to Carmel Avenue;
- 2. Twenty-five miles per hour from Carmel Avenue to Reindollar Avenue;
- 3. Forty miles per hour from Reindollar Avenue to Imjin Parkway;
- 4. Thirty miles per hour from Imjin Parkway to 8th Street.

F. Crescent Avenue, as follows:

- 1. Thirty miles per hour from Carmel Avenue to Reservation Road;
- 2. Twenty-five miles per hour from Reservation Road to the end thereof, which is approximately two hundred fifty feet north of Quebrada Del Mar.

G. Beach Road, as follows:

- 1. Thirty miles per hour from Reservation Road to Del Monte Boulevard;
- 2. Twenty-five miles per hour from Del Monte Boulevard to De Forest Road;
- 3. The prima facie speed limit from Begonia Circle to Villa Circle shall be fifteen miles per hour when children are present.

H. 2nd Avenue, as follows:

- 1. Forty miles per hour from Divarty Street to 8th Street;
- 2. Thirty-five miles per hour from 8th Street to Imjin Parkway.

I. 3rd Avenue, as follows:

1. Twenty-five miles per hour from 8th Street to Imjin Parkway.

J. 8th Street, as follows:

- 1. Twenty-five miles per hour from 2nd Avenue to 3rd Avenue;
- 2. Thirty-five miles per hour from 5th Avenue/California Avenue to Inter-Garrison Road.

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- K. 9th Street, as follows:
 - 1. Twenty-five miles per hour from 1st Avenue to 2nd Avenue.
- L. De Forest Road, as follows:
 - 1. Thirty miles per hour from Beach Road to Reservation Road.
- M. Reindollar Avenue, as follows:
 - 1. Twenty-five miles per hour from Del Monte Boulevard to California Avenue;
 - 2. Twenty-five miles per hour from California Avenue to Carmel Avenue.
- N. Lake Drive, as follows:
 - 1. Twenty-five miles per hour from Palm Avenue to Reservation Road.
- O. Palm Avenue, as follows:
 - 1. Twenty-five miles per hour from Lake Drive to Del Monte Boulevard.
- P. Salinas Avenue, as follows:
 - 1. Twenty-five miles per hour from Carmel Avenue to Reservation Road.
- O. Paul Davis Drive, as follows:
 - 1. Twenty-five miles per hour from Healy Avenue to Marina Greens Drive.
- R. Seacrest Avenue, as follows:
 - 1. Thirty miles per hour from Carmel Avenue to Reservation Road.
- S. Sunset Avenue, as follows:
 - 1. Twenty-five miles per hour from Reindollar Avenue to Carmel Avenue.
- T. Vaughan Avenue, as follows:
 - 1. Twenty-five miles per hour from Reindollar Avenue to Carmel Avenue.
- U. Crescent Street, as follows:
 - 1. The prima facie speed limit from Patton Parkway to Reindollar Avenue shall be twenty-five miles per hour when children are present.
- V. Patton Parkway, as follows:
 - 1. The prima facie speed limit from End (Marina High School) to Crescent Street shall be twenty-five miles per hour when children are present;
 - 2. Thirty-five miles per hour from Crescent Street to California Avenue.
- W. Preston Drive, as follows:
 - 1. Thirty miles per hour from Abrams Drive to Imjin Parkway.
- X. Abrams Drive, as follows:
 - 1. Thirty miles per hour from Preston Drive to Imjin Parkway (East).
 - 2. Thirty miles per hour from Preston Drive to Imjin Parkway (West).

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- Y. Imjin Parkway, as follows:
 - 1. Forty-five miles per hour from State Route 1 to California Avenue;
 - 2. Fifty miles per hour from California Avenue to Reservation Road.
- Z. Marina Heights Drive, as follows:
 - 1. Thirty miles per hour from California Avenue to Imjin Parkway."

SECTION 4. The *prima facie* speed limit for each portion of Reservation Road, Del Monte Boulevard, Cardoza Avenue, Carmel Avenue, California Avenue, Crescent Avenue, Beach Road, 2nd Avenue, 3rd Avenue, 8th Street, 9th Street, De Forest Road, Reindollar Avenue, Lake Drive, Palm Avenue, Salinas Avenue, Paul Davis Drive, Seacrest Avenue, Sunset Avenue, Vaughan Avenue, Crescent Street, Patton Parkway, Preston Drive, Abrams Drive, Imjin Parkway, and Marina Heights Drive set forth in Section 3 hereof, shall be as set forth therein when signs are erected giving notice thereof.

<u>SECTION 5</u>. Any provision of the Marina Municipal Code or appendices thereto inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, to the extent of such inconsistencies and no further, is hereby repealed or modified to the extent necessary to effect the provisions of this Ordinance.

<u>SECTION 6</u>. The City Council hereby declares it would have passed this ordinance sentence by sentence, paragraph by paragraph, and section by section, and does hereby declare that the provisions of this ordinance are severable and, if for any reason any sentence, paragraph or section of this ordinance shall be held invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining parts of this ordinance.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days from and after its final passage.

SECTION 8. Within fifteen (15) days after the passage of this ordinance, the City Clerk shall cause it to be posted in the three (3) public places designated by resolution of the City Council.

Every year, the League of California Cities convenes a member-driven General Assembly at the <u>Cal Cities Annual Conference and Expo</u>. The General Assembly is an important opportunity where city officials can directly participate in the development of Cal Cities policy.

Taking place on Oct. 10, the General Assembly is comprised of voting delegates appointed by each member city; every city has one voting delegate. Your appointed voting delegate plays an important role during the General Assembly by representing your city and voting on resolutions.

To cast a vote during the General Assembly, your city must designate a voting delegate and up to two alternate voting delegates, one of whom may vote if the designated voting delegate is unable to serve in that capacity. Voting delegates may either be an elected or appointed official.

Action by Council Required. Consistent with Cal Cities bylaws, a city's voting delegate and up to two alternates must be designated by the city council. <u>Please note that designating the voting delegate and alternates must be done by city council action and cannot be accomplished by individual action of the mayor or city manager alone.</u>

Following council action, please submit your city's delegates through the online submission portal by Wed., Sept. 24. When completing the Voting Delegate submission form, you will be asked to attest that council action was taken. You will need to be signed in to your My Cal Cities account when submitting the form.

Submitting your voting delegate form by the deadline will allow us time to establish voting delegate/alternate records prior to the conference and provide pre-conference communications with voting delegates.

Conference Registration Required. The voting delegate and alternates must be registered to attend the conference. They need not register for the entire conference; they may register for Friday only. Conference registration is open on the <u>Cal Cities</u> website.



For a city to cast a vote, one voter must be present at the General Assembly and in possession of the voting delegate card and voting tool. Voting delegates and alternates need to pick up their conference badges before signing in and picking up the voting delegate card at the voting delegate desk. This will enable them to receive the special sticker on their name badges that will admit the voting delegate into the voting area during the General Assembly.

Please view Cal Cities' event and meeting policy in advance of the conference.

Transferring Voting Card to Non-Designated Individuals Not Allowed. The voting delegate card may be transferred freely between the voting delegate and alternates, but *only* between the voting delegate and alternates. If the voting delegate and alternates find themselves unable to attend the General Assembly, they may *not* transfer the voting card to another city official.

Seating Protocol during General Assembly. At the General Assembly, individuals with a voting card will sit in a designated area. Admission to the voting area will be limited to the individual in possession of the voting card and with a special sticker on their name badge identifying them as a voting delegate.

The voting delegate desk, located in the conference registration area of the Long Beach Convention Center in Long Beach, will be open at the following times: Wednesday, Oct. 16, 8:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m. and Thursday, Oct. 17, 7:30 a.m.-4:00 p.m. On Friday, Oct. 18, the voting delegate desk will be open at the General Assembly, starting at 7:30 a.m., but will be closed during roll calls and voting.

The voting procedures that will be used at the conference are attached to this memo. Please share these procedures and this memo with your council and especially with the individuals that your council designates as your city's voting delegate and alternates.

General Assembly Voting Guidelines

- One City One Vote. Each member city has a right to cast one vote on matters pertaining to Cal Cities policy.
- 2. **Designating a City Voting Representative.** Prior to the Cal Cities Annual Conference and Expo, each city council may designate a voting delegate and up to two alternates; these individuals are identified on the voting delegate form provided to the Cal Cities Credentials Committee.
- 3. **Registering with the Credentials Committee.** The voting delegate, or alternates, may pick up the city's voting card at the voting delegate desk in the conference registration area. Voting delegates and alternates must sign in at the voting delegate desk. Here they will receive a special sticker on their name badge and thus be admitted to the voting area at the General Assembly.
- 4. **Signing Initiated Resolution Petitions**. Only those individuals who are voting delegates (or alternates), and who have picked up their city's voting card by providing a signature to the credentials committee at the voting delegate desk, may sign petitions to initiate a resolution.
- 5. **Voting.** To cast the city's vote, a city official must have in their possession the city's voting card and voting tool; and be registered with the credentials committee. The voting card may be transferred freely between the voting delegate and alternates but may not be transferred to another city official who is neither a voting delegate nor alternate.
- 6. **Voting Area at General Assembly.** At the General Assembly, individuals with a voting card will sit in a designated area. Admission to the voting area will be limited to the individual in possession of the voting card and with a special sticker on their name badge identifying them as a voting delegate.
- 7. **Resolving Disputes**. In case of dispute, the credentials committee will determine the validity of signatures on petitioned resolutions and the right of a city official to vote at the General Assembly.



How it works: Cal Cities Resolutions and the General Assembly

Developing League of California Cities policy is a dynamic process that engages a wide range of members to ensure Cal Cities represents cities with one voice. These policies directly guide Cal Cities' advocacy to promote local decision-making, and lobby against statewide policies that erode local control.

The resolutions process and General Assembly is one way that city officials can directly participate in the development of Cal Cities policy. If a resolution is approved at the General Assembly, it becomes official Cal Cities policy. Here's how resolutions and the General Assembly work.

Prior to the Annual Conference and Expo

General Resolutions



Sixty days before the Annual Conference and Expo, Cal Cities members may submit policy proposals on issues of importance

to cities. The resolution must have the concurrence of at least five additional member cities or individual members.

Policy Committees

Petitioned Resolutions



The petitioned resolution is an alternate method to introduce policy proposals during

the annual conference. The petition must be signed by voting delegates from 10% of member cities, and submitted to the Cal Cities President at least 24 hours before the beginning of the General Assembly.

Resolutions Committee



The Resolutions Committee considers all resolutions. General Resolutions approved by either a policy committee

or the Resolutions Committee are next considered by the General Assembly. General resolutions not approved, or referred for further study by both a policy committee and the Resolutions Committee do not go to the General Assembly. All Petitioned Resolutions are considered by the General Assembly, unless disqualified.²



General Assembly



During the General Assembly, voting delegates debate and consider general and petitioned resolutions forwarded by the Resolutions Committee. Potential Cal Cities bylaws amendments are also considered at this meeting.

STRENGTHENING THE CITY'S SHORT-TERM RENTAL (STR) PROGRAM TO PROTECT NEIGHBORHOOD INTEGRITY

REQUEST: It is requested that the City Council:

- 1. Direct staff to develop a dedicated complaint and reporting mechanism for short-term rentals (STRs).
- 2. Explore additional measures to ensure compliance with existing STR regulations—particularly around "owner-occupied" requirements.
- 3. Return with a proposed amendment to Marina Municipal Code Chapter 17.42.170 to prohibit the advertisement of unlicensed STRs, including the implementation of daily fines consistent with surrounding jurisdictions. or, in the alternative,
- 4. Direct staff to cease the STR Program and return with a sunset plan.

BACKGROUND:

In 2019, the City of Marina adopted a Short-Term Rental (STR) Program to help balance the demand for vacation rentals with the need to preserve neighborhood character and safeguard local housing availability. Under the adopted policy, STRs are only allowed in "owner-occupied" properties, which are defined as dwellings where the owner resides for at least six months and one day each year.

SUMMARY:

Marina is a city of neighbors, and housing affordability and availability continue to be pressing concerns in our community. Since the STR program's inception, there has been no dedicated online mechanism for residents to report potential code violations or unlicensed STR activity. Without a public-facing complaint tool, enforcement remains limited and reactive.

Moreover, verifying "owner-occupied" status has proven challenging due to limited staffing capacity. This has led to growing concerns over STRs operating outside the bounds of local regulations—particularly by absentee investors whose interests may not align with our community values.

Other cities on the Peninsula, such as Monterey and Pacific Grove, have strengthened their STR enforcement by making it explicitly illegal to advertise non-licensed rentals and imposing daily penalties for violations. Marina should consider similar tools to increase compliance and deter illegal operators.

As Marina continues to grow, we must protect the spirit of our neighborhoods and ensure our housing remains for those who live, work, and contribute to our community. Strengthening our STR program with better tools, clearer enforcement, and updated policies will help maintain Marina as a city of neighbors—not investors.

NEXT STEPS:

To uphold the integrity of Marina's neighborhoods and address increasing concerns around STR activity, Council is asked to consider the following options:

1. Cease the STR Program and Create a Sunset Plan

Begin phasing out the existing Short-Term Rental Program by creating a structured sunset plan that includes notification to current permit holders, a defined timeline for license expiration, and enforcement mechanisms to ensure a full wind-down of the program.

2. <u>Develop a Public Reporting Tool</u>

Create a publicly accessible online form and/or webpage for residents to report unlicensed or non-compliant STRs in their neighborhoods.

3. Enhance Verification of "Owner-Occupied" Status

Explore new tools and processes to better confirm that STR properties meet the "owner-occupied" requirement (six months plus one day), as defined in current policy.

4. Amend Municipal Code to Prohibit Advertising of Illegal STRs

Draft and return with a proposed amendment to Marina Municipal Code Chapter 17.42.170 to:

- Make it unlawful to advertise short-term rentals without a valid city-issued STR license.
- Establish daily penalties for each day an illegal STR is advertised, modeled after similar ordinances in Monterey and Pacific Grove.

5. Return with Broader Policy Recommendations

Provide a comprehensive staff analysis on the impacts of STRs in Marina and return with additional recommendations for enforcement, staffing, and potential program revisions.
