- Patty Martin Chappel Understands that the Marina residents put recreational plans high on their priority list of projects that they would like the city to complete. I'm part of a steering committee, which is interested in hosting the city of Marina to have roller sports continue alongside other sports at the Water City facility. Our dedicated committee feels that bringing the Water City facility up to par is the first step in creating a new plan for the successful continuation of a multi sports facility, including roller sports. It has the potential to become a financially viable business and a main draw for the residents of Marina and Monterey County, as well as from the outside area, other sports that can be practiced and played outdoors. Marina is fortunate to have a building

with great potential moving forward with clean up new management, proper scheduling and proper promotional efforts, our steering committee is confident that the facility can be turned around to host a variety of sports and events. Our steering committee has a variety of people with professional skills, dedication, and willingness to assist the city of Marina to get the facility operational and on its way to greatness for the community.

- Mike Owen I think, Terry Siegrist's statement about the recreation center, slowly coming alive is misleading, because in my view, they have never ceased being very active and energetic. Two weeks ago, at the council meeting, I asked a technical question about if the Sea Haven and Dunes Specific Plans might allow less than a 15-gallon tree replacement as mitigation. Concerned about the effects of wind burn on highly exposed areas, such as Hilltop Park, the roundabout at Del Monte Avenue and Beach Road etc. because the smaller the gallon sizes you go to the actual chances of long-term growth increases and the chances of survivability increase and in addition, there's much less water that needs to be provided at those smaller sizes. So, I think it would be helpful if we ever are able to find out if less than 15-gallon sizes could be planted in a Dunes and Sea Haven.
- Frank O'Connell Responded to some misrepresentations made at the meeting last June 2nd related to campaign finance reform. Explained how the campaign finance ordinance was brought about and eventually approved.
- Council Member Berkley Noted that on Thursday, June 17th is Civil Disobedience Day.
- Mayor Delgado Responded to the statement by Frank O'Connell. Spoke about the volunteers that came out and cleanup Los Aboles Middle School sports complex in time for Junior Giants Kickoff event; thanked the volunteers who showed up on June 12th to help clean up 14.5 miles of roadside trash along Lapis Road and Del Monte Blvd. and thanked the businesses who provided sandwiches for both events. Noted on June 19th Citizens for sustainable Marina spot woodland cleanup between Salinas Avenue and Imgin Parkway, just south of Reservation road from 10am to Noon. Note on June 27th at the Marina Library from 12:00pm-4:00pm the will be a volunteer project in conjunction with an Eagle Scout Project launching a community garden project, the project will consist of building three new garden beds and will be building about 11 new cages lids that go on top so the animals can't get into the garden beds.
- Mayor Pro-Tem Biala The mayor is correct that this ordinance does not level the playing field for fundraising. Noted that there's possibly three unconstitutional aspects of this ordinance, and I do look forward to part two of our discussion about the campaign finance ordinance. Thank you

Public Comments:

- Grace Silva-Santella thanked the consultants and the fire chief, this has been an amazing presentation and report to listen to, it's a little frightening but also realizing how much our city needs to be prepared for and that we are not prepared for. Has 95 year old mother who lives in Monterey and we have had to utilize fire and ambulance for her care in this past year and quite aware of what the challenges are; and listening to this report this evening has really made me be more appreciative of the care of my mother received in Monterey, but also has made me be more understanding of how difficult it must be for cities to be balancing the cost and meeting the needs of the residents. Thank you for this amazing report, and to also express my gratitude. Thank you
- Denise Turley wanted to thank fire fighter Anthony Goncalves, who 16 years ago, saved my mom's life. Fantastic. Thank you
- Anthony Goncalves Thanked everyone for their tireless work on the study. We, the Marina Firefighters union just wanted to reiterate that we support the findings of the study and that you know as a union, the most important thing to us is the response time to the public, and being there for them in their times of need. So, whatever needs to happen to push that forward, obviously we're going to support that. Again, thank you for the study it was very comprehensive, very data driven, and hopefully we can take this data and grow from it together as a city

Public Comments:

- Karen Andersen Noted that the hardscaping proposed has not been something that the ad hoc committee was going to be able to modify. And so, begin construction of parts escaping. You know the paths and everything could have been done already and with anticipation of planting in the Fall, which is the appropriate time to plant the types of California natives that are local and are available, even in common nursery stock. Made the contribution of the stated Native Plant List I think what that was referred by Mr. McMinn, and I'm hoping that that goes into the report, because it was a spreadsheet of California native plants that were where I started with Dr. Watson, historically, present plants from the hilltop Park site that may be going through the time. That may be going through the time but way back to maybe when the army held the property. Added in locally native plants from the reference book Flora of Fort Ord by David Styarr, and then ranked those plants by the number of pollinators, which utilize them. Thanked Brian for adding Dr. Watson websites to the ad hoc committee report. Noted for information education purposes, plants that had the highest number of pollinators starts off with the coast live oaks with 270 species, the various ceanothus, California lilac species at 117, the various Lupin species at 75, and the various Manzanita's at 68 native pollinators using them so it would be very easy to get any of those plants from local nurseries, they're not going to be hard for the developer to find. Asked that her name be spelled correctly on the final version
- Mike Owen It is my understanding that the specific plan, says that they cannot plant, less than a 15 gallon tree plant and asked if there's any way by mutual agreement or somehow to allow smaller gallon sizes to be planted at the more wind exposed areas.
- Fred Watson Think it's just important to understand the history a little bit more deeply particularly the idea to plant local natives is not a new requirement. It's been there all along. This is important the council is fully aware of it. It really starts with the environmental impact report, which is to identify protected plants, and then decide whether or not you're going to protect and preserve those plants in perpetuity and not touch them, or whether you're going to take them and then mitigate them elsewhere. In this case, the developer opted for the former so there's this obligation to protect San Gilia, and in perpetuity some parts of the development, but San Gilia was not found at hilltop Park, what was found at hilltop Park was some sensitive clients not protected legally.
- Juli Hofmann Having been on the ad hoc committee and looked at the proposed plan which as we knew was a conceptual plan it's a solid plan, it's good. Our recommendations were really based on trying to build resilience, as we're all very aware of what a difficult area that is. Many of the native plants are and I think that it's not so much based on restoration but just more about the lifetime of the park and really building something that we can all be proud of. Some of those plants that are up there are up there for a reason with no water, no care. So, we'd like to see more of those plants up there, simply because they'll just be easier to take care of in the long run. We did run into the issue that because it was a conceptual plan it wasn't up to date with the trees that had been inadvertently removed. The mitigation of 3 to1 wasn't shown anywhere on the plan and did show where the mitigated trees were going to go. Tt's kind of hard to recommend the plan. Thinks we will eventually meet somewhere in the middle and find something that works really well for everybody.
- Laura Hoover 3:24:49 thanked everyone for their comments tonight. Finds it ironic to hear the developer in this conversation, asking for speed and efficiency in this process, of which they have actually made longer because of their mistake and how they approached the development of the site. Disappointed that there's no contrition at all in the remarks made by the developer this evening for the mistake that was made. Wants to encourage the developer to work with the recommendations of the ad hoc committee, and with the community to remedy the situation. By

using native plants to restore the area by working with consultants who are certified to do this work with native plants, and to work together for a sustainable successful long-term solution. Thank you very much

- Tommy Spoke about all the installation of plants and trees and whatnots but have you considered the gophers and what it will take to maintain them.
- Don Hofer A comment was made, which was really resonated with me and that you know I hadn't made an apology for the cutting of the trees and so I should have done that. Marina Community Partners (MCP) continues to apologize for the inadvertent cutting of the trees on Hilltop Park. We didn't benefit from it in any way at MCP and in fact the current Park design that has the trail actually going right through the area that was cut where these trees were. funny kind of irony but I throw that out there because I think it's important to tell the whole story. Right. So much has been put back on us, as the developer but I want the community to really understand that we have not benefited in one way from this, it's cost us a lot. It was an individual on a crew that made a mistake that goes home to his family every night, and the local area, and has also apologized for the mistake so I hope that brings it down to kind of the human scale. In terms of process you know the way these parts come together as you go through a concept design which is what we're doing now and then we go and we design, working drawings the actual construction documents in a process with staff and with consultants and with this team that has been recommended as part of the ad hoc committee recommendations and so there have been some comments about us being able to install hard scape, or maybe start to propagate plants when we don't even have an approved design. We have no way of doing that. So, we wouldn't be investing in installing hard scape that isn't approved yet, or probably getting plants that we don't even know if we're going to plant yet, so there's some time. I love the comments about sustainability and some of the comments about the plant lists that have been put together. We appreciate and we're listening to it and I think this is going to be a better part designs at the end of the day, because of a lot of the work that you guys have done, and the work the community has done and so we embrace that and we thank you, we want it to be a community park. We just want to try to move it forward. We're here for the long term. We're here to make sensible decisions with the city. Please trust your staff, let this go back to staff and let staff work with us on details on working it out, and then moving this forward from there. Thank you tonight
