Proclamation

DECLARING NOVEMBER AS NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH IN MARINA WHICH IS LOCATED WITHIN ESSELEN AND OHLONE/COSTANOAN TRADITIONAL TERRITORIES

WHEREAS, the City of Marina recognizes that it was founded and is built upon the traditional homelands and villages first inhabited by the Indigenous Peoples of this region – the Esselen and Ohlone/Costanoan, their ancestors and allies – and honors these members ofthe community, both past and present; and

WHEREAS, the Esselen people have been indigenous to the Greater Monterey County area for more than 12,000 years, and from their known ancestral tribal villages from the coast and inland, the Esselen people hunted, traded, and lived peacefully together, and are known todayas the Ohlone/Costanoan-Esselen Nation; and

WHEREAS, since the arrival of Europeans, California Indians have suffered and been subject to discrimination, violence, and forceable extraction from their lands; and

WHEREAS, the City of Marina is dedicated to treating all people equally and fairly irrespective of race and ethnicity including Indigenous People; and

WHEREAS, the City of Marina values the progress our society has accomplished through Indigenous Peoples' knowledge, technology, thought, science, philosophy, and artistic contributions. The City of Marina also recognizes the deep historic, cultural, and contemporary significance of the Indigenous Peoples of the lands; and

WHEREAS, the City of Marina understands that government entities, organizations and other public institutions should embrace policies and practices to reflect the experiences of Indigenous people and uplift our country's Indigenous roots, history, and contributions; and

WHEREAS, the idea of Indigenous Peoples' Day was first proposed in 1977 by a delegation of Native nations to the United Nations-sponsored International Conference on Discrimination Against Indigenous Populations in the Americas; and

WHEREAS, President Biden, on October 8, 2021, signed a presidential proclamation declaring the second Monday in October as a federal holiday to be known henceforth as Indigenous Peoples' Day; and

WHEREAS, California Governor, Gavin Newsom, in 2021, proclaimed that the month of November will henceforth be "Native American Heritage Month" wherein the rich diversity and perseverance of California Native Peoples are celebrated and honored.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Bruce Delgado, Mayor of the City of Marina, do hereby declare every November henceforth as Native American Heritage Month to celebrate the thriving culture and value that Esselen, Ohlone/Costanoan and other Indigenous Peoples addto our City.

Council Questions on staff presentation: There was mention of about there were 7 trees inadvertently removed. Were those by accident, or was that on purpose? Staff report indicates no fiscal impact, and in my reading of this the number of residential lots was reduced by 20 units does that not impact the tax that the city would ultimately receive? So, the specific plan does, does indicate the total number of units and the anchorage devoted to housing, correct? So this revision to the map continues that call out by the specific plan, with no major change or reduction or expansion of those initially and agreed upon designs?

Council Questions on Proponents presentation: The \$45 million of impact fees and post FORA fees, is that related to phase 3 or the whole Dunes project? How much of it is phase 3 that we're talking about tonight? The \$20,000 for parks is that the entire project and it's 4.6 million for phase 3 right? Would you consider these payments part of your expenses overall? Phase 3 - of the 19 trees that are going to be kept out of the 202 that exist today are they in the linear part or are they in the areas where they're shown as homes going in? Of the 175 trees, why couldn't we have relocated some of the iconic trees to get them out of harm's way during construction of these phases, like we did in the past? Do you have any approximation of how many of the 202 trees that are going to be cut in the residential area are in good or fair condition, and able to be relocated if the desire was there? What will the parking look like if scaling down you plan? Is there adequate turnaround for fire truck? When talking about affordable housing, can you tell me how that plays into the Terracina Apartments? Is the Terracina Apartments project prevailing wage? Will this project have any view sheds and water saving features, such as rainwater capture? On the linear park, is the purpose to have a real park or is it more aesthetic landscaping? What happens on the linear parks? For Phase 2 and Phase 3, where are the timelines? What are the timelines for when the fees are going to be done or available to the city? Are the seeds being planted coming from C4SM volunteer?

Mayor Delgado opened the public hearing for public comments:

• Les Martin – Thinks the whole plan looks nice. Concerned to have one of those big trees next to someone's home. Happy to see the progress on tearing down the old barracks. Asked if there would be more barracks that need to come down when the Dunes development is complete.

- Mike Owen Happy to support the Planning Commission's approval of the tree removal permits. Spoke about previous tree removals in the development areas and the reactions from the public, staff and from the developer. Spoke about the transplanting of the new trees (saplings) and how they will survive better that the older trees.
- Nancy Amadeo Noted this item is about approving an amendment to the tentative map for phase 2 and phase 3 not about trees. Pleased to see that some things actually went back to the original tentative map.
- Liesbeth Visscher Spoke about the width of the streets and that they can accommodate a firetruck but not the semi-trucks that seem to want to turn down the roads and destroy the landscaping. Commented on the tree removal throughout the project and the expense of transplanting large trees.
- Denise Turley Spoke about faulty water heaters that were installed and asked what was the final outcome of that issue? Commented on the extreme water bills and what was being done with that issue.

How large would the Ginkgo be when installed? How much of a tree fill is there already with those large cypress so close? Do you think that the large trees are existing would afford us in this case the chance to be patient with slower growing natives? If we wanted to grow something quickly, would it be possible to have some slow growing species concurrently with fast growing species, such as the natural willow?

Public Comments:

- Grace Silva-Santella Strongly discourage the use of ginkgo because it needs a denser clay soil that we cannot provide and will not get enough water; and strongly urge council to consider Catalina Ironwood. Commented on the proposed garbage enclosures. Concerned about the natural turf and appreciates there will be a cost analysis on it. Hopes Bianca's company takes a close look at Windy Hill and Vince DiMaggio and see that the struggles that Public Works Department have to deal with in managing and maintaining turf. Assumes a separate water meter will be put in for this project so the library is not covering the cost of watering. Need to give serious consideration to synthetic turf and not natural turf.
- Mrs. Dillon Spoke about the lighting in the rendering and concerned about the light pollution close to the marshland and the impacts on the nesting birds and other animals, would like better clarification on the lighting. Likes the Ginkgo tree, it's a pretty tree. Opposes covered seating.
- Nancy Amadeo Commented on the landscaping and liking the layering of plants. Concerned about the maintenance of whatever plants will be placed in this area and concerned about the turf. Council might consider growing ground cover type of plants that can be walked on.
- Brian McCarthy Commented on the lighting and the plants. Agrees Council should look at the Catalina Ironwood. Spoke about the Monterey Cypress truly being a native to this area. Advocate of dark sky compliant lighting and the premises of dark sky lighting is that you use only the light you need where you need it and the brightness. Noticed that there is some "up lighting and asked what is the purpose of that lighting this is on park land?
- Jeff Markham Wanted to congratulate Miss Konic, on a job well done, beautiful design.

RECOMMENDATION TO CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2022-, APPROVING A MITIGATION SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH THE BIG SUR LAND TRUST TO SERVE AS THE CONSERVATION EASEMENT HOLDER FOR THE IMJIN PKWY WIDENING PROJECT, AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE THE AGREEMENT ON BEHALF OF THE CITY COUNCIL SUBJECT TO FINAL REVIEW AND APPROVAL BY THE CITY ATTORNEY

RECOMMENDATION:

It is requested that the City Council consider

- 1. Adopting Resolution No. 2022-, approving a mitigation services agreement (**Exhibit A**) with the Big Sur Land Trust (BSLT) in order for the BSLT to serve as the conservation easement holder for the Imjin Parkway Widening Project, and;
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to execute the agreement on behalf of the City Council subject to final review and approval by the City Attorney.

BACKGROUND:

At the regular meeting of February 5, 2019, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2019-11, accepting the Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration for the Imjin Parkway Widening Project completing the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) process.

On March 4, 2019, Caltrans determined that the project is a Categorical Exclusion under the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA).

Within the approximately 29.6 acres of soil disturbance due to the project are areas of potential sand gilia habitat. Sand gilia is a protected species under California law and is subject to permitting to ensure that any take of sand gilia is mitigated. Project biologists surveyed the project area for the presence of sand gilia June 1-2 and August 29, 2017, April 19-20 and May 17-19, 2018, and April 26 through April 28 and on May 5, 2021. Any sand gilia observed during the gilia flowering seasons was documented and the information was included in permit applications. The City applied for an Incidental Take Permit (ITP) from the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) in February of 2019.

CDFW determined that the ITP application was complete on January 14, 2022. Staff and consultants for the project have been coordinating with CDFW for the issuance of the ITP which is expected within the next two weeks.

ANALYSIS:

The City has proposed that the area of mitigation for the taking of sand gilia on the project be within parcel E8a.1.2 near the intersection of Imjin Parkway and Abrams Drive as shown on **Exhibit B**. The ITP once issued will identify the full extent of mitigation area that the state will require. As part of the ITP to be issued by CDFW, the City will be required to identify the three entities to support Habitat Management Lands for the mitigation of the sand gilia take. CDFW will require, per Government Code §§ 65965-65968, a separate *Land Manager*, mitigation funding *Endowment Holder*, and *conservation Easement Grantee*. No take of sand gilia can occur on the project before the three roles are established.

Staff has proposed that the BSLT become the Easement Grantee. CDFW has previously vetted the BSLT on another permit application which will help streamline and expedite the start of construction of the Imjin Parkway Project. The City as landowner can serve as the Land Manager with a certified biologist to oversee management under contract. The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation serves as the Endowment Holder on many projects which will also help expedite the process.

Staff has submitted application to the BSLT to serve as the Easement Grantee. BSLT will consider serving as Easement Grantee at an upcoming board meeting.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The fiscal impact of applying for BSLT to be the Easement Holder is \$1,000 permit filling fee and a retainer in the range of \$10,000 to \$30,000 to cover BSLT costs associated with establishing the easement. All fees and the retainer associated with this action are available within the already approved budget for the Imjin Parkway Widening Project.

CONCLUSION:

This request is submitted for City Council consideration and possible action.

BIG SUR LAND TRUST MITIGATION SERVICES AGREEMENT IMJIN PARKWAY CONSERVATION SITE

Preamble

This document is a template and contains draft language and an overview of processes for typical mitigation projects but will be edited and adjusted for each project, as needed.

Summary

The City of Marina (hereafter "Project Proponent") is engaged in a transportation improvement project, including improvements to Imjin Parkway from Reservation Road west to Imjin Road. The establishment of the Imjin Parkway Conservation Site is intended to fulfill mitigation requirements of the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (hereafter "Regulatory Agency") certification approval for the development of the Imjin Parkway Improvement Project. Terms of an Incidental Take Permit will require habitat mitigation in the form of a conservation easement and/or fee title land with specific management and monitoring requirements. This easement and/or fee title land will be known as the Imjin Parkway Conservation Site. The Project Proponent has asked Big Sur Land Trust (hereafter "BSLT") to participate as a third-party easement and/or land holder and endowment holder, and in related capacities to assist the Project Proponent in fulfilling their habitat mitigation obligations for the Imjin Parkway Improvement Project. The parties desire to enter into this Agreement to set forth the parties respective duties and the financial arrangements.

Nature of Relationship

The Project Proponent is requesting that BSLT implement certain mitigation obligations required for the Imjin Parkway Improvement Project as required by the Regulatory Agency. The Project Proponent will provide a retainer fee from which BSLT will reimburse itself for all of BSLT's fees, costs and expenses; however, some key differences exist between a client/consultant relationship than exists when the Project Proponent hires a private consultant and the relationship with BSLT for mitigation services created by this Agreement. BSLT will ultimately hold the conservation easement and/or fee title land and endowment and be responsible to the Regulatory Agency for the management and enforcement of the easement and/or fee title land requirements and the associated endowment. BSLT will remain an independent third party with specific obligations and subject to on-going requirements that may, at times, be in conflict with the Project Proponent's interests and/or preferences. Entities that act as an easement holder and land manager have the legal obligation to monitor and, if necessary, enforce the easement terms against the landowner. Therefore, BSLT will be responsible for ensuring that the Project Proponent is complying with the terms of any easement agreement with the Regulatory Agency and, in the unlikely event that an easement violation occurs and is not remedied, BSLT will be required to bring suit against the Project Proponent to resolve the violation, recoup any funds expended by BSLT in mitigation, restoration or litigation activities and, potentially, seek damages as a result of the violation. At the outset of the relationship it is essential to establish and agree that BSLT is not acting as a consultant to the Project Proponent and is not subject to the Project Proponent's direction or control.

Scope of Work

BSLT will analyze the applicable mitigation requirements, permits and biological opinion and assess the proposed mitigation site; complete due diligence on the site, including site visits, evaluating conditions of title & insurance, mineral report and hazardous waste assessment; develop and/or analyze management plans and endowment calculations; develop language for the conservation easement, mitigation agreement, escrow instructions, and other necessary agreements between the parties; and create the baseline documentation report for the mitigation site. Nothing herein shall give BSLT the right to request additional mitigation not required by the Regulatory Agency. In addition, all conservation easement and/or deed language shall be created and/or revised in conjunction with the Project Proponent and the Regulatory Agency.

There are essentially four phases to a mitigation project which include:

1. <u>Initial Project Evaluation:</u>

- a. Initial Inquiry: The Project Proponent will present the potential project to BSLT including the general project parameters. BSLT staff will determine if BSLT has interest in the project. BSLT staff will send the Mitigation Policy, Mitigation Services Agreement template and current mitigation rates to the Project Proponent, along with a Project Application and request for the required non-refundable application fee of \$1,000.
- b. Application Review and Screening Decision: Once the application and initial fee are received, BSLT staff will review the application and seek additional information as needed from the Project Proponent, permitting agency and make mapping inquiries. BSLT staff will evaluate capacity and alignment with conservation priorities as well as the project timeline and other current project timelines. If BSLT staff determines that the project fits within our capacity and interests, it will be presented to the Internal Operations Committee (IOC) of BSLT's Board of Trustees. BSLT's IOC will evaluate the project and determine whether or not to proceed with developing a Mitigation Services Agreement.

BSLT's Board of Trustees will consider the project at the next Board of Trustees meeting and will advise BSLT staff if a project is approved to move forward.

A letter will be sent to the Project Proponent informing them of BSLT's decision. If the project is accepted, then the letter will outline the next steps required to move the project forward into the Project Evaluation and Project Portfolio Development Phase.

2. Mitigation Services Agreement and Retainer Fee:

BSLT will work with the Project Proponent to develop a Mitigation Services Agreement. A retainer fee in an amount appropriate to the terms of the project, usually approximately \$10,000-\$30,000, is required at the time that the document is executed.

Note: The Agreement will require that the Project Proponent pay for all of BSLT's staff time and expenses, including the legal and staff expenses to draft the Mitigation Services Agreement. The Agreement does not commit either BSLT or the Project Proponent to accept the final mitigation project, but rather defines the terms of the relationship for project development. Occasionally

Mitigation Services Agreements will be developed prior to IOC review depending upon project timing and scope.

If there are funds remaining in the retainer fee account after a project and the scope have been defined and finalized, BSLT will return the balance within 30 days.

3. Project Evaluation and Project Portfolio Development:

Upon receipt of the signed Mitigation Services Agreement and the determined retainer fee, BSLT will begin working more closely with the Project Proponent and the agency to develop the project portfolio. During this phase BSLT will conduct site visits and will develop and/or review management and legal documents, including but not limited to a conservation easement, management plan and associated endowment, grazing plan, biological reports, biological opinion of the permitting agency and permits, and a final mitigation agreement document detailing roles and responsibilities of agency, the Project Proponent and BSLT. An escrow account will be opened to facilitate the final transaction.

This period requires significant due diligence as BSLT staff will be reviewing, developing and commenting on project documents and terms.

4. Project Acceptance and Closing:

- a. Final Decision by BSLT's Board of Trustees: Upon completion of the project development phase, the project will be presented to the Board of Trustees by the IOC for final approval including final project details and funding information. The Board may accept or reject the recommendation made by the IOC. The Project Proponent will be advised of the Board's decision.
- b. Mitigation Project Execution: Once the project has received final approval, BSLT staff will move forward with executing the mitigation requirements. This may or may not include the acceptance of a fee title property or conservation easement, or acceptance of land management responsibilities, or acceptance of in-lieu mitigation funds and/or acceptance of restoration or enhancement projects. The transaction will be completed through the escrow account and the conservation easement or fee title deed will be recorded in the county where the project is located.

It is understood that these phases and tasks can require considerable time and expense depending on the complexity of the project.

BSLT, and its legal counsel, will negotiate legal agreements and land management responsibilities that will be assumed by BSLT. The Project Proponent shall be involved in those negotiations to the extent that they involve the Project Proponent or require funding from the Project Proponent. If requested, BSLT and its legal counsel will participate with the Project Proponent in relevant discussions with the Regulatory Agency. During any such discussions, its legal counsel will be acting exclusively as BSLT's counsel. Please be advised that any attorney-client relationship is solely between BSLT's legal counsel and BSLT.

The acceptance of reimbursement for BSLT's expenses in connection with the Imjin Parkway Improvement Project does not establish an agency relationship between the Project Proponent and

BSLT. BSLT makes no representation as to the acceptance of the final mitigation project by other entities or government agencies, including, but not limited to, the Regulatory Agency.

While BSLT agrees to review the Imjin Parkway Improvement Project and all documents related to the required mitigation in good faith, BSLT reserves the right to choose, in its sole and absolute discretion, to accept or reject title to the conservation easement and/or fee title land as a result of its due diligence review, the terms of the negotiated documents, or otherwise. In addition, BSLT's participation in the Imjin Parkway Improvement Project does not obligate BSLT to accept or otherwise agree to any particular mitigation project task or outcome.

Either BSLT or the Project Proponent may terminate its working relationship with the other party at any time. However, if the working relationship is terminated, BSLT is entitled to receive reimbursement for all work done prior to the termination.

Reimbursement Schedule

The Project Proponent agrees to reimburse BSLT, under the retainer fee terms, for all reasonable fees and costs incurred in connection with the Imjin Parkway Improvement Project required to mitigate the Imjin Parkway Improvement Project including, but not limited to, staff time, legal fees and costs, outside consulting fees and materials. The Project Proponent acknowledges that since (insert date) BSLT has incurred fees and costs in the amount of \$X, plus legal fees in connection with the project and agrees to BSLT's reimbursement from the retainer fee for those fees and costs.

All work will be completed on a time and materials basis and all work done by BSLT in connection with development of the project is reimbursable. BSLT charges for staff time per the fee schedule attached hereto as **Attachment "1"**. BSLT's staff time is calculated by the quarter-hour. Incidental communication expenses, copying and postage, and certain other similar incidental expenses are incorporated into the labor rates on the fee schedule. Direct expense such as outside printing, special purchases, sub-consultant services, travel, air and hotel charges, conference calls, delivery fees, filing fees, extra insurance requirements, custom accounting or detailing of special business licenses or other permits to operate that are determined to be required, or any other extraneous costs for the purposes of this mitigation project are calculated as an "Expense" on the fee schedule. Travel time is calculated at 50% of the regular hourly rate. Preparation time and/or "wait" time is calculated at the full labor rate. These rates are subject to change with advance notice.

Legal services from BSLT's legal counsel will be charged at their normal hourly rates including, for example, time spent preparing documents, legal research, negotiations, conferences, telephone calls, travel time and any appearances before any government agency. Current hourly rates are \$X per hour. Legal counsel is assisted by (insert assistants name), whose rate is currently \$X per hour. These rates are subject to an increase effective January 1, 2020.

Additionally, any costs necessary for representation of BSLT in these matters advanced by BSLT's legal counsel will be additional charges to BSLT that will be passed on to the Project Proponent. Neither BSLT's legal counsel nor BSLT marks up the costs incurred by BSLT's legal counsel. Such costs include, but are not limited to, transportation costs, photocopying, faxing of documents, telephone calls and similar costs. BSLT's legal counsel telephone and postage costs are computed on a formula basis.

Any discussion or cursory estimate given by BSLT regarding fees and costs are only an estimate and the fees and costs may be greater than any certain amount mentioned. The number of hours expended, and

resulting fees and costs, varies greatly depending on how events unfold. This makes it impossible to estimate an ultimate fee and cost amount with any reasonable accuracy.

Retainer Fee

In order to proceed with work on this mitigation project, BSLT requires a **\$XX retainer fee**. The retainer fee will not earn interest. The retainer fee does not represent the total cost of fees that will be incurred by BSLT in connection with this project. The total cost which the Project Proponent may incur could be more or less than the amount deposited with BSLT. BSLT will deduct expenses incurred in association with the project from the retainer fee. When and if the account is drawn down to \$1,000, BSLT will review project status and discuss any requirement for additional funds with the Project Proponent. All amounts remaining in the retainer fee will be refunded when the Imjin Parkway Improvement Project is complete.

Billing

BSLT will send the Project Proponent copies of its billings, including a summary of billings from and any other outside consultant, usually on a monthly basis, indicating the current status of your account balance. Unless requested, account statements will not be itemized.

When BSLT's total billings, including billings from BSLT's legal counsel and any outside consultants, have drawn the account down to approximately \$1,000, BSLT shall contact the Project Proponent and coordinate a time to meet and discuss the status of the Imjin Parkway Improvement Project and the the Imjin Parkway Conservation Site easement and/or fee title land. BSLT shall not incur costs beyond the retainer fee until such meeting has been held, BSLT has permission to continue and an addition to the retainer fee is made by the Project Proponent.

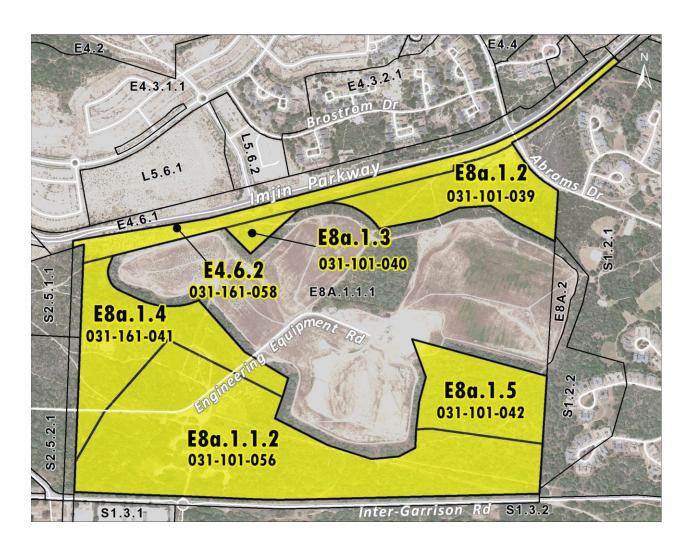

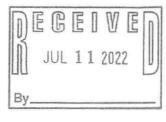

CITY COUNCIL CONSIDER INTRODUCING BY TITLE, WAIVING THE READING, AND APPROVING FIRST READING OF ORDINANCE NO. 2022-ADOPTING AND AMENDING TITLE 15 OF THE MARINA MUNICIPAL CODE TO ADOPT 2022 EDITIONS OF CALIFORNIA BUILDING STANDARDS CODE, SPECIFICALLY 2022 CALIFORNIA BUILDING CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA RESIDENTIAL CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA ELECTRICAL CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA MECHANICAL CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA PLUMBING CODE. 2022 CALIFORNIA ENERGY CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA GREEN BUILDING STANDARDS CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA EXISTING BUILDING CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA HISTORCIAL BUILDING CODE AND 2022 CALIFORNIA FIRE CODE, WITH CERTAIN EXCEPTIONS, MODIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONS REOUIRED BY LOCAL CLIMATIC. GEOLOGICAL OR TOPOGRAPHICAL CONDITIONS; APPROVING FINDINGS TO SUPPORT LOCAL MODIFICATIONS AND SETTING A PUBLIC HEARING FOR NOVEMBER 15, 2022, APPROVING SECOND READING BY TITLE ONLY, WAIVING THE READING, AND FINAL ADOPTION OF THE ORDINANCE SO AS TO BE IN EFFECT AS OF JANUARY 1, 2023.

REQUEST:

It is requested that the City Council:

- Consider approving introduction by title only and approving first reading of Ordinance No. 2022-_____, adopting and amending Title 15 of the Marina Municipal Code to adopt 2022 Editions of California Building Standards Codes, specifically 2022 California Building Code, 2022 California Residential Code, 2022 California Electrical Code, 2022 California Mechanical Code, 2022 California Plumbing Code, 2022 California Energy Code, 2022 California Green Building Standards Code, 2022 California Existing Building Code, 2022 California Historical Building Code and 2022 California Fire Code, with certain exceptions, modifications and additions required by local climatic, geological or topographical conditions.
- 2. Set Tuesday, November 15, 2022, for public hearing, approving second reading by title only, and final adoption of the Ordinance to be in effect as of January 1, 2023.

BACKGROUND:

The California Building Standards Commission (CBSC) has published the latest editions of the construction codes (Codes) for the State of California. They will become effective for every state agency and local municipality as of January 1, 2023, but cities are allowed to modify the codes to reflect local conditions. The City of Marina (City) has until that date to modify the Codes with local exceptions, modifications, and additions, supported by express findings or the Codes will go into effect unmodified by local conditions. Typically, every three years the CBSC reviews and revises the Codes.

The ordinance before Council for introduction on November 1, 2022, would amend Title 15 of the Marina Municipal Code (MMC) to adopt 2022 Editions of the California Building Standards Code - specifically 2022 Building Code, Residential Code, Electrical Code, Mechanical Code, Plumbing Code, Energy Code, Green Building Standards Code, Existing Building Code, Historical Building Code and Fire Code, with certain exceptions, modifications and additions required by local climatic, geological or topographical conditions.

ANALYSIS:

The attached ordinance, with Exhibit A, would introduce for adoption the 2022 CBSC Codes and represents a continuation of previously adopted changes regarding local modifications. There are, however, changes to some of the reference numbering in the new 2022 California Codes, and the proposed ordinance reflects these new reference numbers to ensure that the MMC continues to relate accurately to the CBSC Codes. (**EXHIBIT A**). The local modification will be discussed with the City Council via presentation slides on November 1, 2022. State law requires the City to adopt findings for any local modification to the building standards contained in the CBSC Codes. These findings are included in Exhibit A to the ordinance. These finding are consistent from previous two (2) adoption cycles and continue to apply to the proposed ordinance adoption process.

State law requires that the City Council schedule a public hearing on the ordinance after the first reading. The public hearing can occur in conjunction with the second reading (or, as proposed in this case, the waiver of a formal second reading of the entire ordinance). The ordinance adopting amendments, exceptions, modification, and additions must be sent to the CBSC and be in effect as of January 1, 2023. Pursuant to Government Code 50022.3 and 6066, the notice of the public hearing must be published once a week for two successive weeks. The City Council must determine that the form of this publication is sufficient to give notice to interested persons of the purpose of the ordinance and the subject matter thereof. In addition, the City is required to keep on file a copy of the codes to be adopted by reference for at least 15 days before the public hearing as well as after adoption of the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MARINA ADOPTING AND AMENDING TITLE 15 OF THE MARINA MUNICIPAL CODE TO ADOPT 2022 EDITIONS OF CALIFORNIA BUILDING STANDARD CODES, SPECIFICALLY 2022 CALIFORNIA BUILDING CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA RESIDENTIAL CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA ELECTRICAL CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA MECHANICAL CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA PLUMBING CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA ENERGY CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA GREEN BUILDING STANDARDS CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA EXISTING BUILDING CODE, 2022 CALIFORNIA HISTORICAL BUILDING CODE, AND 2022 CALIFORNIA FIRE CODE, WITH CERTAIN EXCEPTIONS, MODIFICATIONS AND ADDITIONS REQUIRED BY LOCAL CLIMATIC, GEOLOGICAL OR TOPOGRAPHICAL CONDITIONS; AND APPROVING FINDINGS TO SUPPORT LOCAL MODIFICATIONS.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sections 17922, 17958, 17958.5 and 17958.7 of the California Health and Safety Code, the City may adopt the provisions of the California Building, Residential, Electrical, Mechanical, Plumbing, Energy, Green Building Standards, Existing Building, Historical, and Fire Codes with certain exceptions, modifications and additions to provisions of the California codes which are reasonably necessary to protect the health, welfare and safety of the citizens of the City of Marina ("City") because of local climatic, geological and topographical conditions; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered whether certain modifications to the building standards contained in Exhibit A, attached hereto are necessary in the City due to local climatic, geological, or topographical conditions, and.

WHEREAS, the factual findings made are valid and relate to the amendments made to the California codes in this adoption; and

WHEREAS, the City Council directed that a public hearing be held and duly noticed and published in accordance with California Government Code §50022.3, and said hearing was held on November 15, 2022, concerning the purpose of this ordinance to adopt the 2022 California Building Standard Codes with modifications to address unique local conditions; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance was found to be categorically exempt from environmental review, per the provisions of Section 15061(b) (3) of the Guidelines to the California Environmental Quality Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. <u>Title 15 Amended</u>: Title 15 entitled "Buildings and Construction" is hereby amended as set forth in the attached thirty-one (31) pages, marked Exhibit "A," and incorporated herein by this reference thereto.
- 2. <u>Findings Adopted</u>: The City Council hereby adopts the factual findings set forth in respective sections of Title 15 of the Marina Municipal Code, attached hereto as Exhibit A, relating to the amendments made to the California codes.
- 3. <u>Savings Clause</u>: Repeal of any provision of the Marina Municipal Code or any other city ordinance herein will not affect any penalty, forfeiture, or liability incurred before, or preclude prosecution and imposition of penalties for any violation occurring before, this Ordinance's effective date. Any such repealed part will remain in full force and effect for sustaining action or prosecuting violations occurring before the effective date of this ordinance.
- 4. <u>Severability</u>: If any provision, section, paragraph, sentence or word of this ordinance, or the application thereof to any person, property or circumstance is rendered or declared invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions, sections, paragraphs, sentences or words of this ordinance, and their application to other persons, property or circumstances, shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect and, to that end, the provisions of this ordinance are severable.
- 5. <u>Interpretation:</u> The provisions of this ordinance are enacted for the public health, safety and welfare and are to be liberally construed to obtain the beneficial purposes thereof as specified in Chapter 1 of the Building Code. In the event of any conflict between this ordinance and any law, rule, or regulation of the State of California, that requirement which established the higher standard of safety shall govern. Failure to comply with such standard of safety shall be a violation of the Municipal Code. Any provision of the Municipal Code or appendices thereto inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance, to the extent of such inconsistency and no further, is hereby repealed or modified to the extent necessary to affect the provisions of this ordinance.
- 6. <u>Filing of Findings:</u> The City Clerk is hereby directed to file a copy of this ordinance with the California Building Standards Commission of the State of California.
- 7. <u>Notice</u>: The City Council hereby determines that the form of the Notice of the public hearing held on November 15, 2022, which was published on October 19 and October 26, 2022, is sufficient to give notice to interested persons of the purpose of the ordinance and the subject matter thereof.

- 8. <u>Liability</u>: The provisions of this ordinance shall not be construed as imposing upon the City any liability or responsibility for damage to persons or property resulting from defective work, nor shall the City a, or any official, employee or agent thereof, be held as assuming any such liability or responsibility by reason of the review or inspection authorized by the provisions of this ordinance or of any permits or certificates issued under this ordinance.
 - 9. Effective Date: This ordinance shall take effect on January 1, 2023.
- 10. <u>Posting of Ordinance</u>. Within fifteen (15) days after the passage of this ordinance, the City Clerk shall cause it to be posted in three (3) public places designated by resolution of the City Council and a summary of the ordinance, prepared by the City Attorney, shall be published in a local newspaper used to publish official notices for the City prior to the effective date.

15.32.005 Adoption of technical provisions of California Fire Code

A. Except as otherwise provided for in this chapter, the California Fire Code or CFC, 2022 Edition, promulgated by the International Fire Code Institute, including the appendix sections, together with those omissions, amendments, exceptions, and additions thereto as amended in Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations, are approved and adopted, and are incorporated in this chapter by reference and made a part hereof the same as if fully set forth herein.

B. One copy of the CFC has been filed for use and examination of the public in the office of the fire chief of the City of Marina.

15.32.010 Definitions.

As used in this chapter or in any other uniform codes or other nationally recognized fire safety standard made a part of this chapter, unless otherwise apparent from the context:

- A. "City" means the city of Marina when it refers to a political entity and means the incorporated area of the city of Marina when it refers to an area.
- B. "City council" means the city council of Marina.
- C. "Fire Chief" means the chief of the fire department serving the city of Marina.
- D. "Fire code official" means the Fire Chief or his or her designee.
- E. "Mayor" means the mayor of the City of Marina.
- F. "Municipality" means the City of Marina.

15.32.020 Bureau of fire prevention established.

The California Fire Code shall be enforced by the fire chief or his/her designee. The fire chief is appointed as the fire code official. The bureau of fire prevention is established within the city under the direction of the fire code official. The function of the fire prevention bureau shall be the implementation, administration, and enforcement of the provisions of the Fire Code. References within the California Fire Code to the "department of fire prevention" shall mean the bureau of fire prevention

15.32.030 Findings.

The amendments set forth in Sections 15.32.040 through 15.32.090 are reasonably necessary because of the following local climatic, geological, and topographical conditions:

- A. Climate. The city, on average, experiences an approximate annual rainfall of fifteen inches. The heaviest months for rainfall can be expected between January and April. During winter months, the city may experience periods of heavy rain, which can cause local flooding. Due to the proximity of the Pacific Ocean, winter storms are often accompanied by high winds, which have uprooted trees and damaged power lines. The city has also experienced periods of heavy fog, which has delayed the responding fire apparatus and prevented early discovery of structure fires. Light to gusty winds occur during dry periods which, when coupled with highly flammable vegetation, can cause uncontrollable fires. With increased development spreading into brush covered coastal hill areas, wind driven fires could have severe consequences, as have been demonstrated on several occasions throughout the state.
- B. Geologic. The city is susceptible to seismic hazards resulting from movement along any one of several known faults. The most serious direct earthquake hazard threat is from the damage or collapse of buildings and other structures due to ground movement. In addition to damage caused by earthquakes, there is the possibility of earthquake-induced fires starting because of damage to gas lines, power lines or heat-producing appliances and the unavailability to water for fire control due to broken water mains. In the event of a major earthquake many areas of the city may not be accessible to emergency equipment and, if bridges or roads are damaged, the city may be isolated from outside assistance.
- C. Topographical. The city is divided by California State Highway 1. The freeway creates barriers which obstruct traffic patterns and delay response time for fire equipment. The water supply within the city is directly affected by the topographical layout. In the event of a major catastrophe, the city does not have an elevated water storage system to supply pressurized water to the city fire hydrants.
- D. Conclusion. Local climatic, geologic and topographical conditions impact fire suppression efforts and the frequency, spread, intensity and size of fire involving structures in this community. Further, they impact potential damage to all structures from earthquake and subsequent fire. Therefore, it is found to be necessary that the California Fire Code be amended by this chapter to mitigate the effects of these conditions.

101.1 Title. These regulations shall be known as the Fire Code of the City of Marina, hereinafter referred to as "Fire Code".

102.1 Construction and design provisions. The construction and design provisions of this code shall apply to:

- 1. Structures, facilities and conditions arising after the adoption of this code.
- 2. Existing structures, facilities, and conditions not legally in existence at the time of adoption of this code.
- 3. Existing structures, facilities and conditions when identified in specific sections of this code.
- 4. Existing structures, facilities, and conditions, which, in the opinion of the fire code official, constitute a distinct hazard to life and property.
- 5. Existing structures alterations and repairs.
- 5.a. All new work performed in alterations and/or repairs to existing structures shall comply with the current provisions of this Chapter.
- 5.b. When alterations and/or repairs result in the removal, alteration, modification, replacement and/or repair of fifty percent (50%) or more of the external walls of a building, or result in the removal, modification, replacement and/or repair of fifty percent (50%) or more of the existing internal structural and/or non-structural framework, independently or in combination thereof, within a five year period, the entire building shall be made to conform to the current provisions of this Chapter
- 5.c. Calculations of linear wall measurements shall be shown on all plans submitted for building permits, on the cover page in the project description of said plans.
- 5.d. The determination under this section of the requirement for upgrading any existing structure to full conformance with the current provisions of this Chapter shall be at the sole discretion of the fire code official.
- 15.32.070 Amended to read as follows:

MARINA CITY CODE INTERPRETATION

With regards to construction provisions of this Code being required on building remodels:

If wall coverings (drywall, paneling, etc.) are removed down to bare studs, do these walls get included in the calculations?

ANSWER: No

If new wall coverings are installed over existing wall coverings, do these walls get included in the

calculations? ANSWER: No

What is the measurement parameter for determining the 50% figure?

ANSWER: ALL WALLS, INTERIOR AND EXTERIOR, ARE MEASURED USING THE LINEAR FOOTAGE OF THE WALLS.

MARINA CITY CODE COMMENTARY

The following formula is used to determine the 50% linear wall length in the City of Marina and is a standard adopted by the Monterey County Fire Prevention Officers Association:

- Step 1: Determine the total linear length of all walls of the existing building.
- Step 2: Determine the total linear length of all walls of the proposed remodeled building, including additions to the building.
- Step 3. Determine the total linear length of all walls that are proposed to be removed during the remodel.
- Step 4. Add the results of Steps 1, 2, and 3.
- Step 5. Determine whether Step 4 result is over 150% of the Step 1 result. If so, Section 102.1 applies. If not, it does not apply.

103.0.1 Within established fire protection districts, incorporated cities and community services districts, responsibility for enforcement of this code shall be under the direction of the Fire Chief within each district.

Permit Required. Other than one- and two-family residential dwelling units, applicant shall also need to secure a permit and/or clearance from the Monterey Bay Unified Air Pollution Control District.

605.3.1.1 An approved spark arrester shall be installed on all chimneys, incinerators, smokestacks or similar devices using solid fuel for conveying smoke or hot gases to the outer air

15.32.230 Section 605.3.1.2 - Added

Section 605.3.1.2 is added to Chapter 6 of the Fire Code to read as follows:

605.3.1.2 Spark arresters shall have openings in accordance with Section 2113.9.2(3) of the California Building Code and Section 1003.9.2 of the California Residential Code with minimum openings of 3/8" and maximum openings of ½".

Section 901.1.1 is added to Chapter 9 of the Fire Code to read as follows:

901.1.1 Responsibility. The owner of the protected premises shall be responsible for all fire protection systems within the protected premises, whether existing or installed under this code.

15.32.250 Section 901.2.2 - Added

Section 901.2.2 is added to Chapter 9 of the Fire Code to read as follows:

901.2.2 Additional documentation. Additional documentation as required by the fire code official shall be provided to the fire code official in an acceptable format.

15.32.260 Section 901.4 - Amended

Section 901.4 is amended to read as follows:

901.4 Installation. Fire protection systems shall be maintained in accordance with the original installation standards for that system. All systems shall be extended, altered, or augmented as necessary to maintain and continue protection whenever the building is altered, remodeled, or added to. Alterations to fire protection systems shall be done in accordance with applicable standards.

15.32.270 Section 901.4.8 - Added

Section 901.4.8 is added to Chapter 9 of the Fire Code to read as follows:

901.4.8 Nonoperational equipment. Any fire protection equipment that is no longer in service shall be removed.

MARINA CITY CODE INTERPRETATION

With regards to construction provision of the Marina City Fire Code being imposed on ancillary building based on proximity to the main structure, when are detached buildings to be considered "attached" for the purposes of imposing fire protection system requirements of the Marina City Fire Code?

Answer: Ancillary buildings withing 20 feet of the main structure are considered "attached" for the purpose of imposing fire protection system requirements.

901.6.4 Qualifications of Inspection, Testing and Maintenance Personnel. All personnel performing any inspection, testing or maintenance of any fire protection system shall be qualified. Section 903.3.1.3.5.1 is added to read as follows:

903.3.1.3.5.1 Automatic sprinklers shall be installed in all under-stair spaces including all closets.

15.32.610 Section 903.3.1.3.6 - Added

Section 903.3.1.3.6 is added to read as follows:

903.3.1.3.6 Local water flow alarms shall be provided on all sprinkler systems. Local water flow alarms shall be powered from the main kitchen refrigerator circuit. The local water flow alarm shall be clearly audible from within the master bedroom at an audibility level of not less than 75 dBa. Where no kitchen exists in the building, the water flow alarm shall be powered from the bathroom lighting circuit. Where required by the fire code official, interior audible notification appliances or additional water flow alarms may be required to be installed at locations specified by the fire code official.

15.32.620 Section 903.3.1.3.7 - Added

Section 903.3.1.3.7 is added to read as follows:

903.3.1.3.7 Automatic fire sprinklers shall be installed to protect all furnaces and heating system appliances.

MARINA CITY FIRE CODE INTERPRETATION

With regards to requiring fire sprinkler installation in bathrooms,

Do rooms with toilets and/or bidets only and no electrical receptacles require fire sprinklers?

ANSWER: No unless they exceed the 55 square foot minimum in NFPA 13R and NFPA 13D.

Do rooms with showers only and no electrical receptacles require fire sprinklers?

ANSWER: No, unless they exceed the 55 square foot minimum in NFPA 13R and NFPA 13D

15.32.630 Section 903.4.1 - Amended

Section 903.4.1 is amended to read as follows:

903.4.1 Monitoring. Alarm, supervisory and trouble signals shall be distinctly different and shall be automatically transmitted to an approved central station, remote supervising station or proprietary supervising station as defined in NFPA 72, or, when approved by the fire code official, shall sound an audible signal at a constantly attended location. The fire alarm system installed to transmit such signals shall be considered a building fire alarm system (exceptions remain unchanged).

15.32.640 Section 903.4.2 - Amended

Section 903.4.2 is amended to read as follows:

903.4.2 Alarms. One exterior approved audible appliance shall be connected to every automatic sprinkler system in an approved location. Sprinkler water-flow alarm devices shall be activated by water flow equivalent to the flow of a single sprinkler of the smallest orifice size installed in the system. Where a building fire alarm system is installed, actuation of the automatic sprinkler system shall actuate the building fire alarm system. Interior alarm notification appliances shall be installed as required by Section 903.4.2.1.

15.32.650 Section 903.4.2.1 - Added

Section 903.4.2.1 is added to Chapter 9 of the Fire Code to read as follows:

903.4.2.1 Where an automatic fire sprinkler system is installed in a building with more than one tenant or with over 100 sprinkler heads, audible and visible notification appliances shall be installed throughout the building as follows:

- a. Audible notification appliances shall be installed so as to be audible at 15 dBa above average sound pressure level throughout the building.
- b. Visible notification appliances shall be installed in all public and common use areas, restrooms and corridors in accordance with the spacing requirements of NFPA 72.
- c. Visible notification appliances can be eliminated in normally unoccupied portions of buildings where permitted by the fire code official.

EXCEPTION: The requirements of this section do not apply to Group R-3 Occupancies.

15.32.660 Section 903.4.3 - Added

Section 903.4.3 is added to read as follows:

903.4.3 Floor control valves. Approved indicating control valves and water flow switches shall be provided at the point of connection to the riser on each floor in all buildings over one story in height and shall be individually annunciated as approved by the fire code official.

15.32.670 Section 904.13.2 - Amended

Section 904.13.2 is amended to read as follows:

904.13.2 System interconnection. The actuation of the fire extinguishing system shall automatically shut down all fuel and electrical power located under the hood, except for the electrical power to the exhaust air supply. The fuel and electrical supply reset shall be manual.

15.32.680 Section 904.13.5.2 - Amended

Section 904.13.5.2 is amended to read as follows:

904.13.5.2 Extinguishing system service. Automatic fire extinguishing systems shall be serviced by a CSLB licensed C-16 contractor or a CSFM licensed "A" licensee at least every six months and after any activation of the system. Inspection shall be performed by the owner at least monthly in accordance with the currently adopted edition of NFPA 17-A. The service contractor shall review the records of monthly inspections every six months, and deficiencies shall be reported to the fire code official. A service report shall be forwarded to the fire code official by the licensed service contractor within 15 days after every service on the appropriate AES form.

15.32.690 Section 907.1.6 - Added

Section 907.1.6 is added to Chapter 9 of the Fire Code to read as follows:

907.1.6 Multiple Fire Alarm Systems. Multiple fire alarm systems within a single protected premises are not permitted, unless specifically authorized by the fire code official.

15.32.700 Section 907.2 - Amended

Section 907.2 is amended to read as follows:

907.2 Exception 1. The manual fire alarm box is not required for fire alarm control units dedicated to elevator recall control.

15.32.710 Section 907.6.5- Amended

Section 907.6.5 is amended to read as follows:

907.6.5 Access. Access shall be provided to each fire alarm system component for periodic inspection, maintenance, and testing.

15.32.720 Section 907.6.6- Amended

Section 907.6.6 is amended to read as follows:

907.6.6 Monitoring. Fire alarm systems, whether required by this chapter or the California Building Code or voluntarily installed, shall be monitored by an approved supervising station in accordance with NFPA 72 and this section.

15.32.730 Section 907.6.6.5- Added

Section 907.6.6.5 is added to read as follows:

907.6.6.5 Zone transmittal. Where required by the fire code official, fire alarm signals shall be transmitted by zone to the supervising station and retransmitted by zone to the public fire service communications center.

15.32.740 Section 907.6.6.6 - Added

Section 907.6.6.6 is added to Chapter 9 of the Fire Code to read as follows:

907.6.6.6 Means of communication. The use of either POTS or cable telephone lines with a digital alarm communicator transmitter shall not be permitted.

EXCEPTION. Where no other communications methods are available, the use of telephone lines shall be permitted to be used on a temporary basis not to exceed one year from the date of final acceptance test or until permitted alternate means of communications are available.

15.32.750 Section 907.7.2- Amended Section 907.7.2 is amended to read as follows:

- 907.7.2 Completion documents. The following documentation shall be provided at the time of acceptance testing for all fire alarm system installations:
 - 1. A record of completion in accordance with NFPA 72.
- 2. A contractor's statement verifying that the system has been installed in accordance with the approved plans and specifications and has been 100% tested in accordance with NFPA 72.
- 3. A contractor's affidavit of personnel qualifications, indicating that all personnel involved with the installation of the fire alarm system meet the qualification requirements of the fire code official.

15.32.760 Section 1205.1.1- Added Section 1205.1.1 is added to read as follows:

1205.1.1 Signing and Marking. In addition to signing and marking requirements of the California Building Code and the California Residential Code, the following signing and marking is required:

15.32.770 Section 1205.1.1.1- Added Section 1205.1.1.1 is added to read as follows:

1205.1.1.1 Main Panel Exterior Marking. A placard is required to be permanently affixed to the main service disconnect panel. The placard shall be red in color with white capital letters at least 1/2" in height and in a non-serif font, to read "SOLAR DISCONNECT INSIDE PANEL." The placard shall be constructed of weather-resistant, durable plastic with engraved letters, or other approved material.

15.32.780 Section 1205.1.1.2- Added Section 1205.1.1.2 is added to read as follows:

1205.1.1.2 Circuit Disconnecting Means Marking. A permanent label is to be affixed adjacent to the circuit breaker controlling the inverter or other photovoltaic system electrical controller. The label shall have contrasting color capital letters at least 3/8" in height and in a non—serif font, to read "SOLAR DISCONNECT." The label shall be constructed of durable adhesive material or other approved material.

15.32.790 Section 1205.1.1.3- Added Section 1205.1.1.3 is added to read as follows:

1205.1.1.3 Secondary Power Sources. Where photovoltaic systems are interconnected to battery systems, generator backup systems, or other secondary power systems, additional signage acceptable to the fire code official shall be required indicating the location of the secondary power source shutoff switch.

15.32.800 Section 1205.1.1.4- Added Section 1205.1.1.4 is added to read as follows:

1205.1.1.4 Installer Information. Signage acceptable to the fire code official indicating the name and emergency telephone number of the installing contractor shall be required to be installed adjacent to the main disconnect.

Section 1205.2.1 is amended to read as follows:

Section 1205.2.1, Exceptions 1 and 2 of the California Fire Code are deleted in their entirety.

15.32.820 Section 1205.2.1.4- Added

Section 1205.2.1.4 is added to read as follows:

1205.2.1.4 Hip and Valley Layout. Hip and Valley Layouts. Modules shall be located no closer than one and one-half feet (1-1/2') to a hip or valley if modules are to be placed on both sides of a hip or valley. Where modules are located on only one side of a hip or valley that is of equal length, the modules shall be permitted to be placed directly adjacent to the hip or valley.

15.32.830 Section 1206.15- Added

Section 1206.15 is added to read as follows:

1206.15 Signage acceptable to the fire code official shall be required indicating the location of the stationary fuel cell power system.

15.32.840 Section 3905.3- Added

Section 3905.3 is added to read as follows:

3905.3. Fire Protection Systems. Fire protection systems in occupancies regulated by this chapter shall be in accordance with Section 901.11 of this Code.

15.32.850 Section 5609.0 added

Section 5609.0 is added to Chapter 56 of the California Fire Code to read as follows:

5609.0 Safe and Sane Fireworks Permitted. Notwithstanding the foregoing provision of law, safe and sane fireworks, as defined by the California Health and Safety Code or regulations issued by the Office of the State Fire Marshal, may be sold and discharged within the City during the period from 12:00 o'clock noon on June 28 to and until 11:59 p.m. on July 4 of each year, pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance and not otherwise.

No fireworks shall be sold, or offered for sale, discharged, or possessed within the city of Marina that are classified by the California Health and Safety Code as a dangerous firework. Any property owner that allows the willful possession, sale or discharge of illegal or dangerous fireworks shall be held responsible and subject to a citation resulting in a fine, imprisonment or both. Any person in possession of illegal or dangerous fireworks shall be held responsible and subject to a citation resulting in a fine, imprisonment or both, all fireworks shall be confiscated.

The safe and sane firework known as a "Piccolo Pete", "Whistling Phantom", or similar type of whistling fountain shall not be sold or discharged within the city of Marina.

15.32.860 Section 5609.1 added

Section 5609.1 is added to Chapter 56 of the California Fire Code to read as follows:

5609.1 Sale Permit Required. No person, co-partnership, partnership, organization, or group shall sell safe and sane fireworks within the City without first having applied for and received a permit therefor in compliance with the terms of this Ordinance. Upon receipt of a written application for a permit pursuant to this ordinance, the city manager shall direct the Fire Chief to cause an investigation to be made and make a report to the city manager of his findings and his recommendations for or against the issuance of a permit, together with his reasons therefor. After the receipt of such report and recommendations, the City Manager shall have the power, in his discretion, to grant or deny the application. The denial of an application may be appealed to the City council by a written notice of appeal filed with the city clerk within five (5) days after notice of the city manager's action. Any permit granted by the city manager may be subject to such reasonable conditions and restrictions as may be imposed by the city manager, and such conditions and restrictions shall be complied with by the permittee.

15.32.870 Section 5609.1.2 added.

Section 5609.1.2 is added to Chapter 56 of the California Fire Code to read as follows:

5609.1.2 Permittees. The sale of "safe and sane" fireworks within the city is allowed by non-profit agency, certified by the Secretary of the State of California or the Internal Revenue Service, that is based in the City of Marina and having a mailing address within the city of Marina and whose

primary purpose is to benefit the youth and adults that live in the city of Marina. No permit for the sale of safe and sane fireworks shall be issued to any person, corporation, partnership, organization or group which has not been in business or in operation within the City for at least one (1) year continuously preceding the filing of the application. Being in business shall require the prior payment of a business license fee to the City. An organization or group shall be deemed to be in operation if it has a principal and permanent meeting place in the City, holds regular business meetings at that location and has a bona fide membership of at least twenty (20) members.

15.32.880 Section 5609.1.3 added.

Section 5609.1.3 is added to Chapter 56 of the California Fire Code to read as follows: 5609.1.3. Application for Permit. Application for a permit to sell safe and sane fireworks shall:

- a) Be made in writing.
- b) Be filed with the Fire Chief on or prior to May 1 of each year.
- c) Set forth the proposed location of all fireworks stands, and the dimensions thereof.
- d) Be accompanied by an assurance that if a permit is issued the applicant, at the time of receipt of such permit, shall deliver to the city manager satisfactory evidence of an insurance policy with \$50,000/100,000 public liability and \$10,000 property damage coverages, with a rider attached to the policy designating the City and its agents and employees as additional insured thereunder.
- e) Be accompanied by an assurance that if a permit is issued the applicant, at the time of receipt of such permit, shall deposit \$100.00 cash with the city clerk, which deposit shall be refunded to the permittee after the permit period has ended, if said permittee has complied with all applicable provisions of law for the sale of fireworks, but to be forfeited and retained by the City in the event of noncompliance with such law;
- f) Be accompanied by a nonrefundable application fee as specified in Chapter 3 of the Marina Municipal Code; and
- g) Shall contain the following information: name and address of the applicant; applicant's business or organization status; the date the applicant was organized or first conducted business; the names and addresses of applicant's officers, if any; the location of applicant's principal and permanent place of business or meeting; the location where applicant will sell and store fireworks; and the applicant's State Board of Equalization Sales Tax Permit Number.

Provided the above requirements are met, permits shall be granted on a first-applied for, first-granted basis. Applicants for permits hereunder shall be notified by the Fire Chief or his or her designee of the granting or denial of their application for a permit on or before the first day of June each year.

15.32.890 Section 5609.1.4 added.

Section 5609.1.4 is added to Chapter 56 of the California Fire Code to read as follows: 5609.1.4 Fireworks Stands, Regulations. All retail sales of safe and sane fireworks shall be permitted only from within temporary fireworks stand, and the sale from any other building or structure is prohibited. Such stands shall be subject to the following regulations:

- a) No person, corporation, partnership, organization, or group other than the designated permittee shall operate the stand for which a permit is issued or share or otherwise participate in the profits from the operation of such stand.
- b) No person other than individuals who are employees of the permittee or members of a permittee organization or group, or the spouses or children, eighteen years or older, of such persons, shall sell or otherwise participate in the sale of fireworks at such stand.

- c) Fireworks stands shall comply with the provisions of the Building Code of the City, and all stands shall be erected under the supervision of the building official, who shall require that stands be constructed in a manner which will reasonably insure the safety of attendants and patrons. An electrical permit and compliance with electrical codes are required.
- d) If, in the judgment of the building official or fire department inspector, the construction of the stands or the conduct of the operators therein does not conform to the provisions of this ordinance, such officer may order the stands immediately closed.
- e) No person shall be allowed in the interior of the stands except those directly employed in the sale of fireworks.
- f) There shall be at least one supervisor, twenty-one (21) years of age or older, on duty at all times. There shall be no sale of fireworks to persons under sixteen (16) years of age.
- g) No stand shall be placed closer than thirty (30) feet to any other building.
- h) NO SMOKING signs shall be prominently displayed both inside and outside the stand. No smoking shall be permitted within the stand, or within five (5) feet of the stand.
- i) All weeds and combustible material shall be cleared from the location of the stand. No rubbish shall be allowed to accumulate in or around any fireworks stand, nor shall a fire nuisance be permitted to exist.
- j) No stand shall be erected before June 15th of any year. The premises on which the stand is erected shall be cleared of all structures and debris not later than noon of the 12th day of July following.
- k) All stands must be equipped with at least one 2 1/2-gallon water pressure type extinguisher for each exit in the stand. Each fire extinguisher shall have a current State Fire Marshal tag affixed and have been serviced within the last year.
- I) Each stand in excess of twenty (20) feet in length must have at least two (2) exits; and each stand in excess of forty (40) feet in length must have at least three (3) exits spaced approximately equidistant apart; provided, however, that in no case shall the distance between exits exceed twenty (20) feet.
- m) No stand shall be constructed with a depth of more than twelve (12) feet.
- n) All unsold safe and sane fireworks shall be returned to the wholesaler not later than the eighth (8) day of July.
- o) Fireworks shall be stored only in a metal type Conex container and be equipped with a lock for overnight storage at the firework stand location. No fireworks shall be stored in the temporary fireworks stands when the stand is not occupied and not in operation.
- p) In addition to the above, the permittee shall also conform to all regulations relating to the storage and sale of fireworks as set forth in the California Health and Safety Code and the Fireworks Rules and Regulations of the State Fire Marshal.
- q) No one shall possess, use, or sell dangerous or illegal fireworks from the stand or near the stand. Violation of this section shall cause for immediately revoking the Fire Department permit and the stand will be shut down.
- r) No fireworks shall be sold or discharged on the Marina Municipal Airport property.

15.32.900 Section 5609.1.5 added.

Section 5609.1.5 is added to Chapter 56 of the California Fire Code to read as follows:

a. 5609.1.5 NUMBER OF FIREWORK STAND PERMITS.

- (a) Firework stand permits shall be limited to one (1) permit being available for firework stands in the City per every three thousand (3,000) in City population.
- (b) As the population of the City increases, the then current limit on the number of permits for any calendar year shall be increased by one (1) permit per every three thousand (3,000) in additional City population. Population to be determined using the then current State of California Department of Finance, Demographic Research Unit's Population Estimates for California cities.

15.32.910 Section D103.2 – Amended Section D103.2 is amended to read as follows:

D103.2 Grade. Fire apparatus access roads shall not exceed 15 percent in grade with a maximum side slope of 5%.

EXCEPTION: Grades steeper than 15 percent, if approved by the fire code official, shall be paved with perpendicularly grooved concrete.

15.32.920 Appendix Q adopted and added. Appendix Q is adopted and added to read:

APPENDIX Q: Standard Fire Conditions for Single Family Dwellings

SECTION Q101 GENERAL

Q101.1 Scope. Applications for the construction or remodel of single family dwellings, including oneand two-family dwellings, townhomes, modular and manufactured homes, and mobile homes outside of established mobile home parks, shall be subject to the fire conditions in this appendix when conditioned by the Fire Code Official.

Q101.2 Conflicting sections. Where provisions in this appendix conflict with other sections of this Code or other appendices, the provisions of this appendix shall prevail unless otherwise directed by the Fire Code Official.

SECTION Q102 ROADS

Q102.1 General. These conditions will be used primarily when conditioning a subdivision or other project that requires roads. Roads identified in this Section are vehicular access to more than two (2) parcels; more than four (4) residential units; or access to any industrial or commercial occupancy. Includes public and private streets and lanes.

Q102.2 Road access. (FIRE 001). Access roads shall be required for every building when any portion of the exterior wall of the first story is located more than one hundred fifty (150) feet from fire department access. All roads shall be constructed to provide a minimum of two (2) ten (10) feet wide traffic lanes with an unobstructed vertical clearance of not less than fifteen (15) feet. The roadway surface shall provide unobstructed access to conventional drive vehicles including sedans and fire apparatus and shall be an all-weather surface designed to support the imposed load of fire apparatus (75,000 pounds). Each road shall have an approved name.

Q102.3 Roadway engineering. (FIRE 002). The grade for all roads shall not exceed fifteen percent (15%) with a maximum side slope of five percent (5%). Where road grades are 8 percent (8%) or less, an all-weather aggregate base is required at a minimum or as required in other sections of the Monterey County Code. Where road grades exceed eight percent (8%), a minimum structural roadway surface of 0.17 feet of asphaltic concrete on 0.34 feet of aggregate base shall be required. The length of vertical curves in roadways, exclusive of gutters, ditches and drainage structures designed to hold or divert water, shall not be less than one hundred (100) feet. No roadway turn shall have a horizontal inside radius of less than fifty (50) feet. A roadway turn radius of fifty (50) to one hundred (100) feet is required to have an additional four (4) feet of roadway surface. A roadway turn radius of one hundred (100) to two hundred (200) feet is required to have an additional two (2) feet of roadway surface. Roadway turnarounds shall be required on dead-end roads in excess of one hundred fifty (150) feet of surface length. The minimum 30919\000\\000\1670014.2:102622

turning radius for a turnaround shall be forty (40) feet from the center line of the road. If a hammerhead/T is used, the top of the "T" shall be a minimum of sixty (60) feet in length.

Q102.4 Dead end roads.

Q102.4.1 Parcels less than one acre. (FIRE 003). For parcels less than one acre, the maximum length of a dead-end road, including all dead-end roads accessed from that dead-end road, shall not exceed eight hundred (800) feet. All dead-end road lengths shall be measured from the edge of the roadway surface at the intersection that begins the road to the end of the road surface at its furthest point. Where a dead-end road serves parcels of differing sizes, the shortest allowable length shall apply. Each dead-end road shall have a turnaround constructed at its terminus. The minimum turning radius for a turnaround shall be forty (40) feet from the center line of the road. If a hammerhead/T is used, the top of the "T" shall be a minimum of sixty (60) feet in length.

Q102.4.2 Parcels greater than one acre and not exceeding five acres (FIRE 004). For parcels greater than one acre and not exceeding five acres, the maximum length of a dead-end road, including all dead-end roads accessed from that dead-end road, shall not exceed one thousand three hundred twenty (1,320) feet. All dead-end road lengths shall be measured from the edge of the roadway surface at the intersection that begins the road to the end of the road surface at its furthest point. Where a dead-end road serves parcels of differing sizes, the shortest allowable length shall apply. Each dead-end road shall have a turnaround constructed at its terminus. The minimum turning radius for a turnaround shall be forty (40) feet from the center line of the road. If a hammerhead/T is used, the top of the "T" shall be a minimum of sixty (60) feet in length

Q102.4.3 Parcels greater than five acres and not exceeding twenty (20) acres. (FIRE 005). For parcels greater than five acres and not exceeding twenty (20) acres, the maximum length of a dead-end road, including all dead-end roads accessed from that dead-end road, shall not exceed two thousand six hundred forty (2,640) feet. All dead-end road lengths shall be measured from the edge of the roadway surface at the intersection that begins the road to the end of the road surface at its furthest point. Where a dead-end road serves parcels of differing sizes, the shortest allowable length shall apply. Each dead-end road shall have turnarounds at its terminus and at no greater than one thousand three hundred twenty (1,320) foot intervals. The minimum turning radius for a turnaround shall be forty (40) feet from the center line of the road. If a hammerhead/T is used, the top of the "T" shall be a minimum of sixty (60) feet in length.

Q102.4.4 Parcels greater than twenty (20) acres. (FIRE 006). For parcels greater than twenty (20) acres, the maximum length of a dead-end road, including all dead-end roads accessed from that dead-end road, shall not exceed five thousand two hundred eighty (5,280) feet. All dead-end road lengths shall be measured from the edge of the roadway surface at the intersection that begins the road to the end of the road surface at its furthest point. Where a dead-end road serves parcels of differing sizes, the shortest allowable length shall apply. Each dead-end road shall have turnarounds at its terminus and at no greater than one thousand three hundred twenty (1,320)-foot intervals. The minimum turning radius for a turnaround shall be forty (40) feet from the center line of the road. If a hammerhead/T is used, the top of the "T" shall be a minimum of sixty (60) feet in length.

SECTION Q103 DRIVEWAYS, GATES, AND BRIDGES

Q103.1 Driveways. (FIRE 007). Driveway identified in this Section is defined as a vehicle access that serves up to two (2) parcels with no more than two (2) residential units and any number on non-commercial or industrial buildings on each parcel. Driveways shall not be less than twelve (12) feet wide traffic lane and minimum fourteen (14) feet wide unobstructed clearance, with an unobstructed vertical clearance of not less than fifteen (15) feet. The grade for all driveways shall not exceed fifteen percent (15%) with a maximum side slope of five percent (5%). Where driveway grades are eight percent (8%) or less, an all-weather surface such as an aggregate base shall meet minimum fire requirements. Other types of material for driveways may be required by Monterey County Code. Where the grade exceeds eight percent (8%), a minimum structural roadway surface of 0.17 feet of asphaltic concrete on 0.34 feet of aggregate base shall be required. The driveway surface shall be capable of supporting the imposed load of 30919\000\1670014.2:102622

fire apparatus forty thousand (40,000) pounds, and be accessible by conventional-drive vehicles, including sedans. For driveways with turns ninety (90) degrees and less, the minimum horizontal inside radius of curvature shall be twenty-five (25) feet. For driveways with turns greater than ninety (90) degrees, the minimum horizontal inside radius curvature shall be twenty-eight (28) feet. For all driveway turns, an additional surface of four (4) feet shall be added. All driveways exceeding one hundred fifty (150) feet in length, but less than eight hundred (800) feet in length, shall provide a turnout near the midpoint of the driveway. Where the driveway exceeds eight hundred (800) feet, turnouts shall be provided at no greater than four hundred (400)-foot intervals. Turnouts shall be a minimum of twelve (12) feet wide and thirty (30) feet long with a minimum of twenty (25) foot taper at both ends. Turnarounds shall be required on driveways in excess of one hundred fifty (150) feet of surface length and shall be required on driveways in excess of one hundred fifty (150) feet of surface length and shall be located within fifty (50) feet of the primary building. The minimum turning radius for a turnaround shall be forty (40) feet from the center line of the driveway. If a hammerhead/T is used, the top of the "T" shall be a minimum of sixty (60) feet in length.

Q103.2 Gates. (FIRE 008). All gates providing access from a road to a driveway shall be located at least thirty (30) feet from the roadway and shall open to allow a vehicle to stop without obstructing traffic on the road. Gate entrances shall be at least two (2) feet wider than the width of the traffic lane but in no case be less than fourteen (14) feet wide unobstructed and unobstructed vertical clearance of fifteen (15) feet. Where a one-way road with a single traffic lane provides access to a gated entrance, a forty (40) foot turning radius shall be used. Where gates are to be locked, the installation of a key box or other acceptable means for immediate access by emergency equipment may be required.

Q103.3 Bridges. (FIRE 009). All new and reconstructed bridges shall be at least the width of the roadbed and berms, but in no case less than twelve (12) feet wide. Bridge width on all roads exceeding tertiary standards shall not be less than the width of the two lanes with berms. All bridges shall be designed for HS15-44 loading and have guardrails. Appropriate signage, including but not limited to, weight ratings or vertical clearance limitations, and one-way road or single-lane road conditions, shall be provided at both entrances to any bridge. One-lane bridges may be permitted if there is unobstructed visibility across the entire bridge, and turnouts are provided at both bridge ends. The fire authority may impose more stringent requirements for bridges.

SECTION Q104 SIGNS AND ADDRESSES

Q104.1 Road signs. (FIRE 010). All newly constructed or approved roads and streets shall be designated by names or numbers, posted on signs clearly visible and legible from the roadway. Size of letters, numbers and symbols for street and road signs shall be a minimum four-inch letter height, ½-inch stroke, and shall be a color that is reflective and clearly contrasts with the background color of the sign. All numerals shall be Arabic. Street and road signs shall be non-combustible and shall be visible and legible from both directions of vehicle travel for a distance of at least one hundred (100) feet. Height, visibility, legibility, and orientation of street and road signs shall be meet the provisions of the jurisdiction. This section does not require any entity to rename or renumber existing roads or streets, nor shall a roadway providing access only to a single commercial or industrial occupancy require naming or numbering. Signs required under this section identifying intersecting roads, streets and private lanes shall be placed at the intersection of those roads, streets and/or private lanes. Signs identifying traffic access or flow limitations (i.e., weight or vertical clearance limitations, dead-end road, one-way road or single lane conditions, etc.) shall be placed: (a) at the intersection preceding the traffic access limitation; and (b) not more than one hundred (100) feet before such traffic access limitation. Road, street and private lane signs required by this article shall be installed prior to final acceptance of road improvements by the Fire Code Official.

Q104.2 Addresses for buildings. (FIRE 011). All buildings shall be issued an address in accordance with jurisdictional requirements. Each occupancy, including detached accessory dwelling units (ADU), except accessory buildings, shall have its own permanently posted address. When multiple occupancies exist within a single building, each individual occupancy shall be separately identified by its own address. Letters, numbers and symbols for addresses shall be a minimum of four-inch (4") height, 1/2-inch stroke, 30919\000\1670014.2:102622

contrasting with the background color of the sign, and shall be Arabic. The sign and numbers shall be reflective and made of a noncombustible material. Address signs shall be placed at each driveway entrance and at each driveway split. Address signs shall be and visible from both directions of travel along the road. In all cases, the address shall be posted at the beginning of construction and shall be maintained thereafter. Address signs along one-way roads shall be visible from both directions of travel. Where multiple addresses are required at a single driveway, they shall be mounted on a single sign. Where a roadway provides access solely to a single commercial occupancy, the address sign shall be placed at the nearest road intersection providing access to that site. Permanent address numbers shall be posted prior to requesting final clearance.

SECTION Q105 WATER SUPPLY

Q105.1 Water systems. (FIRE 012). The provisions of this condition shall apply when new parcels are approved by a local jurisdiction. The emergency water system shall be available on-site prior to the completion of road construction, where a community water system is approved, or prior to the completion of building construction, where an individual system is approved. Approved water systems shall be installed and made serviceable prior to the time of construction. Water systems constructed, extended or modified to serve a new development, a change of use, or an intensification of use, shall be designed to meet, in addition to average daily demand, NFPA Standard 1142 or other adopted standards. The quantity of water required pursuant to this chapter shall be in addition to the domestic demand and shall be permanently and immediately available.

Q105.2 (RESERVED) (FIRE 013).

Q105.3 Single parcel fire protection water supply. (FIRE 014). For development of structures totaling less than three thousand (3,000) square feet on a single parcel, the minimum fire protection water supply shall be four thousand nine hundred (4,900) gallons. For development of structures totaling three thousand (3,000) square feet or more on a single parcel, the minimum fire protection water supply shall be nine thousand eight hundred (9,800) gallons. For development of structures totaling more than ten thousand (10,000) square feet on a single parcel, the reviewing authority may require additional fire protection water supply. Other water supply alternatives, including ISO Rural Class 8 mobile water systems, may be permitted by the fire authority to provide for the same practical effect. The quantity of water required by this condition shall be in addition to the domestic demand and shall be permanently and immediately available.

Q105.4 Fire hydrants and valves. (FIRE 015). A fire hydrant or fire valve is required. The hydrant or fire valve shall be eighteen (18) inches above grade, eight feet from flammable vegetation, no closer than four feet nor further than twelve (12) feet from a roadway, and in a location where fire apparatus using it will not block the roadway. The hydrant serving any building shall be not less than fifty (50) feet and not more than one thousand (1,000) feet by road from the building it is to serve. Minimum hydrant standards shall include a brass head and valve with at least one 2 1/2-inch National Hose outlet supplied by a minimum four inch main and riser. More restrictive hydrant requirements may be applied by the Reviewing Authority. Each hydrant/valve shall be identified with a reflectorized blue marker, with minimum dimensions of three inches, located on the driveway address sign, non-combustible post or fire hydrant riser. If used, the post shall be within three feet of the hydrant/valve, with the blue marker not less than three feet or greater than five feet above the ground, visible from the driveway. On paved roads or driveways, reflectorized blue markers shall be permitted to be installed in accordance with the State Fire Marshal's Guidelines for Fire Hydrant Markings Along State Highways and Freeways, May 1988.

SECTION Q106 SETBACKS

Q106.1 Setbacks. (FIRE 016). Except as permitted by the fire code official, all parcels one acre and larger shall provide a minimum thirty (30) foot setback for new buildings and accessory buildings from all property lines and/or the center of the road. For parcels less than one-acre, alternate fuel modification standards or other requirements may be imposed by the Fire Code Official to provide the same practical effect.

SECTION Q107 VEGETATION AND DEBRIS DISPOSAL

Q107.1 Disposition of vegetation and debris fuels. (FIRE 017). Disposal, including chipping, burying, or removal to a landfill site approved by the local jurisdiction, of vegetation and debris caused by site development and construction, road and driveway construction, and fuel modification shall be completed prior to final clearance of the related permit.

SECTION Q108 GREENBELTS

Q108.1 Greenbelts. (FIRE 018). Subdivisions and other developments, which propose greenbelts as a part of the development plan, shall locate said greenbelts strategically as a separation between wild land fuels and structures. The locations shall be approved by the Fire Code Official.

SECTION Q109 DEFENSIBLE SPACE

Q109.1 Standard defensible space requirements. (FIRE 019). Defensible space requirements shall meet Section 4291 of the Public Resources Code or the Monterey County Code, whichever is more restrictive. Additional or alternate fire protection approved by the Fire Code Official may be required to provide reasonable fire safety. Environmentally sensitive areas may require alternative fire protection, to be determined by the Fire Code Official and other jurisdictional authorities.

Q109.2 (RESERVED) (FIRE 020).

SECTION Q110 FIRE PROTECTION SYSTEMS

Q110.1 Residential fire sprinkler systems (Standard). (FIRE 021). The building(s) and attached structure(s) shall be fully protected with automatic fire sprinkler system(s). Installation shall be in accordance with the applicable NFPA standard. A minimum of four sets of plans for fire sprinkler systems must be submitted by a California licensed C-16 contractor and approved prior to installation. This requirement is not intended to delay issuance of a building permit. A rough sprinkler inspection must be scheduled by the installing contractor and completed prior to requesting a framing inspection.

Q110.2 (RESERVED) (FIRE 022).

Q110.3 (RESERVED) (FIRE 023).

Q110.4 Residential fire alarm systems. (FIRE 024). The residence shall be fully protected with an approved household fire warning system as defined by NFPA 72. Plans and specifications for the household fire warning system shall be submitted by a California licensed C-10 contractor and approved prior to installation. Household fire warning systems installed in lieu of single-station smoke alarms required by the California Residential Code shall meet the requirements of the California Residential Code.

Q110.5 (RESERVED) (FIRE 025).

15.32.930 Appendix R adopted and added. Appendix R is adopted and added to read:

Appendix R Roofs

SECTION R101 GENERAL

R101.1 Scope. Applications for the construction or remodel of any buildings shall be subject to the roofing conditions of this Appendix when conditioned by the Fire Code Official.

R101.2 Conflicting Sections. Where provisions in this Appendix conflict with other sections of this Code or other appendices, the provisions of this Appendix shall prevail unless otherwise directed by the Fire Code Official.

SECTION R102 NEW BUILDINGS

R102.1 General. (FIRE 026). Roofing requirements for all new buildings shall be a minimum Class "B" roof assembly as defined by the International Building Code.

EXCEPTION: Greenhouses shall be exempt from the requirements of this Section.

R102.2 Very High Hazard Severity Zones. (FIRE 027). Roofing requirements for all new buildings in Very High Hazard Severity Zones shall be a minimum Class "A" roof assembly as defined by the International Building Code.

SECTION R103 EXISTING BUILDINGS

R103.1 General. (FIRE 026). Roofing requirements for existing buildings when fifty percent (50%) or more of the roof area is reroofed within a one-year period after the issuance of a building permit shall be a minimum Class "B" roof assembly as defined by the California Building Code. Where there is no permit issued, this section is applicable to buildings constructed after the effective date of this code and to buildings where fifty percent (50%) or more of the roof area is reroofed within a one-year period after commencing construction.

R103.2 Very High Hazard Severity Zone. (FIRE 027). Roofing requirements for existing buildings within a very high hazard severity zone when fifty percent (50%) or more of the roof area is reroofed within a one-year period after the issuance of a building permit shall be a minimum Class "A" roof assembly as defined by the International Building Code. Where there is no permit issued, this Section is applicable to such buildings constructed after the effective date of this code and to buildings where fifty percent (50%) or more of the roof area is reroofed within a one-year period after commencing construction.

SECTION R104 ADDITIONS TO EXISTING BUILDINGS

R104.1 General. The requirements of this Appendix shall apply to all additions to existing buildings, except that only the new portions of the roof shall be required to meet the requirements of this Appendix.

CITY COUNCIL CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 2022-AUTHORIZING STAFF TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT ON BEHALF OF THE CITY OF MARINA WITH BIRD, INC. NECESSARY TO ALLOW SCOOTERS TO BE USED WITHIN THE JURISDICTION AND TO EXECUTE AN ENCROACHMENT PERMIT.

REQUEST

It is requested that City Council consider

1. Adopting Resolution No. 2022- authorizing staff to work with Bird, Inc. to implement the deployment and authorize the City Manager to execute a Shared Mobility Agreement, an encroachment permit with a fee agreement, and amendments necessary to implement a Shared Mobility Device Services program in Marina.

BACKGROUND

On February 11, 2022, the Bird Rides, Inc. (the "Company") contacted City of Marina ("City") Staff regarding bringing electric scooters to Marina.

On August 26, 2022, Bird notified the City that they reached a tentative agreement to bring electric scooters to California State University Monterey Bay (CSUMB).

The City Council is asked to approve the City Manager to sign a Shared Mobility Device Service agreement with Bird Rides, Inc ("EXHIBIT A") with an encroachment permit with a fee agreement to be executed by Public Works Director or their designee.

ANALYSIS

The Company is proposing to bring stand-up electric scooters to the City of Marina. Multiple attempts to bring stand-alone electric scooters to the City of Marina and CSUMB have not been successful. One of the key differences that Bird believes that this deployment will be successful is that they are waiting to deploy scooters in either location until both agencies have reached an agreement. This is advantageous for the City, because it will create another form of transportation between the campus and the City of Marina.

Another important aspect of the agreement is that the fleet will be managed by a fleet manager who is responsible for maintaining and managing the fleet of scooters within the City. The fleet manager will be picking them up, charging and repairing them and then putting them back in strategic locations. During business hours (8:00 am to 6:00 pm) the fleet manager will have a minimum four (4) hour response time for calls for service and City Staff can escalate that for high priority issues to a two (2) hour response. For any issues that are not addressed within the response time, City staff's time will be covered by an Encroachment Permit.

The consulting Attorney for this project is previous City Attorney Robert Rathie. He has been involved in the details of the contract language including ensuring that the indemnification agreement and the insurance coverage are sufficient for the City of Marina. Under Assembly Bill (AB) 1286 (September 2020), required insurance coverage for shared mobility devices to operate in cities is set to a minimum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for each occurrence and not less than five million dollars (\$5,000,000) aggregate for all occurrences. In negotiating the contract, the Company agreed to Robert's proposal to bring this up to two million dollars (\$2,000,000) for each occurrence, five million dollars (\$5,000,000) aggregate and to include five million dollars (\$5,000,000) umbrella insurance.

Further, Robert consulted with Monterey Bay Area Self Insurance Authority (MBASIA) regarding the insurance amount and our consultant agreed that the insurance amount that the Company has agreed to provide is sufficient.

Shared mobility devices such as these electric scooters help with last mile transportation for citizens who use public transportation, and they will help cut down on carbon emissions within the city. Further, alternative transportation modes such as these will benefit the City for Planning Projects to prove we are working on reducing Vehicle Miles Travelled (VMT).

FISCAL IMPACT

If the resolution is adopted, then the City shall enter into a fee agreement with the Company that will result in all staff time to be 100% cost recovery as required in Marina Municipal Code Chapter 3.24.

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION

The City of Marina determined that the proposed action is not a project as defined by the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) (CCR, Title 14, Chapter 3 ("CEQA Guidelines), Article 20, Section 15378).

SHARED MOBILITY DEVICE SERVICES BETWEEN THE CITY OF MARINA AND BIRD

The Shared Mobility Device Services Agreement ("Agreement") is made on ________, 2022, by and between the CITY OF MARINA, a municipal corporation ("City") located at 211 Hillcrest Avenue Marina, CA (the "City") and BIRD RIDES, Inc., located at 406 Broadway #369 Santa Monica, CA 90401 (the "Company") to provide services under the following terms and limitations. This agreement shall remain in effect for 12 months and may be renewed unless either party provides written notice to the other of its intention not to renew at least ninety (90) days prior to the end of the then-current term, or unless terminated as set forth below. City and Company are sometimes referred to in the singular as a "Party" and jointly as the "Parties."

RECITALS

- 1. City seeks by this Agreement to implement a 12-month pilot program for a dockless standup electric scooter sharing systems program.
- 2. Company proposes to operate a shared mobility program within the City.
- 3. Company will abide by all City ordinances and rules governing the use of public right-of-way to provide efficient and effective electric scooter sharing systems.
- 4. Company will provide electric scooter sharing systems, which collectively will be referred to as the "fleet".
- 5. All Company fleet devices have GPS, 3G, and self-locking technology, such that the electric-assist scooters may be locked and tracked and opened by users with a phone application.

In consideration of the mutual covenants and representations set forth in this Agreement, City and Company hereby agree to launch an electric scooter sharing system program, with renewals every 12 months.

AGREEMENT

Scope: This Agreement and its terms apply to any proposed deployment of Stand-up electric scooter sharing systems within City jurisdictional boundaries. The City agrees that Company may utilize the City Right of Way to provide shared mobility services within the City. The term Right of Way ("ROW") refers to public sidewalks, public roads, other public pathways, City-owned parking lots, and parks owned and maintained by the City for a term of up to twelve (12) months, which may be amended or extended in writing, by mutual agreement to address any issues and modifications raised during the pilot term. This is a non-exclusive agreement and City reserves the right to issue business licenses and to enter into similar agreements in furtherance of implementation of a pilot program for dockless shared mobility devices to other businesses providing shared mobility devices during the term of this Agreement.

- Both parties agree to meet after three (3) months to meet and review the operating agreement between the City, and the Company. At this time, the City can bring up any issues that need to be addressed and the City and the Company can add an addendum to the Agreement as needed.
- 3) Except as otherwise provided herein, City shall regulate the operation of Stand-up electric scooters in a manner no more restrictive than City's regulation of bicycles. Stand-up electric scooters are to be ridden on streets, and where available, in bike lanes and bike paths. Stand-up electric scooters are to stay to the right of street lanes and to offer the right of way to bicycles in bike lanes and on bike paths. Users of Stand-up electric scooters shall be 18 years of age or older. Users of Stand-up electric scooters who violate these provisions may be fined by City consistent with fines for cyclists.
- 4) Use of City ROW. City authorizes the Company to use the public ROW solely for the purposes of maintaining and offering its stand-up scooter fleet for a shared mobility program within the City. Authority to utilize the City ROW for this fleet is dependent on the Company's compliance with all terms of this Agreement, the California Vehicle Code, and the City's Municipal Code. The rights described in this Agreement do not constitute a lease or an easement and shall not transfer any real property interest in City property.
 - a. This Agreement only applies to operations within the City of Marina ROW as defined herein. Additional operational areas may be established, for example, locations on private properties and transit stations. Prior written consent of the property owner shall be obtained by the Company.
- Permitted Use. Company may use the ROW for parking of the fleet that is owned and maintained by Company for use in the shared mobility program. For purposes of this Agreement, the term ROW refers to hard-surfaced areas owned and maintained by the City. Company shall not place or attach any personal property, fixtures, or structures to ROW without the prior written consent of City.
 - a. It is Company's duty under this Agreement to ensure that use of the ROW and Company's operations within the City shall not: a) adversely affect ROW or the City's streets, or sidewalks; and b) adversely affect the property of any third parties located within the ROW; and c) impede or inhibit pedestrian movement or accessibility within the public way or along other property or rights-of way owned or controlled by the City; or d) create conditions which are a threat to public safety and security.
 - b. Upon termination of this Agreement by either Party, Company shall, at its sole cost and expense, immediately remove its fleet and any other property from the City ROW.

- 6) Fleet. The fleet provided by Company shall meet all applicable safety standards and requirements in the California Vehicle Code, including lights and reflectors, and be well-maintained and in good and safe riding condition.
 - a. A maximum of 100 deployed and properly maintained electric scooters should be in service in any calendar month. At the discretion of the City, the maximum number of deployed devices may be dynamically managed. The goal of the fleet shall be to average 2 rides per vehicle over a 30-day period. The maximum number of deployed shared mobility devices can be increased or decreased with prior notice to the City based upon the last 30-days' data demonstrating fleet performance against this average 2 riders per day standard. To increase the fleet above 100 devices, the previous 30-day period must demonstrate a minimum average usage of 2 rides per day.
- 7) Fees. Company, and all independent contractors (Fleet Managers) working for Company in the City of Marina, shall submit to the City the applicable business licensing fees as set forth in Chapter 5.20 of the City of Marina Municipal Code.
- Administrative Cost Recovery. This Agreement is contingent upon an active encroachment permit being obtained, and maintained in good standing at all times, by the Company from the City's Public Works Department. This must be renewed on a regular basis as agreed upon with the Director of Public Works. Company will remit payment based on the average number of deployed vehicles in the public right of way over a time. This cost recovery is intended to fully reimburse ongoing City administration costs of implementing and enforcing this Agreement.
- 9) Fleet Parking. Company and the City may collaboratively identify designated parking areas to station fleet devices and corral and rebalance the fleet as needed. Company and the City may pre-designate fleet parking zones for staging the fleet for public use ("Home Zones"). The Home Zones will be identified on the up-to-date application map maintained by Company and available for viewing by the City at all times. The City will work in good faith with Company to determine and locate stations so as to be convenient for public access. Fleet may only be parked in a legal manner in the ROW by individuals participating in the shared mobility program. Electric scooters parked on private property will be allowed at the discretion of the private property owner but may be subject to approval of the City's Community Development Department. Company will actively manage its fleet to ensure orderly parking and the free and unobstructed use of the ROW.
 - a. Stand up electric scooters in the fleet shall be restricted to the following parking zones on the ROW:
 - i. Fleet can only be parked on hard surfaces (e.g. concrete, asphalt, compacted soil)

- and shall stand upright when parked.
- ii. Fleet shall not be parked in zones adjacent to or in any way blocking loading zones, passenger loading zones, disabled parking zones, automobile street parking spaces, curb ramps, entryways, driveways, and street furniture and pathways that require pedestrian access (e.g. benches, play structures).
- iii. Shared mobility devices shall not be deployed or parked at the corners of sidewalks nor within any crosswalk, curb ramp, or within a feature that serves as an accessible element such as landings, areas of refuge, detectable warning surfaces, bus bench access, bus stop access, or any other physical feature that may be require for mobility. Devices shall not be deployed or parked within 5 feet of a street corner pedestrian ramp.
- iv. Shared mobility devices parked in residential areas that do not impede pedestrian travel will be allowed to remain in place.
- b. Company shall inform users of devices and its Fleet Managers responsible for deploying its fleet as to how to park or deploy the fleet correctly. Company shall inform the City as to how it plans to incentivize device users and Fleet Managers responsible for deploying the fleet to park or deploy shared mobility devices safety and correctly. Company will be responsible for payment of fees and disincentives for any scooters not parked in accordance with Section 9.a. above.
- c. Company shall require shared mobility device users to take and submit a photo of the parked device via the mobile application at the end of a ride. Company shall monitor the submitted photos and take prompt actions to address shared mobility device parking violations.
- Maintenance and Care of ROW. Company expressly agrees to repair, replace or otherwise restore any part or item of real or personal property that is damaged, lost or destroyed as a result of Company's use of ROW. Should Company fail to repair, replace, or otherwise restore such real or personal property, Company expressly agrees to pay City's costs, including reasonable administrative fees, in making such repairs, replacements, or restorations.
- 11) Company shall provide easily visible contact information, including toll-free phone number and/or e-mail address on each Stand-up electric scooter for members of the public to make relocation requests or to report other issues with devices.
- Safety Education and Customer Communication. Company shall provide education to stand-up electric scooter riders on the City's existing rules and regulations, safe and courteous riding, and proper parking. Company shall:
 - Educate users regarding laws applicable to riding and operating stand up electric scooters including wearing a helmet as necessary.
 - Notify customers that rider shall yield to pedestrians on sidewalks.

- Instruct customers on how to park fleet devices legally and properly.
- Make available parking instruction materials that will be available on the fleet, the app and as outreach materials for distribution.
- Provide a mechanism for customers to easily and quickly notify the company of any problems with the stand-up electronic scooters, including providing a phone number clearly posted on all fleet and available on the mobile application and website.
- Maintain a customer service phone number for customers to report safety concerns, complaints, or ask questions. This service phone number must be posted on all deployed fleet and on website and mobile application.
- Will be responsible and accountable for any fleet safety equipment distributed to users, such as helmets and other accessories.
- Engage with California State University at Monterey Bay, and possibly other schools, districts and institutions on fleet device safety.
- Data Sharing and Required Reports. Company will provide data to City as necessary to assist with monitoring program usage. Company shall provide City staff access to, and maintain, a real time dashboard that monitors the fleet. Company shall ensure the dashboard has the capability of providing monthly reports to the City concerning utilization of the fleet and the fleet route usage and shall cooperate with the City in the collection and analysis of aggregated data concerning its operations. Said dashboard shall provide the following real-time data at a minimum.
 - Heat map of rider usage;
 - Total number of rides per day per device;
 - Total riders, including unique riders;
 - Average trip time;
 - Average trip distance;
 - Peak hours of use; and
 - Fleet distribution and in service.

In addition to the dashboard data, Company shall also provide quarterly reports that provide the following information at a minimum.

- Total number of reported complaints and damage and response time; and
- Number of outreach and safety activities in Marina.

Reports shall be public records as defined in the California Public Records Act.

Fines and Penalties. Company shall be responsible for administrative fines assessed pursuant to Chapter 1.12 of the City of Marina Municipal Code because of Company devices being deployed by its representatives or parked by its users in the ROW in manner

that is inconsistent with the parking requirements of item 9.a. Should a shared mobility device not be relocated, re-parked, rebalanced or removed within the Response Time listed below, the device may be impounded by the City or its agents and taken to a City facility for storage at the expense of the Company.

- Response Time. Company agrees to a minimum four (4) hour response time for standard calls for service from the City or the community within business hours defined as 8:00 AM to 6:00 PM. The City staff shall have the ability to report high priority issues with a minimum two (2) hour response time within business hours.
- 16) Compliance with All Laws. Company at its own cost and expense must abide by all statutes, ordinances, regulations, and requirements of all governmental entities applicable to its use of the ROW and the operation of this shared mobility pilot program, including but not limited to laws governing operation of electric scooters. If any license, permit, or other governmental authorization is required for Company's lawful use or occupancy of ROW or any portion thereof, Company shall procure and maintain such license, permit and/or governmental authorization at or prior to the inception and throughout the term of this Agreement.

17) Indemnification:

a. Company and City agree that the City, its Council, boards and commissions, officers, employees, agents, and volunteers should, to the extent permitted by applicable law in effect on or validly retroactive to the date first written above, be fully protected from any loss, injury, damage, claim, lawsuits, cost, expense, attorney's fees, litigation costs, defense costs, court costs or any other cost arising out of or in any way related to the activities authorized by this Agreement including, but not limited to, Company's use of facilities or equipment provided by the City or others and claims brought by customers of Company, regardless of the negligence of and regardless of whether liability without fault is imposed or sought to be imposed on the City, whether arising directly or indirectly, arising out of or connected in any way with the shared mobility device program or services provided for herein by the Company (including its officers, managers, employees, agents and volunteers). Accordingly, the provisions of this indemnity provision are intended by the Parties to be interpreted and construed to provide the fullest protection possible under the law to the City. Company acknowledges that City would not enter this Agreement in the absence of the commitment from Company to indemnify and protect City as set forth herein.

To the full extent permitted by law, Company shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless City, its Council, boards and commissions, officers, employees, agents, and volunteers from any liability, claims, suits, actions, arbitration proceedings, administrative proceedings, regulatory proceedings, losses, expenses or costs of any kind, whether actual, alleged, or threatened, actual attorney fees incurred by City, court costs, interest, defense costs including expert witness fees, infringement of patent, copyright or any other proprietary right or trademark, and any other costs or expenses of any kind whatsoever without restriction or limitation incurred in relation to, as a

consequence of, or arising out of or in any way attributable actually, allegedly, or impliedly, in whole or in part, to the activities associated with this Agreement including any bodily injury including death or damage to property arising out of or in connection with any use, misuse, placement or misplacement, including but not limited to placement or misplacement resulting in alleged violations of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), of Company's devices, property or equipment by any person. All obligations under this provision are to be paid by the Company as they are incurred by the City.

Without affecting the rights of the City under any provision of law, this Agreement, or this section Company shall not be required to indemnify and hold harmless City for liability as set forth above to the extent that loss, damage, injury, or liability results from the gross negligence or willful misconduct of City, its Council, boards and commissions, officers employees, agents and volunteers and is not contributed to by any act of or by any omission of Company including its officers, managers, employees, agents and volunteers to perform some duty imposed by law or agreement on Company, provided the City's gross negligence or willful misconduct is determined by written agreement of the parties or the findings of a court of competent jurisdiction. This exception will apply only in instances where the City is shown to have been grossly negligent or to have engaged in willful misconduct and not in instances where Company (including its officers, managers, employees, agents, and volunteers) is solely or partially at fault and where City' is not grossly negligent or did not engage in willful misconduct. In those instances, the obligation of Company will be all inclusive and City will be indemnified for all liability incurred, even though a percentage of the liability is attributable to conduct of the City.

The obligations of Company under this or any other provision of this Agreement will not be limited by the insurance provisions of this Agreement or the provisions of any workers' compensation act or similar act. Company expressly waives its statutory immunity under such statutes or laws as to City, its Council, boards and commissions, officers, employees, agents, and volunteers.

Failure of the City to monitor compliance with these requirements imposes no additional obligations on City and will in no way act as a waiver of any rights hereunder. This obligation to indemnify and defend City as set forth herein is binding on the successors, assigns, or heirs of Company and shall survive the termination of this Agreement or this section.

b. If any action or proceeding is brought against any indemnified party by reason of any of the matters against which the Company has agreed to defend the indemnified party, as provided above, Company, upon notice from the City, shall have an independent obligation to immediately defend any indemnified Party at Company's expense by counsel reasonably acceptable to the City. An indemnified party need not have first paid for any of the matters to which it is entitled to indemnification in order to be so defended.

- c. The review, acceptance or approval of the Company's work or services by any indemnified party shall not affect, relieve, or reduce the Company's indemnification or defense obligations.
- Non-assignability. Both parties hereto recognize that this Agreement is for the personal services of Company or a wholly owned subsidiary of the Company and cannot be transferred, assigned, or subcontracted by Company without the prior written consent of City.
- 19) Waivers. The waiver by either party of any breach or violation of any term, covenant, or condition of this Agreement or of any provisions of any ordinance or law shall not be deemed to be a subsequent waiver of such term, covenant, condition, ordinance or law or of any subsequent breach or violation of the same or of any other term, covenant, condition, ordinance or law. The subsequent acceptance by either party of any consideration which may become due hereunder shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any preceding breach or violation by the other party of any term, covenant, or condition of this Agreement or of any applicable law or ordinance.
- Insurance. As a condition precedent to the effectiveness of this Agreement and without limiting Company's indemnification of the City, Company agrees to obtain and maintain in full force and effect at its own expense the insurance policies set forth in **Exhibit "A"** "Insurance" attached hereto and made a part hereof.
- Fleet Manager. The parties acknowledge that Company may subcontract with independent business logistics providers to facilitate local operations. The parties further acknowledge that Company may perform any or all the services contemplated hereunder, including the owning and/or operation of Stand-up electric scooters in City, through one or more of its wholly owned subsidiaries. Company's use of these logistics providers or performance through its wholly owned subsidiaries does not constitute a transfer or assignment of this Agreement, and Company remains responsible for all obligations and requirements under this Agreement. A physical inspection of the home or base of operations of the Fleet Manager's area for charging scooters will be required if the fleet is located within the City of Marina. This inspection will be required for all new Fleet Managers as part of their Business License application.
- Attorney Fees. In the event it should become necessary for either party to enforce or interpret any of the terms and conditions of this Agreement by means of court action or administrative enforcement the laws of the State of California shall govern the interpretation of the terms and conditions of this Agreement and such action shall be brought in a court of proper jurisdiction in Monterey County, the prevailing party, in addition to any other remedy at law or in equity available to such party, shall be awarded all reasonable costs and reasonable

attorney's fees in connection therewith, including the fees and costs of experts reasonable consulted by the attorneys for the prevailing party.

- 23) Non-discrimination. Company warrants that it is an Equal Opportunity Employer and shall comply with applicable regulations governing equal employment opportunity. Neither Company nor any of its subcontractors shall discriminate in the employment of any person because of race, color, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status, sex, or age, unless based upon a bona fide occupational qualification pursuant to the California Fair Employment and Housing Act.
- 24) Term. This agreement shall commence on ______ 2022, (the "Commencement Date") and shall expire twelve (12) months after the Commencement Date, unless earlier terminated or extended pursuant to termination clause below.
- 25) Termination. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon (30) thirty days prior written notice for any of the following conditions:
 - a. Non-performance of this Agreement;
 - b. Public health and safety reasons;
 - c. If the services or operations hereunder become operationally impracticable; or
 - d. An attempt to transfer or assign this Agreement.

Company may terminate this Agreement at any time prior to the expiration date set forth in section 24 above, however, Company shall not terminate this Agreement without first giving at least 30 days' written notice of termination. Upon the effective date of termination of this Agreement, Company shall remove all fleet devices from the City and restore the ROW to the condition of the ROW at the Commencement Date of this Agreement.

- Independent contractors. In carrying out their responsibilities, the Parties shall remain independent contractors, and nothing herein shall be interpreted or intended to create a partnership, joint venture, employment, agency, franchise or other form of joint relationship.
- Notices. All notices and communications to the City from Company shall be made in writing and sent to the address below. All notices and communication to the Company shall be made in writing and sent to the address given in the Preamble.
- Amendment. This Agreement may be amended by mutual agreement of the parties. Such amendments shall only be effective if incorporated in written amendments to this Agreement and executed by duly authorized representatives of the parties.

- 29) Applicable law and Venue. The laws of California shall govern the interpretation and enforcement of this Agreement. Venue shall be in Monterey County Superior Court.
- 30) Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed simultaneously or in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same agreement.
- 31) This agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

Exhibit A Insurance Requirements

Company shall procure and maintain for the duration of the Agreement insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property that may arise from or in connection with the performance of the Agreement by Company, its agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors.

Minimum Scope and Limits of Insurance

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 1. **Commercial General Liability (CGL)**: Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis for bodily injury or property damage, including contractual liability, personal injury, and product liability and completed operations with limits of no less than \$5,000,000 per occurrence and \$5,000,000 in the aggregate for all occurrences during the policy period. The insurance shall not exclude coverage for injuries or damages caused by the shared mobility service provided to the shared mobility device user.
- 2. **Business Auto:** Primary coverage shall be written on Insurance Services Office Form CA 00 01 10 01 and shall be endorsed to state the City of Marina, its officers, officials, employee and volunteers are added as additional insureds with respect to the ownership, operation, maintenance, use, loading or unloading of any auto owned, leased, hired or borrowed by Company or for which Company is responsible. Limits shall be no less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage. Starting and ending dates shall be concurrent. If Company owns no autos, a non owned auto endorsement to the CGL policy described above is acceptable.
- 3. **Workers' Compensation**: Workers' Compensation insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits and Employers' Liability Insurance with limits of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease.

If Company maintains broader coverage or higher limits than the minimum shown above, the City of Marina requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage or higher limits maintained by Company. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the City of Marina.

Other Insurance Provisions

- 1. The insurance policies shall contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
- a. Additional Insured Status: The City of Marina, its officers, officials, employs and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL, Auto and Employers' Liability policies. Additional Insured coverage must be provided in the form of an endorsement to Company's insurance (at least as broad as Insurance Services Office Form CG 20 10 11 85, or if not available, through the addition of **both** CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33 or CG 20 18 **and** CG 20 37).
- b. Primary Coverage: For any claims related to this Agreement, Company's insurance shall be primary coverage at least as broad as Insurance Services Office Form CG 20 01 04 13 as respects

the City of Marina, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the City of Marina, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be in excess of Company's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

- c. Notice of Cancellation: Each insurance policy required herein shall state that coverage shall not be canceled except after notice has been given to the City of Marina.
- d. Waiver of Subrogation: Company hereby grants to the City of Marina a waiver of any right of subrogation which any insurer of Company may acquire against the City of Marina by virtue of payment of any loss. Company agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the City of Marina has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.

The Workers' Compensation policy shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City of Marina for all work performed by Company, its employees, agents and subcontractors.

Self-Insured Retentions

Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City of marina. The City of Marina may require Company to purchase coverage with a lower retention or provide satisfactory proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. The policy language shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured or the City of Marina.

Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers authorized to conduct business in California with a current A.M. Best rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the City of Marina.

Verification of Coverage

Company shall furnish the City of Marina with original certificates and amendatory endorsement (or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage provided by this clause). All certificates and endorsement are to be received and approved by the City of Marina execution of this Agreement. However, failure to obtain required documents prior to the commencement of the Agreement shall not waive Company's obligation to provide them. The City of Marina reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including the endorsements required herein, at any time.

Failure to Maintain Insurance Coverage

If Company, for any reason, fails to maintain insurance coverage which is required pursuant to this Agreement, the same shall be deemed a material breach of contract. The City of Marina, at its sole option, may terminate this Agreement and obtain damages from Company resulting from said breach.

Subcontractors.

Company remains fully responsible for the acts, omissions, services, functions and obligations performed by its subcontractors to the same extent as if such acts, or omissions, services, functions or obligations were performed by Company's employees or agents and for purposes of this Agreement such work will be deemed work performed by the Company. Company shall not employ for the program any subcontractor that the City may within a reasonable time object to as unsuitable. The parties agree that Company's subcontractors shall be independent contractors with regard to the providing of services under this Agreement, and that Company's subcontractors shall not be considered to be employees or agents of the City for any purpose and will not be entitled to any of the benefits City provides for its employees. City shall make no deductions for payroll taxes or Social Security from amounts due Company for work or services provided under this Agreement.

Special Risks or Circumstances

City reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstance.

BIRD SCOOTER MOU FAQs

Why are we approving this tonight?

Bird has requested to use our public right-of-way for stand-up electric scooter use. Additionally, we are looking at this now for alignment with CSUMB which is also entering into an agreement with BIRD. This will facilitate an alternative mode of transportation for students to travel to Marina.

Where are the scooters allowed to be?

Scooters will be allowed in the public right-of-way including on streets and sidewalks, and geocoded to create a digital fence to run only in Marina.

What happens if we deny this MOU? What will happen to the CSUMB scooter agreement?

Bird scooters will not come to the City of Marina and mostly likely not at the CSUMB campus as well. Additionally, per AB 1286 Bird would be prohibited from operating as this bill mandates an agreement with the City.

What mechanism is in place to ensure the vendor is complying with the MOU?

A 90-day check in provisions has been added. Additionally, as party to the agreement the City can terminate its participation at any time and the agreement is renewed annually after 1-year period.

What happens to the CSUMB approval of the scooter project?

CSUMB will likely NOT move forward since we share a border with the campus and we would prohibit the scooters in our area. Additionally, the vendor is not interested in operating at just the campus, but rather with CSUMB and Marina combined.

How can we make sure the scooters will not be all over our public right of way?

The fleet of scooters are only allowed to be parked on hard surfaces and are not allowed to be parked blocking sidewalks or entrances. To ensure compliance users are required to take a photo of where they park the scooter at the end of use. If the scooter is parked incorrectly the user will continue to be charged until they have parked the scooter correctly and taken a new photo.

What is the phone number for a resident to call if they see a scooter on a sidewalk?

If approved the BIRD fleet manager's phone number will be put on all scooters and posted to the City website.

CITY COUNCIL CONSIDER ADOPTING RESOLUTION 2022-, AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 80-71, AS AMENDED, PARAGRAPHS 8, 9, 13, AND 27 REGARDING BEST PRACTICES FOR PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT AND MEETING EFFICIENCY

REQUEST:

It is requested that the City Council consider:

- 1. Adopting Resolution No. 2022-, amending Resolution No. 80-71, as amended, Establishing the Rules and Procedures for the Conduct of Meetings (**Exhibit A**);
- 2. Amending Paragraph 8 regarding Order of Business and Consideration and Sequence of Agenda Items;
- 3. Amending Paragraph 9 regarding Preparation of the Minutes;
- 4. Amending Paragraph 13 regarding Debate;
- 5. Amending Paragraph 27 regarding Manner of Addressing Council; and
- 6. Approving a new Agenda format in substantially the same form as **Exhibit B**.

BACKGROUND:

At the regular meeting of December 12, 1980, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 80-71, "Establishing the Rules and Procedures for the Conduct of Meetings of the City Council" ("Rules and Procedures"). The Rules and Procedures govern Council conduct, and include provisions for the setting meetings, order of the agendas, Council debate, and conflicts of interest.

The Rules and Procedures have been amended multiple times over the years – primarily in regard to the order of the agenda and meeting times. (Exhibit C.) More recently, the City Council directed staff to bring forward proposals regarding the Rules and Procedures to increase public engagement and improve meeting efficiency. While this is the present direction, a more comprehensive update can be brought forward to align the Rules and Procedures with the Marina Municipal Code, and incorporate all amendments into one document.

This agenda item was brought to Council for consideration in early August, and continued several times due to more pressing matters. Since August, members of the public and Council have suggested additional areas of potential revision to streamline public meetings.

ANALYSIS:

Elected officials have a large body of work to get through, and it must be accomplished in a reasonable amount of time. A well-organized agenda, appropriate opportunities for public comment and following protocol are all essential to running an effective meeting.

Public Engagement

Public comment is an essential part of local government meetings. Hearing from the public is a critical part of the Council's role. Council members need to be in touch with the public and be responsive. That said, the purpose of public comment is to inform the Council of the public's views, and not to enter into debate or dialogue with Council, or to have general public comment take precedence over items scheduled for action on the agenda.

Time limits on public comment are an important tool for running a meeting of reasonable length, and prioritizing the important discourse while participants are available. General public comment at the meeting's outset provides an opportunity for members of the public to share their viewpoints with Council on matters of concern. However, extensive general comment, prior to the Council's deliberation of the agendized action items, can fatigue all participants and diminish the quality of the discourse and decision-making.

It is recommended that the Mayor and Council provide brief factual information to public comment, if necessary and appropriate, but should not enter into a back and forth exchange or call on staff to provide answers on the spot. As a caution, once a third comment or participant is involved, the question/answer can quickly turn into an unagendized discussion. A best practice is for staff to note input or questions and provide responses at a later date, or to place the item on a future agenda.

The City may adopt reasonable regulations for public comment, including time limits. Many public agencies allow up to three minutes, which can be limited if there are many participants or to accommodate a lengthy agenda. The public does not need to be given an opportunity to speak on an item that has already been considered by a committee made up exclusively of members of the Council at a public meeting, if all interested members of the public had the opportunity to speak on the item before or during its consideration, and if the item has not been substantially changed. In addition, the City may provide multiple ways for residents to express their views, which can further reduce pressure on meeting time, i.e., by encouraging letters and other written communication.

Staff proposes amendments to the current Agenda template in terms of public comments. (**Exhibit B**.) It is recommended that public input on the Consent Agenda be heard under general Public Comment. In this way, the Consent Agenda may be called, and if no items are pulled, adopted in one motion. The agenda, in its current form, provides

"... any member of the public or the City Council may ask a question or make a comment about an agenda item and staff will provide a response. If discussion or a lengthy explanation is required, that item will be removed from the Consent Agenda and placed at the end of Other Action Items."

The Agenda can be clarified to specify that while members of the public may comment on Consent items before action is taken, it remains within the Council's discretion as to whether to pull an item. Further, it is also within Council's discretion as to whether the public comment or question is to be answered by staff or referred to a later date. Additionally, staff proposes to make the Agenda more user-friendly by including only those items brought forward for Council action.

Staff recommends changes to the Rules and Procedures, Paragraph 8 a), to separate Council and Staff Announcements from Public Comment. Subsection b) modifications reflect the new numbering, and update the Rules with gender-neutral language. Proposed additions are set forth in italicized font; deletions are noted in strikeout font:

8. Order of Business and Consideration and Sequence of Agenda Items.

- a) The business of the City Council shall be taken up for consideration and disposition in the following order:
- 1. Call to Order 5:00p.m. (if there is to be a Closed Session)
- 2. Roll Call and Establishment of Quorum
- 3. Closed Session (if any)
- 4. Open Regular Session (6:30 p.m.) Report Any Action taken in Closed Session
- 5. Moment of Silence & Pledge of Allegiance
- 6. Special Presentations no action; no public comment
- 7. Special Council and Staff Announcements and Communications from the Floor
- 8. Public Comment Up to a maximum of 3 minutes per person
- 9. Consent Agenda
- 10. Public Hearings
- 11. Other Council Action Items
- 12. Council & Staff Informational Reports no action taken, no public comment
- 13. Adjournment
- b) The Mayor, at *their* his/her discretion and subject to majority vote overruling *them* him/her, may re-arrange agenda items, provided that any items 'pulled' from Item 98, 'Consent Agenda' shall be considered following the last item of Item 1110, "Other Council Action Items."

Paragraph 27 a) of the Rules and Procedures, entitled "Manner of Addressing Council," sets forth the allotted time for public comments. Proposed modifications consider that members of the public cannot be required to provide their names or other information as prerequisite to speaking, and that the Council has the ability to limit public comment where necessary for meeting efficiency.

Proposed additions are shown in italicized font; deletions are in strikeout font:

27. Addressing the Council

- a) Manner of Addressing Council. Each person desiring to address the Council shall step up to the speaker's rostrum, state his name and address for the record, state the subject he wishes to discuss, state whom he is representing if he represents an organization or other persons, and, unless further time is otherwise specifically provided for in these rules or is granted by majority vote of the Council, shall limit his remarks may comment for up to four three (43) minutes, which may be limited at the discretion of the Mayor depending on time available and the number of speakers. All remarks shall be addressed to the Council as a whole and not to any member thereof. No question shall be asked a Council Member or a member of the City staff without the permission of the Presiding Officer.
- c) After Motion Close of Public Hearing. After a motion has been made or a public hearing has been closed, no member of the public shall address the Council from the audience on the matter under consideration without first securing permission to do so by the City Council.

Structured Discussion

Motion after public comment and prior to Council discussion can help focus Council discourse by identifying the issue to be decided, and make it easier for members of the public to follow the discussion. Accordingly, staff recommends the Council first solicit public input, and then make a motion, followed by Council discussion and a vote. This is the recommended process set forth in Rosenberg's Rules of Order, which is a simplified version of Robert's Rules of Order. Not only does this help identify the issue before the Council, but it ensures compliance with the Brown Act, which requires the public be provided an opportunity to speak prior to action being taken.

Paragraph 8 c) of the Rules and Procedures sets forth the procedure for consideration of Agenda Items. The proposed modifications are set forth below (additions shown in italicized font; deletions in strikeout font):

- 8. Order of Business and Consideration and Sequence of Agenda Items.
 - c) The following shall be the procedure for consideration and sequence of each Agenda Item, including Public Hearings:
 - 1. Mayor Introduces the Agenda Item
 - 2. City Manager/Executive Director (or designee/Council Member) Presents Staff Report
 - 3. Applicant/proponent, when appropriate, up to ten (10) minutes (at Presiding Officer's discretion)
 - 4. City Council Clarifying *Technical* Questions of Staff and Applicant/Proponent
 - 5. Brief Council Comments and Motion Public Comments up to a maximum of four three (43) minutes per person
 - 6. Mayor Closes Public Hearing/Public Comments
 - 7. Council *Motion and* Discussion
 - 8. Council Vote

Paragraph 30 also sets forth rules that apply to Public Hearings, which should be eventually be aligned or consolidated with Paragraph 8. A summary of the public hearing process is included on the draft Agenda.

Paragraph 13 g), "Limitation of Debate" provides, "No Council Member shall be allowed to speak more than once upon any particular subject until every other Council Member desiring to do so shall have spoken." To enhance debate, and manage time more efficiently, some councils have adopted the rule that each person may speak twice on a given subject. This proposed modification is set forth below (additions shown in italicized font):

13. Rules of Debate.

g) <u>Limitation of Debate</u>. No Council Member shall be allowed to speak more than once upon any particular subject until every other Council Member desiring to do so shall have spoken. *Council Members may speak twice on a given subject*.

Meeting Preparation

To aid in meeting efficiency, questions of staff should be asked in advance. This saves Council time during the meeting, and for those questions that Council would like to be addressed at the meeting, enables staff to prepare to answer the questions accurately and succinctly. As a result, meetings run more smoothly, Council is provided the information needed for decision-making, and the need to continue items to the next agenda is minimized.

Minutes

Many public agencies have adopted action minutes, which record what is done at a meeting and not what is said. This is also the guideline of Robert's Rules of Order, which governs Council conduct. The time and effort required to prepare detailed minutes summarizing what was said, and their subjective nature, are time-consuming and resource intensive and the effort often exceeds the value to the City and to the public. This is not necessary given that Council meetings are recorded and available through AMP and YouTube. The proposed modification to the Rules is set forth below (additions shown in italicized font; deletions in strikeout font):

9. <u>Preparation of Minutes</u>. The City Clerk shall have exclusive responsibility for preparation of the *action* minutes, and any directions for changes in the minutes shall be made only by majority action of the City Council.

Future Topics

Future topics to improve meeting efficiency may include additional training on Council, Commission and staff roles and responsibilities, Robert's and Rosenberg's Rules of Order, the Brown Act, and consideration of a Code of Conduct.

WHEREAS, after discussion, the City Council directed staff to place on a future agenda a resolution to make proposed changes to the Rules and Procedures regarding public engagement and meeting efficiency; and

WHEREAS, staff proposes modifications to Paragraph 8 regarding Order of Business and Consideration and Sequence of Agenda Items, Paragraph 9 regarding Preparation of Minutes, Paragraph 13 regarding Debate, and Paragraph 27 regarding Manner of Addressing Council; and amendment of the Agenda format; and

WHEREAS, amendment of Resolution 80-71, as amended, is not subject to California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) as it is not a "project" pursuant to Section 15378 of the CEQA Guidelines.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARINA DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING RULES AND PROCEDURES FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE MEETINGS OF THE MARINA CITY COUNCIL

WHEREAS, in order to provide for continuity of responsibility and to provide sufficient time and opportunity for full consideration and public discussion of important issues which the City Council must review and decide, and in order to provide for the orderly and expeditious conduct of council meetings, it is necessary and appropriate to adopt the following rules and procedures relating to the conduct of such meetings,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Marina, as follows:

- Purpose. The purpose of this resolution is to establish the procedure for the presentation and determination of matters coming before the Marina City Council, to provide for the fair and efficient consideration of said matters, and to insure that the public is fully informed of the matters coming before the City Council and has an opportunity to witness the deliberations of the members thereof in the conduct of public business, and that proper public involvement in the deliberations of the Council be encouraged.
- 2. Regular Meetings. The City Council shall hold regular meetings on the first and third Tuesdays of each month at the hour of 7:30 o'clock p.m. in the Council Chamber of the City Hall, 211 Hillcrest Avenue in the City, or in such other place within the city limits to which said meeting may be adjourned. If by reason of fire, flood or other emergency it shall be unsafe to meet in the City Hall, the meetings may be held for the duration of the emer-

gency at such other place as is designated by the Mayor or, if he should fail to act, by three members of the City Council. day for any regular meeting falls on a legal holiday, no meeting shall be held on such holiday, but a regular meeting shall be held at the same hour on the following business day.

- Study Sessions. The City Council shall meet in a study session on the first and third Tuesdays of each month at the hour of 7:00 o'clock p.m. in the Council Chamber of the City Hall, or at such other place as may be determined by the Council, for the purpose of hearing reports from the staff and reviewing, discussing and debating matters of interest to the City. Such sessions shall be open to the public and press. No official action shall be taken at a study session; provided, however, that nothing herein shall be deemed to prevent the taking of an informal vote on any matter under discussion. The participation of the public in such sessions shall be subject to the discretion of the presiding office,.
- 4. Special Meetings. Special meetings may be called at any time by the Mayor, or by three members of the City Council, by delivering personally or by mail written notice to each Council Member and to each local newspaper of general circulation, radio or television station requesting notice in writing. Such notice must be delivered personally or by mail at least twenty-four hours before the time of such meeting as specified in the notice. The call and notice shall specify the time and place of the speical meeting and the business to be transacted. No other business shall be considered at such meetings. Such written notice may be dispensed with as to any Council Member who at or prior to the time the meeting convenes files with the City Clerk a written waiver of notice. Such

 waiver may be given by telegram. Such written notice may also be dispensed with as to any Council Member who is actually present at the meeting at the time it convenes.

5. Meetings to be Public - Exception for Executive Sessions.
All regular and special meetings of the City Council shall be public; provided, however, the City Council may hold executive sessions during a regular or special meeting, from which the public may be excluded, for the purpose of considering the matters referred to in §§54957-54957.6 of the Government Code of the State of California.

No member of the City Council, employee of the City, or any other person present during an executive session of the Council shall disclose to any person the content or substance of any discussion which took place during said executive session unless the City Council shall authorize the disclosure of such information by majority vote.

tions, contract documents or other matters to be submitted to the Council at a regular meeting shall be delivered to the City Clerk not later than 12:00 o'clock noon on the Wednesday preceding the meeting. The City Clerk shall prepare an agenda of all such matters according to the order of business (paragraph 8 hereinbelow). The agenda shall be delivered or otherwise made available to the Council Members on the Friday preceding the Tuesday Council meeting to which it pertains, and shall be made available to the public no later than 10:00 o'clock a.m. on the Monday preceding the meeting. All matters shall be considered by the Council in the order listed on the agenda, to the extent of time available; provided, however, that the order of the agenda may be changed at any time by the

unanimous consent of all Council Members then present at a meeting. I Agenda items not considered or completed for lack of time shall 2 become agenda items at the following meeting in accordance with the 3 foregoing policies. No matters other than those on the agenda 4 shall be finally acted upon by the Council; provided, however, that 5 a matter deemed to be an emergency by any Council Member, the City 6 Manager or the City Attorney, or a matter which would become moot 7 if not acted upon at the Council meeting at which it is brought up, with an explanation of the emergency or other necessity for bring-9 ing it up stated in open Council meeting, may be placed upon the 10 agenda by a motion, seconded and carried, and then may be considered 11 and acted upon by the Council. 12 13

Correspondence addressed to a) the City Council which is received by the City Clerk or any other officer or employee of the City shall not become a public record until received and filed by the Council at a regular, special or adjourned meeting of the Council. Correspondence shall not be read aloud at a Council meeting unless requested by a majority vote of the Council.

- b) Motion to Close Debate. When a motion to close debate is duly made and seconded, there shall be no further debate. question carries, the Presiding Officer shall put pending amendments to a vote, without debate, in the inverse order of their introduction before putting the main question. If the question is decided negatively, the main question and its amendments remain before the council.
- c) Reconsideration. Providing that no intervening rights will be prejudiced, any Council Member who voted with the majority on a question may move the reconsideration of that question at the same meeting in which the original decision was made or at the next following meeting. After a motion for reconsideration has been acted upon, no other similar motion shall be made without unanimous consent.
- Voting. Three affirmative votes are required to enact an ordinance or to adopt a resolution or motion granting a franchise of authorizing the payment or expenditure of money or incurring of a debt. The majority of a quorum is required to adopt other resolutions or motions. A "majority" refers to a majority of the quorum present.

Every ordinance shall be adopted by a roll call vote. All other matters may be referred to a vote unless a roll call is requested by any Council Member. On all matters for which a voice vote is authorized, the Presiding Officer may ask for, 'objections to the question?". If no objection is expressed, the Presiding Officer shall, "so order," and the minutes shall record a unanimous

- Failure to Vote. Every Council Member should vote unless disqualified by reason of a conflict of interest. A Council Member who abstains from voting in effect consents that a majority of the quorum may decide the question voted upon.
- 17. Silence Constitutes Affirmative Vote. Unless a member of the Council states that he is not voting, his silence shall be recorded as an affirmative vote.
- Tie Vote. Tie votes shall be lost motions and may be reconsidered.
- Changing Vote. A member may change his vote only if he makes a timely request to do so immediately following the announcement of the vote by the City Clerk and prior to the time that the next item in the order of business is taken up. A Council Member who publicly announces that he is abstaining from voting on a particular matter shall not subsequently be allowed to withdraw his abstention.
- 20. Disqualification for Conflict of Interest. Any Council Member who is disqualified from voting on a particular matter by reason of a conflict of interest shall publicly state or have the Presiding Officer state the nature of such disqualification in open meeting. Where no clearly disqualifying conflict of interest appears, the matter of disqualification may, at the request of the Council Member affected, be decided by the other Council Members or the City Attorney. A Council Member who is disqualified by reason of a conflict in interest in any matter shall not remain in his seat during the debate and vote on such matter, but shall

 request and be given the permission of the Presiding Officer to step down from the Council table. A Council Member stating such disqualification shall not be counted as a part of a quorum and shall be considered absent for the purpose of determining the outcome of any vote on such matter.

- 21. Remarks of Council Member and Synopsis of Debate. A
 Council Member may request through the Presiding Officer the
 privilege of having an abstract of his statement on any subject
 under consideration by the Council entered in the minutes. If the
 Council consents thereto, such statement shall be entered in the
 minutes.
- 22. Protest Against Council Action. Any Council Member shall have the right to have the reasons for his dissent from, or protest against, any action of the Council entered in the minutes. Such dissent or protest to be entered in the minutes shall be made in the following manner: "I would like the minutes to show that I am opposed to this action for the following reasons...".
- 23. Rules of Order. Except as otherwise provided in this resolution, other rules adopted by the City Council or applicable provisions of State law, the procedures of the Council shall be governed, to the extent applicable, by the latest revised edition of Robert's Rules of Order.
- 24. Failure to Observe Rules of Order. Rules adopted to expedite the transaction of the business of the Council in an orderly fashion are deemed to be procedural only and the failure to strictly observe such rules shall not affect the jurisdiction of the Council or invalidate any action taken at a meeting that is otherwise held in conformity with law.

Ordinances, Resolutions and Contracts.

a) All ordinances shall be prepared by the City Attorney. No ordinance shall be prepared for presentation to the Council unless ordered by a majority vote of the Council, or requested by the Mayor, or City Manager, or prepared by the City Attorney on his own initiative.

- b) Prior Approval by Administrative Staff. All ordinances, resolutions and contract documents shall, before presentation to the Council, have been approved as to form and legality by the City Attorney and shall have been examined and approved for administration by the City Manager or his authorized representative.
- Reading of Ordinances and Resolutions. At the time of adoption of an ordinance or a resolution, it shall be read in full unless, after the reading of the title thereof, the further reading thereof is waived by unanimous consent of the Council Members present. Such consent may be expressed by a statement by the Presiding Officer that "if there is no objection, the further reading of the ordinance or resolution shall be waived". Council Member so requests, the ordinance or resolution shall be read in full.

27. Addressing the Council.

a) Manner of Addressing Council. Each person desiring to address the Council shall step up to the speaker's rostrum, state his name and address for the record, state the subject he wishes to discuss, state whom he is representing if he represents an organizat tion or other persons, and, unless further time is otherwise specifically provided for in these rules or is granted by majority vote of the Council, shall limit his remarks to three (3) minutes. All

remarks shall be addressed to the Council as a whole and not to any member thereof. No question shall be asked a Council Member or a member of the City staff without the permission of the Presiding Officer.

- b) Spokesman for Group of Persons. In order to expedite matters and to avoid repetitious presentations, whenever any group of persons wishes to address the Council on the same subject matter, it shall be proper for the Presiding Officer to request that a spokesman be chosen by the group to address the Council and, in case additional information or matters are to be presented by any other member of said group, to limit the number of such persons addressing the Council.
- c) After Motion. After a motion has been made or a public hearing has been closed, no member of the public shall address the Council from the audience on the matter under consideration without first securing permission to do so by the City Council:
 - 28. Rules of Decorum.
- a) <u>Council Members</u>. While the Council is in session, the members must preserve order and decorum, and a member shall neither, by conversation or otherwise, delay or interrupt the proceedings or the peace of the Council nor disturb any member while speaking or refuse to obey the orders of the Presiding Officer.
- b) Employees. Members of the City staff and employees shall observe the same rules of order and decorum as are applicable to the City Council.
- c) Persons Addressing the Council. Any person making impertinent, slanderous or profane remarks, or who becomes boisterous while addressing the Council, shall be called to order by the

27 28 Presiding Officer and, if such conduct continues, may at the discretion of the Presiding Officer be barred from further audience before the Council during that meeting, unless permission to continue be granted by a majority of the Council.

- d) Members of the Audience. Any person in the audience who engages in disorderly conduct such as hand clapping, stamping of feet, whistling, using profane language, yelling, and similar demonstrations, which conduct disturbs the peace and good order of the meeting, or who refuses to comply with the lawful orders of the Presiding Officer, shall be guilty of an infraction, and upon instructions from the Presiding Officer, it shall be the duty of the Sergeant at Arms to remove any such person from the Council Chamber and to place him under arrest or otherwise cause him to be prosecuted under the law.
- Enforcement of Decorum. 29. The Director of Public Safety or such member or members of the Public Safety Department as he may designate, shall be Sergeant at Arms of the City Council and shall carry out all orders given by the Presiding Officer for the purpose of maintaining order and decorum at the Council meetings. Any Council Member may move to require the Presiding Officer to enforce the rules, and the affirmative vote of a majority of the Council shall require him to do so.
- 30. Public Hearings. The following rules shall apply to all public hearings, except when proceedings are held under general laws of the State of California which require different procedures.
- a) The Mayor shall state the subject matter of the hearing and declare the public hearing open. Before doing so, he may determine whether or not there are proponents or opponents who wish

to make presentations, how many persons wish to be heard, or other matters which may affect the conduct of the proceedings. He may impose and announce reasonable time limits on presentations or oral arguments by the public.

- b) The City Manager or appropriate staff member shall give a factual summary of the matter.
- c) The proponents shall be heard. (Written correspondence shall be summarized by the Clerk.)
- d) The opponents shall be heard. (Written correspondence shall be summarized by the Clerk.)
- e) Each side shall be given a reasonable time for rebuttal.

 Additional speakers must limit their remarks to providing new information that was not already covered by other speakers.
- f) Prior to the close of the public hearing, the Mayor shall give those persons wishing to place their names on the record as being for or against, without presenting an oral argument, an opportunity to do so.
 - g) The public hearing shall be declared closed.
 - h) The Council shall discuss and determine the matter.
- i) After the public hearing is closed, the public shall not be recognized to speak except to answer any question not covered in the public hearing, and provided that whenever any such answer is given, the opposing side shall be given an opportunity to present facts in rebuttal of the answer given.
- 31. Policy on Public Input. It is the declared policy of the City Council that any member of the public wishing to be heard on a matter under consideration by the City Council shall be given a reasonable opportunity to do so. Prior to the vote on any issue

the Mayor shall determine whether or not anyone present wishes to The Mayor may establish reasonable time limits for oral presentations and shall limit the presentation to the matter before the City Council at that time.

- Absences from Council Meetings. Pursuant to Government Code §36513, if a City Council Member is absent without permission from all regular Council meetings for 60 days consecutively from the last regular meeting he attended, his office becomes vacant and shall be filled by the Council as any other vacancy. In addition, should any Council Member be absent from two (2) consecutive regular Council meetings, or from three (3) regular Council meetings in any six-month period, without permission from (i.e., not excused for good cause by) the Council, the Council may determine that the best interests of the City would be served by said Council Member's resignation, and may request such resignation in a letter authorized by vote of the Council.
- Automatic Adjournment. Unless otherwise adjourned, all meetings of the City Council shall automatically be adjourned at 10:00 o'clock p.m., except that a majority may extend the automatic adjournment to 10:30 o'clock p.m., and adjournment may be further postponed only by unanimous consent to adjourn not later than a specified time.
- These rules may be amended by the Amendment of Rules. Council by an affirmative vote of a majority of a quorum; provided however, that where a provision of these rules require action by a specific affirmative vote which is greater than a majority of a quorum, then an amendment to that rule requires the same vote required for the rule proposed to be amended.
